THE LATEST NEWS FROM TAKE PRIDE IN AMERICA

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Greetings from the Executive Director

This past month, I traveled to the Pacific Northwest to attend the National Conference on Volunteerism and Service and to visit some of Washington's state and local public lands. The conference took place in Seattle over the course of two days. More than 2,300 people attended the show from across the country and included people who work with volunteers in a variety of ways, from non-profit and government volunteer programs to private sector initiatives. I shared with the attendees how easy it is to become involved in Take Pride, as well as the ways Take Pride can help publicize their events nationwide and support them with program materials.

After the conference, I met with representatives from nearby refuges and parks to discuss their involvement with Take Pride in America. It was nice to visit with Joan Howser-Crowe, the Washington State Parks volunteer coordinator, to thank and encourage her to continue to promote the message of Take Pride at events and venues throughout the state. In addition, Cullen Stephenson with the State of Washington Department of Ecology carved out time to discuss ways to involve litter cleanups and shoreline projects in Take Pride. I learned of the needs of the refuge managers and volunteer coordinators and spoke with them about how we can work together to try and meet their needs.

GARDEN SPOTLIGHT

Students, Seniors Work in Spirit of Collaboration for Garden

On Tuesday, June 6, more than 100 Hampstead Elementary School third-graders hand delivered hundreds of vegetable seedlings to The Residences at Hampstead School, a senior living facility that once was home to the local elementary school in Hampstead, Maryland. The students grew the seedlings in their classroom and planted them in a newly designated 'Take Pride in America Garden', a vegetable garden at the Residences, which when harvested, will provide cucumbers, corn, zucchini and other vegetables for the more than 100 senior residents living at the facility.

America the Beautiful Fund, a Take Pride Charter Partner, donated vegetable seeds for the garden, which joins more than 3,500 Take Pride Gardens across the Nation.

Michelle Cangelosi, Take Pride executive director, presented Appreciation Certificates to the partnering organizations who made the project possible and recognized Hampstead Elementary School as the newest member in the Take Pride in America Schools program by presenting a certificate to Principal Theresa Ball.

Mayor Shoemaker, Jr. and members of the Hampstead

City Council were joined by a representative from Senator Mikulski's office and a member of the Maryland House of Delegates. Before the ribbon cutting for the garden, Mayor Shoemaker, Jr. delivered a proclamation for the City of Hampstead, Maryland, declaring June 6, 2006 "Take Pride in America Day."

Social work students at McDaniel College developed this project to bring the elementary students and seniors together, as well as town residents and the community in a collaborative effort to foster relationships between the two

generations and to instill a sense of community service in the students.

Deer Creek Students, Parents Participate in Beautification Day

Deer Creek Elementary School near Oklahoma City, Oklahoma celebrated a Beautification Day on their school grounds on Friday, May 19. Over six hundred parents, students, and community volunteers helped plant new flowers, trees, vegetables, and fruits in 'Antlerville,' their outdoor classroom. Volunteers also built paths out of stone so children in wheelchairs would be able to visit the outdoor classroom. Participants helped clean the wetlands and the environment surrounding the outdoor classroom. Deer Creek Elementary School participates in the Take Pride Schools program and won the 2005 Take Pride National Award in the Schools category—it's encouraging to see them continue to lend a hand to their school lands!

Peaceful Valley Donkey Rescue Receives Funds for Burros



The Save the Mustang Fund has helped place over sixty wild horses and burros with equine rescue groups for permanent care since their announcement in April 2006 to distribute over \$200,000 in support funds.

One beneficiary of the fund is the Peaceful Valley Donkey Rescue in Tehachapi, California. They have purchased 111 burros since February 2006, and most recently, they took delivery of 16 burros at the end of April. Two of the burros have since given birth to a rare white jack (male burro) and a beautiful grey jennet (female burro). Additionally, another group outside Franklin, Tennessee took delivery of 18 horses they purchased from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and will also receive support funds from the Save the Mustangs Fund.

To date, the Save the Mustangs Fund, a program of Take Pride, has raised the funds to be distributed to qualified non-profit wild horse and rescue organizations for assistance in providing long-term care and homes for the horses and burros. Qualified groups can apply for the funds when they purchase the saleable animals from the BLM. Visit www.savethemustangs.org for more information.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHTS

National Trails Day Annual Cleanup Clears Over 7,500 Miles of Trails

On Saturday, June 3, National Trails Day celebrated its fourteenth annual cleanup. Hosted by the American Hiking Society, a Take Pride Charter Partner, over 1,200 events were held nationwide, and inspired nearly a million trail enthusiasts to flock to their favorite trails to discover, learn about and celebrate trails while participating in educational exhibits, trail dedications, gear demonstrations, instructional workshops and trail work projects.

All told, volunteers worked on 1,550 trails and contributed over 200,000 hours to the maintenance and construction of these trails.

Lisa Young of the Take Pride in America office spent the day on the trail in southern Nevada at Kyle Canyon in Spring Mountain State Recreation Area. The work was

intense, but the crew accomplished a well-maintained hiking trail by the end of the afternoon. Together, volunteers picked up litter, removed large debris, replaced trail

signs, moved boulders

and trees blocking the trail, painted picnic tables in rest areas and planted trees to help keep hikers on the trail.

In the spirit of partnership, people from many different agencies were involved —volunteer firefighters from the U.S. Forest Service, BLM representatives, and other volunteers that the sponsoring agency, the Southern Nevada Interagency Volunteer Program, recruited for the day.

Volunteers were greeted in the morning with a fresh cup of coffee from Starbucks and rewarded after the work day with lunch from a local delicatessen. After lunch, a Congressional Record entry, submitted by U.S. Senator Harry Reid, was read by a local representative from his office. The Senator submitted the Congressional Record entry to recognize the activities across Nevada for National Trails Day.

The afternoon concluded with a Take Pride in America door prize giveaway.

At another National Trails Day site outside Sacramento, California, over 25 volunteers showed up to celebrate at the Folsom Lake State Park - Granite Bay unit on Sunday, June 4. The event was co-hosted by the Bureau of Reclamation, Take Pride in America, the Folsom-Auburn Trail Riders Action Coalition (FATRAC), a group of local mountain bikers, the California State Parks, and REI, Inc. in Roseville, California. The volunteers participated in trail maintenance including downed tree and brush removal, clearing blind turns, and kiosk painting/renovation. Volunteers enjoyed a barbecue, swimming, and bike riding after the event.

Preceding National Trails Day, on Thursday, June 1, Secretary of the Interior Dirk Kempthorne designated 36 new National Recreation Trails in 24 states, adding more than 800 miles of trails to the National Trails System. These new trails join a network of more than 900 trails encompassing more than 10,000 miles.

Pricewaterhouse Coopers Hosts Third Annual Take Pride Cleanup

On Thursday, June 1, more than 500 energetic PricewaterhouseCoopers employees descended on the weeds, rust, exotic vegetation and litter in Anacostia Park, in the southeastern corner of Washington, DC. Even with the temperature near 90 degrees, the weeds never had a chance.

This was the third annual Take Pride employee workday hosted by Pricewaterhouse Coopers. By the end of the day, Piles of brush and limbs were gathered as the overgrowth of weeds and plants along the banks were removed. The riverfront had been transformed. The National Park Service chipper machines were overworked, the Urban Tree House looked

wonderful, signs and trash cans were freshly painted, and trees throughout the park were mulched. Volunteers and National Park staff at Anacostia smiled at a great day of accomplishments.
