Relieving Deputy Principal

Uniform

While most Davidson students wear correct school uniform, some students are persistently wearing incorrect uniform. Of particular concern is the school jumper. The school offers two varieties of school jumpers which have the school logo on them. These can be purchased from the school uniform shop. A plain blue sloppy joe is not appropriate school uniform and must not be worn. Any student unable to wear correct uniform on a particular day due to unforeseen circumstances, must bring a note from a parent and have it signed by a deputy principal before school.

Lunch Time Detention

A new detention system is in place for students who arrive at school late without a note from their parents or who are out of uniform without a note. Those students must attend lunchtime detention in Room 2. Tuesday afternoon detention remains in place for students on levels.

Gate Passes

Students are reminded that an early leave pass must be obtained from a deputy before school.

Senior Attendance Requirements

Except for Tuesday, seniors must attend school between the start of roll call and the end of period 5 each day. Students may NOT leave school during free periods without a gate pass.

School Certificate Trial Exams

School Certificate Trial Exams will take place for Year 10 on Monday the 10th and Tuesday 11th October. Normal classes and roll call are not held on these two days. All students must be at school by 8.30am. Students should ensure they prepare for these exams over the holidays.

Teaching & Learning Corner

A reminder to all parents and students that assessment weeks for **Years 7 and 8** are in **Week 2** of Term 4. **Year 9** assessment week is in **Week 3**. Please ensure that your child is at school during this time. Students in these years will be receiving a copy of their exam timetable very soon. Not all subjects have exams in that week, so it is important to read the timetable carefully. Teachers will be informing students about the content and format of these exams. If you have any queries, please contact the classroom teacher.

Year 10 **Trial School Certificate** is **Monday 10th October-Wednesday 12th October**.

Year 11 exams are in the **last 2 weeks of Term 3** and they already have their exam timetable.

Study hints:

- > make summaries of notes
- > write practise essays
- > be clear about the content and format of the exam
- > be **active** in study (don't just read over notes – test yourself, write them out etc)
- > clarify any problem areas with teachers.

How often, as a teacher, have I heard the following anguished cry of a student: "I knew it last night!" Almost certainly, the student has 'crammed' the night before and, under pressure in exam conditions, the knowledge just 'disappears'! It is essential that revision is started well before the exam. In order to move information from short term memory to long term memory, it needs to be repeated at least three times (on three separate days). Research shows that up to 80% of information is forgotten if not repeated within 24 hours of hearing it. Therefore, the student who does not look over their notes within 24 hours or who studies the night before a test for the first time, is almost guaranteed to forget most of what he/she learnt. So the moral of the story is:

START REVISION EARLY AND GO OVER THE CONTENT A NUMBER OF TIMES.

Careers

On Tuesday 30 August, fourteen Year 9 students visited the annual Trades Roadshow held at Youth Reach in Brookvale. Mr Zouain kindly drove Ms Peek and the students in the Davidson school bus.

Youth Reach is a youth support service that provides a youth centre as well as outreach programs for young people aged 11 to 24 years. It is funded by the federal government as represented by the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations and is part of the Youth Attainment and Transitions Program.

The Trades Roadshow each year aims to provide school students with a hands-on introduction to various trade careers. It is an opportunity to give students a taste of the trade opportunities available after they leave school. Representatives from TAFENSW, the Defence Forces and local industry volunteers came together at the Youth Reach premises, to provide a valuable free opportunity to groups of students from schools in our local area. Separate booths were designated to a particular skill area, including automotive, plumbing, electrical, carpentry, bricklaying, music and sound recording, hairdressing and beauty, and locksmithing.



On arrival, students underwent a brief safety induction with relevant OH&S issues explained. They then split into groups of two or three and rotated through each booth during their session time. The local tradespeople, TAFE teachers and skilled specialists 'coached' the students in simple tasks as an introduction to the trade.

The Defence Forces personnel provided literature and advice about trades in the army, navy and air force. Students were able to see and assist tradespeople at work and ask questions particularly related to their industry. Our one-hour session finished off with a sausage sandwich provided as part of the hospitality component.

All students conducted themselves in a responsible manner and were praised for their interest and politeness. They all came away with a better understanding of the opportunities available in trade areas and even a little experience in brick laying and cutting keys.



Science Reports

Year 12 Physics Excursion

On 22nd of August, the Year 12 Physics class went on an excursion to the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO) at Lucas Heights. This forms part of the unit they are studying “From Quanta to Quarks”, relating to the discoveries of radioactivity and the structure of the atom.

We were first welcomed into the visitor centre, and asked to make sure that all mobile phones and cameras were removed from the minibus and brought into the centre. Our host then challenged the students with a very rapid fire session on radio nucleotides and various decay sequences, and a summary of why some isotopes are radioactive while others are not (they have too many or too few neutrons in the nucleus). Next came a description of what is actually at Lucas Heights. Yes, it is a nuclear reactor, but it is not a generator of electricity, it is a “cold” research reactor that produces large numbers of neutrons which are then channelled into experiments or used to irradiate silicon that comes from Japan and is then returned to make computer chips. Last year, ANSTO produced 19 tonnes of silicon suitable for computer chips, and our reactor is one of the best in the world for this task. ANSTO also produces medical isotopes. These are used for either treatment (an example given was the treatment of the pain associated with bone cancer) or imaging – to get a clearer picture of internal structures without surgery, using techniques such as PET (positron emission spectrometry). PET uses sub-atomic particles called positrons, which are anti-matter particles!

Finally came a tour of the site, including a visit to the room next door to the reactor – close enough for most of us – where we saw the experiment hall. This is where the main research projects happen, with teams from universities worldwide using the excellent facilities available. Hundreds of people work at ANSTO, (it has its own motel for visitors) and our final stop was at the on-site cafe for lunch. (I’d forgotten how much an 18 year old can eat).



Musical Science

On the 22nd August Years 7 and 8 attended a musical production for Science Week and the International Year of Chemistry. The students gathered in the MPC where they were entertained by a musical duo performing Rain Reaction, a singing and dancing routine discussing the effects of Climate Change on people and the environment.

The performance emphasised the uses of Chemistry as a creative science involved in solutions to sustainable living, clean water, manufactured products and climate change. Students engaged positively in the performance and we thank "Perform Education" and Mr Ferris for organising the event.

Macquarie University Foundation and School of Astronomy and Astrophysics

On the 20th – 21st of August I was fortunate enough to attend the Macquarie University School of Physics and Astronomy for their 2011 School of Astronomy Conference.

The weekend consisted of a series of eight lectures presented by Astronomers and Physicists from several different Universities and scientific organisations. It was a riveting weekend with stimulating lectures, debates and discussion. Topics included 'Extreme events with the SKA telescope', given by Tara Murphy from the University of Sydney; 'Binary stars and stellar evolution' by Orsola De Marco from Macquarie University; 'Unravelling the secrets of planetary birth' by Mike Ireland from Macquarie University and 'Jupiter – Friend or Foe' by Jonti Horner from UNSW.

All of these lectures were brilliant and inspired lots of passionate discussion. Other topics included lectures on Pulsars, Galaxies, Black Holes and Gravitational Waves. This was a truly great experience and I learned a considerable amount about the cosmos and the current Science being undertaken. I would recommend this experience to anyone who is interested in Astronomy or Physics.

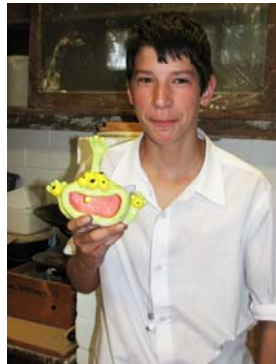
Visual Arts
