

FREE RESOURCES FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD LITERACY

Most of these are Internet sites. The emphasis is on "how-to" along with easy activities for parents, caregivers, preschools, and other groups. Materials can be downloaded, then copied. The U.S. Department of Education site is enormous. Try direct links, then sample other pages.
