Note: More than four years of armed conflict between the PA and Israel changed the situation described by this table. Most of the fighting was done by the "unofficial organizations" like the Tanzim and Hamas. At present there is no data concerning the status of the organizations listed above. Some of them ceased to exist, some may reappear as strong organizations, depending on the personal status of their leaders. Thus, we preferred to display the situation as it was by the end of 2000.

The Palestinian security services included several organizations under the "Palestinian Directorate of Police Force" recognized in the Cairo and Washington agreements. Some of the security organizations (particularly the civilian police) have little or no military significance. They are mentioned here because of the unusual organizational structure, and because it is difficult to estimate the size of the total forces that do have military significance. See also under "non-governmental organizations". Since the

death of Yasser Arafat there have been attempts to consolidate the various organizations. As of now the situation is still in constant flux.
