# 11th general conference of elders marks the 10th anniversary of the United Church of God

INCINNATI, Ohio—Elders of the United Church of God an International Association met at a Holiday Inn here for its annual general conference, the 11th such gathering counting the founding meetings in the spring of 1995.

The elders' meeting came after a week of sessions of the governing council of elders of the United Church of God, headquartered near here at Milford, Ohio.

Days before the general conference met, the 12-man council had selected Clyde Kilough, 53, of Antelope, Calif., as the fourth president of the church in its 10-year history.

Mr. Kilough was in his second term as chairman of the council. A chair-

man can serve only two consecutive two-year terms. The outgoing president, Roy Holladay, had also served as chairman before he replaced the UCG's second presiding officer, Les McCullough.

Before the general conference of 300-some elders was formally called to order, the smaller council met with "international," mostly non-U.S., elders from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Friday, May 13.

On the Sabbath of May 14, scheduled events included a group breakfast and tours of the home office, in the Cincinnati suburb of Milford. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon, church services were scheduled at the Holiday Inn Eastgate, where all the generalconference meetings were conducted.

'Seizing the Vision: The Next Decade and Beyond."

After a 20-minute delay due to technical difficulties, song leader Ed Smith of Cincinnati welcomed his fellow elders, their wives and guests to Sabbath services.

Mr. Smith estimated that 562 people were in attendance and another 9,000 listening in by telephone or Internet hookup.

# Church of God member, inspired by 9-11, says tangible steps help combat terrorism

IG SANDY, Texas—The attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, distressed a lot of Americans, but relatively few have taken concrete steps to try to prevent another terrorist strike in this country.

Forty-eight-year-old Willis Hogg, a Church of God member who lives in the Dallas area, did something concrete. For four days in April, in his single-engine Mooney M20G airplane, he patrolled 20 miles of the border between the U.S. state of Arizona and the Mexican state of Sonora, keeping an eye out for Mexicans and others trying to pass into this country illegally.

Mr. Hogg sees America's porous perimeter as the best way for an aspiring terrorist to enter this land. "If you've flown since 9-11," he

know it's about impossible to get anything through the airports now. So if you are a terrorist all you have to do is fly into Mexico and just walk

## across the border." **Minuteman Project**

Mr. Hogg's interest piqued when he heard about the Minuteman Project, organized by a Southern Californian named Jim Gilchrist and others to lend the U.S. Border Patrol a hand in southern Arizona.

I heard about the project on Fox News on Sean Hannity and I think Bill O'Reilly back in probably February," remembers Mr. Hogg. "Then I went to the Web site [www.minutemanhq.com] to see what they had to say. The main thing I didn't want to get involved with was some kind of racist or hate group.'

Mr. Hogg acknowledges that white-supremacist and so-called hate groups might be attracted to an organization whose aim is to keep foreigners out of the country, but he became convinced the organizers of the Minutemen were not bigots.

"I'm 100 percent satisfied of that," he says. "There may be some racist people who joined it, but the group itself is not, and the leaders


