# Message from the Master

My first six months at St Peter's have been enormously exciting and rewarding, and I have realised how privileged and honoured I have been to be welcomed into the St Peter's community. Those who have been associated with the College for a long time may take for granted the things that make the College such a special place to live, study and work. It takes an outsider like me to confirm that St Peter's really is the friendly and forward-looking college that it claims to be, and this atmosphere makes a remarkable contribution to the many achievements, academic and extra-curricular, of both its junior and senior members.



Our undergraduate and graduate students show real enthusiasm for their academic work, I hope not just in Master's Collections! Not only are they highly articulate in discussing their specialist subjects, but they clearly demonstrate how an Oxford education benefits them in so many ways that will stand them in good stead for the rest of their careers and lives.

I have been particularly struck by the great reserves of dedication and professionalism that my academic colleagues, both Fellows and Lecturers, put into their research and teaching, and the way that the college system facilitates the kind of close interaction between these aspects of scholarship that is the envy of universities all over the world.

The loyalty and commitment and outstanding performance of all the non-academic staff of the College have been considerably tested this term, with the disruption caused by the complete rebuilding of our kitchens, and it is hard to imagine how things could have progressed with greater smoothness and efficiency.

The kitchen redevelopment is only one of a number of exciting developments on the horizon at the College. Later this year will see the official opening of the Dorfman Centre, a stunning addition to our public and teaching space in the College. We have just been granted planning permission to construct a fifty-room student residence next to the Saxon Tower in Paradise Street, just a few yards from the award-winning Lau Building opened in 1999, and only five minutes' walk from the College itself. We have aspirations to build or acquire further residences so that we can become one of the select group of colleges that can provide accommodation for all their students at reasonable (but still economic) rents.

I have met old members from the College spanning almost its entire history, from those who joined St Peter's Hall in the early days to those who graduated just as I joined. The idea that once you join St Peter's you remain a member for life has been borne out to me in so many ways, but most especially in the way that old members visiting the College so often welcome *me*, rather than the other way round!

In more material terms the JCR has seen various acquisitions in the past year. ## **Honorary Fellows**

St Peter's has recently elected Prof Graham Bell, Ms Frances Cairncross and The Rev Prof Paul Fiddes as Honorary Fellows of the College.

#### **Professor Graham Bell** (1967)

Professor Graham Bell was an undergraduate and DPhil student at St Peter's from 1967-74. He is currently James McGill Professor at McGill University in Montreal, and Director of the Redpath Museum. Professor Bell is a distinguished evolutionary biologist who has written four books and more than 90 major research papers in international journals. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and an internationally recognised figure in the field of evolution.

#### Frances Cairncross

Frances Cairncross was Management Editor of *The Economist* for five years. In addition to being a world renowned journalist, she is the chair of the Economic and Social Research Council, a non-executive director of Alliance & Leicester plc and Senior Fellow at the School of Public Policy, UCLA. She holds an honorary fellowship at St Anne's College – where she read Modern History as an undergraduate in the mid-1960s – and a visiting Fellowship at Nuffield College. This October she will be taking up the position of Rector at Exeter College. Frances is the daughter of Sir Alec Cairncross, former Master of St Peter's.

#### **Rev Prof Paul Fiddes** (1965)

Prof Fiddes read successively English and Theology at St Peter's, before proceeding to a DPhil on the theological implications of Hebrew wisdom literature. After post-doctoral research in the University of Tübingen he returned to Oxford in 1977 as a Fellow and Tutor at Regent's Park College, also being a College Lecturer in Theology at St Peter's from 1979 to 1985. He became Principal of Regent's Park College in 1989, and was granted the title of 'Professor of Systematic Theology' by the University of Oxford in 2002. Professor Fiddes is recognised internationally as one of the leading scholars in the fields of theology and literature.





## Telethon 2004



Fundraising for St Peter's got off to a fantastic start this year with the Annual Telethon. In the first two weeks of January 534 Old Members were telephoned by eight current St Peter's undergraduates to update them with the latest College news and to raise money for student hardship and bursaries. Like last year, the campaign was a phenomenal success; over 55% of those contacted made a donation, raising a staggering £100,000 for the college. This money will go directly towards supporting students in financial difficulty, and in particular towards funding the new Oxford Bursaries Scheme. It is vitally important that College is

able to provide financial backing of this nature for its students; it enables talented young people who would not otherwise be able to afford to study at Oxford to take up places at St Peter's.

St Peter's would like to thank everyone who participated in this year's Telethon. Our callers very much enjoyed the time they spent talking to our Old Members, heard many entertaining anecdotes and received a great deal of useful advice during the fortnight of calling! We would like to thank all those who made a donation to this year's appeal and helped make the campaign such a great success. In

particular, we would like to thank our younger alumni, notably those who matriculated between 1995 and 1999. This was the first year they have participated in a Telethon, and they proved to be one of our largest and most enthusiastic groups of donors!

## The Dorfman Centre

The College's recent Business Review, endorsed by the Governing Body in January 2003, highlighted the need for a modern and fully equipped seminar room to complement those in the Latner and Chavasse buildings. Keen to exploit every conceivable inch of the small site that the College occupies on New Inn Hall Street, the Bursar earmarked a potential area behind Staircase IV following an audit of space in 1997. This was always going to be a tricky plot to develop, but an imaginative design by Mr Timothy Lee, of the London architects Lee/Fitzgerald Ltd, and the generosity of Mr Lloyd Dorfman

combined to make possible one of the most outstanding new small buildings in Oxford. The building was constructed to a very high specification by Benfield & Loxley Ltd of Cowley, and the College now has a most elegant new centre capable of seating over 60 for a lecture or conference (45 at tables) and a fitting meeting room for the Governing Body. It is in constant use during term time and will be in great demand for conferences and seminars during vacations.

The centre is air-conditioned and fully equipped with remotely operated audio/ visual technology

and an induction loop. The surrounding area has been landscaped, and we have been able to link the back of Staircase IV to the seminar room by a ramped access to provide facilities for the disabled. The Dorfman Centre is one of the very few modern buildings in the area built entirely of wood. Great attention has been paid to energy conservation with a very high level of insulation and the cedar-panelled walls make the centre beautifully quiet. Large windows let in natural light and the attractive building is marked by an oak floor and elegant vaulted oak ceiling panels.

Lloyd Dorfman's benevolence has provided the College with a major enhancement. This beautiful building has been admired by all that have visited it. It has opened up what was a rather desolate 'back street' area of the College to provide an exciting new facility, drawn our attention to the fine Emily Morris building, introduced an interesting dimension to the Mulberry Quad, incorporated essential facilities for the disabled and, above all, added an elegant new room designed and built with great skill and craftsmanship.



### Kitchen Refurbishments







This Hilary term, the Hannington Ouad has been transformed into a temporary building site for the long-overdue renovation of the College kitchens! In 2002 the Building Committee had concluded that the refurbishment of the kitchen and aspects of the wider catering operation at St Peter's needed an urgent overhauling. Consultants' reports on the existing kitchen arrangements highlighted serious health and safety issues, severe shortages of

storage facilities, difficulties in recruiting and retaining staff, and inefficiencies which make the operation more costly than necessary.

At the end of Michaelmas 2003 the kitchen was closed down and a temporary food preparation area was partitioned off in the space in Hall normally occupied by the High Table. For the duration of Hilary term students, staff and visitors have been served from the back of

the Hall, with simpler meals than usual and disposable cutlery and crockery. Students with rooms in St George's Gate and Cambridge Terrace have been fed in their respective annexes.

Meanwhile, the old Kitchens have been massively upgraded to feature more space for food preparation, better dishwashing facilities, new cold rooms and deep freezers, enhanced meal transportation equipment and a much more pleasant working environment for staff.

After all this disruption, the Kitchen refurbishments are well on their way to being completed. The capacity of Hall has now increased by 25%, and all Health and Safety requirements have been met or exceeded. The new arrangements have cost in excess of £750,000, but will be serving staff, students and visitors for many years to come!

# The Chaplain

It is with both great pleasure and sadness, that we announce that the Chaplain, the Rev Christopher Jones, will be leaving the college in July this year.

After eleven years as Chaplain of St Peter's, he has been appointed Home affairs policy adviser in the Mission and Public Affairs Division of the Archbishops' Council of the Church of England. Christopher's brief will be to provide advice to the Church on areas including criminal justice, mental health, drug and alcohol policy, religious offences, and sexual offences and to maintain a watching brief on industrial and economic affairs.

## **Obituaries**

The college regrets to announce the deaths last year of two of our Honorary Fellows:

#### Lord Dormand of Easington (1954)

The Right Honorable Lord Dormand of Easington died on 18th December 2003 aged 84. He was Labour MP for Easington from 1970 to 1987, and Chairman of the Parliamentary Labour Party during the 1980s. Lord Dormand came to St Peter's as a mature student in 1954 to study Public and Social Administration, and whilst at college was a keen sportsman, playing for the first teams in rugby, cricket and football. In 1994 Lord Dormand became Chairman of the Howard Society, founded to recognise those who have made gifts to St Peter's through their wills. He is survived by his wife Doris, and two stepchildren.

#### Sir Anthony Hollis (1945)

Sir Anthony Hollis QC died on 24th November 2003 aged 76. A long-serving judge in the High Court, family division, he was highly regarded by his colleagues and renowned for his soundness and sensitivity in dealing with cases. Sir Anthony read Law at St Peters in 1945 after a period of national service, and was called to Gray's Inn in 1951, joining the Chambers at 13 King's Bench Walk. He became Head of Chambers in 1971, Chairman of the Family Bar Association in 1974, and was appointed a Recorder in 1976, a post he held until he joined the family division in 1982. Sir Anthony retired in 1997 and leaves behind his wife and stepdaughter.

Medics, Chemists and Life Scientists – if you have not received one and are interested in attending, please contact the Development Office.


#### **Postponed Gaudy**
