



COST OF LIVING COMPARISONS

Chico vs. Sacramento, CA - The cost of living in Chico is 12.5% lower than in Sacramento, CA. Therefore, if you are currently earning \$50,000 annually, you would have to earn a salary of \$43,751 to maintain your current standard of living.

Chico vs. Santa Rosa, CA - The cost of living in Chico, CA is 15.4% lower than in Santa Rosa, CA. Therefore, you would have to earn a salary of \$42,298 to maintain your current standard of living.

Chico vs. Los Angeles, CA - The cost of living in Chico is 29.7% lower than in Los Angeles, CA. Therefore, if you are currently earning \$50,000 annually, you would have to earn a salary of \$35,149 to maintain your current standard of living.

Chico vs. New York, NY - The cost of living in Chico is 50.5% lower than in New York, NY. Therefore, if you are currently earning \$50,000 annually, you would have to earn a salary of \$24,741 to maintain your current standard of living.

Chico, vs. Seattle, WA - The cost of living in Chico, CA is 25.4% lower than in Seattle, WA. Therefore, if you are currently earning \$50,000 annually, you would have to earn a salary of \$37,323 to maintain your current standard of living.

Economic Development/ Redevelopment

An important part of Chico's economic growth has been the availability of reasonably priced industrial and commercial property. Some of the area's major industrial parks and commercial ventures include: Chico Municipal Airport Industrial, Hegan Lane Business Park, Skypark Plaza, Village Park, Southgate, Foothill Industrial Park, Myers Street Industrial Park and the Chico Mall.

In addition to the availability of land and buildings, the City has an aggressive redevelopment program. Since it's establishment in 1980, the Chico Redevelopment Agency has generated \$92 million in funding for water, and other necessary public improvements. Changes in state law have allowed the Redevelopment Agency to participate directly in manufacturing and industrial development projects, which will provide the City with additional flexibility to assist quality development and create jobs. The Redevelopment Agency has adopted a \$28.9 million capital Improvement Program for 2005-2006.

Labor Market and Industry Employment

Over the years 1998-2002, Butte County industry employment increased by 5,200 jobs, cumulative growth of more than 7 percent. In the year 2002, growth slowed (0.8 percentage point), but 600 new jobs were added; a majority of the growth was in trade, transportation and utilities.

Butte County's industry employers include government; trade, transportation and utilities; and educational and health services. Government, the largest employer in the county, accounts for 22.5 percent of all employment. Within the industry, almost 72 percent of the jobs are in local government (which includes local education, county government, and city government employment). Trade, transportation and utilities is the second largest industry in Butte; within this industry, growth has been concentrated in the retail trade component.

Employment in educational and health services has been growing consistently over the last five years; the industry makes up more than 15 percent of all employment. Financial activities, one of the

county's fastest growing industries, has gained 1,100 jobs or 35 percent since 1998. Natural resources, mining and construction gained 600 jobs during these years, growth of 24 percent. Butte's agriculture industry is a vital factor in the county's economic success.

Parts of the county are located in the Sacramento Valley, which has ideal conditions for agricultural production and supports a variety of crops, including rice, almonds, walnuts, dried prunes, and timber. Farm and farm related services in Butte County have an estimated value of more than 300 million dollars annually. Agribusiness and education are also important aspects in the county's economic forecast. California State University, Chico, and Butte Community College District are important assets to the county's workforce preparation efforts. Both institutions are responsive to training needs in the community, often working with employers to provide specific programs.

NATURAL GAS & ELECTRIC

Pacific Gas & Electric provides electricity to essentially all of Butte County, and natural gas service to the greater Chico Area and the more urban areas of the county. 800-743-5000

SEWER

Sewer service is supplied by the City of Chico. The capacity of the sewer plant is 9 million gallons per day. Monthly user rates are based on water usage. The monthly rate is \$12.39 for the first 1,000 cu. Ft. of water use. Charges for use above 1,000 cu. ft. vary depending on the type of use. Sewer service is available to most industrial areas. For information on sewer hook-up fees, contact the Public Works Department at the City of Chico.

Chico Municipal Airport (Primary runway: 6,724 ft by 150 ft. with high intensity lighting, instrument landing system and precision approach path indicators: secondary runway: 3,005 ft. by 60 ft. unlighted).

PUBLIC TRANSIT

The B-Line (Butte Regional Transit) serves the Chico Urban area with eight routes operating Monday through Satuday and two shuttle routes for CSU, Chico students during the academic year. The Chico Clipper serves the Chico urban area with nine modified vans providing transportation for the elderly and the mobility impaired seven days a week. PUBLIC SAFETY

144 people are employed by the Chico Police Department (91 sworn personnel); 55 volunteers, 25 patrol vehicles, five traffic vehicles and 40 support vehicles, three canine cars (two dogs), and two motorcycles.

The Chico Fire Department has 69 full-time personnel, and 36 volunteers. The staff is comprised of 18 full-time firefighters, 24 fire apparatus engineers, 18 fire captains, two fire prevention inspectors, one fire inspection officer and two division chiefs. There are six fire stations in Chico, with a minimum of 24 firefighting personnel and one chief officer on duty 24 hours a day.



Butte College:

The school awards two-year associate degrees as well as Certificates of Completion. More than 14,000 students attend the college.

CSU, Chico was founded in 1887 and is the second oldest institution of higher learning in the California State University System. The campus has grown from 90 students in 1997 to more that 16,000 today, offering more that 120 majors and concentrations, 60 undergraduate and graduate degree programs and 55 certificate and professional education programs. The university maintains one of the highest graduation rates in the California State University system, and is know for it's small class sizes, outstanding faculty and student achievements in many national collegiate competitions.

HOSPITALS

Enloe Medical Center

Enloe Medical Center is a community governed, non-profit organization that provides advanced hospital and health care service to Chico and its surrounding North Valley communities. The hospital's main campus is located on Esplanade Avenue. Enloe Medical Center/Esplanade is home to the Enloe Heart Program, a level II Trauma Center, Enloe FlightCare and an array of inpatient services that includes obstetrics, surgery and intensive care.

To continue to meet the needs of the growing North Valley community, Enloe has initiated an \$80 million dollar capital expansion plan for its Esplanade facility. If approved by the City and State, the Enloe Century Project will replace existing operating rooms with 14 new surgical suites and expand the emergency room from 23 to 35 treatment rooms. Additional patient rooms, a new Women's Center with an entire floor for obstetrical patients, expanded lobby areas and one parking garage will also help meet the needs of patients, families and staff. As planned, the expansion could be completed by 2008, just a few years before Enloe celebrates its IOO-year anniversary in 2013.

Enloe also offers inpatient care at two additional locations: Enloe Behavioral Health on Cohasset Avenue and the Enloe Rehabilitation Center on East Avenue. In all, Enloe Medical Center includes 391 licensed beds.

In 2002, Enloe opened its new Enloe Cancer Center at Fountain Medical Plaza. Located on Cohasset Avenue, this new complex brings almost every aspect of cancer care to one convenient and serenely designed location. The Cancer Center includes powerful IMRT therapy, the most advanced weapon to date in the fight against cancer.



Additionally, Enloe's comprehensive outpatient services include the Enloe Outpatient Center at California Park, with a same day surgery center, Prompt Care, Enloe Occupational Health Program and a number of preventative health programs such as Cardiac Rehabilitation and the Anti-Coagulation Clinic. The Enloe Children's Center offers comprehensive care to children, regardless of their ability to pay. Enloe Home Health and Hospice includes a full compliment of skilled and compassionate in-home support, further extending the care Enloe provides to the community.

A highly skilled team of more than 23I physicians support Enloe Medical Center, as well as more than 2,200 employees, making Enloe Medical Center one of the largest employers in the North Valley.

In 2004 and 2005 Enloe Medical Center was the recipient of the HealthGrades Distinguished Hospital Award for Patient SafetyTM. Enloe is one of only 46 hospitals in the nation and one of just three in California to receive this distinction two years in a row. The award ranks among the top 3% of hospitals in the nation for patient safety.
