Marist Earns MAAC's Highest Honor: All Three 2004-05 Commissioner's Cups

Marist, which captured seven Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference titles during the 2004-05 academic year, has brought home the conference's highest honors, earning all three JetBlue Airways MAAC Commissioner's Cups.

This season marks the fifth time in seven years that the Red Foxes have claimed the overall competition and makes Marist the only school to win the overall title five times. La Salle University and Loyola College have each won four overall titles.

The Red Foxes captured two women's and five men's championships this past season. This past fall, Marist earned the title crown in women's cross country and men's soccer. In the winter, Marist claimed the top prize in men's and women's swimming and diving. In the spring, Marist captured the men's rowing, men's lacrosse and baseball champion-

ships. Marist advanced to three NCAA Tournaments this season (men's soccer, men's lacrosse and baseball), with the

men's lacrosse squad falling to eventual national champion the Johns Hopkins University in the first round.

This is the second year that Marist has swept all three categories (overall, men's and women's); the Red Foxes performed the feat in the 2000-01 season.

Marist finished with a total of 124 points, 24 points ahead of runner-up Loyola. On the men's side, the Red Foxes captured the league crown with 63.50 points, 12.5 points more than second-place Rider University. Marist finished in the top spot in the women's cup race by compiling 60.50 points, just 3.50 points more than Iona College.

Soldier Receives First Marist Degree Conferred via 'Net

Marist's 2005 commencement marked the first time President Dennis Murray conferred a degree over the Internet. Murray conferred an MPA degree Saturday, May 21, Armed Forces Day, upon Capt. Keith Anderson, who is deployed in Northern Afghanistan.

Anderson completed the online MPA program while teaching, mentoring and coaching an Afghan National Army company on infantry tactics and mission development and accompanying it on combat missions. His home is in Jupiter, Fla., where he is a battery commander for the Florida Army National Guard. When not in uniform he teaches in an elementary school in West Palm Beach. Earlier Saturday, FoxNews's TV program "Fox & Friends Weekend" interviewed Anderson and his fiancée, Terri Ganim, about the degree. On the air Ganim thanked Jean Theobald, assistant dean, MBA/MPA programs, and Dr. James Kent, assistant professor, public administration, for helping Anderson. Chief Public Affairs Officer Tim Massie worked through several nights arranging the television coverage of Anderson in Kabul.

In an email earlier this spring, Anderson thanked Marist. "The Marist faculty and staff supported me by encouraging me to never give up. There were many times that I had to travel long distances to find Internet service with an armed escort just to be able to send a paper or project before it was late." Anderson also said he began his degree in 1991 but was academically dismissed. "I was 22 years old [and] I didn't have the maturity to complete the degree, something I regretted for 14 years. Dr. Kent was a big factor for me."

It was also the first Marist commencement to consist of two ceremonies. More than 300 graduates from programs within the School of Graduate and Continuing Education received their degrees in an evening ceremony Friday, May 20. The next day 850 traditional undergraduates received their diplomas.

"Marist's 59th commencement exercises were a huge success and I'd like to thank everyone involved for their contributions," Murray said in an email to the campus afterwards. "Everything from the parking to the receptions ran smoothly, and the response from students and their families was overwhelmingly positive."

Marist Dedicates Applied Research Technology Center

Marist dedicated its new Center for Applied Research in Collaborative and On-Demand Computing (CCODC) May 12 with a ribbon-cutting ceremony in Donnelly Hall.

The center is funded by a five-year, \$2.5 million grant from the New York State Office of Science, Technology and Academic Research, commonly called NYSTAR, which formally designated CCODC a College Applied Research and Technology Center, or CART. Other New York State academic institutions designated NYSTAR research centers include Columbia University, Cornell University, Clarkson University, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and CUNY Staten Island.

"This new center will help New York State business and industry benefit from the application of cutting-edge collaborative and on-demand computing technologies, which are rapidly transforming the concept of the data center," said President Dennis Murray. "We will now be able to train workers and transfer the knowledge and skills being developed at Marist to the corporate world, giving the Hudson River Valley and New York State a competitive advantage in the global marketplace."

"I am very pleased I was able to work closely with Governor Pataki and Marist College to help secure the grant for the Center for Applied Research in Collaborative and On-Demand Computing," said Sen. Stephen M. Saland, a major supporter of technology innovation and the new Marist center. "The center will promote research, collaboration with industry, and work force development. Marist College will play a pivotal role in future development of this technology. This will not only be a win for the college but also for the region."

The center is distributed in different facilities on the campus and net-

worked through the college's advanced technological infrastructure. Faculty and students are working with seven industry partners on NYSTAR-funded projects: 1-800-Flowers.com, Central Hudson Gas and Electric, DataSynapse, the Hudson Valley Technology Development Center, IBM, Informeta and Pepsi Cola of the Hudson Valley. Current projects include a complement of on-demand computing, grid computing, Linux testing, virtual hosting and training outreach.

"It doesn't matter if you're a startup or an established corporation," said Dr. Roger Norton, dean of the School of Computer Science and Mathematics and CCODC director. "Collaborative and ondemand computing environments allow businesses to better share technology resources and request these resources on an as-needed basis. That can lead to cost savings and increased productivity."

"It is difficult to maintain the level of excellence that the student-athletes, coaches and athletic administrators have commend all who were involved in making that happen this year."

The JetBlue Airways MAAC Commissioner's Cup is awarded annually as a symbol of overall excellence in athletics in the 25 championship athletic events conducted within the MAAC. Each institution is scored in all championships in which it fields a varsity team. Then the scores from men's and women's basketball plus the other top six men's and other top six women's championships are added to determine an institution's total points.

The rest of the overall field finished as follows: Loyola (100), Rider (99.50), Manhattan College (97.50), Iona (95.5), Fairfield University (88.50), Niagara University (82.50), Siena College (77), Canisius College (67) and Saint Peter's College (45).

In the men's standings, Rider finished second with 51 points, followed by Manhattan (50.50), Loyola (44.50), Niagara (43.50), Iona (38.50), Fairfield (36), Siena (31.50), Saint Peter's (25) and Canisius (21).

On the women's side, Iona was second with 57 points, followed by Loyola (55.50), Fairfield (52.50), Rider (48.50), Manhattan (47), Canisius (46), Siena (45.50), Niagara (39) and Saint Peter's (20).
