LISTENING TO OUR ANCESTORS

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The Art of Native Life Along the North Pacific Coast



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Native peoples living along the North Pacific Coast merge time-honored values with the modern world. This exhibition's more than 400 objects from the collections of the National Museum of the American Indian demonstrate how Native art from this region connects today's Native North Pacific Coast communities with their lands, customs, and stories.

Representatives from eleven Native nations in Washington State, Canada, and Alaska—the Coast Salish, Makah, Nuu-chah-nulth, Kwakw<u>a</u>k<u>a</u>'wakw, Heiltsuk, Nuxalk, Tsimshian, Gitxsan, Nisga'a, Haida, and Tlingit—selected the objects. Their perspectives reveal the deeper meaning these objects hold, and how much they are still a part of the way Native North Pacific Coast peoples live. From ceremonial to everyday, these beautiful pieces—including vividly painted ceremonial masks, feast ladles shaped from mountain sheep horns, and intricately woven robes—enable the Native community representatives not only to share lessons from their ancestors, but to listen anew to their voices.

A brief introductory video precedes the exhibition, which consists of eleven galleries, one for each Native nation. Also accompanying the exhibition is a family room, called *Paawats*, which provides fun and educational activities for children age five to eleven.

Listening to Our Ancestors is on view at the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C., through January 2, 2007.
