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JACK YOUMANS - PROPERTY RIGHTS, LOWER TAXES & MORE

Property rights and lower taxes were the issues which ignited Jack Youmans' passionate interest in Tybee politics, but it took three elections over a period of six years for Jack to be elected. He ran in 1979 and got 76 votes, again in 1981 and got 156 votes, and in 1983 he got over 300 votes, but still lost. He was finally successful in 1985 and

has served on Tybee's city council for 18 years, which translates to winning 9 elections. Jack has served under three mayors: George Hosti, Pat Locklear, and Walter Parker. Jack admits that he has "had enough".

Jack, who recently celebrated his 80th birthday, was raised in Savannah, attended Savannah High and enlisted in the Merchant

Marines prior to graduation. A veteran of World War II and Korea, Jack settled in Tybee in 1966 when he ran the Mouse Trap for Nickie Alexander. This nightclub was located at the site of the present day, Sunrise Restaurant, and was a favorite hotspot for people from Tybee and Savannah because it stayed open until 4-5:00 a.m. In 1972, Jack opened his own bar on Tybrisa Street (16th Street at that time), which he named Kathy's. He also bought his home on Lewis Avenue in 1972 and has lived there ever since. Jack faithfully served as a volunteer firefighter on Tybee for twenty-five years.

Jack reminisced about his years on Tybee. Freddie's Garage is where Jack hangs out and has his shop/office.

It has been there "forever" and you can find out "anything you want to know" there. Jack is allowed to talk politics there, but Freddie limits discussion by others – probably those with an opposing viewpoint. Jack was Grand Marshall of the Beach Bum parade in 1990 – a

parade which he enjoyed immensely since he was accompanied by three Budweiser girls. Jack readily adds that the parade has gotten a whole lot bigger and a whole lot wetter.

It is evident that Jack is most proud of Tybee's new gymnasium. It is not because it bears the name Youmans-Solomon Complex, but because of the great need on the island for recreational activities for our youth and senior citizens.

Jack relates that the gymnasium fund began over twenty years ago with a \$1000 donation by the Jaycees. Unfortunately, due to Jack's age (too old), he was unable to be a member but became an honorary member of the Jaycees. Funds from the cellular phone tower rental were responsible for an additional \$90,000 towards the dream of Tybee's gym. Chris Solomon was also a supporter of the aym during his tenure on city council. The gym building itself is "better than" anything Jack envisioned over the years and he is pleased with the current utilization of the gym. There are activities for kids and for grownups and he wholly supports the multifunctional use of the gym, including

locally produced plays such as Alice in Wonderland this past summer. He is excited about the prospect of getting skates purchased for the gym, which is currently in process.

About twelve years ago, Jack became a locksmith which filled a much-needed void at Tybee. He took a locksmith course, but honed his skill with practice and more practice, after learning the basics. Currently, most of his business comes from the local vacation property rental businesses as well as from new homeowners on Tybee. He gets business strictly from word of mouth. After he moves to Richmond Hill to be with his family, he plans to return to Tybee three days a week to continue to provide locksmith services. He has plans to retire from the sign painting aspect of his business but will always be available to paint free signs for groups such as the American Legion and for fund-raising activities. He could possibly be persuaded to paint political signs for the next Tybee election in two years!

No story about Jack Youmans would be complete without mention of his induction into the Georgia




Municipal Association's Hall of Fame in June 2003. This came as quite a surprise to Jack who had no idea that he was being honored in such a way even when many of his family members attended the GMA's banquet that year. He proudly displays the plaque in his home along with others including trophies he won while racing hydroplanes in the 1950's.

Jack has lots of plans for his 'retirement'. He will relocate to Richmond Hill to be with Kathy, his wife of 37 years. He has plans to buy a motorcycle and already has his eye on the one he wants. He plans to start a garden and do some fishing with his nephew. He also plans to spend time with his grandchildren – Michael (age 13) and Tess (age 9), who are both on the YMCA swim team. He also has plans to visit his daughter in Newington and visit Jackie Brown, former city clerk, in Metter – most likely on his motorcycle.

Jack admits that he'll miss living on Tybee. He will most miss being at Freddie's Garage every day and his gang of friends here. Tybee will most definitely miss Jack Youmans.

To send Jack off in style and to recognize Jack's unselfish service to the citizens of Tybee, "Jack Youmans Day" is planned for December 10th.

After

hurricane season of 2004, it didn't seem likely that 2005 could outdo it. But it did. Not only did we see an above average season in the Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean Sea and Gulf of Mexico, we also set records for number and intensity of storms.

Hurricane season runs from June 1St through the end of November. Back in May, Dr. William Gray, hurricane researcher at Colorado State University, predicted another above average season,

including 13 named storms, 7 of which to become hurricanes, and 3 of the hurricanes to reach intense status, with winds of 111 mph or higher. What we wound up with was over 20 named storms, so many that we ran through the entire list of names for the first time, and had to dip into the Greek Alphabet.

Similar to 2004 and since roughly 1995, sea surface temperatures in the North Atlantic Ocean have been above average, which tends to lead to a more favorable pattern in the tropics for development. The warmer sea temperatures are part of a normal cycle that usually spans up to 30 years, and it appears similar to the pattern from the 1930s to the 60s, which was an active time for hurricanes. This year's number of storms broke the record of 21 set in 1933. It should be pointed out that we didn't have satellites orbiting the earth until later in the 20th century, so who knows if we missed some back then. Nonetheless, a very active



season finally has come to an end. While Florida did see some damage again this year, the worst area affected was the Gulf coast, where five named storms struck. Tropical storms Arlene and Cindy along with Hurricane Dennis were a prelude to the worst natural disaster in modern American history. In late August, Hurricane Katrina



reached category five status with winds over 155 mph, then made landfall on the Mississippi coast, devastating coastal towns, including Gulfport. On the west side of the storm, New Orleans escaped major wind damage, but water got piled up on the south side of Lake Ponchatrain behind the storm, causing a levee to break. This resulted in catastrophic flooding throughout the city. Hundreds of thousands of people were forced to relocate. While the weather did not affect us here in Georgia, oil refineries in the path of the storm were damaged or shut down, resulting in skyrocketing gas prices that affected us all.

Later in September, Hurricane Rita also reached Category Five status in the Gulf of Mexico. It weakened before making landfall near the Texas/ Louisiana border. The damage was considerable. but nowhere near Katrina. The other monster hurricane was Wilma in October. This storm, while in the Caribbean, achieved the lowest recorded pressure in the Atlantic basin of 882 millibars. At one point, the pressure in this storm dropped an astounding 100 millibars in 24 hours. After pummeling Cozumel and Cancun, it moved towards south

Florida with 125-mph winds and caused devastating damage there.

Here at home, we watched Ophelia dance off Florida for a few days, then it finally made up its mind and headed to North Carolina. The worst weather we saw this season was from Tropical Storm Tammy during the first week of October. The storm developed suddenly off Florida then moved north and onshore near the Georgia/Florida border. The wind gusted to

50 mph on Tybee and our area saw between 7 and 10 inches of rain. A dry September helped prevent significant flooding, though it was worse closer to Brunswick where areas saw up to 15 inches of rain.



This hurricane season will be remembered for the unending fear and devastation it produced, and places such as New Orleans and Cozumel may never be the same. Unfortunately, with more people living near the coast than ever before and the likelihood of hurricane seasons staying quite busy for up to another twenty years, scenes like this year are likely to be repeated, just in different places. Caution and preparation win the day. The science involved will only get better in tracking these monster events. Our human reaction is still what it is all about in being ready and guarding our families, pets, and property. Tybee Nation knows that all too well.





LISA SCARBOROUGH AND THE COASTAL PET RESCUE

Lisa Scarborough and her organization, Coastal Pet Rescue, take a national award and is named as an Ambassador for the Purina Pet Rescue campaign. Coastal Pet Rescue is an all-volunteer 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to saving the lives of homeless, abused and neglected animals in the coastal areas of Georgia, South Carolina and Florida. Lisa is very modest indeed, and when asked what started it all and why, Lisa states, "I founded Coastal Pet Rescue on my 24th birthday (February 5, 2003) with the idea that one person can make a difference in the world. Coastal Pet Rescue started with just one woman and is now an organization with nearly 80 volunteers, having helped nearly 300 animals since inception. We provide pet rescue for animals in need, placement assistance for people needing to rehome their pets, transport assistance to other agencies, and rescue humane education programs to local schools.





My educational background prepared me for this venture. I'm a product of Catholic schools (1st to 12th grade); hold an Associate of Arts degree from Andrew College, where I gradated Summa Cum Laude, and a Bachelor of General Studies from Georgia Southern University. I am currently enrolled online with Duquesne University in PA to get my bachelors degree in Humane Leadership using a scholarship bestowed upon me from the Humane Society University.

I get asked frequently why I chose to start Coastal Pet Rescue. My usual answer is that I blame my father. Dad really set the example for me as a child. In school and Church, I was taught to continuously give back and to always help those in need. My father and I helped many pets in need over the years, from a pregnant stray dog, to a puppy thrown into a dumpster, to an orphaned baby raccoon, to countless feral cats and kittens. My father was a man of few words, and to see him get so excited and laugh with these animals that had been cast aside left an impression with me.

When I went off to college and then moved back to Savannah, stray animals seemed to find their way to my doorstep on a regular basis. I took to getting them care and trying to find them homes. My friends would dread the late afternoon phone calls of "Do you know someone who wants a kitten?" For two years I did everything on my own before taking the advice of my vet to start my own organization and request donations."

For the last three years, Coastal Pet Rescue has participated in the "Home 4 the Holidays" adoption drive through the Helen Woodward Animal Center. The program works to reward families who adopt a pet for the holidays as well as increase the visibility of pets needing adoption. 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




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
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"Eye on the Artist" focuses on -Patti Wynn

"I don't really use reference photos", purports local artist, Patti Wynn. "The inspiration comes

straight from within". Flight of the imagination is readily apparent in Patti's work! Her wonderfully creative paintings are a near paradox of whimsical fantasy and intricate detail. Collages seem to tell a puzzle-like story, and yet when questioned, one

also display the artist's work. Patti's Art shares wall space at the "Meeting Place" with fellow artist and American Legion co-worker, Linda Springer.



October was a very busy month within the City. Besides all of the campaigning the City also began several major projects, prepared the budget, and many other things.

The City of Tybee Island was designated as a "Water First Community" by the Department of Community Affairs in October. We became 1 of only 7 communities in Georgia to achieve this designation.

The 2006 budget process began in July with the Department Heads presenting their wish lists to the City Manager and Council. Since this time the Finance Department has wrestled with those requests and rising operating costs in order to accommodate the large number of capital projects slated for 2006. The results will be available at the Library and City Clerk's office beginning November 16th and the first public hearing is scheduled for November 29th. The 2006 budget will be presented to City Council for their approval on December 8th. Now that the budget process is almost complete the Finance Department will begin preparing for the 2006 audit.

City Hall will be receiving a major interior face lift in the near future. We may need to post a map at the front door as almost everyone will be moving to another area of the building in an effort to make the staff more readily available to the public. Cipher's Design Company is currently preparing the plans for the renovation. Once the plans are complete we will begin accepting bids for the work.

The City's Building Maintenance Department is almost finished with renovating the old cafeteria located directly in front of the gymnasium on Fifth Street. They have replaced all of the windows, and put new siding on the exterior. On the inside they have covered up the ceramic tile with paneling, done some electrical upgrades, and gave it a much needed coat of paint. The kitchen area has been completely redone with all new commercial grade kitchen equipment. The building will begin being rented in the place of the Community House on December 1^{st} . The Community Center will begin being restored after the First of the year. The project should take 1 to 2 years to complete.

The Water/Sewer Department embarked on several projects in October as well. The water tower located at Second and Butler is currently being painted on the inside and outside. Southeast Pipe Company is currently doing repairs on sewer lines and manholes around the Island. Garney Construction has begun work on the Butler Avenue water line. The new water lines will go from Second Street to Seventeenth Street. Thank you for your patience with this project. Work may continue until May, 2006.

The Department of Public Works completed a drainage project on Fourteenth Street and Second Avenue in October. They are now working on a drainage project Fifteenth Street and Fifth Avenue. Once this is completed work will begin on another drainage project at Solomon Avenue and Alger Avenue. The proposed site of the skate park is in the process of being cleared. The lot should be ready for the skate park design RFP to go out the first week of December.

The Zoning Department is currently accepting resumes for the Planning Commission. Four of the current members' terms expire in January. Anyone interested in serving for 2006 - 2007 please submit a written request to be placed on the ballot to the Building and Zoning Department at City Hall.

The Tybee Island Recreation Department held a very successful Halloween Festival for the children of the Island on October 29th at the Youmans-Solomon Center. Director, Jason Nobles, was very pleased with the turnout. Over 50 children attended the event which featured arts and crafts, games, and a costume contest for the children.

Finally, the City has been selected to work with the Chatham Emergency Management Agency to revise our Emergency Management Plan. We will be the first City in Chatham County to participate in this pilot program which will give us a plan for not only Hurricanes but all forms of Natural and Man Made Disasters as well. This will enable the City to have an Emergency Response Plan for ALL Emergencies.





Just Another Day on Patrol

On a recent Friday afternoon, we got a call from a concerned citizen who stated that there was a raccoon trapped on a pole on the beach. The responding officers found, sure enough, a raccoon trapped on a pole. The pole was there to keep swimmers away from underwater obstacles. The raccoon was on top of the pole. The tide had come in around the base of the pole, and the critter seemed unwilling to get his feet wet in order to get back to shore. The caller asked us what we were going to do about it. I'm not sure what answer the



officers gave, since the call was cleared with a status three, meaning Handled by Officer. I know the officer didn't climb the pole to help the raccoon down, so we are left to wonder how it all worked out: did he take the chance of being eaten by sharks and swim to shore? Or did he wait till the tide went back out? We will never know, just as we will never know why the animal went up the pole in the first place.

Mystery number two: a caller on the beach reported that she had gone into the water to retrieve some floating luggage. The officer brought back a brown suitcase, a blue backpack and a green backpack. Inside were various articles of clothing, including children's things. A thorough search revealed nothing that could tell us who had lost them, or how. Did they come from a ship at sea? Or did the tide come in and pick them up off the beach? If so, what were they doing on the beach? We've had no reports of boats sinking, or missing luggage. If you know anything about this, we would sure like to know.

On October 29, a concerned citizen called to report "obscene Halloween decorations." The responding officer discovered decorations that made clever and unique use of pumpkins which, according to the officer, didn't quite rise to the level of being obscene, but weren't exactly G-rated either. Let's just say they were PG and leave it at that. Since Halloween is primarily for the kids, the officer spoke with the property owner, and he offered to take them down. The officer went 10-8, status 3.

On Thursday, November 3, five days before the recent election, on his way to work at 6:45 AM, Major Case spotted some political signs that had been pulled up and tossed about, some ending up in the middle of the street. Before he could get to the station, he found a second street with more uprooted political signs. Then another, and another. When he got to the station, the night shift reported that political signs all over the island, from the south end to Fort Screven, had been vandalized in a similar fashion. Scores, possibly hundreds, of signs were affected, but no problem. The reporting officer pointed out that the offender(s) had not singled out any one candidate. All ten—eight for council and two for mayor—had their signs pushed down, or pulled up and sailed across the street. It all happened sometime after 3:00 AM and before 6:00 AM. No one reported seeing anything suspicious. This offender was clearly making a political statement. We just don't know what it is.

On the evening of October 22, a motorist called to say that he had hit a deer in the road near Lazaretto Creek. The officer met him there, finding one pickup truck with little damage and one small, dead deer. He called DPW to come and retrieve the carcass. A few days later, in broad daylight, several motorists called to report deer

daylight, several motorists called to report deer running through traffic in the same vicinity. They were gone by the time he arrived. So be careful out there. There's more to wildlife on Tybee Island than late night bars.

A house keeper at the Tybee Lite Shrine Club called to report that there was a bird loose in the building. The responding officer produced a net, caught the bird, which was "small and brown in color", and placed it on top of a Waste Management trash cart. The bird rested for a moment, then flew away. 10-8, status 3.


One evening, just after the recent time change, on-duty officers were told to look out for a possible drunk driver in a Volkswagen Beetle on Highway 80, approaching the curve. When they got to the curve, they found the car and the driver up on the curb, stuck and unable to drive forward or backward. Expecting the worst, they discovered a senior citizen who was not supposed to drive after dark. She had driven to an appointment that she thought would end before dark, but Daylight Savings Time tripped her up. The officers helped her out of the car, and got the Beetle unstuck. One of them drove her home in his squad car, and the other followed in the Beetle. The lady's family was very grateful.

On November 11, an officer was dispatched to Butler Avenue and 13th Street on a Damage to Property call. He found there the supervisor of the current water line construction project that has the street all torn up and reduced to two lanes. The supervisor said that someone had stolen the keys to the pumps that were left running overnight, and had then turned all of the pumps off. The keys were still missing, as were ten small PVC tubes that had been attached to a bigger drain pipe. The cost to the construction company: \$85 total. He had no idea why anyone would want to do such a thing. We have the same feeling, but then we see strange things all the time.

While we're on the subject...

...of Butler Avenue, please be aware that the current construction project will gradually move north up that street until it ends near the curve some time about Memorial Day, 2006. The workers are replacing an old water main with two new lines, one on either side of the street. The street will





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
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A Song for Lazaretto, Part I

1. It runs to the mouth of South Channel, with the tide, it meanders 'round, Winding its way through the marsh's wavy grasses and soggy ground. It curves like a rippled gray ribbon, the sash on a satin gown. And touches the back of the island on the side where the sun goes down. Many red sunsets have lingered high above this floating plain, And promised relief from the storms at sea, from the waves, the wind, and the rain. The Euchee walked on Tybee 2. long before the Spanish came. Their word for salt was 'tybee', and the island was named the same. Though fearsome pirates ventured here whose deeds became renowned. Where Blackbeard buried his treasure dear, has never yet been found. But pirate days were numbered. also, French and Spanish gain, When the English anchored at Tybee, determined to remain. 3. The founders envisioned Savannah: 'No tenured property; A vice less yeoman's utopia; no rum, no slavery.' Then trade in Chatham began to fail, and small farms but survived. While over in South Carolina. the rice plantations thrived. As loss and disenchantment overshadowed past convictions. They offered the land grant titles, and lifted the slave restrictions. For years, when ships reached Tybee Light, 4. they'd stop at South Channel Sound. They'd unload the sick and the dving. both the free, ...and the bound. They'd leave them here, where this little creek, still far from Savannah town.

Touches the back of the island on the side where the sun goes down... At a place called 'lazaretto', where a guarantine would hold All the ones with the dreaded diseases. and the ones too sick to be sold. While great blue herons nested out beyond the island's view, Mosquito swarms would buzz and bite 'til evening breezes blew. Windswept cedars, and pines, and palms, and crooked oak trees spread Alms of mercy at 'lazaretto', like a summons to 'raise the dead'. Though the comforters braved the perils, while the four moons waxed and waned, There was no such 'resurrection'. for the dying who remained.

Refrain:

Lazaretto! Here, beyond the stormy sea, Was no promise for tomorrow, in your sunset reverie? Why must these things be so? What hope can ever be, As we lie here, Lazaretto, to rise again and be free?" © C. Kinkel, Jan. 2001

When Paula Devivo and I first talked about doing a series called Ghosts on Tybee, I mentioned to her I might have something to get things started. Originally the above poem, which is also a song, was intended to be just a ballad about a forgotten episode of early American history. But some people believe that it has all the ingredients of a ghost story, including a peculiar little twist that involves how it came to be written.

This piece was begun in January of 2001, exactly one year to the day before we moved our family down to Tybee Island. Incidentally, it was also the same day that the grand old 'Lady of 6,000 Songs', Emma Thompson Kelly passed away. She had just been awarded the Proclamation of Georgia's Entertainer of the Century at her eighty-second birthday party at Hannah's East in December of 2000. It was her last public performance.

'Miss Emma' established regional notoriety throughout the last half of the twentieth century by traveling and playing all over the Southeast. By the time the rest of the country discovered her in the mid nineties, in John Berendt's Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil, Emma Kelly had long been adopted by most native Savannahians as one of their very own. Since the days of her friendship with the late and legendary songwriter Johnny Mercer, the one who initially affirmed her, and decorated her with the celebrated tag name, she tirelessly worked musical magic here, and gave much of her life to the city.

But Statesboro, Georgia was Emma's hometown. Most folks who can remember will tell you that besides the daily out of town trips to dance circuit engagements, military bases and clubs, Emma also ...Continued Page 34 played for almost every social event up in Bulloch County. This included Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions and Country Club affairs, weddings, school plays, and church services, not to mention every dance recital, talent contest and stage production in town. Although she constantly burned the candle at both ends, she always seemed to effortlessly enjoy what she was doing. Her rare talent was always available to the locals both young and old, especially during the earlier years when her ten children, all musically talented as well, were growing up in Statesboro.

I also come from a family of musicians. My great Aunt Mary kept her piano in our living room. That's where I first learned to play by ear, just like my Grandpa. My sister played clarinet. My brother played the drums, and still does. Both of my parents sang (although Dad forgot what a nice voice he had once he became a 'workaholic').

Momma, who is now in her eighties, had a beautiful voice. In my youth, she and I used to sing together at community affairs. Occasionally, I sang alone. 'Miss Emma' was always the accompanist, and because she was also a dear family friend, when she came over to practice, sometimes she'd stay all evening. I remember watching her play, and wanting to be just like her. She had such a gracious way with people, unlike anyone else I've ever known, and she was always 'the encourager'. When Emma played for you to perform, no matter what went wrong, she'd hang in there with you, and give you the confidence to pull it off. She's one of the



main reasons I sing, and play the piano today.

I last spoke with her in the summer of 2000, a month after she had suffered heat exhaustion during a Savannah performance in the park on the Fourth of July. She told me that she was slowing down, getting tired (imagine that!), but how excited she was that all of her recordings had finally been released as a CD. She asked me if I had been doing anything with my music or my writing. I was proud to tell her about our band's CD release in 1999. She said that I had better get over to see her at Hannah's next time we were home.

Around Thanksgiving I learned that her health was failing fast. In late December I called again to inquire, but was told that she had collapsed right after her birthday party, and had to go to the hospital. When I called, her agent told me that she had just gotten home only a few moments before, but was too ill to talk. I told him to tell her that I'd called. I just knew that she'd recover and be back at it again, like so many times before.

But several weeks later, in January of 2001, my Mom called to tell me that Emma was gone. Before I received the newspaper clippings from home, I read all about the funeral in the Savannah Morning News articles online. Suddenly there was a big empty space in Southeast Georgia, for me and for a lot of other folks, as well.

On the day before her death, a winter storm howled around our Northeast Ohio home. As it seems writers just have a way of accumulating the written word in every form imaginable, (and pack rats eventually do run out of storage space), I was busy keeping a New Year's resolution to clean out a desk in the basement. As the snow piled high outside and covered the small basement windows overhead, I found myself buried in old papers, pictures and other memorabilia. I came across a small blue pamphlet brought back from a visit to Tybee Light and the Museum in 1999. In it was a short summary of the history of the island, much of which I already knew. But then something else grabbed my attention something I'd never heard - about 'a guarantine', and a mass burial site on the west end of the island. I had been cleaning all morning, I decided to take a break and check it out.

Webster's dictionary states that the word 'lazaretto' is an Italian term that has its roots in the Medival English word, la-zar, meaning leper, or la-za-rus, an impoverished, diseased person, especially a leper. The Hebrew name El'azar literally means 'God has helped', and comes from the Ecclesiastical Greek term Lazaros that refers to the biblical character, Lazarus, the one that Christ raised from the dead. The actual word 'lazaretto' was the name for a plague hospital in the fifteeneth century. It generally refers to any building, or ship used as a quarantine for people infected with deadly and contagious diseases.

Back in 2001, my sister and I were researching our family's Patriot roots - she from Texas, and I from Ohio. There were Georgia history books lying around the

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basement, and web sites to visit. Most accounts were sparsely detailed, but the more I read, the more I felt compelled to read. The next day, a trip to the library revealed even more, so I checked out a few books and I spent most of that second snowy afternoon learning about the founding of Savannah, trade and shipping in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, and the early years of the colonial life of Coastal Georgia. It was fascinating, and I began to write about it.

That evening after supper, while the rest of the family got ready for bed upstairs, I went to the basement and sat down at the computer to start putting together a narrative. Everything was going well until I got to the part about the 'lazaretto'. I decided to try and put myself in first person, to identify with someone who might have been dying in the quarantine, but I began to feel uneasy. Then an eerie sensation moved in. It began as a hairraising tingle, and turned into something that I can only describe as a 'depressing heaviness'. For a moment, I even got sick at my stomach. Just as I was beginning to think that maybe I was coming down with something, the feeling vanished. It wasn't that late, so I got up, got a drink of water, and decided to keep writing.

They say that empathy can affect you in strange ways, and I'm sure that I was also somewhat 'psyched'. But I don't recall as a writer, any other instance when I've experienced such a sensory 'visitation'. I could actually see and feel myself treading, shoulder deep in murky, salt water, surrounded by shell banks and miles of tall grass. I saw other things, too, just as if I had been right there, and for the first time in a while I felt compelled to write

The most disconcerting thing about this little episode was not what I saw, which can be attributed to a nurtured imagination, but what I felt, and the physical effect that it had on me. It was very unusual. Then the following afternoon I found out about Emma. She had died that day before.

My husband, Roeder is from Western New York and I grew up in South Georgia. For some years after we were married, we lived in Statesboro, and Tybee's north beach was part of many family celebrations and summer vacations. When we parted ways with my stepfather's family business in 1991, we moved to Ohio. Our two youngest children grew up there, and we considered it home. Due to the distance, our Tybee vacations became less frequent.

During the last half of those ten years in Ohio, Roeder and I played together in a band, and avidly promoted 'folk music'. Although the subject might have seemed great material for a folk ballad, it still seemed a bit odd to some of our friends that I would suddenly be glued day and night to my computer writing about a quarantine and a burial ground that once existed on an island off the coast of Georgia. Stranger still, no one, least of all Roeder and I, even considered the possibility that exactly one year later in January of 2002, we'd be living on that island.

It has been almost four years, since we came back South, and moved to Tybee, and it is beginning to feel like home, here. I still miss Emma Kelly. I think about her every time I visit my family up in Statesboro, or run into one of her children somewhere, or just ride by the Pirate's House on East Broad Street. To this day I believe that for whatever reason, I was compelled to start, (and finish) the piece about Lazaretto. I won't say that 'Miss Emma' had anything to do with it, but it marked her passing for me, and however it was 'inspired', I'm sure it was for my own edification. Who knows? Ever since that extraordinary evening on the day that she died, I haven't had one moment of writer's block.

Now, when the idea for a Tidewriter column of ghost stories came up last summer, I decided to start investigating rumors of 'hauntings' around the island, including some accounts of 'lost souls' out at Lazaretto Creek (not to be confused with the locals that come around on Saturday nights out to Cafe Loco). Based on what I already knew, if ever there was a place that should be haunted, this might be such a place. At least it sounded like a good start. January's column will include accounts from some of the folks who presently live and work out at the marina on Old Highway 80. It will also include the second half of A Song for Lazaretto. I won't say for a fact that it's a real ghost story. Perhaps the reader should be judge of that.

By the way, if you have a something that you'd feel comfortable sharing with Tybee Breeze readers, let me know. During the next few months, I hope to visit with some of Tybee's most celebrated 'haints', and bring back a few fireside renditions to warm up the chilly winter nights ahead!

One word of caution - believe it or not, I'm a skeptic. I believe in spiritual things, but I doubt that we (meaning 'the dear departed') stick around for very long after we leave this life. When it comes to pinning down real apparitions, there seems to be more evidence of 'non-human' spiritual activity in the world than of human ghosts.

Some people I know on Tybee claim there's even 'alien' activity here. Two years back, several of them thought they'd had an encounter with a real UFO off the dunes at 12th Street. (The one thing they just couldn't determine was whether or not they'd been taken away for a while, and then returned to tell about it.) But that's nothing! We have a good friend from Ohio who comes down quite often, and does a lot of walking out on the beach at night. He swears that sometimes he sees 'shadow people' running back and forth between the dunes and the waves. (Of course, he believes in the "Boo Hag, too!")

Subject: Lies

1. On November 1, Jonathan Brown revealed a copy of a city check made out to the Police Association. He only showed half the check. What he refused to show was the reason for the check: it was a **reimbursement** of \$194.66, money which the Association spent on its annual holiday dinner. The city chose to reimburse this money because it had already paid for the annual holiday party for the Fire Department, of which Jonathan Brown is a member. He also did not reveal a copy of a receipt from Sam's Club, showing **exactly** how the money was spent—the makings of a low country boil that fed over a hundred police officers and their families, elected officials and their guests, and local dignitaries and their guests.

2. The **Tybee Island Police Association** is a non-profit, charitable organization, duly incorporated under the laws of the State of Georgia. Its revenue is generated by the sale of advertisements from local businesses on the annual TIPA Calendar. TIPA has a federal identification number, but has never generated sufficient revenue to require a payment of taxes. Other than the above reimbursement, TIPA has never requested or received any city money, or grant money from any source, and none has ever been deposited into the TIPA's checking account.

3. Jonathan Brown has revealed a number of receipts from the Quarter Sports Bar and Grill, which were paid by the City. All of these receipts were generated on a Tuesday between 4:00 PM and 5:00 PM. Each of these dates can be-shown to be an official session date for the Tybee Island Recorder's Court. Some of these receipts appear to be for "Open Liquor". Others were rung up by the Quarter's cashier for Hamburgers, Cheeseburgers, and Cokes. **All of these** receipts were for meals for inmates brought down from the Chatham County Jail for an appearance in our court. Each of the meals consisted of a burger, french fries, and a drink, for prices that varied from \$3.50 to \$5.00 each. Jonathan Brown claimed that he could not "find the line item" that was written on one of the receipts. He couldn't find it because the city changed its list of accounts, which we call "line item numbers". If this amounts to "corruption" and "fraud", I guess we're guilty.

4. Jonathan Brown has twice produced a copy of a city check for \$1,247 made out to the Tybee Island Police Department. He has stated publicly that it was deposited into the Association checking account, despite the fact that is clearly made out to The Tybee Island Police Department. As Major Case explained in detail before the elected officials in the October 26 council meeting, this money went into a separate, mandatory checking account, along with \$8,347 of federal money, and was spent on items of equipment approved by the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council as part of the 2004 Local Law Enforcement Block Grant. At one point during this project, bills from Smyrna Police Distributors showed a 90-day past due balance. This occurred because the CJCC forced us to change our list of approved equipment purchases, and we added one additional handgun to the order from Smyrna Police Distributors. It was delivered long after the first part of the order. The total bill was then paid with a check from the special checking account. Both the company, and me, were aware of this situation. TIPD was not charged interest or late fees for the past due balance. Jonathan Brown has also stated that a SunTrust counter check for \$4.70, produced when Major Case closed the special account, was cashed and spent on lunch at McDonald's. Actually, the check was never cashed. It is in the LLEBG file. He has a copy. In order to spend it, we would have had to request a change to our original grant proposal. That would have taken more time and more paperwork than \$4.70 was worth.

For the record, this account was not the first such account to be set up for TIPD grant monies by Major Case, under my supervision. It was the third. In all cases the accounts were required as part of the grant conditions. All were closed when the grant money was spent. All were included in the city's annual audit. Nothing questionable about them was ever brought forth. Special accounts are routine practice for some grant programs, and are done to prevent the commingling of grant and city money, to prevent fraud and corruption.

5. Jonathan Brown has revealed a copy of an email from Major Case to Jason Cowan, asking for a budget adjustment

of \$840.41 in October, 2003. He has maintained twice that this is a request from TIPD for money to be transferred from the city checking account into either a special police account or the Association checking account, to, in his words, "cover an overdrawn account". Jonathan Brown cannot read. The email clearly states that it is simply a notification that \$840.41 has been electronically transferred into the city's checking account from the Bureau of Justice Assistance for the purchase of bullet proof vests. Major Case's email is nothing more than a notification that the transaction has occurred, and that TIPD's budget should be adjusted to decrease our expenses for equipment by \$840.41. Mr. Brown's complete misinterpretation of this routine accounting transaction clearly reveals that he knows less than nothing about doubleentry bookkeeping and the city budgetary process. It says a great deal more about his personal character.

6. For the record, the City's and the department's finances have been professionally audited every year since I have been the Chief of Police. All of the above financial situations were included, and none of them were noted as being questionable.

7. All of these documents are available for viewing upon request.

8. Jonathan Brown has made one truthful statement: "There is nothing negative about the truth."







Saltwater angling is one of the Southeast's most popular recreational activities. Each year more anglers are pursuing the redfish. In fact, a whole segment of the marine industry has developed to provide specialized boats, engines, tackle and gear to redfish anglers. Nowadays, professional anglers pursue redfish on tournament trails, which are televised nationwide.

While the popularity of redfish is a boon to coastal communities and to the marine industry, it is cause for concern among natural resource managers. Since redfish don't mature until the fourth year of life, the species is at constant risk from overfishing. Consequently, all states with redfish fisheries have restrictive slot size and daily possession limits. Some prohibit the take of all adult-size redfish and others have outlawed sale. But will these traditional management tools always be enough?

It is important that anglers, fishery scientists, and natural resource policy makers explore all options for keeping redfish populations healthy and anglers satisfied. The question of whether hatchery-reared redfish can be used as a cost-effective and ecologically sound fishery management tool must be answered.

In 2002, the Coastal Resources Division of the Georgia Department of Natural Resources formed a citizen advisory panel to study the issues surrounding the use of hatchery-reared redfish as a fishery management tool. This group of anglers, fishing guides, and scientists recommended that information specific to Georgia was needed. This recommendation led to the Peach State Reds Initiative (PSRI).

The Peach State Reds Initiative is a 5 year project that will take the responsible approach to examining the feasibility of stocking hatcheryreared redfish in Georgia. Adult redfish captured from Georgia waters will be transported to the South Carolina DNR Waddell Mariculture Center,

where they will be conditioned to spawn in captivity. The offspring of these fish will be reared to a 1- to 2inch size before being transported to the Wassaw estuary and released directly into nursery habitat. Approx. 1, 000 fingerlings will be held in captivity until they reach a length of 8 inches at which time they will be marked with internal anchor tags and released in a saltwater pond on Jekyll Island. This process will take place in 2006 and 2007. The goal is to release a minimum of 1 million hatcheryreared redfish into Georgia's coastal waters.

The survival of hatchery-reared redfish will be documented through surveys of angler catches and fish population studies. The impact of stocking on angler behavior will likewise be studied. The PSRI is scheduled to conclude in 2009. The results will be publicized through meetings, press releases and presentations. At that time, the citizens and leadership of Georgia should be able to make an informed decision about the future of redfish stocking.



Oh, My Aching Feet!!!

Corns and calluses are areas of thickened skin that usually develop between the toes or on the tops of the toes. Calluses usually develop on the soles of the feet, although they can form on the sides or on the toes also. Corns and calluses can happen to anyone, but are very common among older people. These conditions can be annoying at first, but then can become very painful.

Corns and calluses develop in response to friction or pressure. Friction occurs when skin rubs against skin as often happens between adjacent toes or when a sock or shoe rubs against a toe or another part of the foot. Tight shoes and shoes that have a flat, hard toe box (the area of the shoe where the toes fit) are especially likely to increase pressure on the skin. Fat and muscle tissue on the bottom of the feet thin with aging thus pointy outgrowths or bone spurs and bumpy outgrowths of bone are more likely to press against the skin. When friction or pressure occurs regularly in the same area, a corn or callus forms gradually.

A corn may be soft or hard and is thickest at its center or core. A callus is hard and is usually of equal thickness throughout. A doctor treats a corn or callus by using a scalpel to shave or pare away the thickened skin. You can prevent this being necessary by doing one simple thing: wear properly fitting footwear. Shoes should be long enough and have enough space in the toe box so that there is no pressure on the tops of the toes. If you have already developed spurs or bumpy outgrowths of bone, it can interfere with the fit and comfort of your existing shoes. This discomfort can sometimes be lessened by affixing into the shoe a soft material such as moleskin, lamb's wool, felt or foam padding.

The holidays are coming and you will be standing to entertain, walking through the malls to

shop, taking your family and friends that come to visit all around town, chasing the grandchildren around and dancing the night away. Make sure you have on a good pair of shoes even if it means taking a second pair with you. If you want to look good in one pair, take a second pair with you so when you find the pair you have on were "not made for walking" you'll be ready. Looking good does no good if your feet hurt – the pain shows all over your face and ruins the outfit anyway! So be good to yourself – be good to your feet. Wear shoes that fit comfortably. Get a foot massage. You'll be glad that you did!!!

Yoga Remedies



Side Plank

Side plank tones the whole body, especially strengthening the upper body. Side plank improves focus, balance and concentration.

From <u>plank</u> pose , bring the right palm to center on the floor. Bring the outside of the right foot on the floor in line with the palm. Stack the left foot on top of the



right, with the inner edges of the feet in contact. Press the right hand down into the floor and lift the hips making the legs and torso one straight line.

When you feel balanced, lift the left hand up towards the ceiling, making the arms one straight line.

Press the outer edge of the right foot down, pull up the knee caps and squeeze the thighs, and buttocks. Look straight ahead, with the chin off the chest.

Breathe and hold for 2-5 breaths.

To release: exhale and bring the left hand down to the floor, bring both toes tucked under on the floor, into plank pose.

Repeat on other side.

Modification: Bend one or both knees down to the floor.

Contraindications: Recent or chronic injury to the arms, hips, ankles or shoulders





A Smooth Sparkling Start

This Champagne camembert soup could easily be the perfect start for any festive holiday dinner. Here is the recipe for four.

Ingredients:

4 Thsp. plus 6 Thsp. unsalted butter 1 Thsp. all purpose flour 1 cup chicken stock 1 cup heavy whipping cream 2/3 cup whole milk 4 ½ oz. camembert cheese (rind removed- guartered) 2/3 cup champagne Salt White pepper Chopped parsley






