Methodology for Florida Political Survey

Total Number of Interviews – 641 Registered Voters; 614 Registered Voters said they were certain to vote or probably would vote. The 614 Voters were asked the Presidential Preference and Senate Preference Questions. The remaining respondents were asked only demographic information. Since Florida has many new registered voters, voting history in the state was not used as a question to screen respondents out of the sample.

Margin of error = +/- 4%with a 95% confidence interval Field dates = October 10—October 15, 2004

Note: Margin of error is higher for cross tabulations

Average Interview Length = 5.5 minutes

Polling Universe = Registered voters in Florida who said they were certain or would probably vote in the November election.

This survey was conducted through the use of Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) at a supervised polling laboratory at the University of North Florida. To ensure a representative sample, phone calls were made between 2:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, and 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. A sample of the Polling Universe was selected through the use of Random-Digit-Dialing methodology through the GENESYS sampling system. For non-completes with a working residential phone line, at least 6 callbacks were attempted. Twenty-five students at the University of North Florida performed data collection. Students are trained, compensated and are supervised at all times during data collection. The laboratory employs Spanish-speaking interviewers to ensure ethnic representation.

To ensure geographic representation across the state of Florida, the state was divided into 8 strata. These strata include all major metropolitan areas in the state. Quotas for each stratum were based on population estimates and the number of registered voters in that area. 40 Interviews were conducted in Spanish. Since Party Registration is close to the population parameters (3% difference between Democrats and Republicans in terms of registration), the estimates presented are the actual estimates and not weighted.
