Azar Gat was born in Haifa, Israel, in 1959. He took his BA from Haifa University (1975-8), his MA from Tel Aviv University (1979-83), and his DPhil from the University of Oxford (1984-6). His publications include: The Origins of Military Thought from the Enlightenment to Clausewitz (Oxford UP, 1989), The Development of Military Thought: The Nineteenth Century (Oxford UP, 1992), Fascist and Liberal Visions of War: Fuller, Liddell Hart, Douhet, and Other Modernists (Oxford UP, 1998), and British Armour Theory and the Rise of the Panzer Arm: Revising the Revisionists (St Antony/Macmillan, 2000). The first three books have been reissued in one volume as A History of Military Thought: From the Enlightenment to the Cold War (Oxford UP, 2001). Together with Zeev Maoz he edited War in a Changing World (Michigan UP, 2001) He is currently working on a wide-ranging interdisciplinary book, provisionally entitled War in Human Civilization. He has been an Alexander von Humboldt Fellow in Germany (Freiburg), a Fulbright Fellow in the USA (Yale), a British Council Scholar in Britain (Oxford), and a Visiting Fellow at the Mershon Center, The Ohio State University. He has been Chair of the Department of Political Science at Tel Aviv University since 1999.
