Methodology

This Leger Marketing survey was conducted among **1,503** Canadian adults from May 2 to May 7, 2006. The maximum margin of error for a sample of this size is \pm **2.6%**, 19 times out of 20. Using data from Statistics Canada, final results were weighted according to age, gender, region and mother tongue.



1. Conservatives have a 10-Point Lead Over the Liberals

If elections had been held between May 2 and May 7, 2006, the Conservative Party would have obtained 40% of the vote, the Liberal Party of Canada 30%, the New Democratic Party 13%, the Bloc Québécois 9% and the Green Party 7%. When elections were held last January, Conservatives obtained 36% of the vote, Liberals 30%, New Democrats 17%, Bloc supporters 10% and Green supporters 4%. The day before these elections, Leger Marketing conducted its last poll for the Canadian Press and produced the following results: CP 36%, LPC 29%, NDP 17%, BQ 11% and GP 4%.

Conservatives dominate in all provinces except Ontario where the Liberals lead by 38% - 34% against the Conservatives. Bloc supporters obtain 36% against 29% for the Conservatives. Stephen Harper's party obtains its highest score in Alberta with 65%.

2. Canadians Satisfied with Harper Government

Nearly two-thirds of Canadians (62%) say they are satisfied with Stephen Harper's government, while 27% say they are dissatisfied. Satisfaction is more evident in Alberta (77%) and in Québec (72%). There are even more satisfied (49%) among the Liberal electorate than dissatisfied (42%).

3. More than Half of Canadians Expect Stephen Harper to Keep his Promises

52% of Canadians believe Stephen Harper will keep the promises he made during the last election campaign, whereas 35% do not and 11% do not know. (See Table 3)

Moreover, 51% of the population are satisfied with the Harper government's first budget, whereas 26% are dissatisfied and 9% do not know. It should be noted that survey interviews were conducted after the budget was tabled on May 7. (See Table 4)

4. Dryden and Rae in the Lead

Though the ten first candidates officially joined the Liberal Party of Canada leadership race by May 2, only two of them stand out according to the Canadian population. Ken Dryden was chosen as the first candidate by 13% of the population and Bob Rae was second with 11%. They are followed by Stéphane Dion with 7%, Michael Ignatieff with 6%, Gerard Kennedy with 5%, Carolyn Bennett with 3%, Scott Brison with 2%, Joe Volpe and Martha Hall Findley with respectively 1% and Maurizio Bevilacqua with less than 1%.

There is little difference among Liberal supporters when ranking the most well known candidates of the Liberal leadership race. Gerard Kennedy gains 3 points and overtakes Michael Ignatieff, Joe Volpe gains 2% and Carolyn Bennett loses 1 point. The following table shows the position of the different candidates.

Canadians do not seem interested in the leadership race since 51% along with 41% of Liberal voters did not have an opinion.



5. Liberals Would Lose Points with Rae and Ignatieff

If Bob Rae or Michael Ignatieff led the Liberal Party of Canada, either one would only obtain 28% of the vote, whereas the Conservative Party would obtain 42%. In Ontario, the Liberals under Bob Rae would obtain 34% versus 39% for the CP and the Liberals under Ignatieff would obtain 33% against 37% for the CP.
