# 23<sup>rd</sup> VANCOUVER INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL BREAKS RECORDS *Machuca, What Remains of Us and Being Caribou win audience awards*

**Vancouver, BC** (October 13, 2004) - For the first time in 23 years, the not-for-profit *Vancouver International Film Festival* has reached the \$1 million mark in revenues. On top of that, the balance of the \$2.5 million expense budget has again been reached through the outstanding support of over 150 private and public-sector sponsors. The festival also surpassed the 150,000 attendance mark once again, reached for the first time in 2002. In all there were 537 public screenings for a total of 373 films including 247 features and mid-lengths, of which there were 7 world premieres, 32 international premieres, 34 North American premieres, 58 Canadian premieres and 25 English-Canadian premieres.

"The interesting trend this year was how little we relied on films with Canadian distribution in place," noted Festival Director Alan Franey. "Despite the increasingly guarded nature of film distribution, we were extremely encouraged to find that audiences responded well to an uncompromising line-up of often quite challenging fare. Political documentaries, Canadian films, unheralded premieres and specialized titles sold the bulk of our tickets. This bodes well for our non-profit film society as we head into year-round programming beginning in the Spring of 2005 at the *Vancouver International Film Centre* and its state-of-the-art, 175-seat *Vancity Theatre*."

The **24<sup>th</sup>** *Vancouver International Film Festival* will run **September 29<sup>th</sup> to October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2005**, and will be headquartered in the new *Vancouver International Film Centre* at 1181 Seymour Street.

## The AGF People's Choice Award for Most Popular International Film

## Federal Express Award for Most Popular Canadian Feature Film

This year the voting for the *Federal Express Award for Most Popular Canadian Feature Film* resulted in a tie. Co-winners are François Prévost and Hugo Latulippe for **WHAT REMAINS OF US** (Quebec), a moving documentary that takes viewers to the heart of the 50-year tragedy that has consumed Tibetan society, and Leanne Allison and Diana Wilson for **BEING CARIBOU** (British Columbia), an inspiring northern adventure which reveals the threat posed by American oil and gas drilling to these northern creatures.

# JURIED AWARDS

#### The National Film Board Award for Best Documentary Feature

Jurors John Anderson, Karen Cooper and Rob Nelson gave the *National Film Board Award for Best Documentary Feature* to Jessica Yu's **IN THE REALMS OF THE UNREAL** (USA), an in-depth exploration into the parallel lives of legendary outsider artist Henry Darger. The film was commended by the jurors "for its empathetic and innovative portrayal of a complex and problematic artist in a way that illuminates the convergence of his life and work."

# The Dragons & Tigers Award for Young Cinema

Japan's Takahashi Izumi won the *Dragons & Tigers Award for Young Cinema* for his film **THE SOUP**, **ONE MORNING**. The award, which includes a \$5,000 prize, is sponsored by Brad Birarda. The jury was comprised of: Peggy Chiao from Taiwan, Hong Sang-Soo from Korea, and Christoph Huber from Austria. They issued the following jury statement: "By unanimous decision, this years *Dragons & Tigers Award for Young Cinema* goes to THE SOUP, ONE MORNING, for its visual and emotional precision in mapping out the slow decay of a relationship. The film gradually accumulates an overwhelming power which can only come from feelings that the director and his actors have experienced and inhabited for themselves".

Special mention was also given to: **THE BIG DURIAN** (Amir Muhammad, Malaysia), "for its witty and unusual handling of an incident which ultimately allows deep insights into the racial tensions in Malaysian society, **GOOD MORNING BEIJING** (Pan Jianlin, China), "for its compelling mixture of parallel narratives and its uncompromising depictions of the darkness and frustrations of city existence, and **SUND@Y SEOUL** (Oh Myung-Hoon, Korea), "for taking pieces of real-life experience - pieces never

likely to fit into conventional narrative forms - and holding them together through to the end, creating a resonance that is anything but banal".

#### Citytv Western Canada Feature Film Award

Gary Yates wins the *Citytv Western Canada Feature Film Award* for his debut feature **SEVEN TIMES LUCKY**, a hustler flick in the classic noir tradition. Yates's film earned praise from jurors John Griffin, Vincent Le Leurch, and Helen Loveridge, "for its economy of cinematic language, consistency of tone and commitment to entertain". The award, sponsored by Citytv, is accompanied by a cash prize of \$12,000.

## Keystone Award for Best Young Western Canadian Director of a Short Film

**Jennifer Calvert** wins the *Keystone Award for Best Young Western Canadian Director of a Short Film* for **RIVERBURN**, which jurors praised "for its surehanded treatment of the familiar themes of adolescent alienation and sexual awakening". The award, sponsored by International Keystone Entertainment, is accompanied by a \$5,000 cash prize.

Special mention was given for the excellence of two animated entries, Steven K.L. Olson's **JUDAS' PANE** and Jason White's **OF BURNING HILLS**.

## Women in Film & Video Vancouver's Artistic Merit Award

**Joely Collins** received the Women in Film & Video Vancouver's Artistic Merit Award for her performance in **THE LOVE CRIMES OF GILLIAN GUESS**. The award is given annually to a B.C. woman filmmaker or performer of distinction.

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
