They will provide a brief overview of Mentally Healthy Schools and Health Promoting Schools in Aotearoa/New Zealand, as well as issues related to policy and sustainability.

World Conference on Mental Health Promotion

The Third World Conference on the Promotion of Mental Health and Prevention of Mental and Behavioral Disorders will be held from September 15 - 17 2004 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Auckland. The theme will be: From Research to Effective Practice.

The main objective of the Conference is to build on the work that was begun at the first two world conferences in Atlanta in 2000 and London in 2002. Intercamhs has helped to develop the meeting and organize a track of presentations focusing on school-aged children and adolescents.

The Conference is being organized by the World Federation for Mental Health, the Clifford Beers Foundation and the Mental Health Foundation of New Zealand in collaboration with the Carter Center, and is co-sponsored by the WHO.

Intercamhs' seminar at IUHPE conference in Melbourne in April

Intercamhs played a leading role at the
International Union of Health Education and
Health Promotion Conference in Melbourne,
Australia, in April.

Members of the Alliance contributed to the Mental Health Stream at the conference, conducting a seminar entitled 'Exploring quality practice in the international exchange and adaptation of school-based mental health programs'. Four members made short presentations and President Louise Rowling (Australia) chaired the session, involving participants in a discussion of the issues.

Michael Murray (England), the opening speaker, explored the concept of model programs as a guide for international exchange of strategies for school-based mental health. He made a plea to the audience for the further development and dissemination of best practice for school mental health through collaborative activities.

Annette Johnson (North America) elaborated the challenges involved in the transference of model programs, heightening the audience's awareness of 'cultural competence', acknowledging diversity or cultural sensitivity. She alerted the audience to the need to move beyond recognition of differences to the development of tools that respect the differences and factor them into plans for addressing mental health needs in an objective manner.

Jo Mason (Australia) then described a 'model program' - the Australian program MindMatters - and related the experiences of collaborating with other countries to adapt it to each country's culture and context.

Peter Paulus (Germany) gave specific examples of the understandings about international exchange that his team developed in the translation (literal and contextual) and trialling of MindMatters for implementation in Germany and Switzerland.

Discussion following the presentations highlighted the interest and enthusiasm that existed for global collaboration to maximise social impact in cost effective ways. Participants agreed that it was possible to achieve exchange of ideas, lessons learnt and quality practice in implementation of programs, with the proviso that they were trialled and adapted to linguistic and cultural circumstances.

Advisory Board

Jean-Pierre Valla from Quebec, Canada, has tendered his resignation as Vice President of Intercamhs, due to pressure of work commitments. The Board wishes to thank him for his support in the initiation of Intercamhs. The Advisory Board will consider this Board Officer casual vacancy at its meeting in Auckland in September.

The International Journal of Mental Health Promotion

The latest issue of The International Journal of Mental Health Promotion is a special edition, showing how a number of Intercamhs members are working to promote the growth, improvement and sustainability of school mental health programs worldwide.

In their introductory article, Louise Rowling and Mark Weist stressed the importance of collaborative effort. They wrote: 'Successful action to promote mental health can only be achieved and sustained by the involvement and support of the whole community, and the development of collaborative partnerships with range of agencies throughout public, private and non-government sectors.'

The articles covered country-specific work in Ireland, New Zealand, Norway and the United States, as well as the development of cross-cultural programs. Michael Murray and Katherine Weare discussed the paradigmatic change that is needed for school mental health efforts to be sustained.
