Using Adverbs to Improve Sentences

Remember that **adverbs** can tell more about verbs. They tell **how, when,** or **where** actions happen. You can improve your sentences with adverbs. Use adverbs to add descriptive details so that readers can picture the action. Too many adverbs, however, can make a sentence confusing.

- **Original sentence:** Eduardo placed the photograph in the box.
- Adverb adds detail: Eduardo <u>gently</u> placed the photograph in the box.
- **Too many adverbs:** Eduardo <u>gently, carefully, and cautiously</u> placed the photograph in the box.


