Grants awarded under the third round of Criminal Property Confiscation Grants are:

Metropolitan

- The Perth Hebrew Congregation \$100,000 to provide security fencing around the perimeter of the Perth Synagogue complete with electronic access control and surveillance systems, as a deterrent and protection from possible terrorist attacks given the vulnerability of the property and the membership;
- Drug Arm WA \$100,000 for two Mobile Intervention Services in Rockingham and Perth to target young people involved in drug abuse or drug-related criminal activity on Friday and Saturday nights;
- The Town of Vincent \$10,000 to provide and install motion sensitive lighting to approximately 50 homes of seniors, disadvantaged and groups of residents who have recently been victims of anti social/criminal behaviour in or near their homes within the Town of Vincent;
- Homicide Victims Support Group \$41,700 to train four group members in trauma counselling and provide basic office facilities for the group to help secondary victims of homicide:
- Joondalup Youth Support Service \$99,748 to employ a Project Officer to maximise the benefits of the case management approach and complementary mentoring to the re-engagement of disconnected young people to their communities and special interest groups and/or activities;
- Save Our Seniors Mandurah \$10,000 to provide safety and risk of home invasion and fire assessments by FESA and Community Policing in the homes of the elderly and disabled in Mandurah. Supporting Our Seniors volunteers carry out all the work and installation of smoke alarms;
- Same Sex Domestic Abuse Group Project \$90,000 to employ a project worker to deliver training and resources to raise awareness of the issues of domestic violence within the same sex community and build the capacity of mainstream domestic violence agencies to respond to the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community in Western Australia;
- The Patricia Giles Centre \$28,200 to run four counselling camps during the October and April 2006-08 school holidays for children who have experienced domestic/family violence;
- City of Gosnells \$9,418 to help people with disabilities and seniors who live within the City of Gosnells conduct home safety audits and install security lighting to increase safety and reduce their risk of becoming victims of crime;
- Adolescent Drug Education and Support Group \$24,698 to provide drug counselling and support services for children aged between 10 and 17 years;
- Multicultural Youth Together Project \$78,500 for a program to provide social education and conflict resolution/anger management, drug education and interaction with authority figures after school and weekend activities that will improve the relationship between refugee/migrant youth and indigenous children and youths in the Koondoola, Girrawheen, Mirrabooka and Balga areas;

- AAA Youth Project \$66,318 to employ a co-ordinator to provide specially tailored services to meet the needs of 18 to 25-year-old youth from Africa and the Middle East. The programs are designed to help people integrate successfully into WA society and work toward racial harmony among African tribal groups, Middle Eastern and Aboriginal youth in the Mirrabooka area;
- Mofflyn Family Support \$75,000 to employ a specialist practitioner to counsel and help families recovering from drug and alcohol problems keep care of their children;
- Belmont Noongar Network \$75,286 to help indigenous elders and community members work in partnership and be directly involved in developing and implementing initiatives that assist with community safety and crime prevention initiatives;
- WA Network of Alcohol and other Drug Agencies \$10,000 to reprint the Directory
 of Western Australian Community Alcohol and Other Drug Agencies booklet
 known as the 'little green book'. The book provides a concise directory of alcohol
 and other drug services in WA allowing for easy referral to treatment and support
 services;
- Barking Gecko Theatre Company \$20,000 to subsidise \$2.50 per ticket for a
 professional performance of a play called Trains of Thought for Perth Secondary
 Schools in 2006. The play raises issues of gang culture, peer pressure and
 teenagers being coerced into bombing Asian restaurants in a bid to increase
 awareness of the criminal consequences of racism and other anti social
 behaviour;
- Workskills Training Program \$96,260 for an alternative life skills and work readiness program targeting young people who are educationally and socially disengaged in Koondoola, Girrawheen, Balga, Mirrabooka and surrounding areas;
- Finding My Way \$96,630 to provide an education and information program about a range of health issues including substance usage for socially disengaged young people aged 13 to 16 years of age living in Koondoola, Girrawheen, Balga, Mirrabooka and surrounding areas;
- Partnership for Family Safety \$59,031 to provide ongoing contact with and support of women and families who are victims of domestic violence;
- Starick Services \$50,000 to employ two domestic violence advocates who specialise in Aboriginal communities to provide assistance and support to victims of family and domestic violence who present at the Kensington and Belmont Police Stations;
- Australian Red Cross \$56,330 for an early intervention program aimed at turning around the destructive and antisocial behaviours of young children. The program will target families where parents and caregivers experience difficulties in managing their children's challenging behaviour;
- Community Television Perth \$79,000 to produce a 13-episode documentary series concerned with crime and prevention to be broadcast on local and national

community television. The aim is to enhance community safety through educating people about crime prevention practices and initiatives;

- City of Fremantle \$95,665 for an outreach service based in the Hilton PCYC building. The project will employ a police officer and full-time youth worker to work with at risk juveniles and develop programs for them with information, follow up, support and referrals; and
- Yirra Yaakin Aboriginal Corporation \$80,000 to run a program of free community theatre and circus workshops for Aboriginal youth aged 10 to 15 years in the Balga/Koondoola/Girrawheen and help Aboriginal youth to explore and develop positive social skills.

• Regional

- Shire of Laverton \$60,500 to continue to employ a Community Youth Officer to mentor up to 150 young people who are at risk of offending, promote sports with the community and facilitate activities that recognise traditional Aboriginal practices;
- Waratah Support Centre \$55,000 to expand Waratah's South-West domestic violence counselling services for women to Collie and Busselton;
- Ed Start \$79,608 for a part time Education Mentor to provide a culturally and contextually appropriate early intervention approach through a flexible but supervised and supported study and learning program for at risk indigenous youth in the Capes Region to improve literacy and numeracy and complete accredited bridging training and education;
- The Shires of Morawa and Mullewa \$98,100 to employ a Community Development Officer for two years to coordinate crime prevention programs for high risk youth and indigenous residents in the Shires of Morawa and Mullewa;
- Youth Power \$64,000 to run a series of structured activities for at risk youth in Roebourne, Karratha, Dampier and Wickham. Activities will include modelling and dance workshops, hip hop dance, graffiti art, beat box and arts and crafts workshops, excursions, day trips and camps; and
- Marulu Drug Diversion Strategy \$100,000 to run camps and counselling services for indigenous young people who witness and experience the effects of violence, sexual abuse, alcohol and ganja (marihuana) use on a daily basis.
