BEYOND SCHOOL

One of the new MHS 2020 initiatives being implemented this year is continuing the connections and support available to our students beyond Year 12.

For the past three years we have asked our exit students to complete a questionnaire at the end of their first year beyond school. The picture this has provided of their post-school experience is illuminating.

By the end of their first year, over one third felt that their transition to tertiary study had not been as successful as they had wished. Many found the quality of their courses disappointing and felt unprepared for the environment and lifestyle of a university student.

By the end of their third year more than half had changed courses, in many cases altering their intended career path dramatically.

Given this pattern of experience, what role can MHS play in improving our students' transition to tertiary studies? The School is fortunate in being able to comfortably predict that tertiary study will be the destination for the vast majority of our students.

We have commenced discussions with Melbourne and Monash University to seek their support in developing a transition support program.

Next week is orientation week at most universities and on Sunday 25 February, last year's Year 12s will return to the School for Homecoming Day.

We have also invited students from previous years now nearing completion of their tertiary courses to join us and discuss their experiences of university.

Following this, we will be convening Alumni meetings at Melbourne and Monash Universities to enable past MHS students to seek advice from students already completing specific tertiary courses.

We are particularly grateful for the support of the MHSOBA which has assisted with the facilitation of these Alumni meetings. It is hoped that these

may develop into continuing associations at the major universities.

The advice and information we will glean from these initiatives will also enable us to better prepare our senior students whilst still in school for what awaits them.

The Class of 2006 achieved a median ENTER of 95.35, which is the highest attained in the School since the inception of the ENTER scheme. With tertiary placement now largely completed, 98.6% of our exit students have accepted tertiary offers. The vast majority of these will be continuing their studies at Melbourne University (43%) and Monash (38%).

The School is justifiably proud of the achievements of last year's students. However, our goal is always to do better and I have already challenged this year's Year 12s to better the records of their predecessors.

SUCCESS OF OUR STUDENTS

As another indication of the successes of last year, the folio work of two of our Art students has been selected for inclusion in the Top Design exhibition to be held at the Melbourne Museum from Monday 19 March. Matthew Martin's Magazine folio for VCE Media and Sunny Tai's Visual Communication and Design folio have been selected. Congratulations to both of these students.

On Sunday 3 December 2006, a slightly revamped MHS senior basketball team made the journey to Geelong to participate in Basketball Australia's Annual National Schools Basketball Tournament where schools from all states in Australia compete. Without two of our finest players, our team looked fairly undersized and far from intimidating compared with the likes of Christian College, a local school – our first opponent for the tournament

Our first game began a little scrappy and remained consistently scrappy throughout the match with poor defence, turnovers and missed shots, aspects of the game we unfortunately flourished in. Christian College Geelong, who we would later play against in the bronze medal match, won comfortably by 10 points in a low scoring affair.

Our next 2 games saw MHS rise as a team defeating Tension Woods College and St. Edmunds College, the two remaining teams of our pool. Tate Du Plessis was solid, playing every minute for the first three matches whilst the youngest of the team Harrison Straw, Lachie (Rookie) George and Bernard Wojcic rose to the occasion.

The next game of the tournament was against Trinity College who the next day would take out Gold for our division. MHS was definitely competitive and pushed Trinity until the final buzzed, going down by less then 10 in a high scoring match. This match would see MHS face Christian College once again for the bronze medal.

Perhaps our defeat to Christian College early in the tournament gave them a false sense of security and gave us the challenge we were looking for in this tournament, a challenge MHS warmed to, unleashing an assault of their scrappy defence as their home crowd watched on. We won fairly comfortably in the end - 60 to 49.

COMMONWEALTH TAEKWONDO CHAMPIONSHIPS

On October 13 2006 I boarded Virgin Blue Flight Number DJ307, following my athlete's breakfast of 2 bacon and egg McMuffins. Two hours later, I arrived at Brisbane Airport, ready to take on the Commonwealth Nations in the 3rd Commonwealth Taekwondo Championships.

After a three hour wait, I checked into the Holiday Inn, a modest hotel. Following a healthy lunch (KFC), I had to endure a two hour team meeting where I received my Australian tracksuit.

At 5pm, the official weigh-in was conducted. Taekwondo, like boxing, has weight divisions ranging from fin weight to heavyweight. As a fin weight, I had to be less than 45kg. I stepped on the scales. The numbers flashed "41.5."

Next morning, after an all you can eat breakfast, the team filed into a bus which took us to the Boondall Entertainment Centre. The opening ceremony was conducted there, and speeches were given by various officials. Following that, the competition began.

Commonwealth Nations competing included Canada, England, and India, with some competitors being Olympic and World Championship medalists. The first day of competition went from about 10am to 8pm. All my fights were on that day, and 18 minutes of the ten hours was spent by me fighting for gold. I fought my way up to the finals, meeting a fellow Australian there. First round was even, and I held a one point lead (3-2). Second round my opponent was by far the aggressor and built a three point lead (8-5). However, in an excitement filled final round, a flurry of kicks lead me to an 11-9 win.

Overall, Australia did extremely well, coming first overall in the junior divisions and third in the senior divisions.

KASUKABE HIGH SCHOOL EXCHANGE (JAPAN)

It is now ten years since we officially established the exchange relationship with Kasukabe High School in Saitama prefecture, Japan. This tie has developed into a strong, unique relationship. This exchange program with KHS is a mutual student exchange program in which students of Melbourne High School visit Japan and are hosted by students of KHS and reciprocate the hosting when KHS students visit MHS the following year. The school is a traditional, academic and public boys high school located in Kasukabe city about 50km from the centre of Tokyo. In addition to the existing exchange program which includes a trip to Japan every second year in April for 20 MHS students, another reciprocal program commenced in July 2002 to cater for the interests of the broader school communities.

These programs include a Long Term Student Exchange. As part of the program, Goru Fukushima of KHS stayed at MHS and was hosted by Simon Bruckard (Year 11) and his family for three months in 2006. Simon studied at KSHS and stayed with Goru's family until recently. Simon has experienced many aspects of Japanese culture and a very cold winter as well, but enjoyed his stay immensely. This April 20, students of MHS will visit Japan and KHS for biannual exchange program with the School (Friday 9 – Friday 23 April).

This trip will be of 15 days duration which consists of 2 parts: a) 7-day study trip to Kyoto, Nikko and Tokyo and b) 8-day schooling at Kasukabe High School and home-stay with the students' families.

SCIENCE COMPETITIONS AND EXPERIENCES



There are several competitions available in science this year, such as:

- International Competition and Assessment for Schools Science
- STAV Science Talent Search
- National Youth Science Forum
- Rio-Tinto Big Science Competition
- Australian National Chemistry Quiz
- The Siemens Science Experience.

Also watch for Optus on-line quiz, Melbourne Uni's workshops in engineering, Vic Uni's Technology problem solving challenges, Clunies-Ross meet the scientist days, Swinburne University of Technology experience a snapshot of the life and work of a science researcher workshops, University of Sydney Sleek Geeks Science Eureka Schools Prize, and Victorian College of Pharmacy workshops that all ran in 2006.

See below for further details on each of these.

The International Competition and Assessment for Schools Science. (www.eaa.unsw.edu.au) will be held at the School on Thursday 10 May. Time has been allocated after lunch on that day for the competition to be run. All students in Years 9 and 10 will participate. For students of Years 11 and 12 the competition is optional. They will need to register their interest in participating with Mr. Goodey by Thursday 1 March. The Science faculty, hence no cost to the student, covers all costs.

The STAV Science Talent Search (<u>www.stav.vic.edu.au</u>) is open to 25 entries from the School. Year 10 students should consider their multimedia presentations from last year and can they be modified to meet the video area. In 2006 all entries that were entered received a bursary (min \$50). Students can enter an individual project (\$8) or a group project (\$15) per entry. Entries close on Friday 4 May.

The National Youth Science Forum (www.nysf.edu.au) is focussed on students in Year 11. It is a two-week residential programme at a University, mixing with other students from Year11 who are considering a science or engineering career. The sessions are Saturday 29 December to Saturday 12 January, or Saturday 12 January to Saturday 26 January 2008. It is supported by Clubs of Rotary International. The cost is about \$1500 but Rotary will cover at least half of this cost. Applicants will be required to complete a number of interviews in order to be selected. In 2005 we had three successful applicants. Nominations must be lodged with a Rotary club by Sunday 6 May.

The **Rio-Tinto** Big Science Competition (www.RTBSC.edu.au) will be held on Thursday 17 May. Due to the significant school program, this competition will be run after school. It consists of 30 multiple choice questions to be completed in a maximum time of 75 minutes. There are papers for Years 9/10 and for Years 11/12. The cost is \$3 per student with additional costs paid by the Science Department. While this competition follows the Australian Schools Science **Competition,** students will need to register with Mr. Goodey (with your \$3) by **Thursday 15 March**. In 2006 25,000 students entered the competition. From MHS 49 ntered, of which 91% of entries achieved a credit or better.

The Australian National Chemistry Quiz (www.ancq.com) will be held on Thursday 26 July. Due to the significant school program, this competition will be run after school. It consists of 30 multiple choice questions to be completed in a maximum time of 1 hour. There are papers for Years 9/10 and one for Year 11 and one for Year12. The cost is \$3 per student with additional costs paid by the Science Department. Entries close Saturday 28 April, so students will need to register with Mr. Goodey before that time (with your \$3). In 2006 115,000 students entered the competition. From MHS 44 students entered, of which 36 achieved a distinction or better.

The **Siemens Science Experience** (www.scienceexperience.com.au) is a three-day workshop aimed specifically at Year 9 students going into Year 10 in 2006. It is a hands-on program that also has speakers from Scientists, Technology experts and Engineers. The program is held in late September with applications to be in by early August. The cost is \$90 but the local Rotary club may cover this fee if you apply to them). See Mr. Goodey for further details or register online at the above site.

Other possible competitions include:

The Australian Science Olympiads (www.aso.edu.au) is open to students in Year 10 and Year 11 to take up the Science Olympiad challenge through the 2005 National Qualifying Examinations. Entry to the NQE is free, with a selective focus on one discipline — Biology (Thursday 30 August.), Chemistry (Thursday 6 September) or Physics (Thursday 23 August). It consists of a two-hour examination, with all participants recognised and the top 10% invited to attend 16-day residential school at the Australian National University in January 2006 to build students ability to first year university level. Registrations must be in by Saturday 14 July.

The **BHP-Billiton.com**) are for students who have undertaken practical research projects, which demonstrate innovative approaches and thorough scientific procedure. Entries can be independent or the project completed as part of your science assessment. Entries close Saturday 23 June.

EDUCATION MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCE (EMA)

The Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) is provided to assist eligible families with the costs associated with the education of their children. To be eligible for receipt of the EMA you must be either a parent or guardian of a primary or secondary school student up to the age of sixteen and be an eligible beneficiary of a Centrelink pension, allowance or benefit within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004 or be a Veterans Affairs (TPI) pensioner or be a foster parent.

Consequently, parents/guardians are able to access the EMA if they have a current Health Care Card or Pension Card.

The eligibility criteria must be met as at the first day of Term 1 (Tuesday 30 January 2007 which is the first day for teaching staff) and Term 3 (Monday 16 July 2007).

The EMA application must be submitted to the school by **Wednesday 28 February** 2007 for the first instalment and **Friday 3 August** 2007 for the second instalment.

The EMA provides an annual amount of \$210 for primary students and \$420 for secondary students and is paid in two instalments. This amount is split evenly between the parents/guardians and the school. Schools receive the school portion electronically twice a year and parents/guardians receive their portion via two cheques. Students turning 16 years in 2007, will be paid on a pro rata basis and not on the 70/30% basis.

Parents with continuing eligibility, who are paid the first instalment of 2007 through this school will not be required to complete a new application for the second instalment. Parents who transfer children to another school after Wednesday 28 February 2007 and prior to or on Friday 3 August 2007, must reapply at the new school for the second instalment.

Application forms are available from the school office. Application must be submitted to the School by Wednesday February 28 2007. Late applications cannot be accepted.
