

Registering your volunteer event for improving public lands is simple and rewarding. When you make your event a Take Pride in America<sup>®</sup> participating event, you can draw additional volunteers and community support through the resources of the Take Pride program.

## **EVENT GUIDELINES**

Just follow these six simple guidelines when planning your event and be sure to register it on our website. Events meeting our criteria will automatically be placed on our online calendar and appropriate volunteer search engines on our website.

All Take Pride in America events must:

- 1. Be publicized as a Take Pride in America event;
- 2. Feature prominent use of the Take Pride in America logo and/or banner;
- Follow all appropriate laws and regulations, including, as necessary, obtaining permits and forms, meeting safety requirements, and securing volunteer agreements and parental approval;
- 4. Take place on public lands or private lands with the owner's consent, so long as there is a great public benefit;
- 5. Reflect a positive message of cooperation among Federal, state and local governments, private enterprises, and/or civic organizations; and
- 6. Be an "on the ground" project rather than an advocacy event.

## **EVENT IDEAS**

There are hundreds of possibilities for Take Pride in America events, with something sure to appeal to all ages and interests. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- Rehabilitating or creating natural habitats
- Constructing or maintaining trails, campsites or playgrounds
- Clean-ups, including removing trash or debris from shorelines, riparian edges, roadsides, parks, schoolyards, etc.
- Refurbishing, repairing or improving historical or cultural sites by painting, mending fences, improving access, etc.
- ★ Planting and maintaining gardens or trees
- ★ "Hike a Mile, Mend a Mile" type activities
- Ceremonies celebrating the commencement or successful completion of a volunteer project

# TAKE PRIDE VOLUNTEERS

Being a Take Pride in America volunteer is fun. Here are the two ways to become a Take Pride volunteer:

- 1. Participate in a Take Pride in America event. You are automatically considered a Take Pride volunteer for that event, and any subsequent Take Pride events in which you participate.
- 2. Visit our Partner's website at *www.TakePride.info* and log your volunteer hours to become a "Friend of Take Pride." By keeping track of your volunteer hours, you are eligible to receive individual recognition for your volunteer efforts from Take Pride and its partners.

Opportunities to volunteer on public lands are available throughout the country. Here are some ideas to get you started.

- ★ Staff a visitor center or visitor center bookstore
- ★ Construct, maintain or clean up trails
- Photograph public land events
- ★ Write a newsletter for a local park or historical site
- Monitor bird and wildlife habitats
- ★ Participate in re-enactments and historical dramas
- ★ Plant or maintain gardens or trees
- \star Be a trail guide
- ★ Become a volunteer coordinator
- ★ Produce signs for public lands near you
- ★ Participate in wildlife habitat restoration
- ★ Become a receptionist at a public land site
- ★ Promote public land stewardship in local service organizations
