On the Air

Radio

SU games were broadcast all season on the school's flagship radio station for lacrosse, ESPN Radio 1260 AM. **Brian Higgins** and **Matt Park** took turns with the play-by-play duties, while Syracuse equipment manager **Kyle Fetterly** provided color for the fourth consecutive season. The games were broadcast through the internet at www.suathletics.com.

WAER FM 88 also broadcasted each game during the season.

Television

Time Warner Sports showed SU home games on a tape-delay basis. CSTV televised the Hopkins and Princeton games. ABC2 in Baltimore produced the first Hopkins game. ESPN Regional Television carried the NCAA quarterfinals from Ithaca. ESPN2 televised the semifinals, while ESPN was responsible for the championship game. **Dave Ryan, Quint Kessenich** and **Leif Elsmo** served as talent for championship weekend in Baltimore.

Orange Wins Ninth NCAA Championship with 14-13 Victory Against Navy

The current trend for the Syracuse lacrosse team seems to be winning NCAA championships every other season or during "even" years. The Orange captured its third championship in five years by defeating Navy, 14-13, at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore on May 31, 2004. It was SU's ninth NCAA lacrosse championship.

The pattern under sixth-year head coach **John Desko** reads something like this: 1999 - NCAA finalists, 2000 - NCAA Champions, 2001 - NCAA finalists, 2002 - NCAA Champions, 2003 - NCAA semifinalists, 2004 - NCAA Champions. Get the picture? The Orange lacrosse dynasty continues. In 2004, SU extended its remarkable final four streak to 22 consecutive seasons. It made its 14th appearance in the NCAA title game and the fifth in six seasons under Desko's direction. It was the first time SU ever faced Navy in an NCAA championship game.

The playoff road was not easy for the Orange. As the No. 4 seed, Syracuse defeated Albany, 21-13, at home in the first round. Then it was off to Ithaca to take on No. 5 Georgetown in the quarterfinals. The Hoyas and Orange had met just 16 days prior in the regular-season finale. SU squeaked past Georgetown, 8-7, at Cornell's Schoellkopf Field thanks to a last-second goal by senior **Sean Lindsay**.

On May 29, Syracuse faced top-ranked Johns Hopkins in the NCAA semifinals. After losing two consecutive games to the Blue Jays by a combined score of 36-13, including a 17-5 decision at JHU on March 20, the Orange knocked off Hopkins, 15-9.

Syracuse finished the 2004 season with seven consecutive wins and a 15-2 record.



Orange Boasts Best Winning Percentage in NCAA Tournament Play

This was Syracuse's 25th appearance (22nd consecutive) in the NCAA Tournament. The Orange first qualified in 1979, which coincidentally was current coach John Desko's senior year at SU. The team made it again in 1980 and 1981, but missed the 1982 tournament. Since 1983, Syracuse has participated every year. The only other time the Orange earned a No. 4 seed was in 1998. Syracuse has played in an unprecedented 22-straight NCAA semifinal games. The Orange has appeared in 14 championship games and won nine titles. It has won three of the last five NCAA crowns (2000, 2002, 2004). Its other championship titles came in 1983, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1993 and 1995.

Syracuse owns an NCAA Tournament record of 51-16 to rank first in all-time tournament winning percentage (.761). Princeton (28-9, .757) has the second-best winning percentage.

***SU's participation in the 1990 tournament was vacated by the NCAA Committee on Infractions, so the NCAA does not recognize the Orange's 3-0 record nor its national championship from that season. According to the NCAA, SU owns the second-highest winning percentage in tournament play with a 48-16 record and .750 mark.



News and Notes from Baltimore Championship Weekend 2004

Orange Scores Upset in Semifinal Round

Senior midfielder **Kevin Dougherty** was the offensive hero of the NCAA semifinals with a career-high five goals. Senior attackman **Brian Nee** added four goals, while senior **Michael Powell** notched four points on a goal and three assists. Freshman face-off man **Danny Brennan** had the best day of his young career, going 16-for-26 at the X. Both totals were career highs. Junior goalie **Jay Pfeifer** made 13 stops for Syracuse and held an opponent to less than 10 goals for the sixth consecutive game. The Orange led 6-5 at halftime, but the Blue Jays scored three of the first four goals of the second half to take an 8-7 lead with 4:36 remaining in the third quarter. SU reeled off six straight tallies, including two by Dougherty, to take a 13-8 lead. The Orange scored eight of the final nine goals of the contest.

Powell Eclipses 300-Point Plateau

Syracuse all-time leading scorer **Michael Powell** became the first Orange player to reach the 300-point mark with a goal and three assists against Johns Hopkins in the 2004 NCAA semifinals. Powell added one goal and five assists in the championship against Navy to finish his career with 307 points. His 300th point came on his third assist of the game that put SU ahead of the Blue Jays 10-8 with 1:02 left in the third quarter. Powell ended his four-year career with 150 goals and 157 assists.

Powell broke the Syracuse all-time record for assists in NCAA games. His five against Navy increased his career total to 34, passing Tim Nelson. Nelson's old mark was 27 from 1983-85. Powell also joined Gary Gait as the only two players in school history to score more than 50 career points in NCAA Tournament games (58). Gait is the Orange's career tournament points leader with 65 from 1987-90.

Nee Registers Milestone Goal Versus Blue Jays

Brian Nee's third goal of the first half against Johns Hopkins was the 90th of his career, making him the 24th SU player ever to score at least 90 goals. Nee added his career-high tying fourth goal of the game in the fourth quarter. With three goals and two assists in the championship against Navy, Nee concluded his four-year career tied for 21st on the school's all-time goals list with 94.

Pfeifer Earns Two More NCAA Victories

Jay Pfeifer improved his record in NCAA Tournament games to 9-1, making 13 saves against Johns Hopkins in the semifinals and 15 saves against Navy in the championship. His nine NCAA tournament wins ties him for the school record with Matt Palumb (9-0 from 1988-90) and Rob Mulligan (9-2 from 1998-2001). Pfeifer's .900 winning percentage in NCAA action is second only to Palumb. Pfeifer is now 4-1 in championship weekend action, including victories against Princeton in the 2002 championship game and Navy in the 2004 title contest.

Pfeifer's 15 saves against Navy in the final increased his career total to 139 in NCAA games. He now ranks second behind Matt Palumb (146) and needs eight more playoff saves to break his record.

NCAA Attendance Records Continue to Break in Baltimore

The semifinal attendance figure of 46,923 was an NCAA record for an outdoor Division I championship, breaking the record of 37,944 set in the 2003 NCAA championship game in Baltimore.

A record crowd of 43,898 was in attendance for the 2004 NCAA Championship game. The three-day total for paid admissions was 130,700. The championship game crowd of 43,898 was 6,954 more than the 2003 crowd of 37,944.

The championship crowd of 43,898 in attendance to watch Syracuse vs. Navy on Memorial Day cracked the top 10 for all NCAA championship games, trailing just nine men's basketball championships.

NCAA attendance figures have been at their highest when Syracuse is one of the four teams left on championship weekend. The top four total paid semifinal attendance figures in NCAA Division I history included games that the Orange were a part of.

NCAA Playoff Games at the Dome

The NCAA first round game against Albany was Syracuse's 20th NCAA playoff game at the Carrier Dome. The Orange improved to 19-1 at home under the white bubble in NCAA Tournament play with a 21-13 victory against the Great Danes on May 16, 2004. The lone blemish on that record was a 19-13 loss to North Carolina in the 1991 semifinals.

Powell Wins Second Tewaaraton Trophy

Senior attackman **Michael Powell** became the first two-time winner of the Tewaaraton Trophy, an award which has been presented annually since 2001 to the best player in collegiate lacrosse. Powell received his 2004 trophy at a ceremony in Washington, D.C. on June 3. He was also the Tewaaraton recipient in 2002 after he led the Orange to its eighth NCAA championship his sophomore year.

Orange All-Americans

Senior attackman **Michael Powell** became the first SU men's lacrosse player, and just the fourth player in collegiate lacrosse history, to be named to the USILA All-America First Team during each of his four seasons. Powell was one of five Orange players to make one of the STX/USILA All-America Teams announced on Monday, May 31, in Baltimore at the NCAA Championship.

In addition to Powell, senior midfielder **Sean Lindsay** was named a first-team All-American. Senior midfielder **Steve Vallone** was a second-team selection, while sophomore attackman **Brian Crockett** was named to the third team. Freshman defenseman **Steve Panarelli** was an honorable mention pick.

Powell finished his career with a school-record 307 points, including a career-high 89 (42 goals, 47 assists) in his final season. The only other players in collegiate lacrosse history to be named first-team All-America four times are Doug Turnbull (Johns Hopkins 1922-25), Frank Urso (Maryland 1973-76) and Del Dressell (Johns Hopkins 1983-86).

Lindsay was named an All-American for the second straight year. He was a 2003 honorable mention selection. He ranked fourth on the team in scoring with 29 goals and seven assists for 36 points. He scored six points in the NCAA Tournament, including the game-winning goal with five seconds left in the quarterfinal round versus Georgetown.

Vallone earned his first All-America honor in his final season. He ranked fifth on the team in scoring with 22 goals and 13 assists. He tallied 10 points in the 2004 NCAA Tournament on three goals and seven assists, including a goal and an assist in the championship game.

Crockett earned All-America honors for the first time in his career. He ranked second on the team in scoring with 39 goals and 15 assists. He registered eight points in the NCAA Tournament on five goals and three assists. He had three goals in the national championship game against Navy.

Panarelli, the first Orange rookie since Powell in 2001 to earn All-America status, tied for second on the team with 55 ground balls. He was also used on the face-off unit, winning six of the 13 draws he took.



Desko Blazing a Trail of Excellence

The 2004 season was **John Desko's** sixth year as head men's lacrosse coach at Syracuse. He won his third NCAA championship trophy in five seasons after his team defeated the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds in this year's tournament during the final weekend of play. Desko has maintained the winning tradition that is Syracuse Lacrosse. Since replacing Hall of Fame coach Roy Simmons Jr. in 1999, Desko has kept the Orange in the hunt for a national championship each and every season. In the process, he has established his own style of leadership that has proven to be quite successful.

Desko's record speaks for itself:

- An overall record of 80-19 in six seasons
- A postseason record of 17-3
- Six-straight trips to NCAA Championship weekend
- Five NCAA title-game appearances
- Three NCAA Championships (2000, 2002, 2004)
- A 7-3 record at championship weekend
- 5-1 in the NCAA semifinals

Since Desko accepted the head coaching reins, Syracuse has had 21 players earn All-America honors. He has helped develop some of the most skilled players in the nation. Under his watch Ryan Powell was named the Player and Attackman of the Year, while Marshall Abrams earned national Defenseman of the Year accolades in 2000. Michael Powell earned four-straight Attackmen of the Year awards and was selected the Player of the Year in 2004. He became SU's first Tewaaraton Trophy winner in 2002 and won it for a second time in 2004. John Glatzel earned Defenseman of the Year recognition in 2002.

Desko and his staff have achieved success by scheduling the nation's toughest competition.

Since he took over in 1999, Syracuse is 30-12 against top 10 teams.

The Orange have continued to be one of the last four teams standing come Memorial Day weekend for each

of the past 22 years. It is as much a reflection upon Desko as anyone. After all, he is the only person who has been directly associated with the team for each of the past 22 seasons.

Another fact setting Desko apart is that he is the only Division I men's coach to lead his team to NCAA title game appearances in each of his first four seasons as head coach.

Desko's first championship came in 2000. It was the school's seventh crown and first since 1995. That year, he guided SU to a 15-1 record, the best finish since 1988, and an 18th-consecutive appearance in the final four.

A year earlier, Desko became the third head coach in Division I history to reach the NCAA title game in just his first year at the helm. It was the first time a No. 8 seed ever reached the national semifinals and finals.

Desko is the Winningest Active Coach by Percentage

John Desko owns the nation's top winning percentage among active NCAA Division I coaches. He is first among active coaches AND all-time coaches in postseason winning percentage. His 17 NCAA wins rank third among active coaches in the postseason, while he is tied for sixth in total NCAA Tournament wins among all-time coaches.

Warm Weather Means Orange Heat Up

As the warm weather comes to Central New York, the Orange also tend to get hot. Since 1990, SU is 68-10 in the month of April and 15-1 in regular-season May games. Add those numbers to SU's 35-9 NCAA record since 1990 (all in the month of May) and you have 118 wins in 138 outings (.855) in April and May since 1990. This April, Syracuse posted a win-loss record of 4-1 and went 6-0 in May.

Powell Exits as Syracuse's All-Time Leading Scorer

Senior **Michael Powell** recorded six points at Georgetown on May 7 (three goals, three assists) to break the school scoring record of 287 points held by his older brothers, Casey and Ryan Powell. His record-tying and record-breaking points were both assists. Michael Powell scored a team-high 89 points this season (47 goals, 42 assists) and finished second in the nation in points per game (5.24 ppg). The new school record is 307 points, owned solely by Michael Powell.

NCAA Most Outstanding Player and All-Tournament Team

Senior attackman **Michael Powell** tallied a game-high six points on one goal and five assists in the championship against Navy to earn the NCAA Most Outstanding Player Award for the second time in his career (2002, 2004). He is the first Orange player to win the honor twice during his career.

Joining Powell on the NCAA All-Tournament team were goalie **Jay Pfeifer**, attackman **Brian Nee**, midfielders **Sean Lindsay** and **Kevin Dougherty** and defenseman **Dan DiPietro**. It was the first time that Nee, Lindsay, Dougherty and DiPietro earned the honor. Powell and Pfeifer were recognized in 2002.



Powell Finishes with 307 Career Points

Syracuse's all-time leading point scorer is **Michael Powell**, who recorded 307 career points during his four-year career. He is just the fourth Division I player to reach the 300-point milestone.

Powell Becomes First Four-Time Turnbull Winner, Receives Enners Award

Senior **Michael Powell** earned two prestigious awards at the 2004 United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) All-American Banquet, sponsored by STX and Geico, on Friday, June 11, at the Clarion Riverside Hotel in Rochester. He received the Lt. Raymond Enners Award as the Player of the Year and earned the Jack Turnbull Award (Attackman of the Year) for the fourth consecutive season.

Powell is the first four-time Turnbull winner in the history of the USILA's Division I Attackman of the Year award since it began in 1946. He is the seventh Orange player to win it.

It was the first time Powell won the Enners Award. He is one of five SU standouts to be named Player of the Year by the USILA. The others were Brad Kotz (1983), Gary Gait (1988, 1990), Casey Powell (1997, 1998) and Ryan Powell (2000).

Five SU Players Selected in 2004 Major League Lacrosse College Draft

Senior attackman **Michael Powell** was selected as the No. 1 overall pick in the 2004 Major League Lacrosse College Draft by the Baltimore Bayhawks on June 3. He was one of five Syracuse University players to be drafted.

Midfielder **Sean Lindsay** was selected by Rochester with the fourth pick in the first round. **Steve Vallone** went in the third round (No. 13) to Philadelphia, while **Kevin Dougherty** was selected by Rochester with the 16th pick in the third round. **Brian Nee** went to Boston as the 21st selection in the fourth round.

As of June 30, only Sean Lindsay was listed on an active MLL roster.

21 Goals vs. Albany Ties for Third-Most in SU NCAA History

The 21-goal outburst against Albany in the first round tied for the third-highest goal output by the Orange in NCAA Tournament history. It was the most goals by an SU squad since 1992 when the Orange defeated Johns Hopkins in the semifinals. It was the ninth 20-goal game for SU in the tournament. Five of the nine games have been played in the friendly confines of the Carrier Dome.

Donatelli Sees Career-High Time Against Johns Hopkins

One of the most important players on the team this year was senior goaltender **Nick Donatelli**. As SU's back-up goalie, Donatelli had to be ready at the drop of a hat to enter a game and come up with big saves. He saw his first game action of the season at Johns Hopkins on March 20. He was inserted for SU starter **Jay Pfeifer** in the third quarter and ended up playing a total of 25:54. It was the most time he had been asked to mind the net since he joined the team in 2001. He finished with six saves and allowed five goals. Donatelli played the entire fourth quarter against Albany in the NCAA First Round. He stopped six shots and allowed seven goals. Donatelli played in 18 games for Syracuse during his four-year career and made 52 saves. He recorded a .591 career save percentage.

Nee Stepped it Up with 19 Points in SU's Last Five Wins

Senior attackman **Brian Nee** scored a career-high five points in SU's win at Georgetown on May 7, and had the same total in the NCAA championship win against Navy with three goals and two assists. He was impressive down the stretch with a four-goal, one-assist effort against Albany in the first round and four goals against Johns Hopkins in the semifinals. He pushed his career total to 124 points (94 goals, 30 assists). He finished tied for 21st on the school's all-time goals list.

Nee scored his 100th career point in the Cornell game. He netted a career-high four goals in SU's 19-13 victory against Notre Dame. Known as a finisher, Nee added another dimension to his game this year. He had a career-high 15 assists this season, equaling his previous three-year total. Nee was third on the team in scoring with a career-high 47 points (32 goals, 15 assists).

Crockett Ranked 16th in the Nation in Goals Per Game (2.29)

Third-team All-American **Brian Crockett** scored three goals in the national championship win against Navy. It was the sixth time this season he had three goals or more in a game. Prior to that, he had four goals against Georgetown in the final regular-season game.

Crockett had two "sock-tricks" this season. He scored six goals against Brown on April 3, and had six in the win at Virginia on March 6. He was the first Orangeman since Casey Powell in 1998 to record two six-goal games in the same season. The six goals against UVA were the most since Michael Springer '03 exploded for six goals against Notre Dame in the 2001 NCAA semifinals.

Crockett finished 16th in the nation in the final goals-per-game race (2.29). He scored a career-high seven points in the Brown game. His other break-out game of the season included a five-goal, one-assist outing against Notre Dame.

For his career, Crockett owns 84 points on 59 goals and 25 assists. He posted 30 points (20 goals) as a rookie. This year, he was the team's second-leading scorer with 54 points (39 goals, 15 assists). He was listed on the March 17th Tewaaraton "Watch List."



Pfeifer Ranked Sixth in All-Time Saves at Syracuse

Junior **Jay Pfeifer** just completed his third season as SU's starting goalie. The national championship game against Navy was his 50th consecutive start in an Orange uniform. The team is 40-10 with Pfeifer starting in goal. On May 1, he had 11 saves against Massachusetts and in the process recorded his 500th career save. He followed that up with a career-high tying 19 saves in SU's win at Georgetown on May 7. Pfeifer had eight saves in the playoff win against Albany and another 19 saves against the Hoyas in the quarterfinal round. He was superb at championship weekend, tallying 13 saves against Johns Hopkins in the semifinals and 15 spectacular saves against Navy in the championship.

This season, Pfeifer recorded a .559 save percentage and a 10.62 goals against average.

He enters the 2005 season needing 24 saves in order to reach the 600 mark.

Dougherty, Lindsay, Vallone ... SU's First Midfield Line

Kevin Dougherty was a starting midfielder for Syracuse this season after transferring from Hofstra. He earned a spot on the NCAA All-Tournament team after registering a career-high five goals in the win against Johns Hopkins. Dougherty also recorded four goals in SU's 14-12 victory at Princeton. He scored three goals in the playoff win against Albany and had the game-tying goal against Georgetown in the quarterfinals. His linemates **Sean Lindsay** and **Steve Vallone** combined for two goals and two assists against the Hoyas and connected on the game-winner with five seconds left to play. Lindsay scored three goals in the two final four games (two versus Navy). Vallone accounted for two goals and three assists in Baltimore. Lindsay finished fourth on the team in scoring with 36 points (29 goals). Vallone was fifth in scoring with a career-high 35 points (22 goals), while Dougherty finished sixth with 32 points (21 goals).

For his career, Lindsay ended up with 89 points (69 goals, 20 assists). Dougherty finished his career with 71 points on 50 goals and 21 assists. Vallone, who had season-high four-goal outbursts against Cornell and Albany, had six multiple-goal games this season. For his career, Vallone posted 55 goals and 17 assists for 72 points.

Syracuse Never Had to Go to Overtime in 2004

Syracuse did not play one, single overtime game in 2004. The last time the Orange played an overtime game was against Massachusetts on April 26, 2003. The Orange lost to the Minutemen, 14-13, in Amherst and also dropped a 12-11 overtime decision to Rutgers in 2003.

In 2002, SU played two overtime games and came out on top in both of them. During the 2002 regular season, SU's only overtime game was at Brown where the Orange came away with a 14-13 victory. In the national semifinals, SU needed two overtime periods to defeat Virginia. The Orange advanced to their fourth-consecutive national championship game with a 12-11 double-overtime victory against the Cavaliers, thanks to Tom Hardy's game-tying and game-winning goals. It was the first multiple overtime win for Syracuse since 1971.

Under head coach John Desko, SU is 3-5 when the game is decided in extra minutes.

Syracuse has played 28 overtime games since 1971 and has a record of 17-11, including a 3-3 record in overtime games in the NCAA Tournament (1-2 in semifinals and 2-1 in other tournament games).

SU's quadruple-overtime loss to Princeton in 1999 was the first four OT-game for the Orange.

Rookie Brennan Performs Big on the Sport's Biggest Stage

Junior **Geoff Keough**, who transferred to SU this year from Fairfield, ranked 18th in the nation in face-off winning percentage (.538) in the final 2004 NCAA statistics. He won 107 of 199 draws for Syracuse this season. Junior midfielder **Jake Plunket** took 126 faceoffs for the Orange this year and won 57 for a .452 winning percentage.

The up-and-coming performer proved to be freshman middle **Danny Brennan**. A Farmingdale High product (i.e. goalie Rob Mulligan and defenseman Steve Panarelli), Brennan was thrown out to the face-off X for the first time in the Loyola game and went on to win 62 of 117 draws for a winning percentage of .530.

In the playoffs, Brennan won 12 of 19 faceoffs against Albany and was 8-of-19 against national leader Andy Corno of Georgetown in the NCAA quarterfinals. His best performance came in the semifinals where he won a career-high 16-of-26 draws against Hopkins.

Assisting on the wings was junior **Jarett Park**. A soccer player in the fall for the Orange, Park brought his speed and athleticism to the fight for possession. He led the team with 62 groundballs. **Steven Brooks, Michael Powell, Steve Panarelli, John Gallagher** and **Scott Ditzell** were some of the other players who were used on the wings during faceoffs.

Park Leads the Team in Groundballs for the Third Season

Jarett Park led the team with 62 groundballs. For his career, he owns 16 goals and 13 assists for 29 points. He has led the Orange in groundballs the past three seasons (2002, 2003, 2004) from his wing position on face-offs. In the national championship game against Navy, Park made what was perhaps the most critical defensive play. In the waning moments of the game, with his team clinging to a one-goal lead, Park laid himself out and altered a Midshipman's shot that could have tied the game. Those are the types of plays that Park is known for on the lacrosse field. His contributions are immeasurable.

Michael Powell finished second on the team in groundballs with 57.

Rommel Named to CoSIDA All-Academic District I Second Team

Sophomore **Greg Rommel** was named to the CoSIDA All-Academic District I At-Large Team on May 27. He represented Syracuse on the men's District I second team.

Rommel, a regular on SU's second midfield line in 2004, appeared in all 17 games and finished as the team's eighth-leading scorer with 14 points (13 goals). He notched his first career hat trick versus Notre Dame and scored three goals in the two games in Baltimore, including a two-goal performance in the national semifinals against Johns Hopkins. He has been selected to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in his first four semesters at SU.

Rommel is a bio-engineering major.

Zink Scores Career-High Six Points Against Albany in NCAAs

Senior attackman **Alex Zink** had 17 points in SU's last nine games, including a career-high six points (four goals, two assists) against Albany in the NCAA First Round. He had two goals and two assists in the win against Massachusetts. His other two-goal efforts came against Rutgers and Navy in the national championship game. Zink scored a career-high 22 points this season (15 goals, seven assists) to rank seventh on the team in scoring. A natural lefty, he was part of SU's man-up unit.

Brooks Finishes as the Leading Freshman Scorer on the Team

Freshman **Steven Brooks** is a midfielder who Orange fans will grow accustomed to seeing out on the field because of his speed, shooting accuracy and ability to play defense. In the playoff's first round against Albany, he scored a career-high two points (one goal, one assist). In the quarterfinals, he filled in admirably for an injured Jarett Park at short-stick defense and on the wings for faceoffs. Brooks was SU's leading freshman scorer with three goals and two assists. He also had 23 groundballs. He scored his first collegiate goal against Notre Dame. That third-quarter marker gave the Orange a 13-11 lead with 17:23 remaining in the contest. He scored his second goal at Brown and had an assist to Bucktooth in the UMass game.

Gallagher Groomed for Long-Stick Midfield Position, Played in Every Game

Sophomore long-stick midfielder **John Gallagher** played in all 17 games this season. He tallied the first goal of his college career against Virginia's All-American goalie Tillman Johnson. He had his first career assist against Rutgers.

A smart and saavy player, Gallagher collected 17 groundballs on the year. He contributed to SU's defensive turnaround after the first six games which saw the team lower its goals against average by 3.47 goals per game.

Panarelli Earns All-America Honors in Rookie Campaign

First-year defenseman **Steve Panarelli** was voted an honorable mention All-America in 2004. He started the year playing close defense and switched to long-stick midfield halfway through the season. He ranked third on the team with 55 groundballs and faced off 14 times, winning six draws.

Panarelli recorded his first career goal in his first collegiate outing against Army. His score came in the midst of SU's six-goal run towards the end of the game. Panarelli's marker came in the fourth quarter and gave the Orange a 16-13 lead with 14:15 left to play.

One of the most sought-after defensemen coming out of high school, Panarelli was named Defensive MVP of the Under-19 World Championship in July of 2003. He was the first long-stick midfielder to win the honor. In high school, he played close defense.



Defense Lowered Goals Against Average by 3.47

The youthful Orange "D" worked extremely hard to improve its overall team defense and it all came together in the NCAA semifinals when the team held top seed Johns Hopkins to nine goals. With three newcomers on the defensive end this year (Wright, Panarelli, Ditzell), the coaches had some teaching to do and the players had to learn how to communicate and play with one another. In the latter half of the season, the team's goals against average improved by 3.47 goals a game. In SU's first six games, the defense was giving up 13.20 goals per game. In the Orange's last 11 outings, they lowered that mark to 9.73 goals per game.

SU Notches Win 145 at the Carrier Dome Against Albany

Syracuse owns a record of 145-14 (.912) at the Carrier Dome all-time. The Orange's first season playing under the white bubble was 1981. SU went a perfect 7-0 playing at home this year. In 2003, the Orange lost three one-goal games at home, the most in one regular season at the Carrier Dome. It was the most losses at home for Syracuse since 1975, when the Orange dropped three on their home turf. The setbacks to Virginia (16-15), Princeton (11-10) and Rutgers (12-11 OT) at home in 2003 were three of just 14 losses at home in the Carrier Dome all-time for the SU lacrosse program.

The Orange, unaccustomed to losing at home, are 29-4 playing at home since 2000.

Lacrosse Attendance Records at the Dome

Syracuse had 10,536 fans in attendance at its March 1st, 2003 game against Virginia, the largest crowd for lacrosse since 10,924 showed up for the Princeton game in 2001.

Hopkins Loss Worst Since 1987

SU's 17-5 loss to Johns Hopkins on March 20th was the program's largest margin of defeat since a 19-6 loss to Cornell in 1987. It was the fewest amount of goals scored by an Orange team since the University of North Carolina held Syracuse to three goals in a 10-3 decision back in 1991.

The Orange went into the Hopkins game averaging a nation-best 18.7 goals per game.

Senior attackman **Michael Powell** was held without a goal and without an assist for just the second time in his career. Princeton was the first team to completely shut down Powell in 2003 by holding him to zero points in an 11-10 victory at the Carrier Dome. After that game, Powell went on to score at least three points in each of SU's remaining 13 games.

The Blue Jays held a decisive 20-4 advantage in faceoffs, which proved to be one of biggest keys, if not THE biggest key, to their victory.

After using **Jake Plunket** (1-of-11) and **Geoff Keough** (3-of-7) at the face-off X, Desko tried freshmen **Jon Jerome** (0-for-1) and **Steve Panarelli** (0-for-3). Syracuse even asked Powell to take two faceoffs (0-for-2). They were the first two face-off attempts of Powell's career. In the end, the Orange could not solve Hopkins' ease at gaining possessions.

Rommel, Bucktooth, Lykudis Take it to Another Level in Baltimore

Sophomore midfielder **Greg Rommel** recorded the first hat trick of his career against Notre Dame on March 11. Rommel was a member of SU's second midfield line along with **Steve Lykudis** and **Brett Bucktooth**.

The trio combined for five goals and one assist during championship weekend in Baltimore.

Bucktooth had a career-high three-point performance (one goal, two assists) against Albany in the playoff's first round. He scored a goal in each of the playoff games in Baltimore and finished tied for eighth on the team in scoring with Rommel. They each tallied 14 points on the season. Bucktooth had nine goals and five assists, while Rommel was the line's top goal-getter with 13 markers and an assist. Lykudis had an assist in the semifinals against Hopkins and finished 10th on the team in scoring with seven points (three goals).

For his career, Rommel owns 23 points (21 goals, two assists). Bucktooth has 15 career points (10 goals, five assists).

The Orange's second midfield line of Rommel, Lykudis and Bucktooth accounted for 25 of SU's 245 goals. They assisted on 10 goals (Bucktooth with five assists, Lykudis with four). The trio scored 25 goals on 77 shots, for a combined shooting percentage of .325.

Bucktooth had two-goal games against Albany and Massachusetts. Rommel scored goals in five of the Orange's last seven games.



Lacrosse Covered on "Syracuse Sidelines" Show

Head coach **John Desko** joined host **Mark Larson** on the weekly television show, "Syracuse Sidelines." The show aired once a week on Time Warner Sports (channel 26 in Syracuse). Volunteer assistant coach **Ryan Powell** was also a regular on the show. Powell and Larson broke down the past week's action and talked about the national scene. Desko kept fans up to speed on what was happening with the team. Football coach **Paul Pasqualoni** was a regular guest on "Syracuse Sidelines" in the fall and head basketball coach **Jim Boeheim** was a regular during the winter.

2004 Syracuse Captains

Seniors **Steve Vallone**, **Sean Lindsay**, **Dan DiPietro** and junior **Jay Pfeifer** were elected by the team to serve as captains in 2004.

Five High School Seniors Commit to Orange

Head coach **John Desko** and his staff received commitments from five high school seniors during the sport's early signing period in November. The Orange recruited attackman **Michael Leveille (Delmar, N.Y./Albany Academy)**, younger brother of former Massachusetts Kevin Leveille.

The incoming midfielders are **Brendan Loftus (Watertown, N.Y./Immaculate Heart Central)**, **Steve Babbles (Skaneateles, N.Y./Skaneateles)** and **Mike Hatton (Corning, N.Y./Corning East)**. Loftus and Babbles played together this past summer on the Central Region team that won gold at the Empire State Games. Loftus is the son of former Syracuse football player Mark Loftus '78, who went on to play for the New England Patriots of the National Football League.

On defense, Syracuse signed North Carolina native **Brian Holden (Winston-Salem, N.C./Forsyth Country Day)**, who has been a North Carolina all-state performer since 2001. He was invited to the Under-19 national team tryouts as a sophomore.

Players Wear Orange from Head to Toe in Baltimore

Syracuse University adopted an athletics logo for all of its athletics teams. The new look was the result of a collaborative effort between the University and NIKE, SU's official athletics apparel partner. All 21 of SU's athletics teams will utilize the new mark in the very near future – an interlocking SU – and the official orange color on uniforms and warm-ups and in print and electronic venues. In addition, Syracuse University's teams will now use the nickname Orange, replacing Orangemen and Orangewomen.



The lacrosse team debuted the new "Orange" look in Baltimore with new Orange helmets, orange jerseys, orange shorts and orange cleats. It is believed to be the first time that Syracuse donned all orange at once. It was definitely the first time SU wore orange from head to toe at an NCAA championship event.

17 Named to Fall 2003 Athletic Director's Honor Roll
