Major snowstorm fails to ice dual family weekends

By Dave Havir EXINGTON, Ky.—More than 1,500 people braved a major snowstorm to attend two separate but simultaneous winter family activities in Kentucky Dec. 22-26.

From Wednesday evening through Friday both activities-sponsored by two Church of God organizationsscheduled basketball, volleyball and other recreational events. Both groups also sponsored dances. The Sabbath was filled with educational seminars in both locations.

For seven years there had been an annual Winter Family Weekend organized by Jim O'Brien of West Chester, Ohio, and the United Church of God, his employer from 1995 until the spring of 2004.

After Mr. O'Brien was let go from the UCG last spring (see "Church HQ Suspends Pastor From Speaking" and "Church Lets Elder Go When He Disregards Its Gag Order," *THE JOURNAL*, April 30 and May 31, 2004), both he and the UCG decided to continue with their own versions of the activities during the winter publicschool and college break.

Mr. O'Brien and the two congregations he still pastors (the Church of God Cincinnati and the Church of God Lexington) advertised their event as the eighth annual Winter Family Weekend, because for the past seven years Mr. O'Brien and his congregations' boards of trustees negotiated and signed the contracts with the recreational facilities and motel.

The UCG also advertised its event as the eighth annual Winter Family Weekend, because for the previous seven years Mr. O'Brien was an employee of the UCG organization.

Further, the UCG over the years had provided seminar speakers from its full-time ministry.

The activity took place in the Cincinnati, Ohio, area from 1997 to 2001 but moved to Lexington beginning in 2002

This year Mr. O'Brien again organized his activity in Lexington, while United moved its activity to Louisville, Ky. (60 miles to the west).

Mr. O'Brien reported that 350 peo-ple attended his 2004 Winter Family Weekend, while the UCG reported that 1,240 people attended its 2004 Winter Family Weekend. Mark Winner of the Louisville area coordinated the event for the UCG.

Treacherous travel

Because of the icy snowstorm that dumped 6 to 12 inches of flakes along the Ohio River, many of the people who attended both events had difficulty in traveling.

For fliers, schedules were disrupted. For drivers, many roads were slippery, and other roads were closed.

As people arrived, many shared stories of inconvenience.

The weather also influenced a large number of people to change their plans and not attend the events.

Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Winner each reported that 300 people had canceled their plans to attend because of the weather.

Seminars in Lexington

One of the traditional activities at the event has been the seminar schedule, which encourages parents and teenagers to choose topics that interest them.

Wayne Cole announces retirement, gives advice based on his experiences in life and the church

By Dixon Cartwright IG SANDY, Texas—Wayne Cole, known specifically to thousands of present and past Worldwide Church of God members as C. Wayne Cole, in a sermon here Jan. 22 listed lessons he has learned in his 50-year Church of God ministry.

The address was officially Mr. Cole's farewell sermon, although the 75-year-old former Worldwide Church of God evangelist did not rule out the occasional religious discourse or other speaking engagement.

He did say, however, that he wanted to quit while he was ahead: end his formal ministry while he could still competently speak and expound Scripture.

Mr. Cole's preaching over the past

10 years has consisted of sermons delivered before the members of the Church of God Big Sandy but also at numerous other geographically wideranging venues

In the beginning

Mr. Cole was active in speaking and other ministerial responsibilities beginning with his graduation from Ambassador College, Pasadena, Calif., in 1954. His duties continued in various but uninterrupted forms for 25 years, until his sudden and unexpected exit under a cloud when WCG founder Herbert W. Armstrong relieved him of his church responsibilities in 1979.

Mr. Cole's last assignment under Mr. Armstrong was to assist the WCG pastor general as chairman and president of all church operations everywhere in the world. As reported in several articles over

the years in THE JOURNAL recounting the history of the WCG especially in the 1970s, Mr. Armstrong suddenly fired Mr. Cole not long after officials of the State of California assumed legal control of the church through the office of the California attorney general.

Mr. Cole, while carrying out what he said were Mr. Armstrong's specific directives to cooperate with the state in its search for what it said were instances of financial malfeasance in the church, suddenly found himself out of a job, disfellowshipped and banished from church property.
