Judi Dench will be joined in Peter Hall's production of **A Midsummer Night's Dream** by Oliver Chris, William Chubb, Msimisi Dlamini, Charles Edwards, Richard Keightley, James Laurenson, Ben Mansfield, Reece Ritchie, Susan Salmon, Annabel Scholey, Simon Scott, Sophie Scott, Timothy Speyer, Rachael Stirling, Julian Wadham, Leon Williams and Tam Williams

Magic and mischief collide as four young lovers defy authority and are forced to flee the Court for the forest, only to find themselves entangled in a world of reckless enchantment, wonder and sexual desire.

Set in Elizabethan England, this new production sees Titania, the Fairy Queen, as a portrait of the ageing Queen Elizabeth I, fascinated with the theatre, besieged by courtiers but 'married to the people of England'.

A Midsummer Night's Dream reunites Peter Hall and Judi Dench, an enduring theatrical partnership lasting over fifty years. Judi Dench first played Titania for Peter Hall with the Royal Shakespeare Company in 1962 and they have subsequently worked together on productions such as Antony and Cleopatra (National Theatre), The Royal Family (Haymarket) and Hay Fever (West End).

Judi Dench plays Titania. Her theatre credits include Madame De Sade (Wyndhams), Hay Fever, The Breath of Life (Haymarket Theatre), Merry Wives of Windsor, All's Well That Ends Well (RSC), Amy's View (National Theatre and Broadway) and A Little Night Music (National Theatre). For television, her credits include Cranford, As Time Goes By and Last of the Blonde Bombshells; and for film, The Quantum of Solace, Notes on a Scandal, Casino Royale, Mrs Henderson Presents, Pride and Prejudice, Iris, Chocolat, Shakespeare in Love (Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress) and Mrs Brown.

Oliver Chris plays Bottom. Theatre credits include Rain Man (Tour), Well (Apollo), Portrait of a Lady (Bath), Taming of the Shrew (Wilton's Music Hall) and The Importance of Being Earnest. Annabel Scholey plays Hermia. He continues his role as the Rose's Director Emeritus alongside Artistic Director Stephen Unwin. In 2010 Peter Hall not only celebrates his 80th birthday but also a directing career that has spanned almost 60 years.

Judi Dench, one of Britain's greatest actresses, is a long standing supporter of the Rose and hosted a fundraising gala for the theatre in 2004.
