A Brief History

DeKalb County has a rich and colorful history, a diverse legacy still reflected in the cultural expression of the county today.

Dating back to 1822, the county was named in honor of Johann DeKalb, a peasant mercenary who fought for the colonies in the Revolutionary War under the name "Baron Jean DeKalb."

Mills and ginneries were vital to the county's early growth. This heritage lives on in the names of various DeKalb roads that once led to these mills, such as Browns Mill, Evans Mill and Henderson Mill.

The county's previous courthouse was built in 1917 at a cost of \$10,000. DeKalb's present courthouse was built in 1965 at a cost of \$3.5 million, while the old facility has been renovated and serves as the headquarters for the DeKalb Historical Society.

DeKalb County is Georgia's most culturally enriched county, with a wonderful blend of different ethnic groups and cultures. The richness of life that these diverse groups of people bring to DeKalb permeate every facet of the county, from shopping and retail venues to a reflection of the community's very heart and soul.

Reflecting its people, DeKalb enjoys an exciting, diverse and talented cultural arts community, an outstanding public school system and excellent higher education facilities

DeKalb cooking school offers world-class culinary education

If you've ever dined at a restaurant in Paris, gorged on a buffet on a Royal Caribbean cruise or taken a date to Joel's in Buckhead or Café Lilly in Decatur, chances are a chef trained in DeKalb County may have cooked the meal.

Opened in 2003 with just 80 students, Le Cordon Bleu College of Culinary Arts Atlanta is now home to more than 800 chefs-in-training. Located just off I-285 in Tucker, Le Cordon's blue ribbon pedigree can be traced to the famous French school of the same name founded in 1895.

'Our graduates get jobs all over the world," said Executive Chef Todd Kazenske. "They go to Europe-Germany, France and Italy; the U.S.-Napa Valley, New York City and Disney World. We even have a graduate headed to South Africa.

Kazenske said students, who come near and far to attend the school, range in age from 16 to their mid-60s. Some have just a GED; one even has a Ph.D. They graduate with coveted diplomas after exhibiting more than 400 culinary proficiencies, all while helping manage kitchens and an in-house restaurant meant to mimic real-world facilities.

We have a lot of career changers here," said Kazenske, who got much of his training at Sea Island on the south Georgia coast. "We teach them the fundamentals to be successful, but they have to spend the time to better their skills to become areat chefs.

Le Cordon offers two degree programs – a certificate of baking and patisserie, which is about 10 months of intensive study and the more traditional associate's degree in the culinary arts that lasts about 15 months, including the practicum. The certificate program costs about \$20,000 and the culinary arts degree runs about \$40,000.

"We'd like to expand to about 1,200 to 1,500 students," said Kazenske, who was preparing for a quality assurance visit from Patrick Martin, vice president of educational development. "We have the room to grow."

Hospital at Hillandale county's newest gem in crown

Just off I-20 in the burgeoning city of Lithonia, sits the newest member of the county's family of hospitals – DeKalb Medical Center at Hillandale.

While the county is home to some of the most innovative and progressive health-care facilities, such as Emory University Hospital, Northlake Medical Center, the Atlanta VA Medical Center, Dunwoody Medical Center and Decatur Hospital, Hillandale is the baby of the bunch.

But don't let that fool you.

Because Hillandale is the first planned all-digital hospital in the state, it is one of the most efficient health-care providers in the metro area. Doctors and nurses can make faster, more informed decisions because all patient information is available at their fingertips. A Picture Archival and Communication System allows physicians to view diagnostic images and reports by computer from any facility within the DeKalb Medical Center hospital system or even from the office or home.

The six-story, 191,000-square-foot hospital is a welcome relief to many residents in south DeKalb who previously had to travel as much as 45 minutes away to get medical attention.

Cardiologist Cornelius Flowers, M.D., who earned a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Southern Mississippi and his medical degree from Columbia University, is chief of staff. He completed his residency in internal medicine and cardiovascular diseases at Emory University. Flowers is a member of the Association of Black Cardiologists and the International Society of Hypertension in Blacks. He has served on the DeKalb County Hospital Authority for more than 12 years.

Mixed-Use Hot in **DeKalb**

With its close proximity to Atlanta, DeKalb County has experienced tremendous growth in the use of mixed-use development, which combines residential and commercial property. Decatur, with its booming condominium developments, has seen the bulk of this trend in the county. However, other cities, like Chamblee, are also following suit.

The award-winning Atlantic Station, in Midtown Atlanta, is the metro area's best known mixeduse triumph, having converted a defunct steel mill into a perennial entertainment location. A DeKalb echo of Atlantic Station is found on Moreland Avenue at the Edgewood Retail District. The 42-acre former home of Atlanta Gas Light, between East Atlanta and Little Five Points, includes 590,000 square feet of retail space and 260 to 280 condos, single-family homes and apartments for senior citizens. Lowe's, Target, Kroger, Barnes & Noble, Best Buy, Ross Dress for Less, Bed, Bath & Beyond, Office Depot and PETCO are some of its tenants.

So why is mixed-use development so popular? "Because of increased land prices, the developer is forced to think a little outside the box in the use of specific properties," said Swanton Davis, a developer with Vantage Properties Association. "I believe that mixed-use locations will continue to be on the rise because people are looking to live closer in and have the convenience of shopping close to living quarters."





From Fairways To Trails

Parks-a-plenty is one way to describe the plethora of activities available in DeKalb. Whether it's fishing, hiking, biking or some other sport of choice, the county has it all. Perhaps most notable are the two golf courses owned by DeKalb. Mystery Valley, located in east DeKalb, is nestled among 265 acres of Georgia pines. The par 72 course is a 6,700-yard beauty sculpted with twisting and winding fairways. In South DeKalb, Sugar Creek tempts golfers' fates with tight fairways and fast greens through 6,318 yards of renovated landscape. DeKalb offers an annual pass for \$800, which allows patrons to play both courses for only the price of the cart fee.

Stone Mountain Park

Stone Mountain Park provides a day's escape or a weekend respite at the full service Marriott accommodations on the grounds unless, of course, camping is preferred. A climb to the top of the mountain is always invigorating. Or cast your line into one of the fishing holes. A riverboat cruise might be in order after a family picnic and just before the nightly laser show. Just in case there's a need for a little more golf, the park also houses two championship courses.

Arabia Mountain

Arabia Mountain features Heritage Area Cycling on the trails through the woodland and past rock outcrops, hiking to a quiet lake, finding unusual plants and watching the sun wake in the solitude of a high granite outcrop. There is so much to enjoy in vast recreational, natural and historical resources at the Arabia Mountain Heritage Area. It's a great place to visit any time of year.

DeKalb County has a form of government that is unique among metropolitan Atlanta counties. Only DeKalb has a chief executive officer, forming an executive branch that is independent of the board of commissioners, which acts as the legislative branch.

The county adopted this form of government a little more than 20 years ago when the Reorganization Act of 1985 created a structure under which there is a board of commissioners, composed of one commissioner for each of the county's five districts and two super districts. Commissioners are elected to staggered four-year terms. The county is divided geographically into five districts, then split in half to form the two super districts. Thus, every DeKalb County resident is represented by two commissioners. The commissioners set policy and appropriate funding for the county operations.

The CEO, elected countywide, administers the day-to-day operations of the county government and manages its 7,000 employees. The CEO, limited to two consecutive four-year terms, presides over the twice-monthly meetings of the board, but can only vote on business items in the event of a tie. At present, the county has had three CEOs—Manuel Maloof, Liane Levitan and the current CEO, Vernon Jones.

Atlanta

Although most of the city of Atlanta is in Fulton County, some of its most intriguing communities are in DeKalb. Avondale Estates

Jerry D. McCumber, Mayor


Avondale Estates is one of the earliest planned communities in the South and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Construction began in 1927, creating a commercial area designed to recall an English Tudor Village. The city is named for the Avon River, near which William Shakespeare lived and wrote most of his famous plays and poems. Like Shakespeare's home, Avondale Estates sits on a picturesque body of water. Lake Avondale is the centerpiece of Avondale Estates' residential area.

Today, some 4,500 people call Avondale Estates home. The tree-lined town has won numerous awards for its beautiful, well-cared-for trees.

Chamblee

Eric Clarkston, Mayor

Chamblee is a truly international city with the most ethnically





diverse population of any municipality in the Southeast. Incorporated in 1908, Chamblee has a population of roughly 9,500 people within its 3.5 square miles.

Chamblee also is home to Antiques Row, a collection of shops that antiques lovers come from across the Southeast to visit. The city is known for its international shopping and dining options as well as its small-town hospitality.

From DeKalb Peachtree Airport to the neighborhoods of loft-style condominiums springing up around the city, it's easy to see why Chamblee has adopted the slogan "a city on the right track."

Clarkston

Lee Swaney, Mayor

Clarkston was developed on land owned by the Georgia Railroad. In 1882, the city was named for W.W. Clark, a director of the railroad. Clarkston is home to a wide range of businesses, including software developers, wire and cable manufacturers and biotech companies. It is also the home of DeKalb Technical College and one of Georgia Perimeter College's campuses.

The city's more than 5,500 residents are just a short distance from numerous antique shops, textile shops and a charming blend of one-of-a-kind retail shops.

Decatur

William Floyd, Mayor

Fast-growing Decatur is the second oldest municipality in the Atlanta metropolitan area. It is the county seat with county and city government offices as neighbors in the Decatur downtown area. Decatur's population of more than 18,000 people swells to more than 24,000 during the day. It is home to Agnes Scott College as well as a number of other venerable institutions. Decatur has its own police and fire departments and is especially proud of its small and well-respected school system.

The old courthouse in the square in downtown Decatur, now the DeKalb History Center, stands on land where two Indian trails once crossed. Decatur was incorporated in 1823 and named after Stephen Decatur, a U.S. naval hero.

Doraville

Ray Jenkins, Mayor

Doraville was founded in 1871. Historians dispute the issue of which woman named Dora was honored in the town's naming. She may have been the daughter of a railroad official or any of a number of other 19th century residents, according to local legends.

Today, Doraville has a population of nearly 10,000 and is located aside several major transportation routes. It has attracted a large segment of DeKalb's international community and is home to a number of large manufacturing and retail facilities.

Lithonia

Darold Peter Honore, Mayor

Lithonia traces its beginnings to the early 1840s, when a tiny settlement sprang up at the intersection of two roads. Founded in 1856, the city derives its name from the Greek word "lithos," meaning stone. Located near an outcropping of granite, the city has three quarries that still produce thousands of tons of granite daily. The 800-acre Lithonia Industrial Park, which opened in 1977, marked the town's growth beyond an economy based on the granite industry. Lithonia today, with a population of about 1, 200, is home to scores of growing businesses and is a popular community for commuters. The opening of The Mall at Stonecrest in 2001 prompted a revitalization that has attracted dozens of restaurants and retail shops in the area near the mall.

Pine Lake

Greg Zarus, Mayor

Picturesque Pine Lake at two-tenths of a square mile is the smallest of DeKalb's municipalities and is known for its scenic neighborhoods. Pine Lake was founded in 1937 and named for the lake in the center of town. It began as a cluster of cottages, used as summer homes by Atlanta residents seeking to escape the heat of the city. Today, its population is around 600.

Stone Mountain

Gary Peet, Mayor

The city of Stone Mountain sits in the shadow of the geological phenomenon whose name it bears. The giant granite rock that attracts visitors from all over the world rises 1,683 feet above sea level and features the largest relief sculpture in the world, the Confederate Memorial Carving.

The city, originally incorporated in 1839, covers 1.6 square miles and has a population of more than 7,000. The Village of Stone Mountain is the site of quaint retail shops, restaurants and even a popular and esteemed theater.

From art galleries to live theater and from jazz festivals to film festivals, arts enthusiasts have plenty to explore in DeKalb County. So, whether one prefers to take in a performance or be the performer, DeKalb's arts scene offers something to satisfy every fancy.

"There are so many things going on in the arts," said Bill Leavell, public outreach coordinator for the county's office of arts, culture and entertainment. Still in the middle of what has been a successful arts year, Leavell and other staff members are already organizing events for 2007.

Although he is not ready to reveal anything, Leavell promises a memorable 2007 season. DeKalb's Blues and Jazz Festival and the Spaghetti Junction Film Festival are two of the county's special events. For indie film devotees, April is an exciting time. DeKalb hosts a weeklong annual event that features workshops for aspiring filmmakers, roundtable discussions and dozens of independent films. In mid-July, while the weather is heating up, slip on dark shades and cool out at the Blues and Jazz Festival. This is a two-day, open-air event that always exceeds expectations.

Art galleries are the vogue in Decatur. The city is home to an increasing number of varied galleries that includes not just paintings but also jewelry, photographs and folk art exhibits. Directing this burgeoning trend is the Decatur Arts Alliance, a partnership among artists, business owners and local government. The third Thursday of each month, from 6 to 9 p.m., visitors can travel a downtown Decatur circuit that takes one to a dozen galleries, and they are all within walking distance from each other. Glasses of wine and hors d'oeuvres await weary travelers.

Highly trained agencies keep DeKalb from harm

Public safety is a chief concern in DeKalb County.

The DeKalb Fire and Rescue Department has an Insurance Service Office rating of 3, considered very high. Fire hydrants are located within at least 500 feet of county residents. In recent years, the county has bolstered its in-house training program, making it one of the most respected in the Southeast.


Founded in 1937, the department has grown tremendously to reflect the needs of county residents.

According to county estimates, the fire department has made more than 104,000 responses in the last year. Further enhancing the efficiency of rescue services is a county-led mandate that fire personnel undergo extensive medical training, creating a flexible response strategy. An integral part of public safety is the DeKalb County Sheriff's Department,

An integral part of public safety is the DeKalb County Sheriff's Department, which is accredited to the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) for eight years and the National Commission on Correction Health Care (NCCHC) for four years.

The Sheriff's Office provides security for a state-of-the-art courthouse and the Court Division, which is considered a model for agencies to follow. The Field Division, in addition to other law enforcement duties, tracks and maintains the sex offender registry. This registry identifies sex offenders living within close proximity to residences, businesses, or schools.

The DeKalb County Police Department has five precincts, covering all points of DeKalb. Officers undergo a rigorous and comprehensive training regime, rewarding its officers with competitive salaries. Each of the county's municipalities also has its own police departments.






