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



Again, I welcome you all to the Music City, and wish you an exciting and memorable time at PASIC 2001.





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
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


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
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

In addition to her work as Professor of Marimba at Toho Gakuen School of Music in Tokyo, Keiko Abe regularly performs solo concertos, chamber music and improvisations throughout the world. Abe is also in demand as a guest lecturer and has given master classes in North America, Central and South America, Europe and Asia. She has recorded over 20 CDs, mostly for the Denon label, and many of her 30+ compositions have become standards of marimba literature. Abe has commissioned more than 70 compositions and performed at over 40 music festivals worldwide. A 1993 inductee into the PAS Hall of Fame, she served as the Artistic Director for the World Marimba Festival in Osaka, Japan (1998) and the Percussion Festival in Japan Week in Seoul, Korea (1999). Abe is scheduled to be on the jury at the 3rd World Marimba Competition in Stuttgart, Germany in 2002.

ALAN ABEL THURSDAY 9:00 A.M., 12:00 P.M., , SATURDAY 12:00 P.M.

Former Associate Principal Percussionist of the Philadelphia Orchestra Alan Abel retired in September of 1997 after 38 years of service. He currently works with graduate students at Temple University. Abel has compiled two books on orchestral studies for timpani and percussion for G. Schirmer, Inc. and has designed and produced symphonic triangles and bass drum stands that are used throughout the world. Abel has served on the PAS Board of Directors, was inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 1998 and is presently Chair of the PAS Symphonic Committee. He has been a faculty member of the University of Oklahoma. Oklahoma City University, Glassboro State College and the Philadelphia Settlement Music School, Abel was a part-time member of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra and, after two years in a U.S. Air Force Band, played in the Oklahoma City Symphony (1953-59).

ABUSUA SATURDAY 1:00 p.m.

Tennessee Tech University's West African Drumming and Dance Ensemble Abusua complements the West African drumming and dance classes taught by **Joseph Rasmussen**, Professor of Music at Tennessee Tech University in Cookeville. Established in 1991, the student ensemble learns traditional drumming patterns, dances and songs of Ghana, West Africa, as well as other elements of Ghanaian culture. Abusua, which means "family" in Twi (a major language in Ghana), is a university club open to students who have taken classes in West African drumming or dance. They perform on all handcrafted instruments and in handmade costumes from Africa. Abusua has performed extensively in the Putnam County Schools and at schools and festivals in Middle and East Tennessee. The group has been invited to perform at conferences of the Tennessee Music Educators' Association in Nashville and the

Music Educators' National Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio.

TIMOTHY ADAMS

FRIDAY 3:00 P.M.

Named Principal Timpanist with the Pittsburgh Symphony in 1995, Timothy Adams also serves on the faculty of Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh as Associate Professor of Music. In addition, he teaches percussion at the Brevard Music Center in North Carolina and gives master classes and recitals both in the U.S. and abroad. Adams is a regular guest lecturer at the University of Chile and will conduct a South American percussion master class in Patagonia, Argentina next year. He has played solo performances with the Atlanta Symphony, the Indianapolis Symphony and the Florida Philharmonic, and has recorded with the Cleveland Orchestra, Atlanta Symphony and Indianapolis Symphony, where he served as Principal Timpanist (1991–95). Adams has been featured on the television show Mister Rogers' Neighborhood and also played in the rock band Exotic Birds, which recorded two albums and a music video for MTV.

GUSTAVO AGUILAR WEDNESDAY 12:00 P.M.

A percussionist, composer and improviser dedicated to contemporary creative music, Gustavo Aguilar has performed his own improvisational compositions and works written exclusively for him in Australia, Austria, Macedonia, Yugoslavia, South Korea and the United States. He is Composer-in-Residence with the Cleveland-based Groundworks Dance/Theater. Aguilar is also active with his own improvisational percussion duo Zendin with South Korean percussionist Je Chun Park. He has performed and/or recorded with such artists as John Bergamo, Roy Campbell, Nels Cline, Vinnie Golia, Kang Tae Hwan and Wadada Leo Smith. His solo CD Dreaming with Serpents was released on the Acoustic Levitation label. Aguilar has served on the faculty at Del Mar College/Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Korea National University of Arts and the University of Akron, and he has given master classes at universities across the country.

KEITH A. ALEO SATURDAY 3:00 P.M.

Since 1989, Keith A. Aleo has been a member of the percussion section of the Florida Philharmonic Orchestra. He is also director of Percussion Studies at Florida International University and spends his summers on the faculty at the Interlochen Arts Camp in Interlochen, Michigan. Aleo authored the solo snare drum book *Advanced Snare Drum Etudes* and is a contributing composer for the snare drum duet book *Performance Studies for Two*, both published by HoneyRock, Inc. He is also contributing editor for the *Encyclopedia of Percussion Instruments* (Garland Publishing). Aleo has recorded for the Harmonia Mundi, Spectrum and Word Records, and his chamber percussion duo Atlantis is currently performing

and commissioning new works. Aleo received the PAS Outstanding Chapter President Award in 1994 for his five years as President of the Florida PAS Chapter, for which he continues to serve as Secretary.

GIDEON FOLI ALORWOYIE

High priest of the Yewe Cult, Gideon Foli Alorwoyie is regarded as one of Ghana's foremost virtuosos of traditional music and dance, having toured the world as a member of the Ghana National Dance Ensemble. He is Assistant Professor of Music at the University of North Texas where he holds the position of master drummer and artistic director of the UNT African Percussion Ensemble. Alorwoyie is also founder and artistic director of the Chicago-based African-American Unity Ensemble. His recent projects have included performances at the Ghana Fest in Chicago as well as master classes at the New England Conservatory in Boston. Alorwoyie held positions at the American Conservatory of Music and at the Old Town School of Folk Music in Chicago, and from 1967-84 he worked in the Department of African Studies at the University of Ghana as chief master drummer of the Ghana National Dance Ensemble.

RUBEN P. ALVAREZ

Chicago-based Latin percussionist, drumset artist, composer and producer Ruben P. Alvarez has over a quarter-of-a-century of professional touring and recording experience. 
ROBBY AMEEN

Widely recognized as one of the greatest drummers in rock 'n' roll, Kenny Aronoff is an Associate Professor at Indiana University as well as one of the most in-demand musicians in the world. He has worked with some of the biggest names in the music industry, including John Mellencamp, Bob Seger, Elton John, Bob Dylan, Bonnie Raitt, the Smashing Pumpkins and many others. Aronoff has recently been recording with Joe Cocker, Melissa Etheridge, Ricky Martin, Andy Griggs, Josh Joplin, Billy Dean and a new band called PETE. With his style of playing that combines power with finesse, he has been named the #1 Pop/ Rock Drummer numerous times by the readers of Modern Drummer magazine. Aronoff was also part of an exhibit at the Children's Museum of Indianapolis, which ran through June 2001.

BILLY ASHBAUGH SATURDAY 9:00 A.M.

Since 1997, Billy Ashbaugh has been touring and recording with 'NSync. He has also backed such artists as Britney Spears and Jordan Knight and recorded tracks for Aaron Carter. Ashbaugh recently collaborated with Bob Gatzen on the next video in Gatzen's *Inspiring Drumming* series (released by Warner Bros.). As a follow-up to the video, Warner Bros. will also release an "In Session" play-along CD for drums, featuring some of 'NSync's songs from their HBO Live Concert Special. In addition to promoting his video and play-along CD, Ashbaugh is involved with a drum-loop CD project and recording tracks for Pat Benatar. He has toured with recording artist Snap (1992–95) and recorded two funk-rock demo albums for Turbo B.

ANDERS ÅSTRAND THURSDAY 10:00 A.M.

Percussionist and composer Anders Åstrand has toured and performed extensively throughout the USA, Europe, and Australia. He also performs as a percussion soloist with numerous Swedish choirs. Together with American saxophonists Susan Fancher and Mark Engebretson, he formed the trio Engebretson/Fancher/Åstrand, which plays both composed music and free improvisations. In his compositions, Åstrand focuses on improvisation with both the soloist and the percussion ensemble. In 1999, the Spanish percussion ensemble Amores commissioned

"Rauk" for solo vibraphone and three percussionists and another piece, "Purge" for percussion ensemble and vibraphone, was broadcast by the Swedish Radio. Åstrand, together with Björn Meyer (bass) and Martin Löfgren (drums), formed the Like One trio in 1996. In 1999, the trio toured in Sweden with Double Image percussionists Dave Samuels and David Friedman. For the past three years, Åstrand has served as President of the PAS Swedish Chapter.

GEORGE BARRETT

Currently the CEO of Innovative Percussion and Host of PASIC 2001, George Barrett is also a member of the PAS Marching Percussion Committee and serves as the Tennessee PAS Chapter President. He was the Director of Marketing, Educational Percussion Products for the Pearl Corporation from 1994–99, and held the dual roles as Marketing Manager, Marching Percussion and Artist Relations at Remo, Inc. from 1989-94. Barrett also served as an Adjunct Professor of Percussion at Pasadena City College of Music. His teaching experience includes the Democratic Convention High School Band (1988), the 1988 Super Bowl Super Band, the Statue of Liberty All American College Marching Band (1986), the Bayonne Bridgemen Drum and Bugle Corps (1985) and the University of Southern California Trojan Marching Band. He has performed on television soundtracks for The Captain EO Special, the mini-series Amerika, the 1987 Special Olympics Opening Ceremonies and the Walt Disney 20th Anniversary Special. Barrett has written several articles for Percussive Notes, and his snare drum solo "Rudimental Heights" is published by Per-mus Publications.

JOHN H. BECK THURSDAY 8:00 P.M.

Past President of PAS as well as New York State PAS Chapter President and Vice-President, John H. Beck is Professor of Percussion at the Eastman School of Music, his alma mater. He is also the Timpanist with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, where he has made many solo appearances. Beck has also appeared as soloist with the Eastman Wind Ensemble and has performed with and conducted many percussion ensembles. As a composer, his works have been published by leading publishing companies and recorded for CRI, Turnabout, Mark Records and Heritage Records. Beck has written many articles on percussion for leading music journals, is the editor of Encyclopedia of Percussion and has written several instruction books for snare drum, drumset and timpani. He has also taught numerous percussion clinics around the world. Beck was inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 1999.

Currently serving as president of the North Carolina PAS Chapter, John R. Beck is on the faculty of the North Carolina School of the Arts and a percussionist



He has served on the faculties of the Universities of Utah, Colorado and Nevada and has presented clinics throughout the U.S. and abroad. PEGGY BENKESER WEDNESDAY 2:00 P.M.

Peggy Benkeser is co-founder and artistic co-director of Thamyris, New Music Group which has commissioned and premiered over 80 new compositions for mixed chamber ensemble since its inception in 1987. Her current solo project, "Kitchen Chaos," is a new music theater work featuring recently commissioned percussion solos by Steven Mackey, Pauline Oliveros, Janice Giteck, Alvin Singleton, Steve Everett and Frank Hannaway. Musical styles featured include interactive electronics, jazz improvisation and world music. The premiere will be in Atlanta on February 16, 2002 with a national tour to follow. As a dedicated music educator, Benkeser conducts residencies, workshops, master classes and performances at public and private schools throughout the U.S. She is an Artist in Education for the Georgia Council for the Arts and Young Audiences of Atlanta as well as an artistaffiliate at Emory University in Atlanta.

JOHN BERGAMO THURSDAY 2:00 P.M., FRIDAY 11 A.M.

Percussionist, composer and conductor John Bergamo has been coordinator of the percussion program at California Institute of the Arts since 1970. His diverse musical involvements include concerts with John McLaughlin's Shakti, performing in Frank Zappa's Abnuceals Emukka Orchestra, recording with Ali Akbar Khan and a tour to the Soviet Union with Robert Shaw, to name only a few. Bergamo continues to be involved in contemporary music performance, studio work and non-EuroAmerican music performance. Incorporating many of the styles that have influenced him, he has co-founded two all-percussion groups: The Repercussion Unit in 1976 with Larry Stein, Ed Mann, James Hildebrandt, Greg Johnson, Paul Anceau and Steven "Lucky" Mosko, and The Hands On'Semble in 1997 with Andrew Grueschow, Randy Gloss and Austin Wrinkle.

GREG BEYER SATURDAY 9:00 A.M.

Currently pursuing his DMA at the Manhattan School of Music, Greg Beyer is a specialist in contemporary classical music performance and also maintains an active performance schedule in a variety of endeavors. As a soloist, he collaborates with composers on new works for percussion. As a chamber musician, he has performed with Speculum Musicae, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, NewBand, Absolute Ensemble and the S.E.M. Ensemble. Beyer regularly performs pop and jazz music, combining world percussion influences into his drumset playing. Due to his interest in Brazilian music, he has been to Salvador, Bahia, to study capoeira and the berimbau. Beyer leads and composes for The Art Department jazz quartet, which recently recorded its first CD. In 1998, Beyer won a Stipendpreis at the Darmstadt International Festival of Contemporary Music and was invited back to participate in the Course of 2000.

DAVE BLACK SATURDAY 4:00 P.M.

Percussionist/composer Dave Black serves as the Director of Instrumental Music for Alfred Publishing Company. A prolific composer and arranger, more than 50 of his compositions and arrangements have been published by Alfred Publishing, Barnhouse, CPP/Belwin and Warner Bros. Black has written for the bands of Louie Bellson, Sammy Nestico, Ed Shaughnessy and the California State University-Northridge Jazz Ensemble. He is the co-author of several books including Alfred's Drum Method, Books 1 & 2, Alfred's Beginning Drumset Method, Contemporary Brush Techniques, Cymbals: A Crash Course and The Essential Dictionary of Orchestration. Black has also written articles and reviews for Down Beat, The Instrumentalist, Modern Drummer, Modern Percussionist, Drums and Drumming and Drum Tracks. He served on the PAS Board of Directors for six years, was a member of the Sustaining Members Advisory Council, and hosted PASIC '91 in Anaheim, California.

JOHN BLACKWELL, JR.

The son of a professional drummer, John Blackwell, Jr. is currently performing with Prince and The New Power Generation, and he appears on Prince's newly released album, The Rainbow Children. He spent three months as the drummer for teen pop star Utada Hikaru on her Bohemian Summer 2000 Nationwide Tour of Japan and can also be heard on the song "Parody" from her recent album Distance. Blackwell has played with the funk group Cameo as well as with Patti Labelle, including her Grammy-winning CD, VHS and DVD Patti Labelle Live: One Night Only. During his years at Berklee College of Music (1992–95), he played every week with jazz saxophonist Herman Johnson at Ryles Cafe in Cambridge, Mass. Blackwell was featured in the cover story of the October 2001 issue of *Modern Drummer* magazine.

BRADY BLADE AND BRIAN BLADE FRIDAY 11:00 A.M.

Growing up in a musical household in Shreveport, Louisiana, brothers Brady and Brian Blade became two very different drummers. Older brother Brady has performed with Emmylou Harris, Jewel and Indigo

Girls, and has been the "guy-to-get" for cutting-edge artists who go beyond the labels of alternative, rock, country or world music. His understated approach to drumming uses silence as part of his artistic pallet. Younger brother Brian has applied his musical discipline and balance with such diverse artists as Joni Mitchell, Kenny Garrett and Wayne Shorter in addition to his own ground-breaking ensemble, Brian Blade Fellowship. Since moving to New York City, Brian has successfully utilized his jazz style to become one of the "first-call" studio and live players in the city.

JOEL BLUESTONE WEDNESDAY 12:00 P.M.

Dr. Joel Bluestone is a Professor of Music at Portland State University where he has been the head of the percussion department for the past 12 years. He is entering his tenth year as Co-Founder/Percussionist with the Northwest premiere contemporary new music ensemble Fear No Music. Bluestone is also the Principal Timpanist with Sinfonia Concertante Orchestra and has been the Principal Timpanist with the Missouri Symphony. He received his B.A. from the University of California at San Diego and his M.M. and D.M.A. from the State University of New York at Stonybrook. His principal teachers have been the contemporary percussionists Raymond Des Roches, Jean-Charles Francios and Richard Horowitz, Principal Timpanist of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra.

ROSS BOLTON SATURDAY 11:00 A.M.

In addition to being Al Jarreau's guitar player, Ross Bolton has recorded or performed with Rick Braun, David Benoit, The Beach Boys, Sheena Easton, Nell Carter and Donny Osmond, to name just a few. His TV and movie credits include The Larry Sanders Show. Fridays, The Jeff Foxworthy Show and Two Guys, a Girl & a Pizza Place. Bolton has been on the staff of

The Musicians Institute in Los Angeles for many years and presents seminars and clinics around the world.

TERRY BOZZIO THURSDAY 5:00 P.M.

Best known for his playing with Missing Persons and Frank Zappa, Terry Bozzio has also played with the Marin and Napa (California) Symphonies as well as jazz musicians Pete Escovedo, Art Lande, Eddie Henderson, Julian Priester and Woody Shaw, and he has done recording projects and/or tours with the Brecker Brothers, UK, the Lonely Bears, Mick Jagger, Deborah Harry and Jeff Beck. He has released several solo drumming videos and CDs, including the recent Solos & Duets video and Alternate Duets CDs. which feature Bozzio with Chad Wackerman. Bozzio frequently performs solo drumset concerts and clinics around the world, and recently played several of his solo drumset compositions in performance with the Louisville Ballet.

BRITAIN/MOORE DUO

SATURDAY 12:00 P.M.

Formed in 1985 at Wichita State University, the Britain/ Moore Duo—Mat Britain and Dan Moore—combine steel pans, marimba and percussion to create jazz, Calypso, Latin and African music in their trademark mix of acoustic and electronic percussion. Cricket City, the BMD's first CD, showcases their writing, arranging and performing skills.

Mat Britain has performed with the Amoco Renegades Steel Band at the Panorama Festival. Based in Nashville, he leads his popular steel band Deep Grooves and is also active in the recording industry. From 1996 to 1999, Britain was percussionist with Grammy Award-winning country/pop artist Lee Greenwood, and he was the first percussionist to grace the famous Grand Ole Opry stage.

Dan Moore is the Percussion Area Head at the

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University of Iowa, where he focuses on the MIDI-marimba, a setup that augments the acoustic sounds of the marimba with electronically-triggered sounds. His diverse artistic outlets are showcased on his CD *Jungle Fever: Dan Moore plays the music of Dick Schory*, a collection of updated arrangements from Schory's popular 1960s-vintage Percussion Pops Orchestra.

DON BUCHLA WEDNESDAY 2:00 P.M.

Educated in physics, physiology, and music, Don Buchla's multi-faceted creativity has been applied to fields as diverse as space biophysics research, musical instrument design and multi-media composition. Much of his work has centered on the refinement of communication channels between man and machine, notably the design of interactive electronic musical instruments and high level music languages. Buchla founded the alternative band Fried Suck, was a founding member of the 15-piece Arch Ensemble, and co-founded the Electric Weasel Ensemble and the Muse and the Fuse. He has collaborated with such luminaries as Ami Radunskaya, David Rosenboom, Anthony Braxton, David Wessel, Susan Rawcliff, Mark Goldstein, Morton Subotnick, Wendy Reid, George Lewis, David Keane, Joel Davel, and his son, Ezra Buchla. Buchla is currently developing exotic controllers that provide expressive alternatives to traditional musical input devices and some of his recent inventions include Thunder, Lightning II, the Marimba Lumina and the Piano Bar.

MICHAEL R. BUMP WEDNESDAY 11:00 A.M.

Michael R. Bump is Director of Percussion Studies and Assistant Professor at Truman State University. He has held the position of Principal Timpanist with the Ars Nova Chamber Orchestra, Asheville Symphony Orchestra and the Cullowhee Music Festival, and served as Percussionist/Assistant Timpanist with the Memphis Symphony and Opera Orchestras, Chicago City Ballet and Columbus Symphony Orchestra. Bump served as Percussion Coordinator/Arranger for the Memphis Blues Drum and Bugle Corps and taught the University of Illinois Indoor Drumline. He was a founding member of the I-Pan Steel Ensemble, arranging and co-producing the group's debut CD in 1994. Bump's music is published by Arrangers Publishing, Studio 4 Productions and Music for Percussion, and he has written articles for *Percussive Notes* and The Instrumentalist. Bump has served as PAS Chapter President in both South Carolina and Mississippi, and is a member of the PAS New Music/Research and College Pedagogy Committees.

MICHAEL BURRITT THURSDAY 2:00 P.M.

Associate Professor and Director of Percussion Studies in the School of Music at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, Michael Burritt is a permanent guest professor at the Musikhogskolan in Pitea, Swe-

den, as well as a member of the faculty for the Chautauqua Summer Music School. Specializing in marimba, he has given concerts and lectures throughout the U.S., Canada, Europe, Australia and Asia. Burritt has released two solo recordings, *Perpetual* and *Shadow Chasers*, and is working on his third, *Azure*, with Resonator Records. He is also active as a composer, having written two books of etudes as well as numerous solo and chamber works for solo marimba, solo percussion and percussion ensemble (published with C. Alan Publications, Keyboard Percussion Publications, Ludwig Music Publishing and Innovative Percussion). Burritt is a member of the PAS Board of Directors and a contributing editor for *Percussive Notes*.

THOMAS BURRITT

FRIDAY 3:00 P.M.

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Dr. Thomas Burritt is currently Assistant Professor of Percussion at the University of Texas. Prior to his move to Austin, he was Assistant Professor of Percussion at the University of Central Arkansas and President of the Arkansas PAS Chapter. Burritt also served as Principal Percussionist/ Timpanist with the Conway (Arkansas) Symphony Orchestra and was a member of the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra. He was a finalist in the first Leigh Howard Stevens International Marimba Competition (1995) and the PAS Solo Marimba Contest (PASIC '92). Burritt has presented recitals, master classes and clinics throughout the U.S. and can be heard as guest soloist on two CD recordings: Hasenproject and Clarinet Unlimited: Kelly Johnson, Clarinet. He performed Eugene O'Brien's "Rhyme and Reason" during New Music/Research Day at PASIC 2000 in Dallas.

BILL CAHN THURSDAY 2:00 P.M.

A native of Philadelphia, Bill Cahn is a founding member of Nexus, performing on concerts, films, recordings, and broadcasts worldwide. He was also the Principal Percussionist in the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra from 1968–95 and has appeared as soloist with orchestras and at music festivals around the globe. Cahn's compositions for solo and ensemble percussion are published by HoneyRock Publishing and Marimba Productions, Inc. His works for Nexus and orchestra have been performed by symphonies in Atlanta, Cleveland, Detroit, Dallas, the National Arts Centre/Ottawa, Rochester, Toronto and Taipei. Cahn has produced six compact discs, including two with Nexus and Orchestra—Bill Moyers Narrates the Story of Percussion In the Orchestra (1992) and VOICES (1994)—and one, The Solo Percussionist (1996), containing his own compositions. He was an artist-in-residence (1998–99) at Showa University in Atsugi, Japan. With Nexus, he was inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 1999.

RUTH CAHN THURSDAY 2:00 P.M.

Ruth Cahn served as a percussionist with the Roches-

ter Philharmonic Orchestra for 33 years. She is currently Director of the Summer Session for the Eastman School of Music, where she is also the Jack Frank Instructor of Percussion in the Community Education Division and Director of the Music Horizon Program for gifted youth. Cahn has performed with the Chautaugua Symphony, the New Hampshire Music Festival and the Grand Teton Music Festival, and has recorded with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Canadian Brass and the Society for Chamber Music in Rochester. In 1993, she and her husband Bill were named Musicians of the Year by the Rochester Chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon. Cahn also chairs the PAS Education Committee.

CLAYTON CAMERON THURSDAY 11:00 A.M.

Known as the "Brush Master," Clayton Cameron is currently playing drums with Tony Bennett, appearing on six of Bennett's five Grammy-award-winning albums, including Steppin' Out and Tony Bennett Unplugged. He also performed on Bennett's Emmy-award-winning television show *Live by Re*quest. They have performed for presidents and royalty as well as recent collaborations with Billy Joel, Sting, Mariah Carey, Brandy, the Backstreet Boys, James Taylor, K.D. Lang, Elvis Costello and Ricky Martin. Cameron has also worked with Sammy Davis, Jr., Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, George Shearing, Joe Pass and Joe Williams. Cameron released an instructional video The Living Art of Brushes (1990) and designed his own signature brushes for Calato. His new book, Brush Works, will be published by Warner/ Chappell, and he can be heard on Tony Bennett's latest CD, Tony Bennett Sings the Blues.

CARIBBEAN JAZZ PROJECT FRIDAY 9:30 P.M.

A new version of the Caribbean Jazz Project was born in 1999 with **Dave Samuels** on vibes and marimba, Dave Valentin on flutes and Steve Khan on electric guitar. They will be joined at PASIC 2001 by bass player Ruben Rodriguez, conga player Richie Flores, and Dafnis Prieto on a combination drumkit/timbale setup. Their two most recent CDs— Paraiso (2001) and New Horizons (2000)—were released on Concord Records. The original CJP—featuring Samuels, Paquito D'Rivera on soprano and alto saxophones and clarinet, and Andy Narell on steel pan, along with a rhythm section of piano, bass and drums—was formed in 1993 and toured around the world. Their two earlier albums are on the Heads Up label: Island Stories (1997) and The Caribbean Jazz Project (1996). The ensemble performs a melting pot of rhythms from Latin America, Brazil, the Caribbean and Cuba, combining island sounds with the language of jazz in a unique Latin jazz band.

CARIBBEAN SOUND STEEL BAND THURSDAY 11:00 A.M.

Blending the music of calypso, soca, reggae, samba, mambo and jazz, Caribbean Sound—Barry

Olsavsky, Mike Wilson, Sean Tarleton and **Danny Stimpson**—was founded in 1986 by Olsavsky, Wilson and Charlotte Mabrey, Professor of Percussion at the University of North Florida and Principal Percussionist with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra. This unique quartet performs on vintage "Pan Around the Neck" steel drums crafted by Ellie Mannette and the University Tuning Project at West Virginia University. Using a single lead, single second and bass boom with added percussion, these drums recreate the days when panmen marched through the streets of Port of Spain, Trinidad. Caribbean Sound has performed with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra and presented concerts at numerous schools as part of their third year with the Florida State Touring Program. Their two recordings, 1994's Panic Attack and last year's J'Ouvert Comin', are available through their Web site: www.CaribbeanSound.net

RAYNOR CARROLL Friday 12:00 p.m.

Since 1983, Raynor Carroll has been playing timpani and percussion for the Los Angeles Philharmonic, where he has performed under such conductors as Carlo-Maria Giulini, André Previn, Esa-Pekka Salonen, Leonard Bernstein, Pierre Boulez, Sir Simon Rattle and Zubin Mehta. Carroll performs regularly on the Philharmonic's New Music Group and Chamber Music



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series and has been a featured soloist with various southern California orchestras. 

ANTHONY DI SANZA


THURSDAY 8:00 P.M.

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
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

SATURDAY 4:00 P.M.






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


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D'ARCY PHILIP GRAY WEDNESDAY 3:00 P.M.

RUSSELL HARTENBERGER THURSDAY 2:00 P.M.

Russell Hartenberger is Professor of Percussion at the University of Toronto and performs regularly with the Steve Reich Ensemble. He is a founding member of Nexus, which was inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 1999, and has appeared as featured performer with the New York Philharmonic, Boston Symphony, Philadelphia Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra, London Symphony, Israel Philharmonic, Cologne Radio Orchestra, Toronto Symphony and with other leading orchestras in North America. As a new-music soloist. Hartenberger has performed in Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver and Tokyo. He has performed with the Oklahoma City Symphony, as xylophone soloist with the U.S. Air Force Band, as percussionist with the Paul Winter Consort, at the Marlboro Music Festival, and as timpanist with the Canadian Opera Company. 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


RICK MAROTTA SATURDAY 11:00 A.M.

compass television commercials for GTE, numerous local demos and a variety of album projects, including fusion group the Testostertones, blues artists Jerry Lightfoot and Travis Doyle, folk singer Marienne Kreitlow and jazz pianist Paul English. Metcalfe has recently recorded new CDs featuring Ed Calle and David Liebman. He has also performed as a section percussionist for the El Paso and Amarillo Symphonies and instructed the drum line at Rice University.

MICHAEL MIZMA FRIDAY 10:00 A.M., SATURDAY 8:00 P.M.

In 1990. Michael Mizma began teaching percussion. MIDI and electronic music, audio engineering, music theory, introductory music history, music fundamentals, and multimedia technology at San Jacinto College Central in Pasadena, Texas, where he also established an Afro-Cuban ensemble and a steel band. In addition, Mizma founded two Caribbean jazz groups, Tropic Envoy and Tropical Beat, in which he performs regularly on steel pan, drumset, MalletKAT and percussion. Currently on the faculty at the Meistersinger Konservatorium (Hochscule) in Nürnberg, Germany, vibraphonist Bill Molenhof has also taught at the Berklee College of Music, Manhattan School of Music, Ithaca College and Temple University. Since his 1983 European debut at the Tuebingen Germany International Festival with drummer Ed Thigpen, he has been featured in Germany, France, Austria, Holland, England, Norway, Denmark, Poland, the Czech Republic, Ukraine, Brazil, Uruguay and Australia as well as throughout North America. DAN MOORE THURSDAY 10:00 A.M.

Dan Moore is Percussion Area Head at the University of Iowa. His performance energies focus on the MIDImarimba, a setup that augments the acoustic sounds of the marimba with electronically-triggered sounds. Moore's diverse artistic outlets include a percussion/banio duo playing 1970s pop music and an

all-percussion jazz quartet. STANTON MOORE FRIDAY 4:00 P.M.

Drummer Stanton Moore performs approximately 200 days a year with the popular New Orleans funk band Galactic. The band's fourth album, We Love 'em Tonight - Live at Tipitina's, was released in July and Moore's second solo effort, Flyin' the Coop (following his first release All Kooked Out), will be distributed by the Verve Music Group this fall. He was featured at Modern Drummer's Festival Weekend last May and at the Montreal Drum Festival. Moore also plays regularly with his solo project "Moore and More." LUIGI MORLEO WEDNESDAY 11:00 A.M.

Since 1995, percussionist and composer Luigi Morleo has taught percussion at the Conservatory N. Piccinni in Bari, Italy. He served as the timpanist and percussionist with the Symphonic Orchestra from Bari from 1992–94 and as a percussionist with the Orchestra Autonomous Petruzzelli Theater from Bari from 1987-91. Morleo has also collaborated with RAI Sinphonic Orchestra in Milano under conductor L. Berio. As a guest soloist or conductor, he has performed at numerous international festivals in Europe and the U.S.

Morleo has composed and conducted music for various films and has three CD recordings for Classical CM from Bari and Raimbow of Treviso. HIDEMI MURASE FRIDAY 12:00 P.M.

A graduate of the Tokyo College of Music, Hidemi Murase studied percussion and marimba with Atsushi Sugahara. He is an active member of The Percussion Museum and has performed as marimba soloist with the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and Professional Orchestra, which have held joint concerts and recitals in Japan and abroad as well as participated in both national and international tours. Murase gave the world premiere of a special composition written by highly acclaimed Japanese composer Toshi Ichiyanagi. Drummer Lewis Nash rapidly joined the ranks of firstcall players after his move to New York City in 1981 from college life in Arizona. 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Terry, Sonny Rollins, Wynton and Branford Marsalis, Ron Carter, Don Pullen, Cyrus Chestnut, Don Friedman, Kenny Drew, Jr., Roland Hanna, Steve Turre, Kenny Burrell, Russell Malone, Oscar Peterson, Bud Shank, Scott Hamilton, McCoy Tyner, Jackie McLean, Horace Silver and Bette Midler. Nash has appeared on nearly 200 albums including *Rhythm Is My Business*, the only recording under his name. He also leads his own working sextet.

NEXUS

Friday 4:00 p.m., Saturday 8:00 p.m.

Celebrating their 30th anniversary season in 2001, the five members of Nexus—Bob Becker, Bill Cahn, Robin Engelman, Russell Hartenberger and **John Wyre**—continue to delight audiences with a repertoire that includes contemporary percussion masterworks, ragtime, world music, group improvisations and compositions by the group's members. Nexus has garnered international acclaim for performances of their signature piece, Takemitsu's "From me flows what you call Time." A recording of this work featuring Nexus and the Pacific Symphony has been released on the Sony label. Last February, the group premiered "Shadowman" by Canadian composer R. Murray Schafer, and this season the group is premiering a new work by Conni Ellisor being written for Nexus and the Nashville Chamber Orchestra. Nexus

Christopher Norton is Professor of Music and Director of Percussion Studies at Belmont University in Nashville, Tennessee. Born and raised in Nigeria, Babutunde Olatunji performs with Drums of Passion, an ensemble he created consisting of singers, dancers and percussionists. In 1991, he formed the percussion ensemble Planet Drum with Mickey Hart, which produced a Grammy Award-winning CD. Olatunji's first album, *Drums of* Passion (1959) has never gone out of print, and he is the co-author of the book African Musical Instruments, Their Origins and Use. Olatunji has been a faculty member at both the Esalen Institute in California and the Omega Institute in New York. One of his greatest achievements is the establishment of the Olatunji Center of African Culture, which provides a wide range of cultural subjects for adults and children. Olatunji's honors include being named Impresario of the Ghana Dance Ensemble, the presentation of an honorary doctoral degree from Medgar Evers College, and being inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame (2001).

JOHN W. PARKS, IV THURSDAY 9:00 A.M.

Professor of Percussion at the University of Kansas, John W. Parks, IV earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Percussion Performance and Literature degree from the Eastman School of Music. He performed as Principal Percussionist with the Eastman Wind Ensemble on their 2000 tour of Japan and Taiwan and has also served as Principal Timpanist of the Schlossfestspiele Orchestra in Heidelberg, Germany. Parks has played with the Alabama Symphony Orchestra as an extra percussionist and has recorded two CDs with the music group Proclaim. He holds two master's degrees from Northwestern University (one each in percussion performance and jazz pedagogy) and a bachelor's degree in music education from Furman University.

PERCUSSION GROUP CINCINNATI WEDNESDAY 10:00 A.M.

Founded in 1979, Percussion Group Cincinnati consists of Allen Otte, James Culley and Russell Burge, all of whom are faculty members and ensemble-in-residence at the College-Conservatory of Music of the University of Cincinnati. The group has appeared at major festivals, concert halls and schools across America, Europe and Asia, with recent performances at the 2001 Shanghai International Spring Music Festival and a tour of Japan. Over the past 20 years, many young composers from the U.S., Latin America, Europe, Africa and Asia have created a large body of new and often experimental music for Percussion Group Cincinnati. Their work appears on various CDs, including their own Ars Moderno label, and they are currently completing a CD of the percussion music of Qu Xiao-song as well as contributing to

GORDON PETERS THURSDAY 9:00 A.M., FRIDAY 12:00 P.M.

Appointed to the Chicago Symphony by Fritz Reiner in 1959, Gordon Peters retired as Principal Percussionist and Assistant Principal Timpanist in January 2001. He also taught at Northwestern University (1963-68), served as Conductor and Administrator of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago (training orchestra of the CSO) from 1965–87, was the Music Director of the Elmhurst Symphony (1968–73) and was an Assistant Conductor of the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra for 20 years. Peters composed the popular "Swords of Moda-Ling" for percussion ensemble, as well as several works for marimba ensemble. He authored and published a 368-page treatise on percussion. The Drummer: Man. While attending the Eastman School of Music, Peters founded the Marimba Masters and the septet performed on radio and TV programs with Arthur Godfrey and Ed Sullivan. A former member of the U.S. Military Academy Band at West Point, he served as the first President of PAS (1962–66).

PAT PETRILLO SATURDAY 12:00 P.M.

As the drummer for jazz guitarist Ed Hamilton, Pat Petrillo can be heard on Hamilton's latest release, Hear in the Now (Fahrenheit) and has appeared live at numerous jazz festivals as well as on the BET on Jazz TV show. He also performs and records with pop singer Glen Burtnik, including on the recently released Palookaville (Decco). Petrillo has backed Patti LaBelle as well as Patty Smyth and Phoebe Snow. A veteran show drummer, he has played in Broadway productions of "Footloose," "Grease" and "A Chorus Line" as well as the national tour of "Dreamgirls." As an educator and clinician, Petrillo is known for his instructional video Snare Drum Rudiments (Warner Bros.) along with his new release, Complete Drum Workout. He has also taught at Drummers Collective in New York City and has his own Web site. www.patpetrillo.com

JOHN S. PRATT THURSDAY 3:00 P.M.

A 1990 inductee into the World Drum Corps Hall of Fame, John S. Pratt recently released his latest book *Rudimental Solos for Accomplished Drummers* through Meredith Music. He was a member of the United States Military Academy Band where he served as the Rudimental Drum Instructor/Arranger for the Field Music section of the band until his retirement from the Army in 1969. Pratt's first three drumming publications—14 Modern Contest Solos, Ancient Rudimental Snare & Bass Drum Solos and 128 Rudimental Street Beats—were published by Belwin in 1959, followed by his 26 Standard American Drum Rudiments and The New Pratt Book. In addition to writing, he was a member of the New York Chapter of the All-American Associate of Contest Judges as well

as the National Association of Rudimental Drummers. Pratt was part of the Hawthorne Caballeros' instructional staff from 1971–81, winning three American Legion National and four DCA World Championships.

Larry Ferguson (WKU BM '99) recently completed his M.M. degree at The University of Michigan and now resides in Nashville where he freelances and is personnel manager for the Nashville Chamber Orchestra. Kris Keeton (WKU BM '01) is a Master's Performance major at Northwestern University. Jason **Gottfried** is a senior performance major at WKU. **Aaron Hunt** spent his first two years at WKU as a performance major before transferring to Ohio State University this fall to complete his undergraduate curriculum. All members of Project 166 studied with Dr. Christopher Norton during his tenure at WKU (1987– 2001).

JOHNNY RABB THURSDAY 9:00 A.M.

Clinician Johnny Rabb earned the distinction of "World's Fastest Drummer," as recognized by the Guinness World Records, by playing 1,071 single strokes in 60 seconds on a live broadcast of VH1's Rock and Roll Record Breakers. Rabb has played with Tanya Tucker and Hank Williams III as well as performed at the recent KOSA festival with Steve Smith, Gordon Gottlieb, Horacio Hernandez and Giovanni Hidalgo. He is also writing and developing children's books, videos and educational workshops. During his years at Berklee College of Music, Rabb invented The RhythmSaw and shares, along with coowner Gerald Hooper, in the design and manufacturing of drumsticks and percussion accessories under the company name johnnyraBB Drumsticks.

SALVATORE RABBIO THURSDAY 9:00 A.M., SATURDAY 1:00 P.M.

From 1958 until his retirement in 1998, Salvatore Rabbio held the position of Principal Timpanist with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. During that time he also served as Adjunct Professor of Timpani at the University of Michigan (1987–98) and as the head of the Percussion Department and director of the percussion ensemble at Wayne State University in Detroit (1962–86). Rabbio performed world premieres of several concertos for timpani and orchestra, and as a member of the DSO, toured extensively and recorded on the Mercury, Columbia, RCA London and Chandos labels. He was formerly a member of the Boston Per-

cussion Ensemble and was soloist with the Boston Pops and toured with Arthur Fiedler. As an active clinician, Rabbio has been featured at three previous PASICs and has been guest lecturer at many of the world's leading universities and conservatories.

PAUL RENNICK SATURDAY 10:00 A.M.

A member of the percussion faculty at the University of North Texas since 1990, Paul Rennick has become a leading figure in indoor marching percussion through teaching, writing and arranging for the country's most successful percussion ensembles. As Director of the UNT Indoor Drumline, he has written and designed six PAS National Championship shows since 1989. Rennick is currently the Percussion Caption Head and Arranger with the Carolina Crown Drum and Bugle Corps and served as the Director of Percussion and Percussion Manager for the recent Broadway production of BLAST! He is an active arranger and instructor for schools across the U.S. and Canada, including four-time PAS National Champions Marcus High School, three time PAS runner-ups Plano High School and 1996 WGI National Champion John Overton High School. Rennick is a member of the PAS Marching Committee.

TOMM ROLAND WEDNESDAY 10:00 A.M.

Percussionist Tomm Roland is an Assistant Professor of Percussion/Multicultural Music at the University of Nebraska, Omaha where he is Coordinator of Percussion Studies and teaches courses in musics of the world. He has given solo performances throughout California, New Jersey, Nebraska, New York and at the American Consulate in Chennai. India. In 1998. he was awarded a Fulbright grant to study the classical drumming of Southern India. NEY GABRIEL ROSAURO THURSDAY 8:00 P.M.



Drawing inspiration from many sources including classical, rock, jazz, Asia, Latin America and Africa, Joseph Waters is a member of the first generation of American composers who came to classical music through rock 'n' roll. He is equally comfortable in the worlds of traditional acoustic as well as contemporary electronic composition. Waters' works are regularly performed throughout the world. During the past two years performances have taken him to Russia, China, Argentina, Hong Kong, Spain, Mexico and Hungary. His recent composition "Flamehead" (for percussion solo and electronics) is a humble offering to Changó, the god of lightning and thunder. Waters studied composition at Yale University, the University of Minnesota and the University of Oregon.

TOMMY WELLS THURSDAY 10:00 P.M., SATURDAY 10 A.M.

Session drummer Tommy Wells has been a full-time studio musician since 1979. He has worked in studios in L.A., Detroit, Minneapolis, New York, Miami, Orlando, London and Holland. Wells has recorded albums with Ricky Van Shelton, Michael Martin Murphey, Ray Stevens, Kathy Mattea, Don McLean and Gene Cotton. He has done over 150 instrumental tracks for release in Japan with Ventures guitarist Nokie Edwards. In the Christian-music arena, Wells has recorded with The Cathedrals, Singing Americans, Kenny Marks and scores of others. He has also done film soundtracks as well as hundreds of jingles for everything from Hot Wheels to Folger's Coffee. Wells has played on numerous television shows, including Midnight Special, Nashville Now, Music City Tonight and Prime Time Country. He has played with Jimmy Hall for 21 years, including 16 years with the Prisoners of Love.

Student must be an incoming college freshman during the 2002–2003 academic year enrolled in the School of Music at an accredited college or university. Video should not exceed three minutes in length and should demonstrate the player's ability to play at least two different percussion instruments.



Fred Hoey (1920-1994)

Fred Hoey's start in the music industry came at an early age upon winning the 1936 National Rudimental Drummer Competition. His illustrious career in the field of music as an author, clinician, and authority in the world of percussion afforded him many opportunities. In the mid 70s, Fred Hoey launched the CB 700 line of drums and percussion. This unique line was designed by Hoey to service the educational percussion market in a comprehensive way. As Vice President of Sales for C. Bruno in the early 1980s, Hoey created the Gibraltar brand name of drum hardware and initiated its first designs. The mid 80s brought Hoey to oversee the Remo, Inc. San Antonio Distribution Center where he participated in product design, development, and sales direction. Throughout his career, Fred Hoey remained active as a prominent Southwestern performing percussionist. He also wrote several drum methods still in distribution by Mel Bay Publications. He was a charter member of the Percussive Arts Society and an educator whose influence on percussionists continues with the PAS Fred Hoey Memorial Scholarship.

Hall has also taught percussion for other recognized programs such as Klein and Spring High School. Knoxville, IL native and current New York resident Matt Wilson is known for his work as a drummer, composer, recording artist, bandleader, educator, producer and humorist. The Xoc duo was formed in July of 1999 by Juan Martinez and Miguel Gonzalez in Xalapa, Mexico. In August, 2001, Martinez and Gonzalez won first prize for a duo at the International Marimba Competition in Belgium, and part of the prize was the opportunity to perform PASIC 2001 in Nashville. Xoc has also performed in many music festivals during 1999 and 2000, including Percusiones de Latinoamerica and Percusiones del Mundo, organized by the Consejo Nacional para la Cultura y las Artes (CONACULTA) in the Centro Nacional de las Artes in Mexico City, the Junio Musical Festival organized by the University of Veracruz in Xalapa, and in the First International Marimba Festival in Tuxtla Gutiirrez, Chiapas.

Miguel Gonzalez, co-founder and director of Xoc, has been a member of Xalapa Symphony Orchestra since 1998 and a professor at the University of Veracruz, Xalapa since 1993. He was a founding member of the Xalapa Percussion Ensemble in 1989 and performed with them until 1995. Gonzalez has also performed with other groups including the percussion ensemble Tambuco, La Camerata, the Duo Mexico, Le Trio D'Argent and others.

Juan Martinez, a graduate of the University of Veracruz, Xalapa, where he studied with Gonzalez, received his diploma in advanced percussion studies from the Centro Nacional de las Artes and the Instituto Nacional de Bellas Artes in 2000. PERCUSSIVE ARTS SOCIETY HISTORY

uring the late 1950s, it became the custom for a small group of percussionists and interested music directors to gather informally and discuss percussion problems during the Mid-West Band Clinic held each December at Chicago's Sherman House. During the 1960 Clinic, Remo Belli, a member of the group and an exhibitor at the convention, invited the others to dinner at the hotel's restaurant, and during discussion, they developed the idea of forming a percussion organization.

hen Mr. Belli returned home to California, he enlisted the services of Robert Winslow, a professional percussionist and a North Hollywood high school band director, to carry out the details of forming an organization. In early 1961, Mr. Winslow sent a series of letters concerning membership to interested parties. Among the stated goals of the organization were: "to stimulate a greater interest in percussion performance and teaching," and "to promote better teaching of percussion instruments."

In May of 1961, Mr. Winslow sent a letter proclaiming: "We are underway. The Percussive Arts Society is open for business," and in September, the Society sent its first publication, Percussive Arts Society Bulletin, printed on a mimeograph machine donated by Mr. Belli, to the membership.

fter three Bulletins, a determination was made to transfer the administrative and publication duties of the Society to Professor Donald Canedy, who was the percussion instructor and band director at Southern Illinois University. In April of 1963, Mr. Canedy, with the advice of a distinguished editorial board and an able group of contributing editors, published the new PAS journal, Percussionist (in later years called Percussive Notes Research Edition)

in its familiar booklet form. Mr. Canedy served as de facto president through 1964, when, at the December Percussive Arts Society meeting in Chicago, a constitution was adopted and regular officers were elected. Gordon Peters became the first President of PAS; Jack McKenzie took the position of First Vice-President and Mr. Canedy continued as Executive Secretary. Also elected were a Board of Directors and an Editorial Board. With this solid structure, the Society became increasingly influential, expanding its committee activities to address important percussion issues and making policy decisions that would result in important contributions to all areas of percussion.

n important expansion occurred in 1967 when James L. Moore's already successful Percussive Notes became an official PAS publication. Another milestone was achieved in 1969 when the Society was incorporated in Indiana as the Percussive Arts Society, Incorporated, a status it maintained until 1985 when it was reincorporated under the laws of Illinois.

Beginning in 1971, performances and clinics

called "Days of Percussion" were held in conjunction with the yearly business meetings. In 1974, the first Percussive Arts Society National Conference (PASNC) was held in Anaheim and at California State University at Northridge. It was hosted by then-California State Chapter President Lloyd McCausland and Joel Leach of CSU/Northridge. The PASNC evolved into the Percussive Arts Society International Convention that we know today as PASIC. The first PASIC was held in 1976 at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, and was hosted by John Beck, the Eastman School and the New York State Chapter.

t is important to note several significant awards presented annually by the Society. First, since 1972, PAS has inducted some of the most important people in percussion into its Hall of Fame. Secondly, since 1974, the PAS Composition Contest has encouraged the production of hundreds of new works, many of which have become part of the standard percussion repertoire. During the 1990s four additional annual awards were implemented to recognize PAS volunteers and their importance to the society: PAS Outstanding Chapter President Award; Outstanding PAS Supporter Award; PAS President's Industry Award; and Outstanding PAS Service Award.

Thus, the Percussive Arts Society, which began in 1961 as a group of fourteen concerned percussionists,

has grown to more than 6,000 members worldwide, with significant influence on percussion performance, education, composition, publication and manufacturing. Today, the Percussive Arts Society is headquartered in Lawton, Oklahoma, where the administrative offices and its museum of rare and unusual percussion instruments are located in the Society's new building in Elmer Thomas Park. Construction of the building was funded by PAS members and by the McMahon Foundation in Lawton. The grand opening was in August 1992. Phase II of the building project involved the expansion of the museum and was completed in 1995. Phase III of the building project was completed earlier this year, finishing 13,000 square feet of beautiful museum, library and office space.

PERCUSSION ENSEMBLE—CALL FOR TAPES (New FORMAT)

Purpose: The purpose of the Percussive Arts Society Percussion Ensemble—Call for Tapes is to encourage, promote and reward musical excellence in percussion ensemble performance and compositions by selecting the most qualified high school and college/ university percussion ensembles to appear at PASIC.

AWARDS: Four high school and three college/university percussion ensembles will be invited to perform at PASIC 2002 (November 13–16) in Columbus, OH. High school ensembles will be featured in a Festival Concert (Wednesday). 30 minute program (per ensemble) maximum. College/university ensembles will be featured in Showcase Concerts (Thursday, Friday, Saturday). 50 minute program (per ensemble) maximum.

ELIGIBILITY: Ensemble Directors and/or Professional Soloists are not allowed to participate as players on the tape. All ensemble members (excluding non-percussionists, e.g. pianists) must be members of PAS and currently enrolled in school. This will be verified when application materials are received. Ensembles which have been chosen to perform at PASIC may not apply again for three years (resting out 2 PASICS).

PROCEDURES: 1. Send three (3) identical non-edited tapes (cassette/CDs only) to PAS, 701 NW Ferris Ave., Lawton, OK 73507-5442. Tapes should demonstrate literature that you feel is appropriate and not exceed 30 minutes in length. Tapes should include only works that have been performed by the ensemble since January 2001. Include program copy for verification. All compositions and/or movements of music must be performed in their entirety. Tapes/CDs become the property of PAS and will not be returned. Scores (3 identical copies) may be included (optional) to assist the evaluation process. It is the director's responsibility to obtain permission from the publisher(s) for all photocopies of scores. Original scores can be returned only if a prepaid mailer is included. 2. The tapes/CDs will be numbered to ensure anonymity and will then be evaluated by a panel of judges. 3. Invited groups are expected to assume all financial commitments (room, board, travel), organizational responsibilities and to furnish their own equipment. One piano will be provided (if needed) as well as an adequate number of music stands and chairs. PAS will provide an announcement microphone. Additional audio requirements must be provided by the performing ensemble. 4. Ensembles will be notified of the results in June.
