More than 30 budding scientists participated in NECC's third annual science fair March 3.




SPROFILE James B.

t was nearly half a lifetime ago that James B. came to NECC. As a 4 ½ -year-old autistic boy, James arrived at NECC unable to control repetitive behaviors, he was restless and effectively non-verbal. James also had issues with food: He refused to eat anything other than yogurt and Cracklin' Oat Bran cereal.

But with the help of his dedicated teachers, Applied Behavior Analysis and special feeding therapies, James began to make progress.

Today, James is a very different child than the withdrawn little boy who came to NECC four years ago. Socially, he has grown by leaps and bounds and is especially fond of playing tag with the other children. He enjoys kicking a soccer ball, playing catch with a baseball and glove, and hitting golf balls at the driving range with his family. He also has become a charmer who enjoys a good laugh.

James also enjoys quiet time, and has learned to stay on task. His favorite indoor activities: computers – especially video games – and puzzles. He's also expanded his diet. In fact, these days, he'll try just about any food put in front of him.



Not even James' teacher, Michelle, can believe how far he's come. He is currently preparing to make a transition to 2nd grade in the Southborough public schools. He'll start by going to school for one hour three days a week and quickly work up to staying a whole day. Eventually, James will move back to New York to live with his family and attend public school. In short, he's come an incredibly long way in four years – and he's not finished going forward yet.

NECC's Occupational Therapy Department, a.k.a. "OT," does a lot of little things that, put together, make a big difference.

"We create individualized programs to develop the children's motor skills," says Kristen Sidman, NECC's Lead Occupational Therapist and creator of the OT program.

Kristen, who oversees a staff of five, has been lead therapist since 1997. But she's been helping children at NECC for much longer –17 years, in fact!

"NECC was my first job out of college," says Kristen, who now holds a master's degree in severe special education from Fitchburg State and a master's in occupational therapy from Tufts University.

Her various roles over the years at NECC – entry-level teacher, case manager, residential coordinator, vocational

specialist, among others – have provided her with great insight into NECC's overarching goal to "open doors" for the children.

Even after working at NECC for so long, the challenges remain fresh. "NECC is on the cutting edge of everything that's happening in the field of autism," Kristen says. Hands down, "NECC is the best place to work if you want to help kids with autism. You stay current just by working here – not to mention the rewards of working with a young, motivated staff."

For eight months, Rob and Colleen's frustration grew as they searched unsuccessfully for an effective way to help their daughter. When Meaghan entered NECC's Home-Based Program eight months later, their exasperation quickly gave way to relief.

Almost immediately, the McCabes knew NECC was *the* right answer. "First and foremost, Meaghan's comfort with the school gave us a good feeling," says Colleen. "She smiled more and cried less while gaining the ability to communicate."

But it wasn't just Meaghan's comfort level, but the solidarity the McCabes' felt with other NECC families touched by autism. "Parents, grandparents and other family and friends here have been so inspirational to us with their openness, knowledge and experiences," Rob says. "It is rare to find a group of families connected to any school who are always willing to offer a smile or provide words of encouragement."

Finally, the staff and teachers make NECC an institution like no other, adds Rob. He is profoundly grateful for all the staff and teachers "that make it their daily ambition to work in this challenging field."

When asked how NECC has changed Meaghan's life, Colleen seems lost for words. "Nothing I say will completely encompass a truly appropriate response. 'What hasn't NECC done?' is probably a more fitting question. I think NECC's slogan says a lot: The New England Center for Children opens doors."

For Colleen, Rob, and Robbie, 8 (Meaghan's big brother) NECC has done that and more for Meaghan.

PROFILE John Duffy


he Dunkin' Donuts connection strikes again. Include John Duffy on the growing list of NECC supporters affiliated with the donut giant.


