The Venerable Robert Evens

New Bishop of Crediton

During the Summer the Diocese of Exeter announced the name of the new Bishop of Crediton, who will be commencing work at the end of the year.

The Diocese of Exeter is pleased to welcome the appointment of the Venerable Robert Evens as the new Bishop of Crediton. Robert is currently the Archdeacon of Bath.

One of two Suffragan Bishops in the Diocese, Robert will be working alongside the Bishop of Plymouth, the Rt Revd John Garton, and supporting the ministry of the Diocesan Bishop, the Rt Revd Michael Langrish. He will have pastoral responsibility for clergy and lay people across the See of Crediton (north and east Devon) which became vacant on 31st August with the

retirement of Richard Hawkins (who writes this month's Bishop's Letter).

Robert, 57, was born in 1947 in Plymouth, where he lived until he was six. His father joined up with "The Devons" at the beginning of World War II and then entered banking once the war was ended. His career meant a number of moves for the Evens family, including a period in Exeter, where Robert attended Heles School, and a later move to Ilfracombe. Robert followed his father into banking, working at (the now) Nat West in Barnstaple and later in Bristol and Bath, before training for ordination to the priesthood at Trinity College, Bristol. He was ordained deacon in 1977, and priest in 1978. He spent 18 years in Portsmouth Diocese before being invited to take the role of

Fresh Start for Devon Parishes

The Archdeacon of Plymouth, the Ven Tony Wilds, talks about how parishes can deal with the Moving On process as well as addressing current financial difficulties.

The 'Moving On' process to which the diocese is committed is being worked out in a variety of ways as the main thrust of Anglican Church life in Devon. 'Moving On' is not a chance title: it reflects something close to the heart of the Christian faith. The biblical record is of a pilgrim people moving on through history. Indeed, one of the distinctive features of the people of God in the Old Testament was their realisation that the God they worshipped was the Lord of history, who went ahead of his people, calling them to follow as he revealed and established his purposes in the world. They were a pilgrim people as they made their way to the Promised Land; as families and groups they made pilgrimages to the Holy City; they understood life as a pilgrimage - walking with God, yet making their way towards God.

In the New Testament the 'moving on' becomes even clearer. Jesus tells his disciples: "Be on your way..." At the resurrection he says: "Tell my brothers they must leave for Galilee", and when he meets them there he commands: "Go, make disciples of all nations". Still we are called, as

... Archdeacon of Bath in 1996 (by former Bishop of Bath & Wells, the Rt Revd Jim Thompson).

The Bishop of Crediton's role is one of leadership and encouragement. supporting the ministry of both ordained and lay people. He has a lead role in evangelism, teaching and pastoral care. He will also be engaging with social issues facing communities and individuals, and developing partnerships with the wider Church and community representatives. Among the key challenges facing the Diocese of Exeter at the present time are the need to develop new patterns of ministry, based on a clear strategy for mission and the nurturing of Christian discipleship, together with a deepening of the life of prayer.

Commenting on the appointment, Bishop Michael says: "Robert will bring a strong track record in evangelism and shaping the church for mission, in developing new models of ministry and in managing the process of change. He has excellent pastoral skills, is an able liturgist and a good teacher and preacher.

Most of all, Robert comes across as a good and holy man, a loving, prayerful person with deep spiritual awareness and a shining love for Christ."

Robert Evens says: "I feel privileged to be asked to serve as Bishop of Crediton and look forward to serving the churches and communities in the area. In moving back to Devon I feel as if I am 'coming home'."

Robert is an enthusiastic and creative gardener. He also enjoys sailing (having learnt to sail at Starcross as a young man). A former player with Ilfracombe Rugby Club, he is now an armchair rugby enthusiast. He has been married to Sue for 32 years, and has two grown-up children.

During consultation with clergy and accredited lay people on the role of the Bishop of Crediton, there was a strong desire for the Bishop to be more accessible to people living across the Episcopal area (which includes Holsworthy, Hartland, Barnstaple, Tiverton, Honiton, Exeter and the surrounding area and across to Dawlish). The future residence of

the Bishop of Crediton will therefore be in Tiverton, with its excellent road and public transport links.

Robert will be consecrated bishop in Westminster Abbey on 30th November, His installation Bishop of Crediton will be at 3pm on Sunday, December. Exeter Cathedral. His future title will be The Right Reverend Robert Evens, Bishop of Crediton.

OBITUARY

The Reverend Robert Anthony LOVEWELL.

Tony was the first full time Industrial Chaplain to the Devonport Dockyard and neighbouring civilian departments. He was appointed to that post in 1981.

From the beginning Tony became a very popular and well liked personality with all he came into contact, including both management and workforce. He was very well respected by the Trade Unions with whom he had a good rapport. One innovation he introduced was clergy seminars called Church and Theology in Industry. Clergy were invited into the dockyard to learn about the workings of the largest industrial concern in Devon.

At his funeral Martyn Goss, director of the Diocesan Board for Christian Care, said: "Tony was, in the words of someone else, a 'reluctant priest' – maybe less called and more cajoled or prodded by others around him and by God. His enthusiasm for institutional church was not exactly renown! Yet his enthusiasm for people – especially 'ordinary folk' was so tangibly real and purposeful.

Tony attempted to break down many walls in his life, and one of these was the mystique between what happened on the other side of those walls opposite this church, and life in the wider city and the world outside. I would like to say on behalf of us all thank you Tony for so much. An immense thanks for all that you were and all that you stood for. Thank you for all that you shared with us and contributed to our lives in countless ways. We have been touched by a special man whom we shall not forget."

Tony died on 3 July 2004.

...the pilgrim people of God, to move on, individually and as a Church, to move on with our Lord, yet towards our Lord, sharing with others the news of his lordship. The 'Moving On' process is a response to this imperative.

During the next two months there will be an initiative aimed at assisting every parish in the diocese to equip itself better to move on. At a series of occasions spread across Devon, people from every parish (e.g. Clergy, Readers, Churchwardens, Treasurers and others) will be invited to come together with four aims:-

Firstly, they will be able to think together about the way God calls us to move on as a pilgrim people, and what that means for them and the parish they come from.

Secondly, the question of resourcing will be addressed. Our ability to move on is dependent on a range of factors, not least our financial

situation. This in turn is governed by the ability and willingness of parishes to contribute through the Common Fund to the 'family purse' of the diocese, to which all contribute and from which all receive. A 'Fresh Start' will be presented, giving news of a new approach to our Common Fund, and offering practical help for parishes and PCCs in responding to the gospel imperative to give in proportion to the generosity of God's gifts to us.

Thirdly, help will be made available for the next stage in implementing the Moving On in Mission and Ministry report: the stage where every parish and PCC needs prayerfully and carefully to make plans to move on into a Mission Community.

Lastly, those who attend the 'Fresh Start' meetings will have opportunity to worship together, for these occasions themselves will be part of the pilgrim journey for those who attend and, through them, for the parishes they represent.



What Shape Sherford?

Exploring the role of the Churches in Devon's new communities

The shape of Sherford, the proposed and to some controversial new community in West Devon has emerged more clearly after a series of hearings by the Prince's Foundation. Churches Together in Devon are determined to be at the heart of the new development.

The Foundation's "Enquiry by Design" brought together interested parties, including opponents and critics, for three days of intense encounter - what was different from previous confrontational public meetings was the Foundation's passionate belief in what good new communities could be - the presentation on "New Urbanism" could have been presented word for word as a Christian Sermon on the centrality of Koinonia, Fellowship, Communion

Designers, by constantly drawing what participants were implying, challenged them to move beyond the divisive and vague rhetoric. Choices included A flagship new settlement, a sustainable community, a string of new typical South Hams villages, a concrete canyon, an urban extension, a new town, more grotty overspill estates.

The independent Foundation believes good design can help develop vibrant new communities - e.g. Poundbury. Visions include bringing back traditional high streets; designing with landscape, rather than flattening it: multiplying possibilities of exchange and encounter; mixing together residence, work and leisure: ensuring a genuinely mixed community with 60% affordable housing; committing developers to an agreed code and range of styles. and to providing community facilities from the start; encouraging walking and cycling; getting different agencies - health, education, recreation, leisure - and churches - to think outside their boxes and explore multi-use facilities:

and cradle to grave care. The Foundation's vision of what works remarkably parallels the findings of the best-selling report, *Mission Shaped Church*, challenging the church to relate to the different networks that give meaning now.

So what shape Sherford now? A sort of upside down triangle of four or five linked, walking size, overlapping neighbourhoods; south of the A38, and reaching down into the Sherford Valley. A clear urban edge- with an identified ridge of grass and woodland surrounding and separating Brixton village; future development pushing West towards the Plym, rather than ribbon development East to lyvbridge: two

Three schools, a 50 bed hospital, workplaces, shops - Sherford will eventually be a community the size of Totnes (constantly quoted as an example of how wonderful traditionally evolving design and high streets can be).



Involvement in each new developing neighbourhood and emerging meeting places. Land reserved for an eventual church building, but the church as people must emerge first.

Christians in Plymouth and South Hams who've been waiting for affordable housing are encouraged to start praying now; and to be part of the praying, playing, networking, worshipping, witnessing ecumenical Body of Christ that will be lead to a living sustainable church - people and buildings - in Sherford.

Local church leaders are determined that if Sherford develops Christians should be concerned that it is the best community it possibly can be; and that the church - as involved Christians - is present from the start. 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
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
