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


The Presidential Race in Pennsylvania

The latest Keystone Poll shows that John Kerry has moved ahead of President George Bush in Pennsylvania, a critical battleground state, 48 percent to 41 percent. This is Kerry's largest advantage in Pennsylvania and is slightly larger than the margin he held after the Democratic national convention (Figure 1). Kerry's lead is somewhat smaller among likely voters, 49 percent to 43 percent.

The upturn for John Kerry corresponds with changes in several important variables. First, Kerry's favorability ratings among the state's voters have increased while his unfavorable



ratings have declined. The story is exactly the opposite for President Bush—his favorable ratings have declined and his unfavorable ratings have increased since his nominating convention (Table 1). Perhaps the most important change, though, is in the President's re-elect ratings. Since the last Keystone Poll, the proportion of Pennsylvania voters who think the president deserves re-election has declined from 47 percent to 40 percent. The proportion who believes it is time for a change in the White House has increased from 49 percent to 55 percent in that same period (Table A-5).




The President has an advantage over Senator Kerry in the Northeast and Central regions of the state (Table A-1). Kerry has the lead in Philadelphia, the Southeast, Allegheny County, and the Northwest. The race in the Southwest continues to be very tight. Senator Kerry leads among liberals and moderates, union households, military veterans, young voters, non-whites, and middle-income voters. The President does best among born-again Christians, conservatives, and gun owners. The race continues to be very tight among voters over 55 years of age and these voters may ultimately determine the winner in Pennsylvania.

The changes evident to the images of the candidates must in large part be attributed to their debate performances on September 30. Nearly three in four (77%) of the state's registered voters claims to have watched the debate. The consensus among the state's voters is that John Kerry was the clear winner (Figure 2). Six percent of the voters who watched the debate say it changed their Presidential preference, and three in four of those whose preference changed now plan to vote for John Kerry.

Note: Questions asked only of respondents who watched the debate (n=368).




The US Senate Race in Pennsylvania

The US Senate Race in Pennsylvania, pitting incumbent Republican Arlen Specter against US Representative Joe Hoeffel, has begun to narrow, as expected. In September, Specter led Hoeffel, 51 percent to 25 percent. At the moment, Specter leads 46 percent to 32 percent (Figure 3). Third party candidate Jim Clymer receives six percent of the vote. The Senate race is even closer among likely voters. Specter's current advantage among likely voters is only nine points, 44 percent to 35 percent. Hoeffel has improved his name recognition among the state's voters since September, although a majority still does not recognize his name.

Both candidates need to improve their standing with their partisans, although Specter does better among Republicans than Hoeffel does with Democrats. Only half of Democrats plan to voter for Hoeffel while two-thirds of Republicans intend to vote for Specter (see Table A-3). Specter leads in every region of the state except Philadelphia and the Northwest. He also leads among most demographic groups. Hoeffel does lead among Jewish and non-white voters, although his support in these groups is far lower than the support that Democrats traditionally receive from them.

Methodology. This release summarizes the findings of a survey of 594 registered voters in Pennsylvania conducted by Franklin and Marshall College's Center for Opinion Research. The survey interviewing was conducted between September 30 and October 4, 2004. The sample error for the total sample is plus or minus 4.0 percent. Telephone numbers for the survey were generated via random digit dialing. Respondents were randomly selected from within each household and were screened to determine their voter registration status. The final sample includes 263 Republicans, 262 Democrats, and 69 Independent/Others.
