Admissions, Fees, and Financial Aid

It is our policy to promote and maintain a student body composed of young women and men with diverse educational, geographic, ethnic, racial, and socioeconomic backgrounds.

Admissions

Admission to Loyola Academy is based on several factors, which include the prospective student's Loyola entrance exam score, grade school report cards, and previous standardized test scores. Other factors that may be taken into consideration are legacy relationships, a prospective student's participation in cocurricular activities, and the grade school attended by the student. Lovola does not discriminate on the basis of gender, race, or ethnic origin



in the administration of educational policies, financial aid, athletic programs, or other school

programs. To protect students' individual eligibility, schools of the Archdiocese of Chicago support the policies of the Illinois High School Association. In doing so, Loyola Academy may not promise or offer athletic scholarships of any kind. Violations may result in loss of eligibility for the student, coach, and/or school.

Entrance Exam Information

The entrance exam will be administered on Saturday, January 14, 2006.

Test reservations are not necessary. Eighth grade students should arrive at Lovola's south entrance (near the stadium) with two #2 pencils and a \$25 check payable to Lovola Academy for the test fee. The entrance exam will begin promptly at 8:15 a.m. and end at about noon. Any students who qualify for extended-time testing must contact Ms. Cathy Witczak and provide proper documentation by December 16, 2006.

Please note: Students who take the entrance exam at Loyola Academy will be given first priority for enrollment. Enrollment is limited at Loyola Academy and other Archdiocesan high schools. For this reason, we encourage students to test at the school they would most like to attend.

Tuition

Tuition for the 2005-2006 academic year is \$9,650. The fee for the LEC O'Shaughnessy program is \$900 per year for freshmen, \$700 for sophomores, \$300 for juniors, and \$200 per year for seniors.



Transfer Information

Loyola Academy reviews the number of openings available for transfer students after April 1. All transfer transactions must be completed by the end of June.

Transfer students must have at least a "B" average and be in good standing at their current school. As a policy, Loyola reserves the right to limit transfers due to enrollment restrictions.

Transfer applicants should complete the following steps:

- The prospective student should write a letter of introduction to Director of Admissions Mr. Les Seitzinger '88, stating why he or she would like to attend Loyola Academy.
- 2. An unofficial transcript and a copy of the student's most recent standardized test results should follow the student's letter of introduction. An official transcript, as well as a copy of the student's health records, must be sent at the end of the school year.
- The prospective student's parent or guardian should write a brief letter authorizing Loyola's Admissions Office to contact officials at the applicant's current school regarding his/her disciplinary record.

January 14, 2006 Eighth grade students interested in attending Loyola Academy must take the **entrance exam** at Loyola. Financial aid information will be available that morning in the athletic corridor. You may also request a form by contacting our financial aid director at 847.920.2482. Don't forget to leave your name and mailing address.



February 2, 2006 All financial aid application forms, as well as 2004 W-2 forms and income tax return forms, must be received by the Private Schools Aid Service (PSAS) by February 2. Copies of your 2005 W-2 and income tax return forms must be sent to Loyola's Financial Aid Office by **April 15**. Your file cannot be processed if any of the requested information is incomplete.

March 2, 6, & 9, 2006 Incoming freshman conferences are held. Tentative financial aid awards will be given to families who have submitted their applications to PSAS by February 2.

March 16, 2006 Your registration fee of \$150 (for freshman and transfer students) and a tuition deposit of \$450 (for all students) are due on this date—along with registration information. Incoming freshman must also submit their program recommendation form by this date.

April 15, 2006 If your 2005 W-2 and income tax return forms were not submitted, copies must be sent to: Financial Aid Office, Loyola Academy, 1100 Laramie Avenue, Wilmette, Illinois 60091-1089.

May 27, 2006 Final financial aid awards will be granted to all qualified students.

St. Ignatius was a soldier from the Basque country of northern Spain. During a battle against the French, Ignatius was wounded in the leg by a cannonball. After his recovery, he dedicated his life to the service of Christ. In 1540. he founded The Society of Jesus (The Jesuits), a Catholic religious order. Ignatius saw the world as good and believed that all creation was a gift from God. 
A Serene Spot for Prayer and Reflection


How do I get to Loyola Academy?

Loyola is readily accessible by public transportation. Please note the various options outlined below:




FROM CHICAGO The METRA train originates on Madison Street in downtown Chicago and makes stops at 2000 N. Ashland, 4600 N. Ravenswood, and 7000 N. Ravenswood in Rogers Park. It continues north with stops at 600 Main Street, 901 Davis Street, and 1601 Central Street in Evanston.

FROM THE WISCONSIN BORDER The METRA train has stations in almost every northern suburb along Lake Michigan. For schedules, call METRA at 312.322.6777 or visit their website at www.metrarail.com.

CHICAGO AND EVANSTON (EAST) Take the CTA train to the Linden train station in Wilmette. Students who have access to the CTA elevated train line that runs north to the Howard station in Rogers Park can transfer trains at the Howard station and board the Linden train to the Linden station in Wilmette. At the Linden station, students should board the PACE #421 bus*, which will take them to Loyola Academy. For schedules and times, call the RTA at 312.836.7000 or visit their website at www.transitchicago.com.

NORTHWEST CHICAGO Take the PACE #423 bus*, which starts at the Harlem CTA station on the corner of



Harlem and Higgins, and makes five stops along Harlem (Devon, Touhy, Oakton, Dempster, Golf). The intersection of Glenview and Waukegan Roads is the last stop before arriving at Loyola. For more information, call PACE at 847.364.7223 or visit their website at www.pacebus.com.

NORTH SIDE OF CHICAGO Take the CTA #54A bus from Irving Park Road and Cicero Avenue. The CTA #54A bus travels north on Cicero (which becomes Skokie Boulevard) and continues to the Old Orchard Shopping Center at Skokie Boulevard and Old Orchard Road. At Old Orchard, students can transfer to the PACE #422 bus*, which travels to Edens Plaza (Lake Avenue and Skokie Boulevard), three blocks east of Loyola Academy. Students can then walk to the Academy from Edens Plaza.

* Students may purchase a monthly pass from PACE. This pass can be used on any PACE bus in the Chicagoland area.
