2020 SCHOOLS SUMMIT AT MHS THURSDAY 20 MARCH

The Australian Government is inviting Australian primary and secondary schools to participate in a series of **School Summits** in the lead-up to the *Australia 2020* summit on 19 and 20 April. The aim of the *Australia 2020* summit is to look at Australia's future challenges and find innovative solutions by harnessing the best ideas across the nation from Australians with experience, accepted standing, credibility and authority.

The Australian Government wants to involve the whole Australian community in addressing these challenges. So, as the future adults of 2020, the Federal Government is very interested to hear the ideas of all Australian school children. Schools Summits will be held by individual schools over a three week period, starting on the 17th of March 2008.

Melbourne High School is running its summit on the afternoon of Thursday 20 March. It will be for interested students in years 11 and 12 and will run from 1.15 in the Memorial Hall and T Building classrooms. It will go until around 3pm.

Of the ten critical areas for consideration nominated by the federal government, the School will be investigating five issues:

- Future directions for the Australian economy including education, skills, training, science and innovation as part of the nation's productivity agenda
- Economic infrastructure, the digital economy and the future of our cities
- Population, sustainability, climate change and water
- Future directions for rural industries and rural communities
- Towards a creative Australia: the future of the arts, film and design

The results of the Melbourne High School Summit will feed into a Youth Summit that will take place on 12-13 April, where 100 young Australians will be invited to discuss the long-term challenges of our country. The results will then feed into the Australia 2020 summit on 19 and 20 April.


