REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY

The Shreveport-Bossier area is blessed with individuals and agencies committed to addressing the needs of our community as well as organizations that provide enrichment activities in the areas of art, music, dance, theatre, festivals and other activities for a population with diverse needs and interests. Each year The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier makes grants that support some of these activities in order that children, youth and adults who might otherwise not be able to participate can do so.

Other grants provide resources for the homeless and their children to become self sufficient, after school programs for at-risk children, enrichment activities that assist youth to discover constructive areas for self discovery and use of their time. Additional grants provide for basic needs such as shelter, food and healthcare. The Foundation annually supports grants to enhance the education of children and youth, scholarships for worthy college students, services for children/youth, and organizations that provide human services.

The Foundation not only provides grants that make a difference for now, but also brings it leadership to discussions that delve into the etiologies of the current needs and support programs that will reduce the number of at-risk children who live in poverty and unbealthy families.

We are grateful for the contributions and commitment of our donors which has enabled the Foundation to address critical needs while nurturing the creative spark within each of us. Because of you, the fabric of our community provides a strong safety net for the most fragile among us.



Dear Friends:

As I approach the end of my ten-year tenure on the Board of Directors, I reflect with pride upon the quantity and quality of the grants we awarded during that time. Grants are the hallmark of the foundation's connection to the community. The grant awards occur after careful research and site visits by the staff and study, contemplation and collegial discussion by board members. I am convinced that each grant that was made justified our confidence that the organization would exercise careful stewardship of the funds and that the funds would make a significant difference in the lives of the people served in our community.



For a number of years, the majority of the grants that The Community

Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier has given have been to provide children and
youth from low-income families and the working poor with services and activities that assist them and their
families to have hope for a better life.

In 2002, more than half of the Community Foundation's unrestricted grants were made to organizations that serve at-risk children, youth and their families in our community. In 2003, almost fifty percent of the unrestricted grants went to organizations for activities that assist children in need and if you include adults, the percentage is almost one hundred percent. Including the field of interests grants more than ninety per cent of the grants have gone to assist those children and their families who may be at-risk individuals in our community. The Community Foundation requires organizations receiving grants to provide follow-up evaluations that provide data regarding the use of the funds and people served. Many agencies provide data about the differences these grants make in the academic achievement level or other areas of need for these young people and their families.

In the past couple of years, national attention and attention within Louisiana has been focused on "fragile families." Nearly one-third of all births now occur outside of marriage. The proportions are even higher among poor and minority populations. There has been a great deal of research relating to these "fragile families." The term "fragile families" emphasizes that these unmarried couples and their children are in fact families, and, as families, they are at greater risk of poverty and of family dissolution than married families.

As one of the major grant makers in our area, we believe it is important to ask ourselves not only whether or not the grants that are being given are improving the quality of life of the recipient families, but will these grants help remedy the situations that are creating a need for the grants? As a community, we must begin to look at whether or not we are supporting activities that will eliminate the underlying factors that are producing at-risk children such as those who live in poverty, fragile families and unhealthy families. Otherwise, we will not have funds in the future for other worthy causes or new challenges that arise.

The annual meeting provides us with both an opportunity to reflect on our year's work as well as a chance to explore potential avenues for greater service to the community. We are pleased to have Dr. Ronald B. Mincy, Maurice V. Russell Professor of Social Policy and Social Work Practice, School of Social Work, Columbia University, New York, address us during our annual meeting. We are grateful for Dr. Mincy's willingness to share with us his extensive research and expertise about fragile families as we contemplate the future role of the foundation in addressing the various needs of families living in poverty and the needs of at-risk youth.

FOUNDATION FUNDS UNIQUELY DESIGNED TO MEET DONOR INTERESTS

The Community Foundation's six types of funds provide the flexibility for donors to tailor their contributions to achieve their vision and specific charitable goals. A foundation fund can be created during the donor's lifetime or by bequest, and may be established by an individual, family, corporation, private foundation or nonprofit organization.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS afford the Foundation the greatest flexibility to support frequently changing needs in the community as they arise. Unrestricted funds are necessary for the Foundation to adequately respond to new programs and innovative services.

FIELD OF INTEREST FUNDS support work in a chosen area of concern such as education, the environment, arts, youth services, programs for the elderly and other social and cultural areas as determined by the donor. The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier Board then awards grants on the basis of competitive applications to the most appropriate programs or organizations within the field of interest specified.

DESIGNATED FUNDS allow the donor to name specific organizations to which grants will be made. If an organization ceases to exist or the purpose for which a fund was created becomes obsolete, the Board of Directors may reapply the Fund to best achieve the basic intent of the donor.

AGENCY ENDOWMENT FUNDS offer non-profit organizations the opportunity to establish funds within the Community Foundation as a means of sharing the benefits of broader investment management and gaining the visibility of being part of the Foundation family. Net income from these funds is disbursed to the designated organizations. If the agency ceases to exist the Foundation will distribute net income to a charitable organization that serves a similar purpose.

DONOR ADVISED FUNDS enable donors to be actively involved in the choice of grantees by allowing them to suggest grants from time to time to charitable agencies from the funds they establish. The Foundation Board evaluates these suggestions against Internal Revenue Service requirements and Board guidelines for consistency with established charitable purposes and community needs. Although the Foundation is not bound by such suggestions, it welcomes donor participation. Donor advised funds may also be established through bequests which specify distribution advisors for the funds for a stated period of time. Donor advised funds are excellent vehicles for teaching family philanthropy.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS provide grants for deserving college or university students. The Foundation staff works with donors to develop criteria and selection processes. The Foundation tracks the performance of scholarship recipients to ensure that they continue to meet the terms for scholarship support. Scholarship funds can be established to further the education of graduates of a particular high school, students in a specified field of study or those enrolled at a chosen institution. Committees review scholarship applications.

WAYS TO GIVE

OUTRIGHT GIFTS - A simple, convenient way to donate and receive maximum tax advantages. Money and securities are frequent gifts. Other gifts may include art, property, timber land, mineral reserves and other gifts that may be liquidated or from which cash benefits may be realized.

MAKE A BEQUEST IN YOUR WILL - You can designate The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier as a beneficiary of your estate, to receive a certain dollar amount or as the residuary or contingent beneficiary. Bequests are deductible for estate and inheritance taxes.

TRANSFER A PRIVATE FOUNDATION - Families and businesses often find it difficult and costly to manage a private foundation, file the required reports and make grants responsibly. It may be useful to transfer the assets of the private foundation to a fund within The Community Foundation, where the identity and purposes of the transferring foundation can be retained and family or corporate members can continue to serve as fund advisors. The Community Foundation often realizes tax benefits that are not available to the private foundation and avoids excise taxes that burden private foundations.

LIFE INSURANCE - A donor may choose to name the Foundation as the owner and beneficiary of a life insurance policy to receive an immediate tax deduction in the amount of the cash value of the policy. In addition, all premiums paid thereafter by the donor are deductible as charitable gifts.

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUSTS - The Community Foundation can be named as the ultimate beneficiary of a charitable remainder trust, providing the donor with lifetime income while, at the same time, assuring a future gift of the trust to the Foundation.

CHARITABLE LEAD TRUSTS - In this gift, the Foundation is named the beneficiary of income from a trust for a specific number of years. The corpus of the trust eventually goes to other named beneficiaries, such as the children or grandchildren of the donor.



FOUNDATION FUNDS REFLECT A VISION FOR A BETTER COMMUNITY

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS allow the Board to use their expertise and discretion to award grants to address the pressing and current needs in the Shreveport-Bossier community.

MICHAELIS LEWIS BATH AND LEONA BESS WINTERS BATH FUND Established 1965

In 1965, Leona Bess "Nonie" Winter Bath, widow of prominent Shreveport businessman, M. L. Bath, donated their home at 819 Margaret Place in memory of her late husband. With Mrs. Bath's consent the property was sold and the assets from the sale created the M. L. and Leona W. Bath Trust Fund. It was the first major gift to the Foundation granted during a donor's lifetime. "You get more dividends this way," Mrs. Bath said. "If you wait until you're dead to make a gift, you're never able to see how it is used."



EASTER BASKET LADIES *Established 1972*

"Operation Easter Basket for the Blind" was conceptualized by members of the Shreveport Association for the Blind during World War II. The Blind Association began decorating wicker baskets from a local drugstore to sell and provide funds for the Blind Association. The concept was expanded when a group of Shreveport women began decorating baskets made by vision-impaired weavers. The women added additional embellishments and simple gift items to the baskets. The operation remained fairly simple until 1952 when the baskets became more elaborate and tailor-made for boys and girls. The trademark basket featured ballerina dolls with crowns, designed for young girls. "Operation Easter Basket" ended in 1972. After twenty-two years, they had become a "grandmothers' organization". Their fund of \$45,000 was donated to the Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier on behalf of all the Easter Basket Ladies. With this gift the Community Foundation continues to provide support to those in need, especially the blind, the aged, and the handicapped.

LOIS SANDERS AND CHARLES MANSEL EVANS FUND Established 1976

The Lois and Charles Mansel Evans Trust was created from the bequest of Charles Evans before his death in 1960. He willed his residuary estate to The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier subject to a life estate in favor of his wife, who was a regular contributor to the Foundation. Evans established the Evans Sporting Goods Company and served as president until selling it in 1951. Evans acquired a national reputation through his work as president of the National Sporting Goods Association for five terms. He was an avid sportsman committed to wildlife conservation.

LOIS SANDERS EVANS FUND Established 1976

Upon her death in 1975, and the like bequest of her estate to the Foundation, the Lois Sanders Evans Fund was established. She contributed to numerous civic groups.



JUSTIN AND EUGENIE TORR GRAS FUND Established 1972

From his earliest days in Shreveport, Justin Gras involved himself with benevolent causes. He immigrated to Shreveport in 1891 speaking not a word of English and with 5 cents in his pocket. He worked for his uncle in his grocery store and within five years purchased the store on the corner of Texas and Common Street after the owner's death. His estate came as the result of hard work, long hours (he usually worked 16 to 18 hours a day), and careful investments. He never forgot where he came from and remembered the community that had been good to him. His will provided the cornerstone for The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier. Gras expressed his desire to Colonel John H. Tucker, jr. and

others that a community foundation be the distributing agent for the interest from his trust. His will provided for this eventuality.

EUGENIE TORR GRAS AND JUSTIN GRAS FUND Established 1972

When Justin Gras's widow, Eugenie Torr Gras, died in 1971, her will bequeathed her residuary estate, the remainder of the Gras estate, to the Community Foundation.

SAMUEL B. HICKS, JR. AND ELIZABETH KOBLER HICKS FUND Established 1989

Mr. and Mrs. Hicks were supporters of civic and philanthropic organizations of the City. At her death in 1989, Elizabeth Kobler Hicks, widow of Shreveport businessman, Samuel Bailey Hicks, Jr. left a bequest for the Sam B. Hicks, Jr. Family Advised Fund to the Community Foundation. Their son, Samuel Bailey Hicks, III, was the advisor. At his death, the Fund became an unrestricted fund of the Foundation. The Hicks Company, one of the largest wholesale grocery concerns in the South, had numerous subsidiaries including S. B. Hicks Motor Company and Shreveport Publishing Company. Mr. Hicks was affiliated with Kansas City Southern Railroad and Southern Pacific Railroad, and he was a major cotton planter of the area. In 1929, he bought out the interest of his uncle, A. M. Bourquin, in the insurance firm of Querbes and Bourquin. Elizabeth Kobler Hicks was a charter member of the Shreveport Demoiselle Club and the Junior League. She was an elder and trustee of the Presbyterian Foundation USA and moderator of the Presbytery of the Pines. Elizabeth Hicks served on the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian World Missions. Mr. Hicks died in 1967. Mrs. Hicks remained active in the community until her death in 1989.

ROBERT MCLEAN JETER, JR. FUND Established 1999

Robert McLean Jeter, Jr. handled all the legal work necessary to develop The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier. After twenty-four years of generous service on the Board, Mr. Jeter retired as a founding member. At his retirement from the Board on February 19, 1985, Mr. Jeter was recognized for his vital role in the early years. He served as secretary of the Board for eighteen years and chairman of the Board for six years. At his death in 1999, memorial contributions to the Community Foundation were used to establish a fund in his memory.

C. HUFFMAN LEWIS FUND Established 1988

Founders, volunteers, community leaders, and philanthropists - Virginia Moore Lewis and her husband, C. Huffman Lewis, left a legacy to continue contributions to their community. In 1988 the C. Huffman Lewis Foundation was transferred to the Community Foundation as an advised fund. In 1999 following the death of Mrs. Lewis, the last surviving advisor, the Fund became an unrestricted fund of the Community Foundation. Charles Huffman Lewis, a prominent attorney, began his law practice in Shreveport in 1919. At the time of his death, he was the senior partner of Wilkinson, Lewis, Madison and Woods, and president of the Hunter Co., the Gulf Coast Exploration Co., and the S. D. Hunter Foundation, and a long-time member of the official Board of the First United Methodist Church. Virginia (Jen) Moore Lewis was the first president of Junior Service League in 1930, and did the groundwork necessary to see it accepted into the National Association of Junior Leagues. She promoted the arts and projects to support the needy. Mrs. Lewis was preceded in death by her husband and their children, Susan Lewis Ford and Charles H. Lewis, Jr.

DENMAN AND MARY LONG FUND Established 1978

The founders established this fund to support grants to organizations in the parishes of Bossier and Caddo for charitable, scientific, educational, literary and religious purposes.

MEMORIAL FUND Established 1991

This fund was established for memorial gifts received by The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier. The earnings are used for unrestricted grants.

JOHN G. AND KATHERINE KRAEMER O'BRIEN FUND Established 1976

Katherine Kraemer O'Brien, widow of Shreveport banker and prominent businessman, Jack G. O'Brien, established the trust through a bequest in her will. Mr. O'Brien was born in New Zealand in 1897. Mrs. O'Brien was born in Oak Park, Illinois. They met and married in Chicago and moved to Shreveport in 1926 when he became head of the Trust Department at Commercial National Bank in Shreveport. He was very involved in charitable organizations. He attended the University of London and DePaul University in Chicago. He served in the Australian army during World War I and saw action in Turkey, Egypt, and France. In World II, he served as Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Air Force, and was on active duty in the South Pacific.

PATRICIA O'BRIEN FUND Established 1978

This fund was established to support charitable, educational, social welfare, conservation, cultural and religious organizations of the Shreveport-Bossier area by the founder, a long-time resident.

RUBYE MOSS RATCLIFF FUND *Established 1984*

Rubye Moss Ratcliff was a generous philanthropist leaving a bequest of nearly \$2.3 million of unrestricted funds to the Community Foundation in 1983. Her bequest nearly doubled the Foundation's total assets. Born in Shreveport, she was a talented artist featured in many private showings. Her father organized the National Gasoline Company, the Atlas Pipe Line Company, the Spartan Refining Company, and the Commercial National Gas Company, which operated a 10-inch gas pipeline that served east Texas towns. He oversaw the operations of the oil and gas companies, gasoline plants in a four-state area and the Louisiana Refrigerated Foods Corporation from his office on the ninth floor of the Giddens-Lane Building.

BETTY STAGG MEMORIAL FUND Established 1990

One of the largest bequests made to the Community Foundation in its fourth decade was the Betty Stagg Fund. Betty Stagg was committed to the community foundation concept, and she requested that at her death mourners, in lieu of flowers, consider making donations to The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier in her memory. She was known for her keen interest in and support of the arts, literature, music and environment. Her concern for the environment ran deep. Her motto was "Never Give In". Her spirit of generosity continues to live through the residual estate that she willed to the Community Foundation for charitable and philanthropic uses.

HORTENSE R. AND JOHN H. TUCKER, JR. FUND Established 1984

Colonel Tucker was one of the most respected attorneys in Louisiana and, indeed, the nation. He was always involved in community and civic affairs and enjoyed numerous

memberships in academic, professional and social organizations. He learned about community foundations from his wife's father of Cleveland, Ohio. The Cleveland Foundation was the nation's first community foundation, established in 1914. The groundwork for The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier was laid through Colonel Tucker's thorough research, discussions with the Community Council, and the interest and determination of a small group of dedicated individuals. He is known not only as the Founder



of The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier, he is a benefactor.

FIELD OF INTEREST FUNDS support particular areas of charitable

activity specified by the person, family or organization that established the fund.

ENVIRONMENTAL FUND Established 2003

This fund was established to encourage environmental awareness and education, to promote environmental citizenship and to encourage broad community participation in environmental decision making.

EULAVA JOYCE AND CHARLES RAVENNA FUND Established 2001

Mr. William (Bill) L. and Mrs. Freda H. Stephenson through the W.L.S. Company established the Fund "To Honor Public School Teachers in Caddo Parish". The earnings from the Fund are used to provide Caddo Parish public school teachers a means by which to purchase glasses or hearing aids for needy students.

ROWENA AND HENRY KIRSCH FUND Established 1981

Mr. Kirsch's will suggested the income from the principal of the trust should be utilized for scholarship purposes for deserving students that attend any educational institution in the State of Louisiana. In connection with the consideration of any person for a scholarship, he requested that the Board of Directors of the Community Foundation advise from time to time with the Rabbi of the B'nai Zion Congregation of Shreveport. Other charitable, educational and religious needs in the Shreveport-Bossier area may be considered. Funds shall at all times be utilized without discrimination with regard to race, color or creed.

STILES MINERAL RESERVE FUND Established 1992

The Board of The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier created this fund from mineral income received from the Stiles Trust. Field of interest grants are made to organizations that have projects with a Stiles-like mission.

STILES TIMBER RESERVE FUND Established 2000

The Board of The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier created a reserve fund from timber income received from the Stiles Trust. Field of interest grants are made to organizations that have projects with a Stiles-like mission.



TRAVIS WHITE FUND Established 1990

Travis White spent much of his life serving others, and his bequest of \$1,800,000 to the Community Foundation at his death seemed a natural culmination of his life and philanthropic spirit. Travis White's will said, "In making grants from this Fund, I request that the Foundation consider those charitable, educational, religious and community organizations in which I have been interested over the years. I am particularly interested in those organizations which are dedicated to the elimination of illiteracy among the population." He included a list of the organizations in his will.

DESIGNATED FUNDS ensure support to one or more specific non-profit organizations.

NEWIT JAMES DREW AND MAGGIE SORRELLS DREW FUND Established 1985

The annual income from the fund is to be divided equally between the Shriners Hospital for Children, Shreveport, Louisiana and Hap House, Shreveport, Louisiana.

ISABEL AND DADIE GOLDMAN FOUNDATION FUND Established 1988

The net income of the fund is to be paid annually to the Goldman School of the Caddo-Bossier Association for Retarded Citizens, now the ARC of Caddo-Bossier.

BEN LEVY MEMORIAL FUND Established 2001

The many friends of the late Ben Levy established this fund to express their respect and admiration for him and to honor his memory. The fund supports the Annual Shotgun Raffle and/or Auction of the Shreveport Committee/Chapter of Ducks Unlimited.

SHREVEPORT SESQUICENTENNIAL FUND Established 1990

Income from the fund is to be used for historical and historical-related projects in the Shreveport area.

VIRGINIA K. SHEHEE FUND Established 1998

Income from the fund is to be used for support of the Nena Plant Wideman Piano Competition.

AGENCY ENDOWMENT FUNDS are established by a not-for-profit agency for the benefit of

the not-for-profit agency.

CADDO PUBLIC EDUCATION FOUNDATION FUND Established 1993

An agency endowment fund established to provide for the teacher mini-grant program for public school teachers of Caddo Parish and administered by the Alliance for Education.

CENTER FOR FAMILIES Established 2002

An agency endowment fund created in memory of Mr. Robert Currie.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE FUND Established 1998

Established to help fulfill Sister Margaret McCaffery's last wish that the work of Christian Service, a non-profit group which she started that works with the poor, would continue.



RED RIVER REVEL ARTS FESTIVAL FUND Established 1996

An agency endowment fund established to provide current income and longterm protection for the operations of the Red River Revel Arts Festival.

RED RIVER ZOOPORT FUND Established 2002

Established for the creation and maintenance of a zoological and botanical garden. This fund was initiated with memorials in memory of Ernest Arlington Fort, II.

THE STRAND THEATRE OF SHREVEPORT CORPORATION FUND

Established 1998

Established to provide for special maintenance and other costs that cannot be covered by ticket sales.

UNITED WAY OF NORTHWEST LOUISIANA FUND Established 1999

Established through a challenge grant and initial gifts to establish a de Tocqueville Society at the United Way of Northwest Louisiana.

YOUTH ENRICHMENT PROGRAM SCHOLARSHIP FUND Established 1991

Established to provide scholarships for Youth Enrichment Program children.

S O Z I SCHOLARSHIP

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS typically provide grants toward tuition, fees, books and required course materials. The Foundation works with donors to develop criteria and selection processes. The Foundation tracks the performance of scholarship recipients to ensure that students continue to meet the terms of the scholarships.

ARK-LA-TEX AGRICULTURAL COUNCIL-JESS LOYD, JR. MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND Established 1987

Established by the Ark-La-Tex Agricultural Council for worthy graduate and undergraduate students majoring in some field of agriculture or home economics studies at an accredited institution.

A. W. AND TWEATIE S. BAIRD SCHOLARSHIP FUND Established 1986

Established by Tweatie Scarborough Baird, after the death of her husband, A. W. Baird, a Shreveport oilman, to assist worthy students in pursuit of the study of geology. The fund is a component of the Shreveport Geological Society Scholarship Fund.

HARVEY BROYLES ENDOWMENT FUND Established 1991

more than \$5 million that Mrs. Annie Lowe Stiles donated to the Foundation in her 1980 will. She outlived her husband and their three sons. William P. Stiles' primary interest and most successful venture was the oil business, which he entered shortly after the discovery of the Caddo Oil Fields. He moved to Louisiana in 1903, and founded the town of Trees, Louisiana, a "company town" that was the center of his oil operation for many years. He owned land throughout Louisiana, Arkansas, California and Texas. He had extensive business interests in Dallas, Houston, El Paso and Los Angeles, and maintained an office on the fifth floor of the Ricou-Brewster Building in downtown Shreveport. Mrs. Stiles was a director of Commercial National Bank and vice-president of Ogilvie Hardware. William Pierce Stiles and Annie Lowe Stiles were both interested in philanthropy. Organizations were specified in her will; therefore, the Stiles Funds are designated funds.

This supporting organization distributes its income annually to the Foundation. The awards issued from the Stiles Trust are included in the designated grants. The assets of the Stiles Trust are not included in the financial statements of the Foundation.

The assets of the Stiles Trust for the year ending December 31, 2003 are \$6,457,479. The Trust distributed \$363,498 to the Community Foundation for the year ended December 31, 2003, which is included in the Foundation's total contributions received for the year.



INVESTMENT EXPERTISE

The Foundation's investment assets are professionally managed with the sole intent of supporting the philanthropic intentions of its donors. Specifically, the Foundation strives to provide a sustainable and increasing level of funds for grant-making purposes.

A few years ago, the investment strategy for most community foundations was relatively simple—choose the safest, most secure investment avenues and spend the income generated on the principal. Unfortunately, practicing that type of seemingly "safe" strategy actually leads to the erosion of the base principal because it does not take into account important market fluctuations.


In 1996, the Board took a hard look at the investment practices and instituted a policy to provide for long-term real growth of principal and income without undue exposure to risk.

The spending policy allows the Foundation to make grant distributions each year of 4% of the fair market value of the average of the assets for the past rolling 12 quarters. An administrative fee of up to 1% is assessed.

Several different money management firms manage the Foundation's investments funds, each having a specific role in the overall management process. Each of these firms was selected following a rigorous selection process conducted by the Foundation's Board. Likewise, the investment performance of each money manager as well as the overall performance of the Foundation is monitored on a quarterly basis.

The Foundation's investment consulting firm, Larry Thompson & Associates, assists the Foundation's Board in all manager selection and performance measurement issues.

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HOW TO APPLY FOR A GRANT

Grant making is the core mission of The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier. The Foundation accepts grant applications twice each year. Deadlines for applications are March 31 and August 31.

Grants from the Community Foundation are awarded to:

- Benefit individuals, activities and institutions of Caddo and Bossier Parishes.
- Not-for-profit organizations exempt from federal taxation under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue
- · Specific projects covering definite period of time. Grants are typically made for one year only.
- Leverage other donations in the form of matching funds or challenge grants.
- Agencies that do not discriminate as to age, race, religion, sex or national origin.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Applicants should telephone the Foundation to determine if their project or goal is consistent with the Foundation's funding criteria. Grant guidelines should be carefully studied before an application is submitted.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

Seven copies, plus an original, shall include the following information collated in the order listed:

- Application Cover Sheet provided by CFS-B.
- Letter from chief executive officer of the governing body.
- Grant Narrative, three to five pages.
- List of the applicant's governing board, including address and phone number.
- One-page budget summary showing the current fiscal year as compared to the preceding year.
- The completed CFS-B Project Budget form.

Please attach these items to the original application only:

- A copy of the organization's 501(c) (3) tax exemption letter.
- Audited financial statement for the most recently completed fiscal year.

Grant applications should be submitted to the office of The Community Foundation of Shreveport-Bossier, 401 Edwards Street, Suite 105, Shreveport, Louisiana 71101 on or before March 31 or August 31. NOTIFICATION

Applicants are usually notified within sixty days of the application date of the status of their funding request.
