- a) reconstructing the historical development and internal relationships of the Austronesian languages—especially those of Oceania—and their implications for the prehistory and culture history of Austronesian speaking peoples;
- b) reconstructing the prehistory of the various groups of Papuan languages (i.e. non-Austronesian languages spoken on the island of New Guinea and the surrounding area) and the implications thereof for the prehistory of the region;
- c) the theory of language change, and its role in improving our ability to reconstruct linguistic prehistory and to interpret the relationship of that linguistic prehistory to archaeological and ethnographic findings;
- d) the study of grammatical change induced by contact with neighbouring languages, and its implications for the detection of prehistoric relationships between speaker groups and for general linguistic theory;
- e) the diachronic fate of grammatical constructions.

Proto Oceanic Language, culture and environment: Foundations of the Austronesian settlement of the Pacific, co-directed with Professor Andrew Pawley since 1992. The primary aim of this project is to publish a dictionary of Proto Oceanic, arranged by terminologies each covering a semantic field. The project was financed by the Research School of Pacific Studies, and included a specially funded Research Assistant to collate data. From 2003–05 it is funded by the Australian Research Council.

Papuan Linguistics Project, co-directed with Professors Andrew Pawley and William Foley (University of Sydney). since 1994. The aim of this project is to reconstruct the prehistory of Papuan languages of New Guinea and nearby islands. Partially funded by the Australian Research Council 1994–1999.

Metatypy and the diachronic fate of grammatical constructions (individual project). This has grown out of my work on contact-induced language change. A major feature of language change among bilingual people is the reformulation of grammatical constructions in one of their languages on the basis of the constructions of the other, resulting in metatypy (a change in the grammatical typology of the language). I am investigating how this happens. I am also interested in the converse—the maintenance of meaning distinctions between grammatical constructions over long period of time when contact does not intervene.
