Year in Review

+ In August, Lawrence Biondi, S.J., marked his 25th anniversary as the president of Saint Louis University, making him one of the longest-serving presidents in the history of American Jesuit colleges and universities.

+ The University announced that it will move its School of Law to downtown St. Louis, bringing more than 1,100 law students and faculty into the heart of the city's legal community. A donated building — located near the Civil Courts, the Thomas F. Eagleton U.S. Courthouse and many of the region's biggest law firms — is being renovated at a cost of nearly \$20 million. The building is expected to open in August 2013.

+ Pius XII Memorial Library was renovated to improve study space and Wi-Fi accessibility, as well as to add an inviting new entrance from the West Pine Mall. The \$4-million project also included new seating and tables; individual study carrels; and updated ceilings, lighting and flooring.

+ SLU began construction on the second phase of its Center for Global Citizenship project. Located in two adjacent historic buildings, the new center will house SLU's internationally related academic and support services, as well as a classroom dedicated to international teaching, a Global Student Commons

and a high-tech, 1,000-seat auditorium. The center is set to open in May 2013.

+ The University received continued institutional accreditation from the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, having been continuously accredited since 1916. The accreditors identified numerous strengths, including SLU's commitment to holistic student learning, diversity and community service. The accreditation team also highlighted programs that support first-year students and the Reinert Center for Transformative Teaching and Learning.

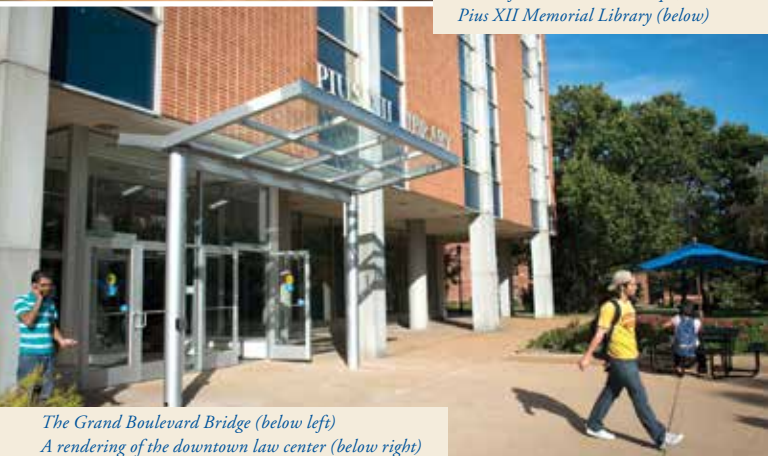
+ After being closed for 16 months, the new Grand Boulevard Bridge reopened to traffic — reconnecting both sides of SLU's St. Louis campus. Below the \$22 million bridge, the new Scott Avenue Transit Plaza at the Grand MetroLink Station features improved lighting, a ticket vending area and a park-ride lot.

+ The University announced that it was establishing the College for Public Health and Social Justice, a new academic unit that combines SLU's nationally accredited Schools of Public Health and Social Work. The reorganization, designed to strengthen both schools, will become fully operational in July 2013.

Discovery

RESEARCH

+ During fiscal year 2012, SLU's Medical Center researchers in the health sciences were awarded 386 grants, contracts and subcontracts totaling \$46.8 million from agencies such as the National Institutes of Health, National Science Foundation, Centers for Disease Control and other government sources, as well as private industry, associations and foundations.

+ SLU researchers in areas outside of the health sciences received 59 awards through grants, contracts and subcontracts from federal government agencies, associations, foundations and private sources, generating \$4.2 million during FY12.

+ SLU's Center for World Health and Medicine, inaugurated in 2010, obtained funding and initiated a range of partnerships aimed at creating new treatments for neglected diseases such as malaria, river blindness and childhood diarrhea. These initiatives offer promising solutions for

diseases that ravage the developing world.

+ SLU is one of only seven Catholic institutions designated as a research university (high research activity) by the Carnegie Foundation.

+ SLU's biomedical Edward A. Doisy Research Center opened in 2007. Research in the state-of-the-art, LEED-certified facility focuses on several core areas: cancer; molecular and structural biology; cardiovascular and pulmonary diseases; infectious diseases and biodefense; neurosciences and aging; and liver disease.

+ SLU's Center for Sustainability continues to foster discovery through groundbreaking research with assistance from programs such as the Alberici Fund for Innovation, a \$1.5 million commitment to seed cross/interdisciplinary research focused on creating solutions to the urgent sustainability issues facing society.





TEACHING

+ 99% of tenured and tenure-track faculty members hold the highest degree in their fields.

+ The average class size is 24.4, and the student-to-teacher ratio is 12-1.

+ 51% of undergraduate courses have fewer than 20 students.

+ SLU boasts 44 endowed chairs and 23 named professorships.



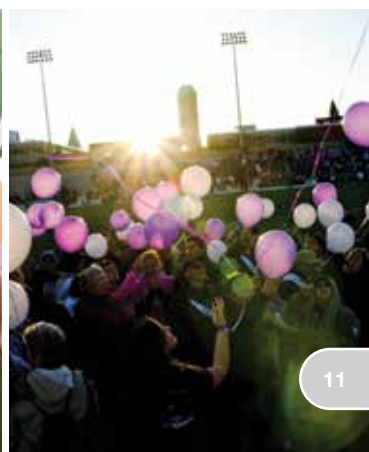


MISSION

- + The division of mission and ministry promotes programs and events for the entire University community. Mission and ministry includes campus ministry at the University, pastoral care at Saint Louis University Hospital, and ongoing mission programs for both ends of the St. Louis campus.
- + During University breaks, campus ministry sponsors immersion trips for students who serve the poor and marginalized in the United States, Belize and El Salvador.
- + The 4:30 and 9 p.m. Sunday Masses at St. Francis Xavier College Church regularly attract hundreds of students who lead worship and form Christian community.
- + More than 30 Jesuit priests live, teach and minister at SLU.
- + Campus ministers and Jesuits are available in the residence halls for conversations about God, faith and belief.
- + Campus ministry offers a variety of retreats that encourage students to grow spiritually and to deepen their relationship with God.
- + Students have many opportunities to engage in service locally, nationally and internationally, leading participants to a deeper integration of service, social justice and faith.
- + SLU offers Christian Life Communities — small, faith-sharing groups that meet weekly to pray, reflect on scripture and share their own stories of faith.
- + Regardless of their religious identity, SLU students are encouraged to form deep friendships with faith as a centerpiece for their own developing lives. Campus organizations, affiliate ministers and nearby houses of worship help facilitate this growth.
- + Pastoral care primarily supports patients, families and medical and nursing staff at SLU Hospital in their pastoral and personal needs. Pastoral care also provides outreach and education to SLU students in health care fields.
- + Pastoral care and SLU offer Clinical Pastoral Education at SLU Hospital for students from across the United States.
- + Mission programs provide ongoing opportunities for students, faculty and staff to deepen their understanding of the University mission through presentations, programs and other opportunities.

OUTREACH

- + SLU has been recognized as a character-building college by *The Templeton Guide: Colleges that Encourage Character Development*.
- + Students, faculty and staff members cumulatively complete more than a million hours of community service each year.
- + More than 81% of SLU students volunteered at least once during the 2011-2012 academic year — more than triple the national average among college students.
- + The University was named to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll for the fifth consecutive year. It is the highest federal recognition a school can achieve for its commitment to service-learning and civic engagement.
- + In fall 2012, *Washington Monthly* ranked SLU No. 4 on a list of universities that participate in the most community service.
- + SLU's chapter of Alpha Phi Omega, a co-ed service fraternity, is the largest in the nation per capita, as well as one of the biggest student organizations on campus.
- + During the October 2012 Make A Difference Day — an annual service event — a record-breaking 3,376 SLU volunteers assisted 136 agencies and schools in the St. Louis area.
- + SLU's annual Relay for Life event raises funds and awareness for cancer research and patient needs. Students, employees and friends raised more than \$140,000 in 2012.
- + Fraternities and sororities make service a big part of their activities. They participate in events for local hospitals, family organizations and a variety of disease awareness efforts.
- + SLU volunteers cook and deliver more than 2,500 meals per month to St. Louis neighbors in need as part of a unique cooperative between the University, the Campus Kitchens Project and local nonprofit service organizations.
- + SLU's Micah Program is named for the Biblical prophet Micah, who spoke out against social injustice. Micah Program students perform community service in the Shaw neighborhood near SLU.





ECONOMIC IMPACT

- + An economic impact study conducted in 2012 by Tripp Umbach, a nationally recognized consulting firm focused on economic analysis, showed that in 2011, Saint Louis University generated \$715 million in economic impact and supported more than 6,800 jobs throughout the St. Louis metropolitan region.
- + The study also reported that \$1 in every \$176 in the regional economy can be attributed to Saint Louis University and that \$1 out of every \$36 in the City of St. Louis' general fund is generated by SLU.
- + The economic impact study also showed that a single graduating class from SLU represents a future economic impact of \$2.7 billion to the region during the next 40 years. In addition, the annual impact of SLU-trained physicians who entered the St. Louis-area workforce in 2011 was \$135 million.
- + According to the study, SLU students and employees contributed \$26.3 million in cash and volunteer services to the region in 2011.
- + The study demonstrated that the University stimulates the economy both directly and indirectly. SLU is the largest single developer in the Midtown area, spending more than \$850 million in campus improvements, enhancements and expansions during the past 25 years.
- + One out of every 195 jobs in the St. Louis metropolitan area can be attributed to SLU, according to the study.
- + Approximately 50,933 SLU alumni live in the St. Louis Metropolitan region.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARIES

+ SLU is home to three libraries: Pius XII Memorial Library, Medical Center Library and Omer Poos Law Library.

+ Collectively, the libraries hold more than 2.2 million volumes and provide access to more than 45,000 electronic resources, including databases, journals and e-books. Podcasts, RSS feeds and blogs are accessible at libraries.slu.edu.

+ Pius XII Memorial Library is the main library for undergraduate, graduate, faculty and visiting scholars' research, as well as learning and study needs.

Open daily, including five days around the clock during the fall and spring semesters, it also is home to the University Archives, a full-service café, the Reinert Center for Transformative Teaching and Learning, undergraduate and graduate writing centers, and the iCommons.

+ The Vatican Film Library, located within Pius Library, holds the most extensive collection of manuscripts microfilmed from the Vatican Library in the world, including archival records on the

history of Jesuit missions in the Western Hemisphere filmed from library collections located in Spain and Latin America.

+ The Omer Poos Law Library, ranked by the *National Jurist* as the 32nd best academic law library in the country, owns more than 600,000 titles and more than 25,000 electronic journals.

+ The Medical Center Library is housed in the Doisy Learning Resources Center and is a 32,000-square-foot facility that provides quiet and comfortable accommodations for students to study and do research.

+ Through the document delivery program, the University Libraries offer students, faculty, researchers and clinicians access to key databases and e-resources necessary for teaching and research both on-site and remotely from anywhere in the world.

+ Faculty librarians who are subject experts in many disciplines are available to assist students and faculty in their research and learning activities.



Colleges and Schools

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Year Founded: 1818

Dean: Michael Barber, S.J., Ph.D.

- + The oldest academic unit at the University, the college is home to 17 academic departments, 14 interdisciplinary programs, and four centers and institutes.
- + Boasting nationally ranked programs, the college offers more than 40 majors in the sciences, social sciences, humanities, and fine and performing arts.
- + Undergraduate psychology students can gain research experience and training in assessment and intervention through SLU's on-campus Psychological Services Center.
- + Partnerships with the Missouri Botanical Garden, the Saint Louis Zoo and the Donald Danforth Plant Science Center provide biology students access to these world-class organizations.
- + The college boasts a state-of-the-art, 8,500-square-foot digital media center that provides communication students access to the latest technology in the field.
- + Communication sciences and disorders students can receive unique clinical experiences through SLU's Early Childhood Language/Literacy Clinic, among others.
- + Using SLU's Quantum Weather system, meteorology students provide forecasts for the St. Louis Cardinals.
- + SLU's Earthquake Center was one of the nation's first, and it continues to monitor the New Madrid Fault and other hot spots.
- + Supported by the Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies, the Crusades Studies Forum draws scholars from around the globe and is the only venue of its kind in the world for research and scholarship related to the Crusades.
- + Five of the college's graduate philosophy programs are among the best in the English-speaking world, according to the renowned *Philosophical Gourmet Report*.
- + The departments of political science, women's studies and African-American studies collaborate on an annual Politics and Gender Conference that draws participants from across the United States.

COLLEGE FOR PUBLIC HEALTH AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

Year Founded: 2013 (School of Public Health, 1991; School of Social Work, 1930)

Dean: Edwin Trevathan, M.D., M.P.H.

- + The college uniquely addresses the health and well-being of society's most vulnerable by bringing all of the disciplines of public health and social work together.
- + It is the only accredited college of public health in Missouri and the only accredited Jesuit or Catholic school in the nation. The School of Social Work has been accredited for 60 years and is ranked among the strongest programs in the country.
- + The college's programs span the globe, with research, education and service programs in Latin America, China, Africa and Europe. A bachelor's degree in public health also is offered at the SLU Madrid Campus.
- + Together, students and faculty from both disciplines examine a range of societal issues, among them infant mortality, inequities in health and well-being, mental health and substance abuse services, and the issue of neglected or abandoned children.
- + The college also houses the criminology and criminal justice program, formerly in the College of Arts and Sciences.
- + The college offers five undergraduate majors: public health, social work, health management, emergency management and criminal justice.
- + The master of health administration program, ranked in the nation's top 10 by *U.S. News & World Report*, was founded in 1947.
- + The college's investigators are funded by the Centers for Disease Control, National Institutes of Health, Health Resources and Services Administration and other federal agencies, as well as multiple private foundations. The college leads the CDC-funded Prevention Research Center.
- + The master of social work (MSW) program is ranked among the nation's top 25 percent by *U.S. News & World Report*.





EDWARD AND MARGARET DOISY COLLEGE OF HEALTH SCIENCES

Year Founded: 1979

Interim Dean: Lisa Dorsey, Ph.D., M.B.A., P.T.

+ The college is home to seven academic departments and 17 programs that incorporate SLU's long-standing tradition of excellence in health care education with modern innovations.

+ *U.S. News & World Report* ranks the physician assistant program among the nation's top 25, the occupational therapy program among the top 36 and the physical therapy program among the top 34.

+ Doisy students and faculty serve at more than 1,200 clinical sites nationwide.

+ The college receives research support from the National Institutes of Health, the Department of Health and Human Services, the Missouri Foundation for Health and multiple private foundations.

+ The school boasts modern labs, including: a movement science research lab for assessing motion analysis; a culinary lab for teaching food service and preparation; a clinical diagnostic laboratory to teach blood and body fluid analysis; and a media lab for teaching students how to assist clients in daily activities that support their quality of life. Modern, cutting-edge classrooms provide an interactive educational experience.

+ The college's program in health sciences offers students a general health science bachelor's degree that will prepare them for either non-clinical health care occupations or post-baccalaureate programs.

+ Doisy offers a master's degree in molecular imaging and therapeutics, and was one of the first schools to offer a graduate-level degree in this field.

JOHN COOK SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

Year Founded: 1910

Dean: Ellen Harshman, Ph.D., J.D.

+ The school has a long-standing history of forming successful leaders. As the oldest business school west of the Mississippi River, it offers highly ranked programs and is well connected and respected in the business community. Its emphasis on values, leadership and action create a foundation for success that is highly regarded by employers.

+ The school offers a nationally ranked undergraduate business degree with concentrations in accounting, economics, entrepreneurship, finance, information technology management, international business, leadership and change management, marketing, and sports business. The entrepreneurship and international business undergraduate programs are among the nation's top 20 according to *U.S. News & World Report*.

+ The school offers a one-year MBA; a professional part-time MBA, which the 2013 edition of *U.S. News & World Report* ranks 37th nationally; a master of science in supply chain management; a master of accounting; an executive master of international business; and a Ph.D. in international business and marketing. The school's graduate programs in entrepreneurship, international business and supply chain management rank among the

nation's top 25 according to *U.S. News & World Report*.

SLU is the only Jesuit university in the country and only institution in Missouri with this recognition.

+ The school's centers of distinction bridge academic and real world experiences, expanding students' horizons beyond the classroom. The centers include the Boeing Institute of International Business, the Center for Supply Chain Management, the Center for Entrepreneurship, the Emerson Ethics Center and the Simon Center for Regional Economic Forecasting.

+ The school offers several certificate programs that align with SLU's Jesuit mission, including certificates in service leadership, sustainable business practices, and corporate ethics and compliance management.

+ All of the school's academic programs are accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business-International, the premier accrediting agency for business degrees.

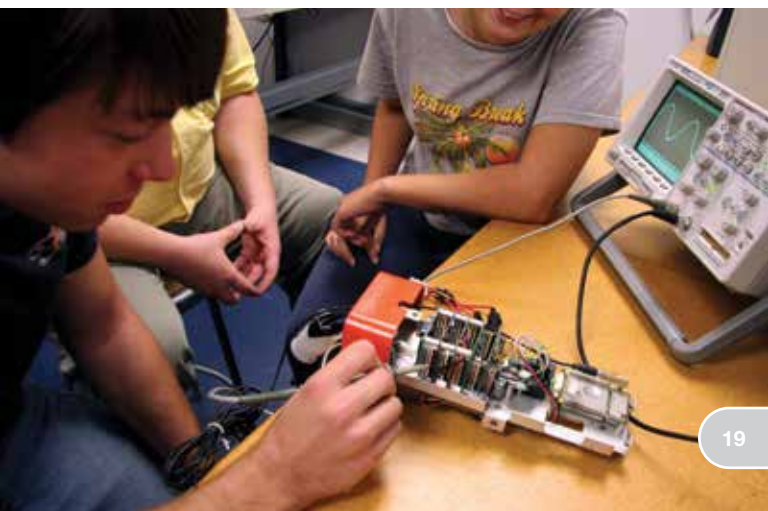
+ It is one of only 21 schools in the country to provide comprehensive international business education.

PARKS COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING, AVIATION AND TECHNOLOGY

Year Founded: 1927

Dean: Theodosios Alexander, Sc.D.

- + Parks College has a worldwide reputation for outstanding education in aviation and aerospace engineering programs and also has become a leader in biomedical, civil, electrical, mechanical and other engineering disciplines.
- + The college is governed by a hands-on approach to engineering and aviation education, resulting in a proven reputation for graduates attaining leadership positions in their fields.
- + Parks is the first federally certified flight school in the United States.
- + Parks' research is focused in six major areas: aviation safety, space exploration, biomedical engineering, structural mechanics and design, thermal-fluid dynamics and sustainability. Both undergraduate and graduate students collaborate with faculty, publish their results in archival scientific journals and present at professional conferences.
- + The Federal Aviation Administration-funded Center for Aviation Safety Research strives to address the nation's critical aviation safety concerns.
- + The Space Systems Lab offers students hands-on experience with designing and constructing small, low-cost spacecraft.
- + Parks is one of 21 Kern Entrepreneurship Education Network (KEEN) schools in the country that promotes the education of action-oriented, entrepreneurially minded engineers.
- + The college features two state-of-the-art flight training devices, including a precise replica of a regional jet airliner cockpit.
- + At least one Parks graduate has been involved in every NASA space launch.





SCHOOL FOR PROFESSIONAL STUDIES

Year Founded: 1996

Dean: Jennifer Giancola, Ph.D.

- + SLU began offering adult continuing education in 1963, when very few universities had programs for working adults. Today SLU's School for Professional Studies is one of the nation's most innovative, adult-focused programs.
- + The school's globally accessible, career-oriented programs are designed with busy adult students in mind and built on a foundation of SLU's Jesuit tradition of excellence.
- + The school offers 32 undergraduate, graduate and certificate programs, 22 of which are available totally online.
- + The school's six accelerated bridge programs allow students to take master's-level courses while pursuing their bachelor's degrees.
- + The school's faculty members are industry leaders who share real-world experience with students.
- + The school boasts many community partnerships, including programs with the Boeing Co., BJC HealthCare and St. Anthony's Medical Center.
- + The school's new Center for Workforce and Organizational Development will offer training and consulting services to the information technology, business and health care communities.

SCHOOL OF LAW

Year Founded: 1843

Interim Dean: Thomas Q. Keefe Jr., J.D.

+ The law school's vision of legal education embraces SLU's Catholic, Jesuit identity and encourages students to approach their professional lives as a calling and a vocation.

+ The school provides students with extensive course offerings, personalized interaction with nationally recognized faculty and exposure to practicing attorneys and clients through professional skills programs, such as the Legal Clinics and externships. In addition, students studying health law and employment law can spend a semester in Washington, D.C.

+ The school offers concentrations in nine areas of the law and 10 dual-degree programs.

+ The school is home to four centers of excellence: The Wefel Center for Employment Law, the Center for International and Comparative Law, the Center for the Interdisciplinary Study of Law and the nationally ranked Center for Health Law Studies.

+ It is one of only 16 law schools nationwide invited to participate in the prestigious 2012 Andrews Kurth Moot Court National Championship.

+ The school's legal clinics provide nearly 40,000 hours of free legal service annually to the community.





SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

Year Founded: 1836

Dean: Philip O. Alderson, M.D.

- + The School of Medicine educates physicians and biomedical scientists, conducts medical research and provides health care on a local, national and international level.
- + Many of the school's approximately 550 faculty members are nationally and internationally recognized scholars, clinicians and teachers.
- + The school teaches approximately 700 medical students and 600 residents in 50 graduate medical education programs, including residencies, subspecialty residencies and fellowships.
- + The school is a leading center of research in five key areas: infectious disease, liver disease, aging and brain disorders, cancer and heart/lung disease.
- + Funded by the National Institutes of Health as one of only eight vaccine research institutions, SLU's Center for Vaccine Development conducted pivotal research on the H1N1 influenza vaccine.
- + The school awarded the first medical degree west of the Mississippi River.

SCHOOL OF NURSING

Year Founded: 1928

Dean: Teri A. Murray, Ph.D., A.P.H.N.-B.C., R.N., F.A.A.N.

+ Nationally recognized for expert faculty and innovative and pioneering programs, the school offers bachelor's degrees, master's education in advanced practice and clinical nurse leadership, and D.N.P. (doctor of nursing practice) and Ph.D. nursing education degree programs.

+ Through a one-of-a-kind inter-professional curriculum, nursing students collaborate with those studying other health careers to learn teamwork strategies and offer the best possible patient care.

+ The school was the first in the country to offer an accelerated

nursing program for qualified students seeking a 12-month, fast-track bachelor's degree in nursing and the first in the state to offer an accelerated master's degree in nursing.

+ The nursing school became the first in the state to offer a Ph.D. program and in 2008 introduced the area's first clinical doctoral degree (D.N.P.) for advanced nurse practitioners.

+ The school also is the first in the nation to offer an online certificate program that prepares nurses to lead in case of a natural disaster or terror attack.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION AND PUBLIC SERVICE

Year Founded: 1998

Interim Dean: Donald Linhorst, Ph.D., M.S.W.

+ The founding philosophy of the college stresses faculty collaboration in teaching and research across departments and a commitment to serve the broader University and metropolitan St. Louis communities.

+ Undergraduate students can major in several areas of education: early childhood, early childhood special education, elementary, middle school, secondary and special education with mild-to-moderate disabilities.

+ Graduate offerings in the college include educational leadership and higher education, educational studies, family therapy, public administration and public policy analysis.

COLLEGE OF PHILOSOPHY AND LETTERS

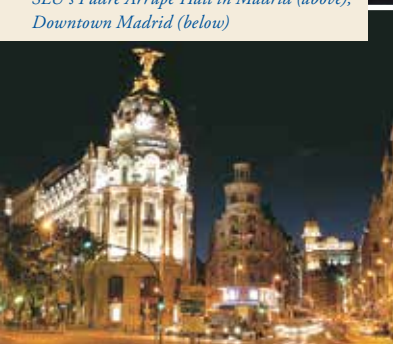

LEARNING OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

- + Innovative programs for first-year students ensure that their transition to SLU goes smoothly. In addition, sophomores, juniors and seniors can participate in programs tailored just for them.
- + Eight residence halls and four apartment complexes offer diverse living options. All on-campus housing accommodations include many amenities and are staffed by professionals, graduate students and upperclass undergraduates.
- + Many residential Learning Communities and First-Year Interest Groups are available. These allow students to transition to SLU in a supportive, creative environment and offer them an early bond that will promote their comfort, as well as encourage their excitement for learning.
- + Students are supported in their choices of majors and careers through a focus on exploration and educational planning in academic advising and career counseling. SLU's Student Success Center provides tutoring, writing consultation, supplemental instruction, academic advising, career services and support for students with disabilities.

INVOLVEMENT

- + SLU offers more than 140 student organizations, including service groups, academic honoraries, fraternities and sororities, media programming groups and special interest clubs.
- + Busch Student Center, SLU's student union, features a 1,600-seat ballroom, bank, bookstore, floral shop, meeting spaces, student organization offices and student services, as well as a variety of dining options.
- + The student-led Great Issues Committee brings prominent speakers to campus such as Nobel Peace Prize winner Elie Wiesel, former prime minister of Israel Ehud Barak, civil rights activist Morris Dees, hip-hop artist and author Common, and human rights speaker Eric Alva.
- + The Center for Global Citizenship in the heart of campus brings all of SLU's international academic and support services under one roof. It includes a student lounge with access to international media outlets, conference rooms with worldwide teleconferencing abilities and a high-tech auditorium with more than 1,000 seats.



DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

+ Saint Louis University is committed to diversity as a value rooted in Ignatian spirituality. SLU is an inclusive community that welcomes all people, regardless of race, ethnicity, sex, age, ability, faith, sexual orientation, gender, class or ideology.

+ Many speakers have been invited to campus to promote diversity, social justice and inclusion, including Cornel West, Kip Fulbeck, Tim Wise, Jeff Johnson, Julie Otsuka and Eboo Patel.

+ *The Oath of Inclusion* — created by students — is a document that sets forth the expectation that all students will work to promote inclusion while at SLU.

+ SLU's Cross Cultural Center promotes multicultural awareness and provides support services to historically underrepresented student populations.

+ The Safe Zone program strives to erase prejudice, while providing a support system for the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer community.

+ The Diversity Leadership Cabinet of the Student Government Association serves as the student voice for diversity and social justice issues.

+ Every year, SLU awards Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarships to graduating high school students who demonstrate leadership in the area of diversity.

+ The African-American Male Scholars Initiative is a retention effort that connects underrepresented students to resources that help ensure academic and personal success.

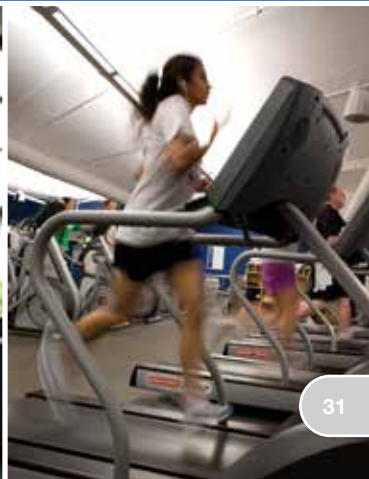

- + Simon Rec offers a variety of fitness classes, including dance, aquatics, spinning, kettlebell, Zumba, Pilates, yoga and more.
- + Membership to Simon Recreation Center is included in the SLU experience for all students. Faculty, staff, alumni and their families can join as well. The Rec Center also offers special memberships for friends of the University, as well as daily use and guest passes.

BILLIKEN ATHLETICS

+ The Saint Louis University Billikens compete at the NCAA Division I level in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's swimming and diving, softball, men's and women's tennis, and volleyball.

+ SLU is the only Division I school in St. Louis.

+ SLU belongs to the Atlantic 10 Conference, which includes Butler, Charlotte, Dayton, Duquesne, Fordham, George Washington, La Salle, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Richmond, St. Bonaventure, Saint Joseph's, Temple, VCU and Xavier.

+ During 2011-12, SLU student-athletes posted a 3.19 GPA, nine Billikens were voted to Atlantic 10 Conference All-Academic teams, and three were named Academic All-District. Men's basketball student-athlete Brian Conklin was named Academic All-America. In addition, 47 student-athletes earned straight "As" during the fall 2011 semester or the spring 2012 semester.

+ During the 2011-12 school year, Billiken student-athletes performed on a national level. The men's basketball team took part in March Madness for the first time since 2000, advancing to the third round of the NCAA Tournament. Hilary Orf became the first female Billiken student-athlete to represent her country in any sport when she ran for Team USA in the NACAC Cross Country Championships in Trinidad and Tobago. Men's swimming and diving had its first relay conference title ever when four freshmen won the 400-yard freestyle relay. The baseball team achieved a school-record 41 victories and claimed a share of the A-10 regular-season title for the first time. Last but not least, women's track and field had five individual conference titles shared by two athletes – Brittney Cloudy (indoor and outdoor long jump/triple jump) and Naya Owusu (outdoor high jump). The women's team placed sixth at the A-10 Outdoor Championships, a program best.

+ SLU's 10,600-seat, state-of-the-art Chaifetz Arena opened in 2008 and is home to men's and women's basketball games. The complex features the adjacent Chaifetz Pavilion, which hosts volleyball matches.



WHAT'S A BILLIKEN?

The Billiken is a symbol of good luck that was a national craze in the early 1900s. In 1908, Florence Pretz, an art teacher, received a patent for her version of an ancient figure. Later, the Billiken Co. of Chicago adopted the likeness, giving it its name. Manufactured as a bank and statuette, the Billiken reached its peak of popularity in 1911. Its association with SLU can be traced back to around 1910, when local sportswriters thought that SLU football coach John Bender bore a striking resemblance to the impish creature. One writer drew a cartoon of Bender as a Billiken, posted it in a drugstore window and dubbed the football team “Bender’s Billikens.” The public took up the moniker, and it soon became the official nickname of all SLU teams.

- + The office of alumni relations reaches out to alumni abroad, particularly where large numbers of SLU graduates reside, such as in Bangkok, Madrid, Seoul and Taipei.
- + SLU alumni have served as president of Nicaragua (Enrique Bolaños '62), NASA director of mission operations (Gene Kranz '54), a World Cup soccer star (Brian McBride '96) and award-winning Broadway producers (David Merrick '37 and Mike Isaacson '86, '96). Over the years, eight SLU alumni have been members of U.S. Congress, and six have been St. Louis mayors, including current mayor Francis Slay ('80).
- + Six Jesuit universities have been founded by SLU Jesuit alumni, faculty or administrators: Creighton University, Loyola University Chicago, Marquette University, Rockhurst University, University of Detroit-Mercy and Xavier University.

SLUCARE

+ SLUCare, the physician medical practice of Saint Louis University School of Medicine, has more than 600 faculty physicians who practice in 15 clinical departments. These physicians – along with nurse practitioners, medical assistants, nurses and related professionals – provide primary through quaternary care services at more than 40 locations in Missouri and Illinois. + St. Louis' best doctors include 153 SLUCare physicians, according to a survey conducted by Best Doctors Inc. and printed in the August 2012 issue of *St. Louis Magazine*.

+ SLUCare is the only academic medical group practice in St. Louis fully accredited by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care Inc.

+ For fiscal year 2012, there were more than 500,000 outpatient visits to SLUCare providers.



SAFETY

- + Maintaining the campus as a safe place to live, learn and work is a priority at SLU. The University's safety efforts focus on education, crime prevention and emergency preparedness.
- + SLU's Department of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness includes nearly 100 armed and well-trained security officers with arrest powers who patrol campus 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
- + The department's state-of-the-art communications center features computer-aided dispatching and centrally networked video surveillance.
- + SLU has an emergency notification system that can reach students, faculty and staff through phone calls, text messaging, email, social media, the web and digital signage in key campus buildings.
- + The SLU Ride program offers secure transportation to areas on or adjacent to the campus, including the nearby light rail station. More than 20,000 safety escorts are provided each year.
- + SLU's Campus Emergency Response Team program, which trains members of the University community to assist first responders, has become a model for other colleges and universities around the country.



INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

- + SLU offers students, faculty and staff a high-speed wireless network and Internet availability that allows them to use mobile devices, computers and networks from just about anywhere on campus.
- + Promoting an engaging learning experience, classrooms are equipped with fully integrated digital presentation systems that include high-definition projection, LCD displays and video walls, as well as tools to support collaboration, distance learning and lecture capture.
- + The Mobile SLU app gives students with mobile devices the ability to access campus maps and important University sites and services.
- + Virtual and cloud-based services such as Google Apps are employed to provide highly available "any student, anytime, anywhere" technology services.

MEETING SPACES, RETREAT FACILITIES AND CAMPUS AMENITIES

+ SLU's Busch Student Center is the ideal facility for conferences, meetings and other special events. It features 18 meeting rooms, state-of-the-art technology, on-site catering and floral services, and nearby enclosed parking. The BSC's Wool Ballroom can seat up to 1,000 people for banquets or 1,600 for lectures.

+ Manresa Center (a former Franciscan monastery) and Il Monastero (a former Presbyterian church) have been renovated as retreat, conference and meeting

centers in Midtown St. Louis.

+ Other campus meeting spaces available for rental include the Père Marquette Gallery, which features stained glass and religious-themed artwork, and the Sinquefield Stateroom, both located in the University's historic DuBourg Hall.

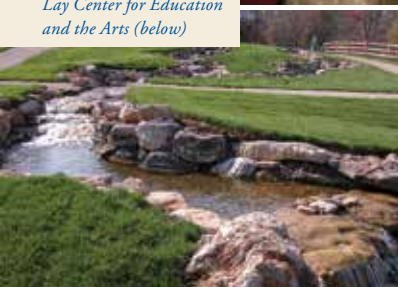
+ The University's award-winning Hotel Ignacio is a distinctive boutique hotel located in St. Louis' fine and performing arts district. The hotel's

well-appointed 49 rooms and two suites reflect four different themes: fine art, performing arts, architecture and music. The hotel also offers the latest amenities and comforts, including Tempur-Pedic mattresses, organic linens and Avaya Guest Media Hubs (a first in North America).

+ SLU's other hotel, Water Tower Inn, features 62 guest rooms, five meeting rooms, food service and a fitness center. It is perfect for budget-conscious travelers.

+ The University's Lay Center for Education and the Arts in Louisiana, Mo., offers both art and educational opportunities for community groups. The 380-acre property features a sculpture park, children's garden, classroom, laboratory and residential facilities, and an interpretive center displaying the area's natural and cultural history.

+ Bannister House, SLU's faculty, staff and alumni club, is open weekdays for breakfast and lunch and is available for private gatherings.

Museums

SLU MUSEUM OF ART (SLUMA)

+ O'Donnell Hall, home of SLUMA, was built in 1900 as the St. Louis Club.

+ The Aronson Gallery on the first level hosts temporary exhibitions developed by SLUMA or traveling exhibitions.

+ Displayed on the second level is art from the permanent collection, including works by Jasper Johns, Andy Warhol, Jim Dine, Roy Lichtenstein, Ernest Trova,

Robert Motherwell, Richard Serra, Dale Chihuly and more.

+ The Collection of Western Jesuit Missions, with religious art and artifacts from the 13th-20th centuries, is on display on the third level.

+ The Asian Art Collection, which features one of the most extensive collections of Japanese netsuke in the country, is on display in the John and Ann MacLennan Gallery on the fourth level.





SAMUEL CUPPLES HOUSE

+ Cupples House serves as a gallery for SLU's collection of fine and decorative art dating before 1919. The Eleanor Turshin Glass Collection is shown throughout the mansion.



+ In 1888, wealthy St. Louis entrepreneur Samuel Cupples commissioned architect Thomas Annan to design the mansion.

+ The three-story home is made of purple Colorado sandstone with gargoyles and architectural details. It is one of the rare examples of Richardsonian-style Romanesque architecture in St. Louis.

+ The elaborate interior of carved wood and stained glass once was heated by 22 unique fireplaces.

MUSEUM OF CONTEMPORARY RELIGIOUS ART (MOCRA)

+ MOCRA is the world's first museum dedicated to the dialogue between contemporary artists and the world's faith traditions.



+ The museum opened in 1993 and is located in the former chapel of Fusz Hall.

+ In its first 20 years, MOCRA has presented nearly 50 exhibitions featuring artists of regional, national and international stature, to significant critical acclaim.

+ MOCRA's exhibitions are supplemented with educational programming, including tours, lectures and conferences, movies and performances.

SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY HISTORY

SLU's beginnings date to 1818, three years before Missouri became a state and when St. Louis was a pioneer settlement of 3,000 people. At that time, Louis William DuBourg, bishop of Louisiana, opened St. Louis Academy, which began in a one-story house and later became St. Louis College.

In 1823, DuBourg offered the Society of Jesus a farm near Florissant, Mo., for a Native American school and additional property in the city for the building of a college. The Jesuits' Maryland provincial authorized a band of 12 Belgian Jesuits — two priests, seven scholastics and three lay brothers — to set out for Missouri in 1823.

Ground was broken in 1828 for a three-story building downtown at the corner of Ninth Street and Washington Avenue. During construction, classes were conducted in Florissant. On Nov. 2, 1829, the college formally reopened in St. Louis, and enrollment reached 150 students. On Dec. 28, 1832, the institution became Saint Louis University when Gov. Daniel Dunklin signed the charter granted by the General Assembly of Missouri. In 1888, the University moved to its present Midtown St. Louis site.

THE JESUIT TRADITION

The Society of Jesus, commonly known as the Jesuits, is renowned for its educational institutions. Today, more than 650 Jesuit institutions educate women and men around the world.

Founded in 1540 by Ignatius of Loyola, the Society's original plans included a trek to the Holy Land to follow the life of Jesus. War prevented the group from making the trip, so the Jesuits placed themselves at the pope's disposal to "seek the greater glory of God and the greater aid of others."

Although Jesuits filled a variety of roles in their early history, Ignatius realized the need for education in the world was great, and he included this work in the Jesuit Constitutions. In 1543, the Jesuits began to teach both Christian doctrine and scholarly subjects in Goa, India. Schools originally intended for young Jesuits began to admit other students. The Society of Jesus also received a request to establish a college for lay people in Messina, Sicily. By 1556, the Society of Jesus had opened 40 colleges throughout the world.

The Jesuit tradition demands excellence in research and teaching, but it also calls for educating "women and men for others." This approach is accomplished through educating the whole person. Dedicated to its Jesuit heritage, SLU strives to put knowledge to the service of humanity and to contribute to the transformation of society.



SLU'S PRESIDENT

Lawrence Biondi, S.J., is the visionary leader of Saint Louis University and is considered the founder of the modern SLU. Since his inauguration in 1987, Biondi has led the University through a remarkable era of transformation and achievement. He has committed vast resources to academics, student scholarships and financial aid, faculty research, campus improvements and expansions, and state-of-the-art technology.

Biondi has earned numerous honors and accolades during his career, including the 2005 St. Louis “Citizen of the Year” award, the St. Louis Award, the Leon R. Strauss Urban Pioneer Award, the John D. Levy Human Relations Award and the Chief Executive Leadership Award from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education. Widely considered one of the most influential people in the region, Biondi was named one of St. Louis’ “Citizens of the Century” in 2000 by readers of the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*.

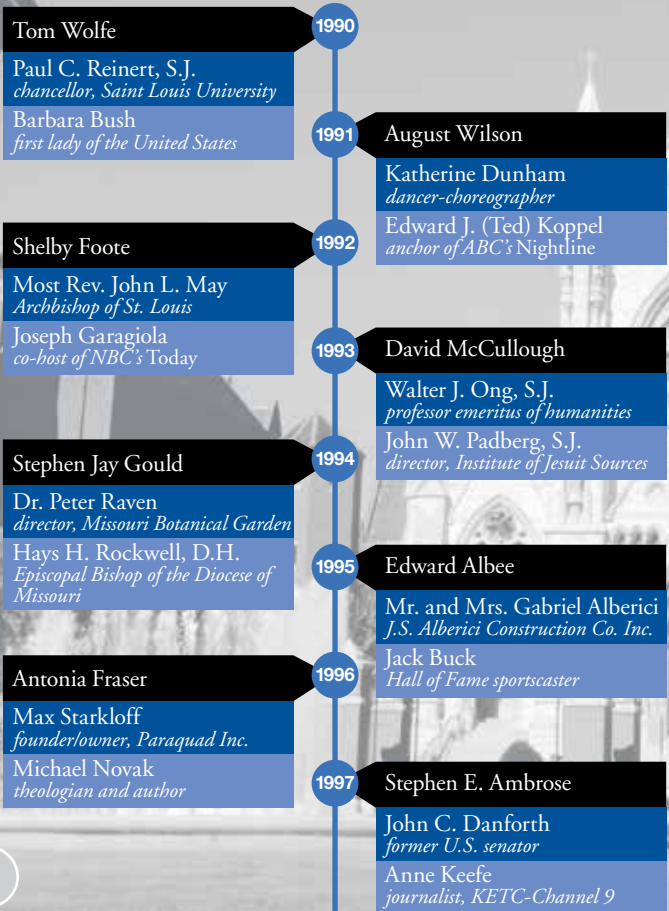
Saint Louis University takes pride in recognizing those who represent the highest achievements in the arts, social justice and Jesuit ideals.

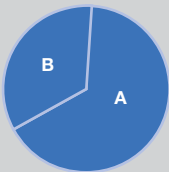
FINANCIAL AID

For fiscal year 2012, 97% of first-time freshmen received aid, as did 86.5% of all students.

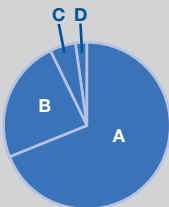
FINANCIAL PROFILE

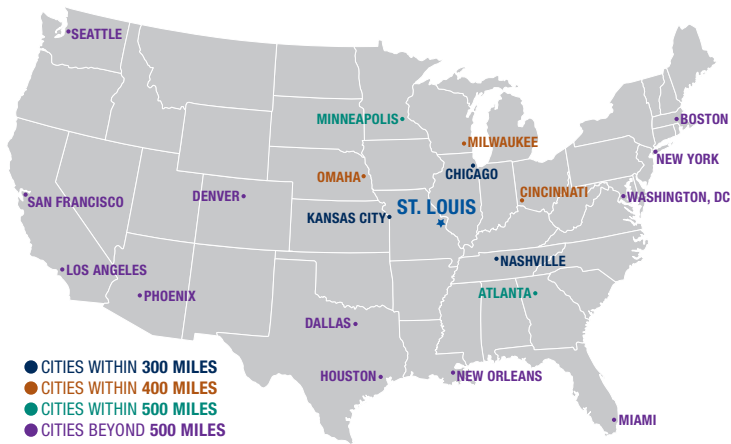


St. Louis

Located on the Mississippi River, St. Louis is a metropolitan region boasting nearly 3 million people, with more than 350,000 residents in the city itself. It is home to a number of Fortune 500 and Fortune 1,000 companies, and the city has received national recognition for its successful efforts to revitalize its downtown.

St. Louis claims a number of significant cultural gems, including the world famous Gateway Arch, the tallest monument in the United States; Forest Park, which is larger than New York City's Central Park and contains the city's free zoo, art museum, science center and history museum; and City Museum, which combines art and fun through recycled architecture, a huge outdoor jungle gym and a rooftop Ferris wheel.

St. Louis is noted for being one of the nation's best sports cities and having great fans. Residents and visitors root for the 11-time World Champion St. Louis Cardinals baseball team, St. Louis Blues hockey team, St. Louis Rams football team and a number of independent sports teams. In addition, the Saint Louis University Billikens excite the city with 18 NCAA Division I teams. SLU is St. Louis' only Division I school.



SLU-MIDTOWN

+ SLU's Midtown neighborhood is known as the cultural jewel of St. Louis. The neighborhood features many notable restaurants, art institutions and performance houses.

+ The historic Fabulous Fox Theatre hosts touring musicals such as *Wicked* and *Memphis*, as well as national acts such as The Avett Brothers, Kelly Clarkson and Blue Man Group. Near the Fox, Powell Symphony Hall is home to the second-oldest symphony in the nation. The St. Louis Symphony Orchestra often pairs with popular artists such as Chris Botti, performs classic movie scores such as *Pirates of the Caribbean* and *The Matrix*, and welcomes noted guest conductors.

+ SLU-Midtown boasts a number of award-winning art galleries, including the Contemporary Art Museum, the Pulitzer Foundation for the Arts and Craft Alliance. SLU's own museums — the Saint Louis University Museum of Art, Samuel Cupples House and the Museum of Contemporary Religious Art — have been recognized nationally for various exhibits.

+ The neighborhood has received top marks for its restaurants. The Travel Channel rates Pappy's Smokehouse as the best barbecue in St. Louis. Vito's serves some of the city's renowned Italian specialties. Triumph Grill is famous for a unique take on American fare and provides room service to SLU's adjacent Hotel Ignacio.

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
