LGBT Characters Disappear From Network TV

LOS ANGELES - Despite the emergence of three LGBT television networks Gays have all but disappeared from the six major broadcast networks according to a new study, 365Gay.com reported.

After a promising network pilot season that saw many new shows developed with Gay and Lesbian characters, the actual number of LGBT representations on the six networks will comprise less than 2% of all characters on the networks' 2005-06 schedule, according to the analysis conducted by the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation.

GLAAD said Monday (August 28) that it counts only 16 "series regular" and recurring Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual roles and there continues to be no Transgender characters.

The 16 characters appear in 14 different scripted programs out of a total of 110 shows on the broadcast networks. While this number is up from the 11 characters counted last season, GLAAD said, the lack of representation is still cause for concern.

"Out of 710 'series regulars' that will appear this season on the broadcast networks, Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual characters make up less than 2%," said GLAAD Entertainment Media Director Damon Romine.

"This is a shocking misrepresentation of reality and of the audience watching these programs.

"Of the 16 characters, 13 are male and three are female; 13 are white, with one Gay character each representing African Americans, Latinos and Asian Pacific Islanders.

"If you're looking at network television to see a good cross section of our community, you're not going to find it. What you will find is primarily Gay white males," Romine said.

In addition, many of the characterizations of Gays and Lesbians on the networks fall into minor, supporting or recurring roles.

"The LGBT community wants to see itself represented on television. It's that simple. We want to see our stories told and we want to know that our lives matter," said Romine.

"Television is a reflection of society, but the broadcast networks are not doing enough to fairly represent the diversity of their audience. We are still too often portrayed as stereotyped caricatures, and the reality of our lives and relationships is largely ignored." Cable, meanwhile, continues to traverse boundaries Romaine said.

GLAAD counted 25 LGBT characters that will appear on cable series in the 2005-06 season.

This is GLAAD's 10th annual report on the state of LGBT characters on television.

This year GLAAD also examined ethnicity, gender and sexual orientation among all "series regulars" scheduled to appear on the broadcast networks during the 2005-06 season, based on information the networks provided by Aug. 29.

The report found that male characters outweigh females 57% to 43%, and that the faces on network scripted shows continue to be predominantly white at 76%. African Americans make up 14% of the characterizations, Latina/os 6%, Asian Pacific Islanders represent 3%, with less than 1% making up other ethnicities.

Vatican Plan To Block Gay Priests

VATICAN CITY - The new Pope faces his first controversy over the direction of the Catholic church after it was revealed that the Vatican has drawn up a religious instruction preventing Gay men from being priests, the (Manchester, England) Guardian newspaper reported.

The controversial document, produced by the Congregation for Catholic Education and Seminaries, the body overseeing the church's training of the priesthood, is being scrutinized by Benedict XVI.

It been suggested Rome would publish the instruction earlier this month, but it dropped the plan out of concern that such a move might tarnish his visit to his home city of Cologne last week.

The document expresses the church's belief that Gay men should no longer be allowed to enter seminaries to study for the priesthood. Currently, as all priests take a vow of celibacy, their sexual orientation has not been considered a pressing concern.

Vatican-watchers believe the Pope harbors doubts about whether the church should publish the document, which has already been the subject of three drafts.

"Inevitably, such a directive will be met with opposition," said John Haldane, professor of moral philosophy at the University of St Andrews.

Real Estate Firm Bars Gays From Neighborhood

RICHMOND - A human rights body has determined that a real estate office in northern Virginia is guilty of discrimination against Gays, reported the Associated Press on 365Gay.com.

The Alexandria Human Rights Commission ruled that Long and Foster Realtors in McLean, Virginia discriminated when they sold an Alexandria home to a married couple — rather than to a Gay man willing to pay more for it.

Lawrence Cummings accused Long and Foster Realtors of discrimination based on sexual orientation and marital status, but the commission did not specify which of the charges it agreed with.

Wingspan Annual Dinner Sept. 24

TUCSON - On Saturday, September 24, more than 900 guests are expected at the Tucson Convention Center for the Wingspan Eighth Annual Benefit Dinner; an evening of celebration, socializing, recognition and enlightenment.

Wingspan is honored to have Mandy Carter as keynote speaker for the event. Mandy is a leading African American Lesbian activist and the cofounder and current Executive Director of Southerners on New Ground (SONG), southnewground.org. Her work against war and violence and promoting social and economic justice for people of color and equal rights for women and the LGBT community has been successful because of her strength as a both a grassroots and national coalition builder. Winner of the prestigious Stonewall Award, Mandy was nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize as part of the 1000 Women for Peace nominations.

Teen Pleads Guilty In Gay Bashing

SANTA FE - A 17-year-old boy has pleaded guilty to aggravated battery and other charges in a February attack on two Gay men, reported the Associated Press on Advocate.com.

David Trinidad, the first of six defendants to go to court, pleaded guilty Tuesday (August 23) to aggravated battery, battery, conspiracy, and criminal damage to property. An attorney for another man charged in the beatings said his client will not plea-bargain, while a lawyer for a third said his client will plead to some charges and testify against codefendants who go to trial.

New Mexico district judge Michael Vigil ordered a 15-day evaluation of Trinidad before sentencing. The teen could be sentenced as a juvenile, which could include being committed to the state until his 21st birthday, or be sentenced as an adult, in which he could get up to seven and a half years in prison. He was on probation for a rape conviction involving a 4-year-old boy at the time of the beating, prosecutors said.

James Maestas, 21, and Joshua Stockham, 23, were attacked by a group of men February 27 in the parking lot of a Santa Fe motel after an earlier confrontation with them at a restaurant. District attorney Henry Valdez has said he will seek tougher sentences under New Mexico's hate-crimes law. Maestas, who spent more than a week in intensive care, had to undergo extensive physical and speech therapy, said assistant district attorney Heidi Pircher. Stockham suffered minor injuries.

Maestas was not at the hearing. Stockham, who attended, had no comment. Also charged are Isaia Medina, 19; Gabriel Maturin, 20; Paul Montoya, 20; Joseph Cano, 19; and Jonathan Valdez, 23. Lawyers have said prosecutors have offered pleas to at least four, though none has appeared in court. Maturin and Medina are charged with aggravated battery, battery, and conspiracy. Cano, Valdez, and Montoya are charged with aggravated battery, conspiracy, contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and criminal damage to property under an accessory theory.

Valdez's attorney, Dan Marlowe, said his client will not take a plea deal. "He's not pleading; he didn't do anything," Marlowe said. Maturin's attorney, Thomas Clark, said his client will plead guilty to some charges in exchange for "truthful testimony" in possible trials of others in the case. Maturin could face up to seven years in prison, Clark said.

Court Thwarts Falwell Bid To Shut Gay-Positive Web Site

RICHMOND - The owner of a Web site critical of the Rev. Jerry Falwell's views on homosexuality did not violate trademark laws by using a common misspelling of the television evangelist's name as the site's domain name, a federal appeals court ruled Wednesday (August 24)

A three-judge panel of the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals unanimously reversed a lower court decision and ruled that Christopher Lamparello of New York City can continue to operate his "gripe site" at http://www.fallwell.com.

"The result proves this is still America," Lamparello said in a telephone interview. "Just because someone who's a lot more powerful than I am demands that I do something doesn't mean I should do it"

U.S. District Judge Claude Hilton ruled last August that Lamparello's domain name was nearly identical to the trademark bearing Falwell's name and could confuse Web surfers, despite a disclaimer noting that it is not affiliated with Falwell. The appeals court disagreed, citing the adversarial nature of the Lamparello's site.

"After even a quick glance at the content of the website ... no one seeking Reverend Falwell's guidance would be misled by the domain name http://www.fallwell.com into believing that Reverend Falwell authorized the content of that website," Judge Diana Gribbon Motz wrote in the opinion, which was joined by Judges M. Blane Michael and Robert King.

"No one would believe that Reverend Falwell sponsored a site criticizing himself, his positions, and his interpretations of the Bible."

The American Civil Liberties Union, which filed a brief supporting Lamparello, called the ruling a victory for free speech on the Internet.

"Trademark law must not be used to inhibit the freedom of speech in this powerful and important medium," said Kent Willis, executive director of the ACLU in Virginia.

Falwell's attorney, John H. Midlen Jr., said he will ask the full appeals court to reconsider the decision.

"We have argued from day one that the likelihood of confusion test relates only to the domain name itself and not to the content of the Web site, which is not known to the Internet surfer until they've already been confused by the domain name," Midlen said. "It is an argument we will be pressing forcefully to the full court"

The panel considered the "initial interest confusion theory" but ruled that it applies only when someone is trying to profit financially. No such motive existed in this case, the court said.

Lamparello's attorney, Paul Levy, said the ruling recognizes "the fundamental value of trademark law, which is to protect consumers against confusion in making their purchase decisions."

Lamparello took Falwell to court after the minister sent letters in October 2001 and June 2003 demanding that he surrender the domain name. According to the appeals court, Lamparello's site was getting only about 200 "hits" a day to more than 9,000 for Falwell's site.

"I find it odd that they want to take this site down so aggressively," Lamparello said of Falwell. "I think it's because he's disturbed by the content. Perhaps it does hit a raw nerve."

Among the headlines on Lamparello's site are "Proof that fundamentalists selectively quote the Bible" and "What commandment is Dr. Falwell breaking?"

Lamparello is not the first Web master to clash with Falwell over domain names. In 2003, Gary Cohn of Highland Park, Ill., surrendered the domain names jerryfalwell.com and jerryfallwell.com after Falwell threatened to sue him over trademark infringement.

Cohn said he created the sites in response to Falwell's public comments after the 2001 terrorist attacks. Falwell claimed feminists, homosexuals and abortion-rights advocates provoked God to "lift the curtain" of divine protection on America. Falwell later apologized.

Feds & State Raid Orlando Gay Club

QORLANDO - A combined federal and state task force raided Parliament House, one of the largest Gay entertainment complexes in Florida, arresting all 12 bar employees early Monday morning (August 29), reported 365Gay.com.

A state official said that they were acting on a tip that the club was serving alcohol to minors. Investigators say they used minors to test the club's system of putting identifying bracelets on underage patrons. When the "plants" were served alcohol the joint task force made up of state police and agents with the Department of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms moved in, shutting down the bar.

Officials say that nine bartenders and three servers - the entire staff on duty - was arrested.

Witnesses said that one one employee resisted arrest and was pepper sprayed. He was taken to hospital complaining of chest pains.

Patrons say that Parliament House is generally very careful not to serve underage customers.

Parliament House is an Orlando Gay fixture and has been around for more than 30 years. It has frequently been used as a venue for events associated with Gay Days at Disney World and has been a target of anti-Gay groups. Officials did not say who tipped them off about underage drinking.

Question about the raid have



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been raised including the use of federal agents and the large number of officers involved in the raid.

Officials say they are still in the

process of determining what charges will be laid against the workers and the club. If convicted Parliament House could lose its liquor license. The complex's hotel remained open Monday although the bar was closed.

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Major LGBT Rights Groups Announce Opposition To Roberts

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Four of the nation's largest LGBT civil rights groups Thursday (August 25) officially announced their opposition to the nomination of Judge John Roberts for the US Supreme Court, 365Gay.com reported.

The Human Rights Campaign, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the National Center for Lesbian Rights and Parents & Friends of Lesbians and Gays issued a joint statement calling on the Senate to reject President Bush's candidate for the court.

"Since President Bush nominated John Roberts on July 19, disturbing evidence has emerged about the kind of justice that he would be," the joint statement said. "His writings as a lawyer, his rulings as a judge, and his statements as a policymaker all lead us to the unfortunate conclusion that Judge Roberts would not vote to protect our civil rights from those who are, at this moment, fighting so hard to take them away. Instead, his record indicates that Judge Roberts would vote to roll back the constitutional protections upon which our community — and all Americans rely."

The statement also said the groups are concerned that the Senate has had no access to many documents relating to Roberts' service as principal deputy solicitor general from 1989 to 1993. Those documents include Roberts' writings about cases involving voting rights, choice, the separation of church and state, and a number of other issues.

Although documents produced by Roberts for President Reagan have been turned over to the Justice Committee, the White House has refused to give up documents from the two Bush administrations claiming they are shielded by attorney-client privilege.

"Judge Roberts has such a narrow view of what the courts can and should do, it's a wonder he wants the job at all," said HRC president Joe Solmonese . "Ultimately, this is about an individual's right to privacy. From women's rights to religious freedom to civil rights, there is powerful evidence that Judge Roberts would rule against equality."

NGLTF executive director Matt Foreman said that throughout his entire adult life "Roberts has been a disciple of and promoted a political and legal ideology that is antithetical to an America that embraces all, including Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender people."

Foreman said that Roberts has shown opposition to the constitutional rights to privacy, equal protection and due process as well as federal government's role in confronting injustice.

"I have no doubt he's an accomplished lawyer and an affable dinner companion, but that doesn't make him any less a mortal danger to equal rights for Gay people, reproductive freedom and affirmation action," Foreman said.

Although every major LGBT rights organization has voiced concerns about Roberts nomination, Thursday's joint statement is the first officially opposing placing him on the high court.

Lambda Legal was the lone LGBT rights group not to sign the document. Lambda says it will not make a decision on Judge Roberts until after hearings are held on his nomination.

Earlier the group issued a series of 30 questions it believes Roberts should be asked by the committee.

They include Roberts' position on the Supreme Court ruling in Romer v Evans, the landmark Equal Protection case in which Roberts worked pro bono for the Gay group arguing before the court.

Another question asks Roberts' position on Lawrence v Texas, the sodomy law overturned by the Supreme Court in a ruling setting out the Right to Liberty for Gays. Additionally, Lambda wants to know Roberts' stand on the Right to

Hong Kong Anti-Gay Law Ruled Unconstitutional

HONG KONG - A Hong Kong judge ruled on Wednesday (August 24) that a law requiring a life sentence for men under 21 who engage in Gay sex is unconstitutional, 365Gay.com reported.

The landmark decision stemmed from a legal challenge brought by 20 year old William Roy Leung who said the law was prejudicial because the age of consent for heterosexual or Lesbian sex is 16. Sentences for heterosexuals or Lesbians engaging in sex with someone under the age of 16 also are less severe than for two 20 year old Gay men, Leung noted.

High Court Judge Michael Hartmann agreed. In his ruling Hartmann said the laws "discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation. (They) are demeaning of Gay men who are, through the legislation, stereotyped as deviant.

Hartmann's ruling also found that the law is inconsistent with Hong Kong's mini-constitution, the Basic Law, and the Bill of Rights, which provide that all Hong Kong residents are equally protected by the law.

"[The laws are a] grave and arbitrary interference with the right of Gay men to self-autonomy in the most intimate aspects of their private lives," he said.

Outside the court a jubilant Leung said that "I can finally have a loving relationship without being scared of (being) thrown into jail for life imprisonment."

In the past five years police have arrested 65 men under the anti- Gay sex laws and 26 were convicted.

"It is a landmark case and a long overdue judgment," said Hong Kong Gay activist Roddy Shaw. "It's the first time that sexual orientation has been upheld as a protected ground against discrimination in a Hong Kong court," Shaw said.

In April, a fashion show organized by a Gay businessman was shut down after 10 members of Hong Kong's Police Tactical Unit burst in and began searching members of the audience. (story) It was one of a series of raids on Gay venues in the past year in what activists called systematic police harass-

A month later the former British colony saw its first Gay rights demonstration. (story) About 100 people -many of them in masks to hide their identities marched through central Hong Kong to call for civil rights protections for Gays and Lesbians.

The Hong Kong government is considering legislation to grant greater rights to Gays and Lesbians but in a recent poll 60 percent of respondents said there was no need for such legislation and nearly 70 percent said they were unaware of sexual discrimination.

Human Rights Monitor in a recent report said that Hong Kong is lagging behind the rest of the world in Gay rights.

It is estimated there are about a million Gays among Hong Kong's 6.9 million residents.

(The following is a press release from Arizona Together, a coalition formed to fight the proposed Protect Marriage Arizona amendment to the state constitution that would ban the governmental recognition of same-sex marriage, civil unions and domestic partnerships, prohibit governmental entities from extending medical and dental benefits to employees who have domestic partners and their families and affect many current laws on the local, county and state level.)

Arizona Republican Senator John McCain last night (August 25) endorsed the "Protect Marriage Arizona" amendment being pushed by the ultraconservative group, The Center for Arizona Policy.

"Senator McCain has a presidential campaign to run, and his endorsement of issues that many Arizonans consider extreme is understandable in light of the fact that he is also running for the nomination in places like South Carolina and Louisiana," said Republican Steve May, former member of the Arizona House of Representatives and treasurer of "Arizona Together," the coalition opposing the amendment.

McCain voted against expanding hate crime laws to include crimes against Gays in June of 2000 (S.2549).

"We understand that the Senator is doing what he has to do politically. We have a year to educate the Senator and others about the harmful effects of this proposal. It hits unmarried straight couples even harder than Gay couples, and will deprive some children of medical

coverage. The extreme nature of this amendment doesn't fit with Arizona's live and let live traditions, and we expect that many Arizonans who don't know the facts right now will come around on this issue in the months ahead to join with the majority of Arizonans who already say they will vote against it. The Senator may be among those who change their views, although we know he is in a special political bind," May said.

The measure would affect the rights of 120,000 unmarried couples in Arizona, many with children. Approximately 10% of the couples are same-sex unions.

"We're happy to have this out of

the way, over a year before the election," commented acting campaign manager, Dennis M. Burke. "Even though the Senator has chosen his team, we hope to encourage him to stay on the bench," Burke said.


"Many Arizonans are upset by the Senator's actions, but we've all seen this story a thousand times before: the candidate takes extreme positions to get the nomination, then moderates his positions when he gets that nomination. This is that old game. 
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NOTES FROM THE FOR-REAL SIDE The Bridge by Lee Thorn

Tucson's Rio Nuevo revitalization project has always struck me as a disheveled bureaucratic frolic in dire need of adult supervision. The ARIZONA DAILY STAR's opinion section of August 21 ran an editorial and an interview on the current status of Rio Nuevo that left me anything but reassured.

The STAR's focus was on the centerpiece of the project, a suspension bridge that would span 1-10 and the Santa Cruz River and house a science museum that's supposed to attract 500,000 visitors a year. Rio Nuevo's director says he doesn't know how much it will all cost, but he's looking north of a hundred million

I feel like Rip Van Winkle. Where was I sleeping when all the public discussion of this bridge was going on?

I called the STAR and they said they've been doing tons of articles on the project. I guess my problem is that I get my news primarily from the TV and I haven't seen a single mention of the 100-million-dollar bridge there.

I've seen dozens of stories on local TV news about the process involved in deciding what will replace the World Trade Center (WTC) buildings in New York and not one story on local TV news about the process involved in deciding to build a 100-million-dollar bridge in Tucson

I also asked the STAR if there had been any community input on the bridge idea and I got what I thought was a curious response, "Apparently you think there wasn't enough." Well no, I didn't think that. I didn't know. I was just asking.

And there are lots of other questions that come to mind: Who decided that what Tucson needs is a pricey bridge across the Santa Cruz? Some person made that decision. Is it unreasonable to ask his name?

Who decided that the bridge should be designed by a Uruguayan? Was there an international design competition that I slept through? Perhaps this was one of those jobs that we hear so much about nowadays that Americans are just unwilling to do.

What do you put in a science museum that will draw 500,000 visitors a year to downtown Tucson? You might remember that the original centerpiece of Rio Nuevo was going to be a fish tank that was going to draw 100,000 visitors a year. That projection was discarded as "unrealistic only to be replaced by a projection that's downright fanciful.

Someone apparently forgot that

we're talking about downtown Tucson. You couldn't get 500,000 visitors a year to downtown Tucson to see God the Father handing out exploding cigars. And speaking of cigars, what can these people possibly be smoking.

I got a kick out of the project director saying that the bridge "will literally redefine the image of Tucson in minds throughout the country and maybe internationally." Does Tucson even have a national image, let alone an international image?

I know that we like to think of ourselves as the town with the longest non-mechanized rodeo parade in the world, but to the rest of the country Tucson's image is that of a fictional town that used to crop up in old cowboy movies -- or was that Tombstone? And what is Tucson's image in the minds of Romans, Parisians and Londoners? Mercy!

For those of you who have been Rip Van Winkling along with me, the bridge sounds like it might actually be a cool thing. The STAR describes it as "an arch resembling a rainbow that spans a wider Interstate 10, from which would hang a pedestrian bridge supporting the (science) museum, restaurants and other structures

"The arch would stand 360 feet at its peak. Cables would support a 60-foot-wide bridge stretching 1,200 feet over the highway, giving people a vantage point of eight stories high."

The bridge could be a good thing for Tucson, even if we discount the fantasy projections and the delusions of grandeur about our image. The museum of science would be as good as the stuff you put in it. I mean, there's lots of science stuff --biology, physics, chemistry You'd more of less have to have some organizing principle or theme to get a good museum started. Do we have one?

So the bridge could be good. The museum could be good. But what would be better for Tucson than 100 bridges is this: a transparent process the would allow citizens to attach names to ideas and that would allow citizens to make their assessments of planning ideas known to the planners and to other citizens.

How come New Yorkers can take this approach with the WTC and we can't take it with a project of similar or even greater importance to our future?

'Gay Chat Mayor' Recall Moving At Lightening Speed

SPOKANE - Three days after they began circulating petitions (August 27) seeking an election to recall Mayor Jim West, organizers say they have collected about 40 percent of the necessary signatures, reported the Associated Press on 365Gay.com.

Ralph Tracy raced from car to car pulling into the lot of a vacant carrepair shop on busy Division Street that serves as a drive-through collection point and recall headquarters.

"People are starting to realize we can make a difference," said Tracy, a volunteer who logged 14 hours handing out petitions on Sunday and planned a 17-hour day yesterday.

"He's done some good things for the city, but when it comes down to it, Spokane's image has been hurt."

"This is an opportunity to take politics out of it ... for people to have the chance to vote again," Tracy said. "We revote and whether he stays or goes, it's all over with."

The mayor's office referred calls for comment to his lawyers.

West, in his second year as mayor after a 17-year career in the state Legislature, is accused of offering a City Hall job to someone he thought was an 18-year-old high-school student he met in an online Gay chat room. The "teen" was really a computer expert hired by The Spokesman-Review newspaper to track the mayor's online activities.

The newspaper published a series of articles implicating West in



sexual abuse of boys in the late 1970s and early 1980s and of offering City Hall jobs in exchange for sex to young men he met online. West acknowledged using "poor judgment" but has denied doing anything illegal.

The state Supreme Court on Wednesday (August 24) cleared the way for circulating the recall petitions filed by Shannon Sullivan, a single mother who said she found it hard to explain West's conduct to her 9-year-old son.

Sullivan and Rita Amunrud are the leaders of Citizens for Government Integrity, the pro-recall group.

To make the ballot, organizers must collect signatures of about 12,600 registered city voters. Amunrud said the group hopes to turn in 16,000 signatures.

"We're right around 5,000," Amunrud said. "We hit the floor running when the word came down" that petitions could be circulated, she said.

Sullivan signed the first petition in a ceremony across the street from City Hall on Thursday afternoon (August 25).

Amunrud spent yesterday morning (August 29) seeking permission from businesses to set up petition-collection areas.

Equal Marriage Bill Heads For California Senate

SACRAMENTO - A bill legalizing samesex marriage is headed for California's Senate floor next week after clearing the Senate Appropriations Committee on Thursday (August 25), the PlanetOut Network reported.

Sen. Carole Migden, the chair of the committee, championed the bill, AB849. It would legally define marriage as gender-neutral and was approved, 7-4, with Sen. Dean Florez, D-Shafter, joining three committee Republicans in opposing the bill.

"Senator Migden is very pleased," Alan LoFaso, Migden's chief of staff, told the PlanetOut Network. "She's been a strong supporter of this legislation and has worked hard to make it happen. She's a very active member of the LGBT Caucus."

AB849 is the resuscitated samesex marriage bill authored by Gay Assemblyman Mark Leno, whose original bill fell four votes short in California's Assembly in June. Leno used a parliamentary move known as "gut and amend" to change a bill about fishing to a bill legalizing same-sex marriage.

"Allowing same-sex couples to access one another's health care plans, make joint medical decisions, inherit one another's property, file joint tax returns, and provide for their children without fear of them falling into foster care should one partner pass away is not only humane but fiscally prudent," said Leno in a press release by Equality California, the

organization sponsoring the bill.

"I'm grateful that a majority of my colleagues in the Senate Appropriations Committee has taken a principled stand against discrimination and in favor of allowing same-sex couples who want to devote their lives to one another," Leno said.

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger is being pressured to vote against the bill by social conservatives who are gathering signatures to put three amendments banning same-sex marriage on the June 2006 ballot.

"We call upon Gov. Schwarzenegger to announce that he will veto this anti- marriage, anti-voter bill," said Randy Thomasson, president of the Campaign for Children and Families and organizer of VoteYesMarriage.com, an organization supporting one of the ballot initiatives.

"It's high time for the 'Terminator' to tell California families where he stands on AB849," Thomasson said in a quote published by the San Francisco Chronicle.

Geoffrey Kors, the executive director of Equality California, told the PlanetOut Network he is optimistic the governor will sign the legislation. "The governor has been consistent in saying he's fine with same-sex marriage if the courts and the people rule, he will support it. The legislature is the people's body, and so hopefully he will sign it."

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Gender Gap Divides U.S. Gays and Lesbians

SAN FRANCISCO - Although they campaign arm-in-arm for Gay rights, Lesbians and Gay men don't always march in step. With bemusement and at times frustration, they acknowledge a lingering gender gap in how they live, socialize and perceive each other, the PlanetOut Network reported.

The two groups each grapple with real differences, and with stereotypes of themselves and the other sex: that Gay men are the party-goers, flashy and promiscuous; that Lesbians are the relatively dull homebodies — "soccer moms," in the words of one activist.

In San Francisco and New York, nightclubs in the main Gay districts tend to be virtually all-male, while many Lesbians have settled in quieter, less expensive neighborhoods. Some Lesbians question whether Gay men, whom they supported fervently during the peak of the AIDS crisis, are reciprocating now with appropriate empathy for Lesbian health problems.

"It never ceases to amaze me how much sexism there is among Gay men, given that they're the main victims of sexism," said Kate Kendell, executive director of the San Francisco-based National Center for Lesbian Rights.

National Gay rights leaders — men and women — say the gender gap has narrowed dramatically from the 1960s and '70s, when Lesbian feminists openly rebelled at what they considered to be patronizing male domination of the movement. Now, political solidarity is strong, but other differences remain.

In Chicago, for example, a Gay men's group at the Broadway United Methodist Church recently invited two Lesbians to one of its weekly meetings to discuss gender issues. The men and women each brought along a list of stereotypes they subscribed to — for example, that Lesbians craved to be physed coaches, and Gay men to be interior decorators — and found the discussion refreshing.

"It felt so novel and unique," said Cathy Knight, one of the participants. "It's stuff you'd think we could talk about, but we don't."

The group leader, librarian Arlie Sims, said he gained insight about how Lesbians view Gay men. "It's not hard to see the ways in which being a white male carries with it privilege — even if you're a Gay white male," he said. "There's a sense that everything is about the boys."

Knight suggested that even if some stereotypes are accurate, they shouldn't serve to divide a community that needs unity.

"More Lesbians are coupled, homebodies, they don't go to bars as much, and men are more sexually active," she said. "My response is, 'So what?' If that's what they choose, it doesn't have anything to do with having less moral values. It's about expressing yourself."

Evidence suggests that Lesbians are indeed more drawn to monogamy than Gay men — two-thirds of the same-sex couples who have married in Massachusetts or entered civil unions in Vermont are women. But prominent Lesbians balk at using such statistics to question the multi-partner dating preferences of many Gay men.

"I don't have any judgment about how they order their lives," Kendell said. "Lifestyle choices that are damaging and self-destructive — that's the problem, not Gay men having more partners."

While Gay men, as a group, have

a higher incidence of drug abuse and sexually transmitted disease, activist Cheryl Jacques said Lesbians shouldn't generalize or view the men as impeding political progress.

"I've met too many monogamous male couples and promiscuous, drugusing women I wouldn't want around my children," she said.

Jacques — former president of the Human Rights Campaign, the largest national Gay-rights group — said she has met numerous activists who distrust the other gender.

"One of the best messages you can convey as a leader, is, 'Hey, the enemy is over there,'" Jacques said. "We are a family. We may have differences within our four walls. But we all share the enemy that wants to strip us of our common humanity."

Never was the common bond more evident than in the worst of the AIDS crisis in the 1980s, when Lesbians doubled as caregivers and lobbyists on behalf of stricken Gay men who were not getting all-out support from the political and health establishments.

"It was as if we were siblings, and you found out your brother is gravely ill and your parents pay no attention," Kendell said. "It was a life or death situation, and whatever the social differences were became totally irrelevant."

The National Center for Lesbian Rights is a rarity among major Gay-rights groups in retaining a gender-specific name, even though it advocates on behalf of men, too, in pushing for same-sex marriage and other goals.

"That part of our name conveys a feminist philosophy and recognizes that sexism is the universal oppressor — of Gay men as well as Lesbians," Kendell said.

At times, the discussion of gender can be lighthearted. Kendell, for example, joked that Lesbians "don't have a social life — it's just being soccer moms."

Paris Poirier, a Lesbian film-maker from Santa Monica, Calif., tackled gender stereotypes with a mostly light touch in a 1997 documentary, "Pride Divide" — interviewing dozens of Gay men and Lesbians about differences in dating habits, humor, tastes in pornography. Among the stereotypes debated: that Gay men were more witty in their conversation, more predatory in their sex lives, less serious in their relationships.

"I don't think Lesbians are as whiny as they used to be," Poirier said in an interview. "There's a lot more freedom to talk about gender issues."

Shum Preston, a political consultant in San Francisco, said he and his partner of 13 years have been thrust into Lesbian culture since they became coparents of children with two Lesbian couples.

"The friendship structure seems a lot stronger than in the Gay male community," he said. "We're the longest surviving male couple I know, but in the Lesbian culture we're just two more peas in the pod."

Bevan Dufty, who represents the heavily Gay Castro district on San Francisco's Board of Supervisors, said the boom in Gay parenting is forging a powerful new bond between Lesbians and Gay men raising children as they share advice and lobby for family-oriented services

But the Castro's nightlife remains male-dominated, Dufty said, and the Lesbians and Gay men in his coed track club often divide by gender when dispersing for lunch after running together.

"I've had women say they don't feel welcome in parts of the community," Dufty said.

Matt Foreman, New York-based executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, said the degree of interaction between Lesbians and Gay men varies by locality.

"Where there's not much interaction, the stereotypes, the jokes and the myths persist," he said. "I've been to places like Topeka, Kansas, where Gay men and Lesbians socialize together and have a good time, while in New York —

with the exception of some political and charitable events — there's virtually no interaction."

Foreman also said Gay-rights groups should place more focus on breast cancer and other women's health issues.

"I understand the frustrations of Lesbians," he said. "They did so much to respond to the AIDS crisis and don't see a lot of reciprocity."

Amber Hollibaugh, senior strategist with Foreman's task force, said the Gay community should strive for candor in addressing gender issues.

"We need to talk about this, and not think it's dangerous," she said. "There are real differences. ... and a lot of times, in order to achieve solidarity, people try to hide them."

Utah Supreme Court To Consider Parental Rights For Former Lesbian Couple

SALT LAKE CITY - The case of a Lesbian who wants to be a parent to a child born to her former same-sex partner will be heard by the Utah Supreme Court, reported the Associated Press on 365Gay.com.

The issue before the high court on Tuesday (August 30) will be whether the woman is legally entitled to a continuing parental relationship with the child when the biological parent objects.

Keri Lynn Jones and Cheryl Pike Barlow met in 2000 and were together about three years.

"Probably after we were dating six months maybe, we decided we wanted to have a baby in the next year so we spent a lot of time talking to our attorney," Jones contends

Jones contends they intended to rear the girl — now 4 years old — together and took several steps to establish legal relationship for her and the baby. Barlow disputes that she ever intended for Jones to have a legal relationship to the child.

At the beginning both women shared in the joy of the birth. But then, Barlow said, she discovered Jones was having an affair with another woman.

"I did enter into this relationship thinking she and I could have a life together," Barlow said. "I was dead wrong."

After the breakup, Barlow, a former Gay activist, said that she "left the Gay lifestyle" and converted to an evangelical Christian faith.

Barlow said Jones has no legal ties to her daughter and, as the mother, Barlow believes she should decide if Jones can see the girl.

"I never elected a legal relationship with her," Barlow said. "Nor did I put myself in the position that she would have legal rights to my child."

Utah law prevented Jones from adopting the girl.

The issue before the state Supreme Court could test earlier common law court rulings in Utah that have allowed visitation by divorced stepparents. But the U.S. Supreme Court has handed down rulings that establish a biological parent's right to make the decision.

Last December, Third District Judge Timothy Hanson ruled that although Jones had no legal right by adoption or marriage, there was a parental relationship between the girl and Jones. He ordered visitation for Jones as being in the best interest of the child.

"This case is not about Gay marriage. This case is not about Gay adoption. What this case is about is whether or not a child is better off in this rather uncertain world with as many people as possible taking an interest in the child, both financially and emotionally," Hanson wrote in his decision.

The judge also noted that the couple traveled to Vermont to register as domestic partners.

Barlow's lawyer, Frank Mylar, said the case is a parental rights issue.

"You have somebody who is a fit natural parent and somebody who claims that they should have rights to a child, even though they do not have any legal relation to the child either by blood or marriage," Mylar said.

Jones' lawyer, Lauren Barros, said the core issue is the best interest of the child. If local legal doctrine is overturned by the Utah Supreme Court, the decision could affect any unmarried person raising and caring for a non-biological child without the benefit of adoption.

"I think that the precedent around the country also supports the rights of people who have a special parent relationship with a child," Barros said.

Both sides have the assistance of advocacy organizations. Barlow's position is being supported by the Alliance Defense Fund, an Arizona-based conservative Christian organization. Jones is being supported by the National Center for Lesbian Rights in California.

Members of the Utah Legislature and the American Civil Liberties Union are paying attention to the case. There are indications that state lawmakers might introduce legislation dealing with "in loco parentis," which is Latin for "instead of a parent."

The possibility of winning before the Utah Supreme Court only to have the Legislature step in alarms Jones. She said there were family members, doctors, lawyers and many others involved in the birth and raising of the girl. "To all of a sudden to think that you're just going to be written off as a roommate and that I'm just some stranger trying to take away her child," Jones said.

Barlow said she doesn't want anything to do with Jones. Barlow said the dispute has been hard on her daughter. Barlow and the girl have moved to Texas.

"I feel as if my rights have been stripped away," Barlow said. "After a fleeting three-year relationship, I feel I'm now being prevented from taking care of her; I have to sit back and watch her suffer."

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
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
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
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
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Vatican Plan To Block Gay Priests

down the controversy by eschewing a moral line, arguing instead that the presence of homosexuals in seminaries is 'unfair" to both Gay and heterosexual priests by subjecting the former to temptation.

"It will be written in a very pastoral mode," Haldane said. "It will not be an attack on the Gay lifestyle. It will not say 'homosexuality is immoral.' But it will suggest that admitting Gay men into the priesthood places a burden both on those who are homosexual and those they are working alongside who are not."

The instruction was drawn up as part of the Vatican's response to the sexual abuse scandal that surfaced in the American church three years ago, which has seen hundreds of priests launch lawsuits against superiors whom they accuse of abusing them.

As the former head of the

Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith, the Vatican body charged with looking into the abuse claims, Benedict, then Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, was made acutely aware of the scale of the problem. He is thought to have made clearing up the scandal one of the key goals of his papacy.

Next month the Vatican will send investigators to the US to gauge the scale of the scandal. More than 100 bishops and seminary staff will visit 220 campuses. They will review documents provided by the schools and seminaries and may interview teachers, students and alumni, then report directly to the Vatican, which could choose to issue the instruction barring homosexuals from entering the priesthood as part of its response.

Studies show that a significant proportion of men who enter seminaries to train for the priesthood are Gay. Any move signaling that homosexuals will not be allowed to join the seminaries, even one couched in the arcane language of the Vatican, could reduce the number of recruits to the priesthood.

In a further sign of the instruction's deeply controversial nature, it is expected the document would be signed by a cardinal rather than the Pope himself if the Vatican decides to publish

The Vatican has been carefully trying to soften Benedict's image since he was elected earlier this year. In recent weeks he has reached out to the Jewish and Muslim communities as well as young Catholics during the church's World Youth Day. The initiatives have been seen as a significant PR success. A decision to publish an instruction that would underscore his religious conservatism would be detrimental to Benedict's standing as he enjoys his "honeymoon period" on the world stage.
