Sixth Annual Boston Beanpot Collegiate Cycling Classic Returns to Grafton, Westboro and Sutton On Saturday, April 8th

GRAFTON: The Boston Beanpot Collegiate Cycling Classic, the largest collegiate cycling event in the country each of the last two years, returns to the historic Grafton Common on Saturday, April 8th.

This year will again feature a morning team time trial event over the new 7.69 mile time trial course starting at the Grafton Common. The course then winds its way down Pleasant Street into South Grafton and Sutton, crossing sections of the Blackstone River and the Blackstone Canal, cycling through the mid-1800 historic mill villages of Saundersville and Wilkinsonville, and crossing over two areas where the new Blackstone River Bikeway will be built. It then heads north up Depot Street in Sutton and Follette Street and Fitzpatrick Road in Grafton before proceeding onto Millbury Street and climbing back to the finish line at the Grafton Common. The team time trial features teams of four from each participating college in a race against the clock. The event, with teams stating at one minute intervals from 7:00 AM to approximately 9:00 AM at the Common, is hosted by the Boston University Cycling Club.

Also on Saturday the Beanpot Championship Road Race will be held in the towns of Grafton and Westborough. This 13.0 mile course is the same race course used for the 1996 Eastern Collegiate Cycling Championships, modified so that the course begins and finishes at the historic Grafton Common, considered by many to be the most distinctive and picturesque town common in Massachusetts. The race course passes such notable landmarks as the Nipmuc Nation Hassanamesit Indian Reservation on Brigham Hill Road, the Brigham Hill Community Farm and its Community Harvest project, the 1874 vintage Grafton and Upton Railroad on Snow Road and North Street, and Cummings / Tufts University School of Veterinary Medicine. The course features a dramatic hairpin turn at the corner of Route 30 and West Main Street in Westboro. The championship race course includes sections used by the Tour de Trump and Tour Dupont bike races when they traveled through Grafton and Westboro.

The Championship Road Race will include up to four mid morning race divisions starting between 9:30 AM and 9:50 AM, and up to four early afternoon race divisions starting between 1:00 PM and 1:15 PM. The race is hosted by the Harvard University Cycling Association.

2006 Beanpot Cycling Classic - Bike Race, Local Restaurant & Spectator Guide

The Beanpot Collegiate Cycling Weekend is organized by students from seven Boston area colleges - Harvard, Boston University, Boston College, Tufts University, Wentworth, Northeastern University and MIT. 2006 marks the fourth year that the road race will be held in Grafton and Westborough, and the second year for the team time trial event in Grafton and Sutton.

The third race of Beanpot Weekend, held on Sunday, April 9th, is the Beanpot Criterium event on the traditional downtown street course of Medford and Somerville.

The races are sanctioned by the Eastern Collegiate Cycling Conference (ECCC) and USA Cycling. The Eastern Collegiate Cycling Conference (ECCC) includes colleges in New England, New Jersey, New York, Delaware and Pennsylvania. As they compete from early March through April, ECCC teams vie for the top of the season-long team points standings, Collegiate Nationals qualification team spots, and the Ivy League trophy. The races feature team-oriented bicycle racing for all abilities with team pride, glory, and honor as the only prize list.

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Event Information

Parking

This year the Beanpot event will not be using the high school parking lot facilities on Providence Road. Instead, four parking lots within a half mile radius of the Grafton Common will be used as staging areas by the collegiate teams. These include the parking lot at St. Philip's Church, (Church Street) the parking lot at Minor Field / Mini-Fenway at Norcross Park (North Street) the parking lot at the Grafton Middle School on North Street, and the town owned property at 25 Worcester Street. Access to these four lots will be controlled by the event organizers and race marshals and will be restricted after the start of the morning road race event at 9:30 AM.

St. Philip's parking lot will be open and available for the scheduled 5:00 PM church services.

There is no parking around the Grafton Common or the race course finish lines on Millbury Street (until after 9:30 AM) and on Church Street. No parking on South Street which forms the initial leg for both race courses.

Parking at the Congregational Church parking lot will be restricted to race organizers, race officials, media, and public safety officials.

Parking in front of the two commercial blocks at the Grafton Common will be carefully monitored by race officials and is for use of the business patrons only.

Please respect that the parking lots for the Grafton Inn and the Grafton Public Library are in use during the race day and may be restricted for use by their patrons only.

Public Bathrooms

Bathrooms available to the public in the Grafton Common area will include those at the Congregational Church, the Baptist Church and at St. Philip's Church on Church Street.

The Historic Grafton Common Grafton, Massachusetts

Perhaps the most quintessential New England Common in the Blackstone Valley, Grafton Common is surrounded by sixteen historic buildings, including the traditional Congregational Church. The well maintained four acre parcel hosts a bandstand (gazebo) built in 1935 to film Eugene O'Neil's "Ah, Wilderness". Photo sessions for prom nights or weddings, summer concerts, the annual Antique Fair or the Christams Season Chain of Lights merely underscore the continued significance of the Grafton Common in Grafton's daily life. Grafton volunteers worked to designate the area an Historic District to maintain the appearance with strict standards preserving the connection to the past.

Charming shops, such as the Grafton Country Store, Peggy's Place, Tuscan Rose, or Antiques on the Common grace the area along with three churches, the typical Congregational Church as well as the First Baptist Church and the Unitarian Universalist. Several eateries line the Common, including Cafe on the Common, Latte A' More and the historic centuries old Grafton Inn, home to a lovely double fireplace restaurant still offering overnight rooms to stay. Modest and grand residences, the library and two prominent Grafton builder offices also border this 120 x 135' Common with historic architecture seen also along Church, Oak, South and Millbury streets all converging, along with Rte 140, at the historic Common.

Rte 140 was the old roadway for stagecoaches often stopping at the historic Grafton Inn. However, according to very old maps in 1831 and another in 1832, Rte 140 and Worcester Street did not yet exist, so the bulk of the earlier stagecoach traffic probably came up South Street or along North Street before Rte 140 was built. Church Street also did not exist until later. Rte 122 lies about half a mile away minimizing the growing traffic through the Common, but these two old routes join further north where Grafton's small, but growing commercial district is located. A new car wash, larger regional family run building supplies store and a variety of small restaurants, gas stations and shops line the heavily trafficked road with easy access to the Mass Turnpike, Rte 495, Rte 20, Rte 30, Rte 146 are within minutes or the nearby Grafton station for the MBTA traveling to Boston.

Though two grocery markets, Hodes and Glass King's, used to be located in Grafton, more than a decade passed before Stop & Shop filled the grocery store void left after their demise. But that has all changed in recent years as Grafton faces the benefits and the challenges of high growth, with over 1000 new residential permits adding to 5800 homes spread throughout the three different zip codes for South, North and central Grafton. Grafton has been working to provide affordable housing for its residents with several ongoing projects in varying stages. These three main sections, each retaining its very own neighborhood library, are comprised of many former old mill villages, cottage industries or rural farmlands with names such as Farnumsville, Saundersville, Kittsville, or Fisherville where the large, old mill burnt to the ground only a few years ago, but along the River where the Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor and Army Corps of Engineers heralds as a special waterfowl habitat.

Scenic roads, wetlands and the farmlands are currently challenged with the heavy growth, but both Grafton townspeople and the non-profit Land Trust have collectively preserved some key parcels for future generations to enjoy. Grafton volunteers and Town Meeting voters have worked diligently to balance the fiscal needs of the community with preservation, open space and recently, the permits under the State 40B law to begin building denser affordable housing as only affluent homes had been built recently throughout Town. Controversies have abounded over the density that overrides local bylaws necessitated by skyrocketing land costs to produce modest homes, but the commitment for diverse housing has always been integral to Grafton as seen its its inclusive zoning.

Economic development has been triggered by several committed residents working to develop the Centech Industrial Park and the Tufts Biomedical Park for startups while reversing the State's intention decades back to transform the former Grafton State Hospital to a prison. Instead, the former Hospital is home to the lovely Tufts Veterinary School campus along Rte 30 with scenic vistas and nearby historic Willard Clock House and Museum. Tax Incentive Financing is no longer necessary to induce location in Centech Park, but the Town will continue to benefit from the Cherry Street connector road soon coming to fruition along with the increased industrial tax base for the community.

The Grafton Common Area -Historic Treasures Abound

Grafton is filled with historical homes and buildings, some of which are described below:

The Common

The **Wheeler Block** was originally constructed in 1806 by Jonathan Wheeler. It was used as a general store and still is the home of Liz Humphries' wonderful Grafton Country Store with the recent addition of Latte & More. Its roof style is the French Mansard roof which was added in 1865 although it has lost its slate. The Country Store is a must-see for its quaintness, appealing diversity of products and penny candy!

Across Worcester Street and also facing the Grafton Common is the **Warren Building** built in the early 1850s by Jonathan Wheeler. Destroyed by fire in 1862, it was immediately rebuilt by Mr. Wheeler and became home to a tailor, jeweler and other businesses prior to its use as the old Town Hall. Presently, it is home to several unique and charming shops: women's clothing Peggy's Place, a European gift store, a Tea House and the Historical Society.

The **Evangelical Congregational Church** was completed in 1833 and its steeple and gallery clock are works of the famous Willard Family. The Greek Revival church architecture is a notable example of an early New England village. The roots of the Congregational church in Grafton go back to Solomon Prentice in 1731.

The Grafton Inn, 25 Central Square is the oldest building on Grafton common. It is pre-Industrial and still intact as the well-respected Grafton Inn restaurant and offers 8 rooms for lodging. It's at the corner of Rte 140 and many a stagecoach stopped at the Inn.

The **Unitarian Church** at 3 Central Square was built at the site of the second public meeting house before the Warren Building was constructed. This former meeting house, however, was burnt in the great fire of 1862. In the interim of the fire and the Warren Building, town meetings were held in the basement of the Church.

The Jerome Wheelock Statue was built in the late 1800s to honor a noted mechanical engineer, Jerome Wheelock, who had been born in Grafton in 1834. Wheelock bestowed a large gift of money to the town.

The monuments memorialize the **Civil War and World War I** soldiers lost in these two wars that were from Grafton. These monuments are graced with flowering trees in the Spring adding to the picturesque beauty.

The Baptist Church at 1 South Street was built in 1830 when membership grew after meeting throughout Grafton homes for many years.

The Bandstand gazebo was built for the filming of a 1935 movie, "Ah Wilderness" featuring a quaint NE village. However, a gazebo stood at the Common in the 1800s for public affairs and gatherings during town celebrations.

OAK STREET

The Old Burial Ground, off of Oak Street, is the town's oldest burial ground which was laid out in 1737 when the town was acreage was being divided. It started as an acre but has since grown to four acres and contains the graves of seven of Grafton's first 40 proprietors. It also is the burial ground of the Reverend Solomon Prentice.

12 Oak Street is a Greek Revival styled home almost identical to a home across the street. This house was built in the early 1830s by Phillip Wing whose son, Henry inherited it upon Phillip's death. It was used as a stopover for the mail coach during these years.

18 Oak Street was the farmhouse of the Redding family which held onto it for over 50 years. This property once held a large portion of land in this Oak Street area, but was reduced to a smaller lot in 1898 and sold to Joseph Adams. It might have been used as a rental unit.

20 Oak Street is known as the Solomon Prentice House and is one of the remaining 2 1/2 story five bay central chimney farmhouses to remain from the eighteenth century. It was home to Rev Solomon Prentice, who was relieved of his position in 1747 for his radical views, following the English minister and radical, Whitefield.

Millbury Street

16 Millbury Street is a 1 1/2 story 5 bay Cape Cod cottage, of which there are not many in Grafton. Still intact as the oldest standing house built in 1822, Captain Samuel Hall had worked as a blacksmith and an undertaker. The shop to build and store caskets was attached to his home.

26 Millbury Street is a prime example of the Queen Anne's architecture. The original owner, Edward Beauregard, built the home in 1890 and by 1900, Mrs. Louise Beauregard established it as a boarding house.

South Street

6 South Street, another example of Greek revival architecture, offers important features such as a central pavilion and double leaf arched door. The influential owner was Samuel Wood who fought in the Civil War.

17 South Street is one of only two three-story Federal style houses in Grafton. It was owned by two deacons of the Baptist Church at different times. The first was Jeremiah Bond in the 1830s and then surgeon and deacon George Hastings ran a shop in the home. Hastings worked as a surgeon in the Grand Army of the Republic after the Civil War although it seems he held no medical degree.

Worcester Street

6 Worcester Street, now home of the LakeView Deli, was built in the 1850s and became the home of Grafton's high school and grammar school in 1867. Grammar school classes were held on the first floor and high school classes were held on the second floor.

7 Worcester Street was built in 1875 for Dr. George K. Nichols, who had been raised in Saundersville (south Grafton) when his Father died. He was educated at private schools and the University of Pennsylvania. He became president of Grafton Savings Bank and married Samuel Harrington's daughter. This Italianate style home has been updated with more modern shingles and picture windows.

20 Worcester Street a gable end Greek Revival home owned for many years by George Estabrook, president of the Grafton Farmer's Club and selectman 1860-1.

39 Worcester Street is an 18th century gambled roof cottage, the oldest home in Grafton that was built around 1720. This home was moved from its original northwest location in Central Square.

North Street

1 North Street is a 5 bay Greek Revival home originally owned by shoemaker Samuel Flagg. It was later owned by shoemaker Silas Warren who brought the shoe manufacturing business to the site. In the 1840s, the building was used as a high school.

3 North Street was used as a tanning and currying shop during the 1850s after being built by Joseph Rice in the 1830s. Lewis Dodge was a major employer in Grafton at the Dodge Shop which was made into a dweliing in the 1880s.

15 North Street is an example of a mail order home assembled by locals after it was received from a Sears Roebuck catalog order. The site had earlier been the location for the Warren Family manufacturing structure.

28 North Street is a lovely and very well-preserved Federal House and is presently a Bed & Breakfast. It was built in 1790 for A.J. Hall and was a rooming house, often for teachers in the Worcester area.

30 North Street was the home of two generations of the Wood family. Isaac Wood was a School Committee official in the early 1800s. In the 1890s, undertaker Benjamin Gibson owned the home.

44 North Street is on the National Register of Historic Homes as the only example of a high style Greek Revival with a two story colonnade at the front and side. This house was built by owner George Clapp circa 1831 and was owned in the late 1890s by Grafton's treasurer, George McClellan.

April 8th Collegiate Bike Race Spotlights Route of Historic 1828 Blackstone Canal in Grafton & Sutton

GRAFTON: The historic Blackstone Canal, operated from 1828 to 1848, is the subject of several new investigative and interpretive studies by the Town of Grafton, The Grafton Land Trust and the John H. Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor. The canal trench and towpath, listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 1972, although largely hidden is still remarkably physically intact more than 150 years after canal use was discontinued. It traverses three miles through the historic mill villages of South Grafton and an additional one mile in the Wilkinsonville section of Sutton in Massachusetts.

Again in 2006, the Boston Beanpot Collegiate Cycling Classic Team Time Trial race course highlights the history of the Blackstone Canal, crossing it in two distinct locations in the mill villages of South Grafton and Sutton. The team time trial event features teams of four cyclists competing from each participating college in a race against the clock. The event, with teams starting at one minute intervals from 7:00 AM to approximately 9:00 AM at the Grafton Common, is hosted by the Boston University.

The new (2005) collegiate team time trial race course starts at the Grafton Common, then winds its way down Pleasant Street into South Grafton, where it crosses over a still completely watered section of the Blackstone Canal at Leland's Landing. Located at Pleasant and Canal Streets and just north of the Providence & Worcester Railroad tracks, Leland's Landing is part of the Saundersville mill village area of Grafton. Considered in the recently completed Blackstone Canal Preservation Study as one of the best areas for further historic interpretation of the Canal, Leland's Landing was the site of what was then (1820's -1830's) important commercial and trading facilities built in conjunction with canal boat traffic between Worcester and Providence. Where the bike race course crosses the canal there are three (now residential) buildings associated with the Leland family, the site of former Canal Lock #31 and remnants of a water control dam. The canal towpath includes an area documented where a towpath bridge crossed what was the combined Blackstone Canal and Blackstone River in this area.

The bike race course then takes cyclists over the P & W Railroad tracks and across the proposed route of the Blackstone River Bikeway. The new Bikeway is a planned 48 mile recreational facility which will connect Providence, Rhode Island to Worcester, Massachusetts, New England's second and third largest cities. The race course then turns right onto Route 122A - Main Street and through the mid-1800's mill villages of Saundersville and on into Wilkinsonville in Sutton. At the intersection of Route 122A and Depot Street in Sutton the race course turns north up Depot Street, again crossing a small but still quite visible watered section of the Blackstone Canal trench that is tucked in between Follette Street and Blackstone Street at the Grafton / Sutton town line. The team time trial course then proceeds up Follette Street and Fitzpatrick Road in Grafton before turning north onto Millbury Street and climbing back to the finish line at the Grafton Common.

Also on Saturday, April 8th the Beanpot Championship Road Race will be held in the towns of Grafton and Westborough. This 13.0 mile route is the same race course used for the 1996 Eastern Collegiate Cycling Championships, modified so that the course begins and finishes at the historic Grafton Common. The Beanpot Championship Road Race will include up to four mid morning race divisions between 9:30 AM and 9:50 AM, and up to four early afternoon race divisions starting between 1:00 PM and 1:15 PM. The race is hosted by the Harvard University Cycling Association.

The Beanpot Collegiate Cycling Weekend is organized by students from seven Boston area colleges - Harvard University, Boston University, Boston College, Tufts University, Wentworth Institute of Technology, Northeastern University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. 2006 marks the fourth year that the championship road race will be held in Grafton and Westborough, and the second year for the team time trial race in Grafton and Sutton. Nation's Largest Collegiate Bike Races Ready To Roll Through Grafton On Saturday, April 8th

GRAFTON: After moving the start finish line to the historic Grafton Common, and hosting a record 400 collegiate bike racers last year, the 2006 edition of the Boston Beanpot Collegiate Cycling Classic is set for a return spin into Grafton, Massachusetts on Saturday, April 8th.

Organized by students from seven Boston area colleges - Harvard, Boston University, Boston College, Tufts University, Wentworth, Northeastern University and MIT, the Beanpot races are the largest collegiate cycling event in the nation. This marks the fourth year that the championship road race will be held in Grafton and Westborough, and the second year for the team time trial event in Grafton and Sutton.

The team time trial features teams of four from each participating college in a race against the clock. The event, with teams stating at one minute intervals from 7:00 AM to approximately 9:00 AM, is hosted by the Boston University Cycling Club. The event is contested over the new 7.69 mile time trial course starting at the Grafton Common. The course then winds its way down Pleasant Street into South Grafton and Sutton, then onto Follette Street and Fitzpatrick Road in Grafton before proceeding onto Millbury Street and climbing back to the finish line at the Grafton Common.

The Beanpot Championship Road Race will be held on the championship 14.02 mile course used for the 1996 Eastern Collegiate Cycling Championships, modified so that the course begins and finishes at the historic Grafton Common. The Championship Road Race will include four mid morning race divisions starting between 9:30 AM and 9:50 AM, and four early afternoon race divisions starting between 1:00 PM and 1:15 PM. The race is hosted by the Harvard University Cycling Association.

The Grafton Lions Club will host a community chili and pasta luncheon at the Grafton Common bandstand starting at 11:00 AM and continuing to 2:00 PM. Cost is \$6.00 per person and includes a choice of pasta and sauce, or chili and sauce, bread, drinks, and deserts.

The third race of Beanpot Weekend, held on Sunday, April 9th, is the Beanpot Criterium event on the traditional 6/10th's mile downtown street course of Medford and Somerville.

The races are sanctioned by the Eastern Collegiate Cycling Conference (ECCC) and USA Cycling. The Eastern Collegiate Cycling Conference (ECCC) includes colleges in New England, New Jersey, New York, Delaware and Pennsylvania. As they compete from early March through April, ECCC teams vie for the top of the season-long team points standings, Collegiate Nationals qualification team spots, and the Ivy League trophy. The races feature team-oriented bicycle racing for all abilities with team pride, glory, and honor as the only prize list.
