

independence of the judiciary from political interference by government. The autonomy and operational independence of British (and to a lesser extent, Australian) police organisations can be contrasted with the thoroughly politicised NYPD under Bratton.

Australian policing's flirtation with the US zero tolerance policy and with the UK's core business policy speak of a failure of Australian police managers to examine the singularity of the societies and political systems which produced these policies. Neither context was even a near-match with Australian society or Australian police organisations, or in the NYPD case, with non-codified or porous NSW law which demands the exercise of police discretion in its enforcement. Adoption of either policy would have been immensely damaging to Australian society; neither policy should have ever been contemplated for implementation here.

Notes and References

When organised policing was first introduced in 1829 London, police searched for lost children and cared for drunks, intervened in spousal violence and arbitrated in neighbourhood disputes. Police ran soup kitchens for the poor and dormitories for the homeless and acted as a proto-public service. "The nineteenth century police reformers cultivated the service role in order to secure legitimacy for more coercive policing functions." A.P. Donadigrodski (1977) Social Police and the Bureaucratic Elite in nineteenth century Britain, London: Croom Helm, p. 67.
The Royal Irish Constabulary despite its imposed, rather than negotiated modus of policing also had a service role function

- it collected agricultural statistics and kept the school rolls,

enforced weights and measures legislation and rounded up

straying hogs and suppressed crime, offences against public order – and rebellion.

The NSW Police replicated that RIC-type service role; it obtains to this day. NSW Police Commissioner 1984-91 John Avery changed the title of the NSW Police Force to "Police Service" in the 1980s, to highlight the primacy of the service role. Police Minister Michael Costa seeking a transient electoral advantage, determined to give NSW policing a tough-guy image by changing its title back to Police Force. The affrighted response of the NSW Labor Left resulted in him deleting both the words "Force" and "Service" from the title; we now have a NSW Police – full stop.

WINDOWS XP SERVICE PACK 2 – IS IT SAFE?

Last month we highlighted the recently released update to the Windows XP Operating System by Microsoft. Having downloaded, installed and updated our test PC it would be difficult indeed to suggest that the update should be ignored. In fact, the exact opposite is the case, there being no negative aspects noted post installation – although there are likely to be some problematic consequences that we may have missed.

The CD copy we requested (at a suggested 4-6 week wait) arrived within two weeks' and came with the expected warning to backup all-important files prior to installation. Order your Update CD now, or source one from a friend.

IS A LCD (TFT) MONITOR FOR YOU?



Back in the September edition of Computer Review the new range of PC Products distributed by Mitsubishi Electric was mentioned, and more specifically the Diamond Digital large screen TFT LCD monitors - DV191 (19") and DV201 (20").

Thankfully we have now had the opportunity to trial the DV191 and it must be said that we are impressed. Not so much by the product itself (although it is impressive), but by the aesthetics of the LCD screen. This together with the space saving benefits of the TFT monitor must surely see it as technologically advanced.

For those with a passion for knowledge, LCD refers to Liquid Crystal Display, and TFT to Thinfilm Transistor (or active matrix). Practically the terms refer to thin, slim and feature packed – only 210 mm deep including the stand (DV191).

Unlike the standard CRT Monitors (Cathode Ray Tube) which cover the edges of the screen, the Diamond Digital DV191 is a true 19" monitor with full viewing ability. It weighs only 7.5 kg and used about 55% of the power requirements of similar sized CRTs.

The DV191 also features inbuilt speakers (another space saving feature) and is extremely easy to install with an auto adjustment function that optimises the displayed image by tuning it to the characteristics of the graphics signal. It is available in both black and beige and retails for AU\$1,399. (inc GST) – it's a winner all round.

COPS ON THE BOX

REALISTIC TAKE ON LAW AND ORDER

IN OUR REGULAR FEATURE ON TV POLICE SHOWS, CONSTABLE ELLEN KASERMAN RECKONS WE COULD LEARN A THING OR TWO FROM LAW AND ORDER



ometimes cop show Law and Order is so accurate a depiction of New York policing that it's difficult to watch. Not because it's disturbing or shocking, but because Australian police simply don't dream of a lot of the tools police have in the Big Apple.

"For instance we can't lie to defendants during an interview to induce them to make a confession," Kaserman says "but I must admit many Aussie police might find it a useful tool at times." As for being able to hold suspects for 48 hours, it's just unfathomable.

"I cannot imagine the bureaucratic problems that would cause in Sydney, between police and correctional services."

The Education and Development Officer based in Newtown LAC in Sydney's inner west says she's a fan of all three incarnations of Law and Order – leaving aside the frustratingly freer hand the US police seem to have.

Kaserman enjoys the realism of Law and Order and its discipline in not descending into a soapie.

"It deals with investigative matters and police work and does not get into the sex lives of the main characters - it focuses on the realities of the job," says Kaserman. "That's why I like it."

It's a recipe that others appreciate as well – the series is the longest running crime series in the history of television. The show has also spawned three successful spin-offs Law & Order: Special Victims Unit, Law & Order: Criminal Intent," as well as the new Law & Order: Trial By Jury which premieres in the US in early 2005.

Kaserman loves the show's formula where viewers follow a case from the police investigation all the way through to the courts. The investigations

are challenging, prosecutions are complicated, and decisions about legal procedures and pleabargaining often vexing for the protagonists.

"You see the police liaising with the DA and the actual prosecution – it's very realistic because all the legal stuff is half the battle" she says. "No matter how well you've done your job there can be legal ramifications."

"The sub plots always weave in and out and you see the effect of police work on the character's emotions, or the sleep deprivation of a high profile investigation, under the nose of the politicians and journos," she says.

"You do feel the frustration of the police on the show, the inter-agency communication. And the good guys don't always win," Kaserman says.

Kaserman finds the show topical, reflecting changes in attitudes and political environments. "For example since September 11 new legislation on terrorism has changed our posture on civil liberties – sometimes police can have misgivings about such changes."

When pressed Kaserman admits to liking Law and Order: SVU the best of the three – but she does love Lenny from the original series, "He's a typical old school copper - a recovering alcoholic," she laughs.

SVU stands for Special Victims Unit and the show deals primarily with sexually based crime. Kaserman likes the characters from the show.

"I love Elliott because he is so motivated and he has a simmering anger he only just manages to control – he always manages to remain professional even if sometimes it's only just," Ellen says. "And Munch has a very dry humour, and takes a very cynical bent on what's going on – but his feelings run very deeply when it comes to child sexual assault."

However Kaserman doesn't like Detective Odafin "Fin" Tutuola played by Ice-T. "He might be a popular rapper but he's a terrible actor," she says.

Yet Kaserman does think it's funny you never see the main characters doing the mundane work of policing like filling out applications for warrants and taking statements. "All you see is the execution of search warrants, the arrest of offenders and crucial interviews," she says "But I suppose all TV shows are like that."
