We have learned of the recent deaths of the following defenders of the Olympic and sports movement.

 Jesse Abramson (USA, 75). a journalist for the New York Herald Tribune, who was among the most noted publicists of athletics.

• Henri Anspach (BEL, 97), a member of the 1912 Olympic champion épée team who later became a painter. His brother Paul, Honorary President of the FIE, won the individual Olympic title in the discipline.

• Gérard Blitz (BEL, 77), who won four Olympic medals (silver in water polo — 1920 and I924 — bronze in the 100 m backstroke at the 1920 Games and in water polo in 1936) and served as President of the Belgian swimming federation from 1955 to 1960.

• René Chesal (FRA, 83). former Secretary General of the FIAC.

• Major Antoine Coicou (HAI, 64). former President of the Haitian Olympic Committee.
