Pre-Federal Election – Time for Change/Momentum/Party Strengths/Vote Intention

November 28, 2005





### Introduction and Methodology

- Gregg, Kelly, Sullivan & Woolstencroft: *The Strategic Counsel* is pleased to present findings of The Globe and Mail/CTV Polling Program for November 28, 2005.
- The findings are based on interviews conducted by telephone among a weighted national sample of 1500 adult Canadians 18 years of age or older, plus an oversample of 75 in the province of British Columbia.
- The interviews were conducted between November 24<sup>th</sup> and November 27<sup>th</sup>, 2005.
- ◆ A sample of 1,500 yields a margin of error of +/- 2.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
- Note: Due to rounding, proportions may not total 100%.





#### Key Conclusions – On the eve of an election call, Liberals hold a six-point advantage over the Conservatives

- However, the Liberals support in Ontario has softened: Liberals' lead over the Conservatives has declined from 13 percentage points (in early November to 5 points in our current poll) in this crucial battleground. Moreover, they are 5 points down from the 2004 election.
- In Quebec, the Liberals are enjoying a modest rebound it now sits at 30%, up from 22% immediately after the release of the Gomery report. This increase has largely been at the expense of the Conservatives and NDP, suggesting they have made some headway in consolidating the federalist vote. Still, the Liberals remain well behind the Bloc whose vote intent comes in at 54% and are 4 points below their 2004 results.
- In BC, the electoral landscape is highly competitive with the Liberals, Conservatives, and NDP being within six percentage points of each other. Compared to the 2004 vote, Liberal support is up, while Conservative vote is down somewhat. The NDP is flat.
- The Conservatives continue a stranglehold in the Prairies (which includes Alberta). To date, there is no change from the 2004 vote.





# Key Conclusions – Canadians are more positive than last spring, but they think it is time for change.

- A very slight plurality (47%) of Canadians believe that the country is on the right track. This is up from last spring when only 38% thought this was true. Almost the same number (43%), however say the country is on the wrong track (down from 49% last spring). This suggests that there is a modest opportunity for the Liberals to marshal a campaign that the country is in good shape.
- Despite these positive attitudes about the state of the country, the desire for change has increased since last spring: now over 1-in-2 (54% up from 48% in May) say that this is time for change and new government should be voted in. Only 39% (down from 44%) say that it is the wrong time to make a change. While the desire is strongest in the West and Quebec, it is also evident in Ontario where 49% say that it is time to change.



#### Key Conclusions – The Liberal brand remains strong and is seen as more able to manage critical issues facing Canadians

- Canadians see the Liberals as stronger in managing the <u>national economy</u>, <u>health care</u>, <u>US-</u> <u>Canada relations</u>, <u>and national unity</u>. These views are particularly strong in Ontario and Quebec where the Liberals hold a significant advantage over the Conservatives.
- Even though the Liberals have been taking a hit in Quebec, they still enjoy a strong advantage in this province on the unity file.
- Even on defence issues (traditionally, an area of strength for the Conservatives), the Liberals score modestly better than the Conservatives.
- Not surprisingly, the Liberals are weakest when it comes to questions of ethics and honesty and handling the taxpayers' money. That said, the Conservatives do not appear to have been able to differentiate themselves on these issues and only enjoy a small advantage over the Liberals. Indeed, the plurality response to the question of who is most honest and ethical is "none".

#### Key Conclusions – The Liberal brand remains strong and is seen as more able to manage critical issues facing Canadians (cont'd)

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- The Liberals are also perceived (33%) to have the best team. Only 19% attribute this strength to the Conservatives.
- On the question of who has a hidden agenda, the highest proportion (33%) now cite the Liberals, while a smaller group 25% mention the Conservatives. While results to this question are driven largely by partisan support, it is noteworthy that the belief that the Conservatives have a hidden agenda has declined 10 points in Ontario since May. In fact, this may be the most dramatic change since the 2004 election the Conservatives don't look as scary to Ontario voters going into this election.
- Against this, the fact that the only issue where the Conservatives have an advantage over the Liberals is a small 4-point lead on the question of spending taxpayers' money wisely, simply underscores that the Conservatives have yet to demonstrate that they are a government in waiting.






