Alumni Association launches program to raise funds for ETHS

or the last few years the ETHS Alumni Association has been working to create a tax-deductible way to contribute to the needs of ETHS students, faculty, and the high-school programs that are otherwise not funded by tax revenue.

In May, the Association will launch a fund-raising program that will operate through the existing "ETHS District Foundation," an already organized, tax-exempt, charitable organization.

The Association's initial focus continues to be providing scholarships to deserving graduating seniors. At the same time, the association will be considering other student- and ETHS-related needs as they present themselves. For example, the Alumni Association already has helped fund the Dialogue Series speaker program and has contributed in getting radio station WKR (Wildkit Radio) on the air (and over the Internet)!

These are examples of some of the things the association has done, and hopes to continue to do with taxdeductible contributions from ETHS alumni.

Alumni Directory enters research phase

n December 1994, Harris Publishing Co. published the first edition of the ETHS Alumni Directory, and it was an instant hit! Now Harris's Graduate Connection branch is updating the original directory.


should receive a postcard from Harris's Graduate Connection asking them to call Harris (tollfree at 800-792-6209) to update their biographical information. While the requested information will include name, class year, address, phone, email address, and family names, alums may give as much or as little information as they choose.

One new feature the ETHS Alumni Association has asked Harris to research are careers that ETHS alums have pursued. This database, which will be listed by career area in the rear of the directory, should be of interest to other alumni. It will also be useful for ETHS faculty in career discussions with students.

The timeline for updating the directory is much shorter than the year it took Harris to compile the original edition. The phoning phase—either alums calling Harris or Harris phoning alums if they haven't called first—lasts only 11 weeks.

During the phone call, alumni may (but are certainly not obligated to) order a copy of the directory (\$69.99 for a hardbound copy, \$59.99 for the paperback edition). **Tentative deadline for placing an order is August 7.** Only a few copies will be printed beyond what are ordered, said a Harris representative.

The new directory will be released in November 2000. Once the project is over, Harris will return the freshened database to ETHS at no cost.

he Laptop Loan Program, initiated by ETHS alumni. is growing in numbers. By the end of April, there were 14 laptops that students may borrow. For those many students who do not have access to a computer at home, the Laptop Loan Program is a blessing. These computers are loaded with the standard Microsoft Office products-Word, Excel and PowerPoint. Students may borrow the computers for 1-3 days to work on school-related projects from the Media & Technology Department.

The Laptop Loan Program originated with gifts of money from the 50th Reunion Classes of 1948 and 1949. ETHS At ETHS, she excelled in science and debate, winning the state high school debate championship in 1995.

From the President

n my last letter as President (since my term ends this September), I would like to cover a few points. First, membership. The

ETHS Alumni Association is now five-years-old. It has come a long way in a short time. We currently have over 1,900 alums as "active members." I hope we can recruit many more. Your \$25 annual dues pay for *The Kit*, which is mailed twice a year, and a variety of Association activities. We work with ETHS in various ways that are not normally supported by taxes but which improve the quality of education. One example is the scholarships we support for outstanding students to further their education after graduating from ETHS.

A new alumni fund-raising effort is my second point. In about six weeks you will receive more information about the association's fund-raising drive, which will be used to help support scholarships, possibly including the Cunningham Award for boys which lacks financial parity with the outstanding girl's award, as well as targeted school programs. We would like to establish an endowment fund and use the accrued interest as support revenue. Please be as generous as you can with your contributions. I will step down in Septem-

ber, and your new president will be Jeanne Zimmer, '77. Please give her the same support you have given to me. Thank you for all of your help. The pleasure was all mine.

ETHS Updates

www.inter and Spring 2000 have been exciting at ETHS! Not only have students earned top honors in several major events, most of the athletic teams have had stellar seasons.

• For the third consecutive year, the **ETHS JETS** (Junior Engineering Technical Society) academic team placed first in state competition.

• ETHS's **Chess Team** was named state champion for the second time in three years.

• Fifteen students in ETHS's **DECA** (Distributive Education Clubs of America) chapter qualified for nationals by winning first, second or third in state competition.

• A 14-member team placed second in state finals in the **World Youth Science and Engineering** academic competition.

• A team of 10 ETHS students captured two firstplace medals and a fourthplace mention at the **International Student Robotic Challenge** in which over 120 universities and high schools participated.

• On April 12, over 800 ETHS students were recognized at a special pizza luncheon for their voluntary participation in **community service** projects.

• One student—Katie Henoch—earned a perfect score in the **National Latin Contest**, the seventh ETHS student to do so since 1990. Over the last decade, 38 students have won Gold Medals in the National Latin Contest (six just this year alone!).

• On April 12, 213 juniors and seniors (7% of the student body) were inducted into the **National Honor Society**. Over the last 10 years, ETHS has averaged 180 NHS inductees per year.

• **Basketball**—The girls were awesome, placing 1st in the Central Suburban League South Division, 1st at regionals and sectionals, and 2nd in the conference. Danielle McKinley, Angel Mason and Tanara Golston made the All-Conference team; McKinley and Golston made the Pioneer Press All-Area Team; and McKinley was named to the Chicago Sun-Times All-Area and All-State teams. The varsity boys, with an overall 17-9 record, placed 2nd it the CSL-South, and had two players-Scott Horne and Vladimir Ako-named All-Conference.

• **Cross Country**—The boys' team was 1st in conference, 2nd in sectionals, and 4th at state, where junior William Artope placed 13th. The girls' team was 1st in conference and at regionals and placed 8th at sectionals.

• **Football**—The varsity team, which had its first losing season in a tough conference in over a decade, didn't live up to its 6th-place state ranking,

• **Golf**—Despite two All-Conference selections (senior Jason Bergmann and junior Paul Hiller), both the boys' and girls' teams had lackluster seasons.

• **Soccer**—A very tough year for the boys, but they managed to end the season with a 6th-place state ranking. The girls are in their season now.

• Swimming & Diving— Both the boys and girls sent teams to state this year, where the boys placed 4th and the girls finished 13th.

• **Tennis**—Despite a rocky season for the girls, three girls qualified for the state meet. Spring is tennis season for the boys.


• **Volleyball**—The girls advanced to sectionals, where they lost a close two-game match to New Trier. Senior middle-hitter Teesha Block was named All-Conference. The boys play this spring.

• Wrestling—Three ETHS wrestlers were named All-Conference: Jason Carter, Wesley Wosik and Carlington Young.

HS students will benefit from two generous donations that will purchase books for ETHS students to use in their scholarly pursuits.





Athletic Hall of Fame inducts six More teachers aware of Dialogue Series this year


n March 29, ETHS inducted six former athletes who helped establish the proud winning tradition at ETHS into the high school's Athletic Hall of Fame. This brings the number of Hall of Fame members to 45 ETHS sports greats. The Athletic Hall of Fame is housed in the lobby of Beardsley Gym.

Donald Heap, '30, ...



received the Noyes Trophy for being the best all-around athlete in 1930. He attended Northwestern on a football scholarship, where he played halfback and was named team captain and All-American in 1937. He was head football and baseball coach at IL Wesleyan and also coached for NU. He served the Evanston Recreation Dept. for 20 years as Assistant Director and later as **Business Manager.**

Emery Moorehead, '72, ...



was another three-sport athlete (football, basketball, track/ discus),

Moorehead captained the 1971 undefeated ETHS football team and earned All-Suburban League and Chicago Sun-Times All-Area Team honors. In 1972, he was 6th man on the basketball team that went to state and was the IHSA District and Suburban League discus champion. He attended the U of Colorado on a football scholarship, where he played in two bowl games and held the all-time average per catch (19.1 yards). He played 12 years in the National Football League: 3 with the New York Giants, 1 for the Denver Broncos, and 8 for the Chicago Bears. He ended his career as the Bears' second-leading all-time receiving tight end.

ETHS alums featured in Chicago Trib

n the past few months, four ETHS alumni have been profiled in the Chicago Tribune. We thought you'd like to know about:

Gordon Segal, '56, founder and chief executive of Crate & Barrel, launched CB2, a new, less-expensive spin-off to his well-known housewares and home furnishings chain. The first CB2 store, located at 3757 N. Lincoln Ave. in Chicago, opened in January. With a hip, "techno" feel, CB2 is reaching out to the twentysomething Internet-generation, customers also targeted by Ikea, Target, and other retail outlets who appeal to first-time apartment and home dwellers. According to the Trib, the store's offerings run the gamut from bed linens to flatware to kitchen utensils to a maple home-office system.

Leonard Schaeffer, '63, 15-year chairman and chief executive of Wellpoint Health Networks Inc., heads a healthcare organization noted for the options it offers its subscribers. After graduating from Princeton in 1969, Schaeffer served as deputy director for management, Illinois Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities, and later

ran the Medicare program during President

Carter's administration. In 1986, he took over the financially troubled Blue Cross of California and in 1993 converted it to a for-profit company that went public as Wellpoint. Wellpoint recently absorbed Chicagobased Unicare Health Plans (formerly Rush-Prudential Health Plans) for \$200 million and, partnering with Dutch bank ING Barings, has also bid \$10 billion for troubled Aetna Inc., the nation's largest HMO.

Hecky Powell, '67, owner of one of Chicagoland's most famous barbecue restaurants, was featured as an activist and philanthropist, who strongly believes in giving back to his community. Rising from a troubled youth to successful businessman, along the way he directed an Evanston antipoverty program and led Evanston's NAACP chapter. Official rib provider for the Chicago Bears and Northwestern Wildcats, he now also serves on the Evanston **Recreation Board and directs** his own foundation. His

personal philanthropy of hiring and mentoring at-risk youth was also chronicled by the Trib. Recently Powell, a jazz aficionado, opened a jazz club and banquet hall (near the former Fanny's Restaurant on Simpson) to help revive the neighborhood and bring together "black and white Evanstonians in the name of jazz ." (Two April concerts featured the jazz quartet of David Young, '97, now attending Northwestern, who played with Wynton Marsalis last summer.)

Marsha (Avery) Belcher, '67, ESPN-AM 1000 radiostation manager in Chicago, came to her new job a year ago with a proven track record as general sales manager of WBBM-AM 780. The article relates how this self-professed "sports enthusiast" has succeeded as one of the few women to manage a Chicago radio station, a career slot usually filled by men. After ETHS, Belcher majored in education at Southern Illinois University and taught for seven years. She lives with her husband and two teenage sons, both athletes themselves, in Lake County, IL.

Overall student feedback was very positive and indicated an interest in hearing from a broader range of career areas. Representative comments of lessons learned included: "follow your dreams," "If you aren't going to college, consider an apprenticeship," and "You need team, personal, social skills for almost any job."




Class of '38 does lunch quarterly

Cecil Martin talked informally with freshmen scholar/athletes while in town for the Alumni Athletic Hall of Fame induction.



During her tenure at ETHS, Barbara served as one of the four English Chairs in the late 1960s when ETHS was divided into four schools, taught and helped shape the school's Advanced **Placement English** program, and served as sponsor of the Press Bureau. She was also active as an officer of the **IL Education Association**

and the IL Retired **Teachers Association.** After her retirement, Barbara returned for 1-1/2 years (1973-75) to serve as Director of **Public Information** Services and as a teacher in the Student Leadership Training Seminar. In her memory, the family and English Department have established the Barbara Pannwitt Freshman Creative Writing Award, a cash award which is given to a promising freshman writer at the annual May department award ceremony.
