After every game, coach David Wood and selected players will be available for interviews. Following a 10-minute "cooling-off" period, coach Wood will field questions in his office followed by the players in the locker room. All media requests will be handled within the locker room and not outside. If you wish to interview a specific player after the game, please notify Sports Information Director Derek Crudele. At home games, media members are asked to enter the Quick Stadium press box through the door furthest from the scoreboard. (If you are walking up the bleachers toward the press box with your back to the field, it is the door on your left. Thanks for your cooperation.)

Dixon Field is the first field after the gate. Continue past the field to the main parking lot. Schwartz Center is directly in front and Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium is to the right. From Interstate-95: Take Exit 7 (Interstate-476) and immediately get off Exit 1 for MacDade Blvd. West. Turn left at Bullens Lane (second light). Go to the second stop sign and turn right. Edith R. Dixon Field is the first field after the gate. Continue past the field to the main parking lot. Schwartz Center is directly in front and Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium is to the right.





David Wood • Head Coach

Head coach David Wood has been a part of something very special at Widener University, serving as a player, assistant coach and head coach over 18 of the last 19 years. In three seasons as head coach, he has built something very special and looks to continue that success in a new year.

The only alum in the 126-year history of the program to coach the football team, Wood molded all the pieces into place in 2005 with a memorable campaign. The Pioneers amassed an 8-3 record, capturing the ECAC South Atlantic Bowl for the school's first postseason title since 1981.

His likeable personality and strong leadership skills have helped him carve a niche into one of the area's most successful programs. This has helped pave the way for bigger and better things to occur down the road. With plenty of resources at his disposal, Wood has the program headed in the right direction.

The 21st coach in school history, Wood boasts a 19-12 record over three seasons. The Pioneers last season notched a second straight campaign with a five-game winning streak and just the school's fifth undefeated season at Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium.

Wood's credentials are not limited to Widener. He served last July as a featured coach in Hohenfels, Germany at the Team USA American Football Camp. In this role, he gave expert evaluations and lessons to some of the best players and coaches in America.

He begins a term this season as the Middle Atlantic Conference's NCAA representative. Wood also for the second time participated in Pete Carroll's USC Football Camp.

Wood is a two-time Middle Atlantic Conference All-Star, receiving citations as a Champion USA Division III All-American and GTE Academic All-District player as a senior. He helped Widener to its second straight Middle Atlantic Conference pass defense title and a No. 12 Division III ranking in 1990.

After graduation, Wood was an assistant coach for the Pioneers working with the defensive backs, running backs, linebackers and special teams from 1991-1995. He spent 1996 as the running backs coach at Division I-AA powerhouse Lehigh University before returning to Widener in 1997 as defensive coordinator, a position he still holds.


In his role as defensive coordinator, the Pioneers have been one of the best units in the country against the run. The defense in 1998 led the nation in allowing just 31.4 yards per game on the ground. The rushing defense enjoyed consecutive top six national rankings in rushing defense, with the last coming in 2002 with a mark of 73.4 yards per game. During the 1998 season, the defense shattered the school record

with 73 sacks and ranked seventh nationally in total defense after allowing 226.1 yards per game. Four different times that season, the Pioneers held opponents to negative yards on the ground, including a school record minus-43 yards at Delaware Valley.

Wood also is the university's head golf coach. Under his direction, the Pioneers enjoyed its highest finish in school history




Outside of Widener, Wood is a member of the National Register's Who's Who in Executives and Professionals and also is treasurer of the Delaware County Literacy Council Board of Directors.

A three-year defensive starter for the Pioneers, Wood graduated from Widener in 1991 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Accounting and received a Master of Taxation degree from the University in 1993.

A native of Yeadon, Wood was one of Delaware County's leading rushers with an average of 5.7 yards per carry at Penn Wood High School in 1986

Wood resides in Boothwyn with his wife Deanna and sons David, 7, Matthew, 6, and Christopher, 2.

Widener **ASSISTANT COACHES**



Chris Ostrowsky • Offensive Coord., QB

Chris Ostrowsky, in his third season as Widener's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, has continued to place the offense among the elite in the Middle Atlantic Conference.

The Pioneers in 2005 continued to make noise with the ball, totaling 403.7 yards of total offense and scoring 29.1 points per game. This helped the team score

at least 30 points in six contests and claim its first ECAC championship.

As quarterbacks coach, he guided Mike Lomas the last three seasons into Widener's record book. Lomas graduated as the school's all-time leader in passing yards, completions, total offense, 200-yard passing games and 300-yard passing games.

In his first season as the offensive mastermind in 2003, Widener's offensive unit became one of the most explosive and efficient teams in the conference. In 2004, Widener racked up close to 380 yards per game including 284 in the air.

Ostrowsky came to Widener from Washington and Lee University, where he served as offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and receivers coach from 2002-2004.

During his tenure at W&L, Ostrowsky guided the team to the most touchdown passes over a two-year span in school history. He also coached the Division III fifth all-time passing leader Peter Dean, who also was an Academic All-American.

He coached Chris Sullivan, who in 2002 was the Division III leader in all-purpose yards. Sullivan went on to be a finalist for the Gagliardi Trophy as the top player in Division III.

In addition to Sullivan's achievements, Ostrowsky also coached two All-Americas (Matt Rapoza and Sullivan) along with John Melillo and Jay Thomas who were Academic All-Americans.

His ability to recruit in New Jersey has been a valuable asset for Widener. In his time at W&L, Ostrowsky helped the school record its largest recruiting class from the Garden State.

Ostrowsky was named the youngest coach in New Jersey in 1997, taking over East Side High School. During his seven years, the team snapped an 18-game losing streak in the opener of the 1998 season. The squad qualified for the playoffs and earned a Top 10 ranking in Essex County by the *Star-Ledger*, both firsts in school history.

For those accomplishments, Ostrowsky was named the Star-Ledger High School Coach of the Year.

As a player at Roselle Park High School, he was the quarterback and earned All-State honors in 1989. He is second all-time in career touchdown passes thrown at Roselle Park.

Graduating from New Jersey City University with a B.A. in History, he is married to the former Jennifer Deo. Ostrowsky and his wife have two sons, Jackson, 6, and Joseph, 4.

Brian Sheridan • Inside LB, Special Teams Coord.

Brian Sheridan, is in his third year at Widener, had a daunting task during the 2005 season as several linebackers with crippled with injuries.

He helped right the ship that saw the Pioneers close among the league's best in rushing defense and permit just seven points in three different contests.

In addition to leading the inside linebackers, Sheridan also serves as the program's special teams coach.

Sheridan came to Widener after serving one season as linebacker

coach at Saint Peter's College in Jersey City, NJ. He previously spent five years at East Side High School in Newark, NJ, where he was the head coach in 2002. He was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator four seasons at East Side before becoming one of the youngest head coaches in New Jersey.

He played four seasons at Rutgers University, where he was an All-

Big East Conference selection in 1997. During that season, he set school records with 161 total tackles and 109 unassisted tackles. Those totals also rank third all-time in Big East Conference history for a season. He was team captain twice.

Sheridan was a standout linebacker and fullback at Union High School in Union, NJ, where he was named New Jersey Gatorade Football Player of the Year. He also was a first team Star-Ledger and Associated Press All-State and All-Group player. Sheridan was a Heisman High School All-Star, which honors the top 15 players in New Jersey, New York and Connecticut.

Sheridan in 1991 helped the Farmers close with a No. 1 ranking in the state thanks to his team defeating Randolph in the North Jersey Section 2 Group IV final, ending the latter's 59-game winning streak. Union was ranked fourth in the nation by USA Today and was named the 10th best public-school team in New Jersey history by the Star-Ledger through 2003.

ASSISTANT COACHES

Billy Adams • Running Backs

Billy Adams begins his first season as Widener's running backs coach. He arrives after spending three seasons at nearby Williamson Trade School from 2002-04. Adams coached the running backs, defensive backs, linebackers and special teams at various points and also was an assistant recruiting coordinator. Since 1987, he has worked for Exelon Power as a fuel production technician. Adams graduated from Albright with a B.S. in Applied Psychology and Organizational Development and also has a Professional Certificate in Human Resource Management from DePaul University.



John Amendt • Secondary

John Amendt brings 30 years of experience to the coaching staff. In his third year as a Widener assistant coach, he spent 11 years with the University of Pennsylvania Sprint Lightweight football team. During that time, he was the defensive coordinator for nine years and helped win three league titles. In 2000, he led the team to wins over Army and Navy for the first time in school history. He also coached tight ends and running back at West Chester University, where he coached two All-Americas. At the high school level, he was the head coach at Roman Catholic High School where Marvin Harrison of the Indianapolis Colts was on his freshman team. Amendt has a degree from Eastern College.



Brian Fox • Assistant Wide Receivers

Brian Fox is in his fourth season with the Pioneers. He will coach the wide receivers after assisting with the running backs in 2005. Brian has been instrumental in the development of athletes in Del. Co., having coached the Wallingford Huskies in the Bert Bell League and the Ridley Park Parkers in the Delco League. A member of the Knights of Columbus, he has been a volunteer for the annual Blue/Gold All-Star Game that is made up of players from area CYO teams. Fox also has been a Ridley Township (Leedom) Little League District coach since 1998. Fox also played four seasons for Upper Darby of the Del. Val. Semi-Pro Football Conf. under Widener assistant John Amendt. Fox was a member of the 1985 Indiana U. of PA PSAC Western Conference champions. Fox graduated from Widener with a B. S. in Information Systems and resides in Ridley Park with his children, Bill, 17, Courtney, 15, and Bryan, 13 (pictured).



Mike Guille • Outside Linebackers

Mike Guille brings a long, storied football background to Widener. A graduate of Monsignor Bonner where he was a member of the 1968 championship football team, he attended West Chester University and was on three championship squads. He started his coaching career at Darby-Colwyn High School and moved on to become the first football coach at Penn Wood High School from 1980 to 1990. The three-time coach of the year, who coached Widener head man David Wood, saw his team win five championships and finish runner-up twice. He joined Widener in 1992 as a linebacker coach. Guille is the chairperson of the Health and Physical Education Department at Penn Wood and resides in Springfield, PA.



Mike Heath • Offensive Line

Mike Heath is in his second season with Widener. He will coach the offensive line after co-coordinating the running backs a season ago. Under Heath's leadership, Khalee Prothro was named MAC Rookie of the Year and second team all-conference after totaling 1,573 all-purpose yards and 12 touchdowns. Heath continues to teach Health and Physical Education at Springfield High School. Before coming to Widener, Heath coached for 13 years at Springfield, eight as the offensive line coach and five as head coach. He also volunteered his services for several years as coach in the Hero Bowl, Delaware County's All-Star Game. A resident of Souderton, PA, Heath lives with his wife, Tara, and daughter, Kylie.





Gary Long • Tight Ends

Gary Long is in his fifth season as an assistant coach for the Pioneers. Long was a player at Widener from 1994 to 1997, where he was part of two Middle Atlantic Conference championship teams. He graduated from Widener in 1997 with a degree in Criminal Justice and Sociology and recently earned his Master's in Elementary Education in 2005. He will assist Brian Sheridan with the inside linebackers and also will work with the special teams.



Jack Signor • Defensive Line

Jack Signor is in his ninth season on the staff and seventh as defensive line coach. As defensive line coach, Signor has tutored numerous all-conference selections and four first team All-Americas. He previously served as a defensive assistant in 1998 and the defensive tackles coach in 1999. Signor was named a Division III All-America in 1997 at defensive lineman and the school's recipient of the F. Eugene Dixon Bowl for dedication and unselfish contribution as a senior. A four-year starter and also captain his senior season, Signor was tabbed second team all-conference in 1996 and first team all-league in 1997. A 1999 graduate of Widener with a degree in History, he received his Master's in Middle School Education here in 2005. Signor is working toward a second Master's in Educational Leadership/Principals Certification. The dean of students at Ridley Middle School, Signor resides in Wallingford, PA with his wife, Eva, and daughter, Riley.



Bob Napp • Wide Receivers

Bob Napp is in his first year in his second stint as Widener assistant coach. He will coach the wide receivers in 2006. Napp arrives after coaching the last two seasons for West Chester East High School as the offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. He served an offensive coordinator at Bishop Shanahan High School from 1999-2003, offensive coordinator at Peirce Middle School from 1996-99 and offensive coordinator at Cardinal O'Hara High School in 1994. Napp's first go-around at Widener had him as the quarterbacks and fullbacks coach in 1988. He was the head coach at Upper Darby High School from 1986-87 after two seasons as a graduate assistant at Temple University. Napp received a B.S. in Secondary Education with a concentration toward Mathematics from West Chester University in 1972. He earned his Master's in Secondary Education from WCU in 1978.



John De Carlo • Assistant Offensive Line

John De Carlo is in his first season at Widener as a graduate assistant and will work as an assistant with the offensive line. De Carlo enters after four standout seasons at Sacred Heart from 2002-05. He played 37 games with 33 starts on the offensive line overall, allowing no sacks from his responsibilities in 2004. De Carlo, the offensive line captain in 2005, helped lead the Pioneers to a 23-18 record during his time. He donated his time in many ways, helping with the *Athletes Have Heart Foundation* in 2002, the *Soundview Sports Camp* for two years and *Habitat for Humanity* in 2004. De Carlo graduated Sacred Heart in 2006 with a B.S. in Criminal Justice.



Zach Richards • Defensive GA, Safeties

Zach Richards is in his first season as a defensive graduate assistant, primarily overseeing the safeties. He arrives in Chester after winning two letters with Bucknell's football team. He finished with 29 tackles in 2003 and had 13 the year prior. Richards was one of two freshmen to play every game in 2002 and in 2005 won the Bobby Pangburn Memorial Award, the first non-active player to capture this honor. He served as a student assistant coach in 2004 and 2005, assisting the defensive line with its practice schedule and film study. He also helped script the defenses during games. Richards graduated from Bucknell in 2006 with a B.S. in Business Administration. He played his high school ball at Upper Darby High School, earning three letters in football and four in track & field.

An 8-3 record along with the school's first ECAC championship would satisfy most schools. Widener hopes these major steps are signs of things to come, returning 14 starters on a squad which seeks to continue making noise in the Middle Atlantic Conference.

The Pioneers last year rode an explosive offense and an intimidating defense to their first postseason title in 24 years thanks to many big plays in key situations. This gives plenty of optimism to a group which welcomes backs 66 letterwinners from an already tested unit.


The *offense* in 2005 was among the league's best with over 403 yards of total offense per contest. The graduation of standout quarterback Mike Lomas leaves the door wide open for several to step in and make their mark just as much as the school's all-time leader in several categories.

Junior Matt Campbell served as backup last season and earned several snaps. He will receive competition from senior Adam Parcell, who started at defensive end a season ago.


MAC Rookie of the Year Khalee Prothro gave Widener a huge lift last season at halfback. Averaging almost seven yards per carry and almost 80 yards per contest, the sophomore also plays a vital role catching the ball out of the backfield as well as on kickoff returns.

Sophomore Scott Monestime also will seek time in the backfield. Sophomores Jesse Jayne and Fritzie Purverge are the leading candidates to get the starting role at fullback.

Senior Jamie Schild and junior Mike Schmidt give the Pioneers more than able targets at wide receiver. Schild averaged over 18 yards per catch last season and made several clutch grabs. Schmidt, who has the potential to be one of the conference's most dangerous receivers, presents the squad plenty of speed and

Senior Mike Falkenstein and junior Bill Calhoun also have the talent to make an impact at wide receiver.

Junior Kevin Wisniewski and sophomore Kevin Carroll will battle for the starting role at tight end after seeing limited action in 2005.

The offensive line is paced by junior left tackle Michael Fagnani, a second team all-league pick last season. Sophomore Mike Chambers gives the team a boost at either tackle or guard and sophomore Cris Collazos is back at left guard. Junior Sean McAleer hopes to play a key role at guard and senior Justin Barbely returns at center.

Others looking for time on the line include juniors Nick Sarro and Charles Ridewood, and sophomores Bart Troiano and Jason Mertz.

The *defense* last season held the opposition to 19 or fewer points in six contests last season and was among the league's elite in rushing yards allowed. Expectations remain high for a group which returns eight starters and hopes to continue piling seasonending awards.

The most significant returnee is senior free safety Todd Fairlie, named first team All-America and second team all-conference. A dynamic player who has the ability to change the game at any moment, Fairlie gives the Pioneers great leadership and a strong desire to make big plays.



Widener is solid at cornerback with juniors John Martorell and Orlando Brown II. Martorell posted a breakout campaign last season with 75 tackles, giving the secondary another weapon teams looked to work around. Brown steps into the starting role after giving the Pioneers quality play last season.

The Pioneers were decimated by injuries among their linebackers, but still bring back a solid unit that hopes to be together an entire season.

Mike McFadden was tops among Widener linebackers last season with 74 tackles, giving the team consistent and energetic play. Fellow junior Matt Yost also made a tremendous impact with his determined competitiveness and more of the same is expected this year.

Junior Joe Meringolo gives the Pioneers a major boost at inside linebacker, coming off a year which he recorded 36 tackles. Sophomore Pat Brady suffered a devastating season-ending injury in the second game of last season, but is back to make a run at outside linebacker.

Senior Carroll Dixon closed fourth a season ago with 58 tackles and hopes to crack the starting lineup. Other looking to play a role at linebacker include juniors Daniel MacDonald and Steve Kovitch, and sophomore Adam Wiley.

One of the major reasons Widener placed itself among the league's best in rush defense was the play of senior Mo Kabba. Possessing what it takes to be one of the league's elite, Kabba is an intimidating force who the opposition will tend to work around.

Junior Tom Gallo returns at defensive end and senior Evan Snydman hopes to win the role vacated by Parcell.

Juniors Keith Terlizzi, Jim Fitzgerald and Joe O'Shea also are seeking time on the defensive line.

Widener this season replaces two key losses on *special teams*. Punter Doug Schlack, an Academic All-American last year, booted 20 punts inside the 20 yard line and averaged 35.3 yards per kick. Kicker Frank Vinci converted many key opportunities last season, including a 29-yard field goal as time expired to help Widener stun then No. 29 Salisbury.

Senior Robert McHugh and junior Tom Laurich each look to win the starting role at punter. Laurich and sophomore Frank D'Angelo, who each shared kick-off responsibilities last season, will vie for the role at kicker.



Mike Lomas became the school's leader in completions and moved into second place in passing yards for Widener, which was handed a season-opening loss to Wilkes. Lomas was successful on 24-of-49 passes and has 434 completions, breaking the mark of 422 held by Mike Granato (1996, 1998-2000). Entering the day fifth in passing yards, Lomas climbed three spots by passing for 254 yards and now has 5,393 for his career. He trails only Granato, who threw for 7,824 career yards. Wilkes got the game's first break in the second quarter when Lomas was stripped by Keith Cavalloti and Anthony Serafin recovered the fumble at the Colonels 44 yard line. On the next play, Al Karaffa fired a deep pass over the middle to Jim Jordan as Wilkes moved to the Widener six yard line. Three plays later, Remmel dove into the line for a one-yard touchdown and a 7-0 Colonels lead with 4:48 left in the first half. Wilkes got another big play on its second touchdown, taking advantage on the opening drive of the second half. On third down and 18, Remmel caught a screen pass behind the line of scrimmage and sprinted 57 yards for a score. The touchdown just 2:21 into the half gave the Colonels a 13-0 cushion after missing the extra point. Despite being shutout in the opening half, Widener owned a 152-143 advantage in total yards. Lomas threw for 98 yards during that stretch and Bob Warden had six carries for 42 yards. Jeff Chick caught seven passes for 89 yards with Warden and Jon Steever adding five catches. Todd Fairlie had 10 tackles.

James Fagnani caught a 38-yard touchdown pass from Mike Lomas early in the second half, keying Widener to victory over Lycoming at Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium. Leading 3-0 at halftime, Widener got the first big break early in the second half. Lycoming had third down and nine at its own 15 when its center snapped the ball over the head of backup quarterback Sean Hanna, who fell on it in the end zone for a safety. On the ensuing free kick, Jeff Chick returned it 30 yards to the Warriors 38 yard line. Fagnani's touchdown catch followed with 11:09 left in the third quarter, giving the Pioneers a 12-0 lead. Widener got another huge play later in the quarter when John Martorell intercepted Hanna at Lycoming's 29 yard line. Chick caught a 25-yard pass from Lomas on the first play to set up first down and goal at the four. But the Warriors tightened up on defense, surviving a roughing the passer call to only allow a field goal by Frank Vinci, his second of the day, that gave the Pioneers a 15-0 lead. That capped a quarter which Widener held a 104-33 edge in total offense, including 74 yards passing. Lycoming got back in the game as Jim Laky scored on a two-yard run with 13:15 left for a 15-7 deficit. That ended a 16-play, 80-yard drive in which the Warriors benefited from a pass interference call on fourth down at the 14 yard line. The remainder of the contest was a battle for field position, with the Warriors getting the ball on their six yard line with 1:45 left. In that drive, Hanna competed a fiveyard pass to Jeremy Ebert on fourth down deep in its own territory and got a pass interference call on Widener with 43 seconds left and the ball at the Lycoming 18. Lycoming drove to the Widener 33, but Hanna's pass in the end zone for Jim Smith was knocked away by Anthony Huggins as time expired. Chick had seven catches for 91 yards and Lomas completed 22-of-34 passes for 196 yards. Dominic Rock had 20 carries for 60 yards, Zach Santiago closed with 10 tackles and Matt Yost recorded two of the team's five sacks. Hanna completed 8-of-23 passed for 91 yards with Laky rushing seven times for 32 yards. Tim Hartingh had 12 tackles, Luke Sterling closed with 11 and Smith added 10. Widener posted a 268-153 advantage in total offense, including a 114-22 margin in the first half. It was the Pioneers first game at Quick Stadium since a new FieldTurf surface was installed over the summer.

Todd Fairlie made three critical defense plays, one of many for Widener to have standout performances in a wild victory over Lebanon Valley in Annville, PA. Fairlie took center stage the first time when he forced and recovered a fumble from Tyler McCauley at the Dutchmen 31 yard line. Three plays later, Jeff Chick caught an 11-yard touchdown pass from Mike Lomas for a 35-31 Widener cushion with 7:25 left and the contest's seventh lead change. Play number two for Fairlie occurred on the next drive, intercepting a pass from Dan Kelly and returning it to the Pioneers 46 yard line with 4:48 left. After Jamie Schild caught a 41-yard pass from Lomas on third down and eight, Khalee Prothro followed with an 11-yard touchdown run. The extra point was missed and Widener owned a 41-31 lead with 3:27 to go. Lebanon Valley closed to 41-38 with 2:34 to play as Adam Brossman caught a three-yard scoring pass from Kelly. But Fairlie recovered the onside kick and Widener ran out the clock, marking its sixth straight victory at Arnold Field and 12th in the last 13 overall meetings. The teams combined for 42 points and 333 yards in the fourth quarter. Chick had a solid game for the Pioneers, catching 12 passes for 145 yards and a touchdown. He fell just shy of her career-best 13 catches for 196 yards September 25, 2004 against King's. Lomas completed 26-of-46 passes for 387 yards and four touchdowns. It was the eighth time he passed for at least 300 yards, one shy of the school record, and his touchdown passes are one behind his personal best. Prothro and Bob Warden each closed with a touchdown rushing and receiving. Prothro ran for 97 yards on 16 carries, helping the Pioneers obtain 139 yards rushing. He also had five catches for 43 yards. Zach Santiago paced the defense with 13 tackles and Mike McFadden added 12, including a key interception in the end zone midway through the third quarter. Khalee Prothro scored four touchdowns, including three such receptions in the first half as Widener won its third straight by topping Moravian at Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium. Prothro became the 10th player in Widener history to record at least three touchdown catches, one shy of the school record set by Tyreak Saviour on November 9, 2002 against Juniata. Prothro closed with 351 all-purpose yards that included 138 yards rushing on 15 carries, 180 yards receiving with 11 catches and 33 return yards. Prothro and the Pioneers wasted little time jumping to a 7-0 lead, helping them to their eighth straight win over the Greyhounds. After Moravian's Brian Reckenbeil booted the opening kickoff out of bounds, Mike Lomas fired a 65-yard scoring pass to Prothro on the first play from scrimmage. Moravian responded on its first drive as Chris Jacoubs went in on a 10-yard touchdown run for a 7-7 tie. Widener regained the lead on its next drive with Prothro scoring on a 10-yard pass from Lomas for a 13-7 lead after a missed extra point. On that drive, Prothro caught three passes for 54 yards. Lomas and Prothro were on the spot again early in the second quarter. The duo hooked up on a swing pass to the right that resulted in a three-yard touchdown with 12:19 left and a 20-7 lead, closing an 11-play, 76-yard drive. The Pioneers used a 70-yard drive later in the quarter for another score, giving the squad four touchdowns on their first five possessions. It was capped when Mike Schmidt scored on a seven-run yard run with 5:27 left for a 27-7 margin. The Greyhounds got a 23-yard field goal from Reckenbeil early in the second half and added a one-yard quarterback sneak from Jerry Venturino with 13:12 left, closing to 27-17. But Prothro was on the spot again, scoring on a 48-yard touchdown run two minutes later for a 34-17 margin. Prothro's four touchdowns are two shy of the school and conference record set by Billy "White Shoes" Johnson in 1972 against St. John's. Lomas completed 22-of-34 passes for 289 yards and three touchdowns. Todd Fairlie recorded 14 tackles for Widener with Carroll Dixon adding nine. Jacoubs, who added a two-yard touchdown run with 2:18 remaining, finished with 28 carries for 138 yards. Venturino completed 22-of-43 passes for 329 yards and Shawn Martell had six catches for 133 yards, helping Moravian hold a 538-476 advantage in total offense. Andy Morrissey recorded a team-high nine tackles. This marks the 13th straight season the Pioneers have recorded at least a three-game winning streak.

Mike Schmidt scored one touchdown and his kickoff return helped set up another as Widener won its fourth straight, playing in a torrential downpour. Widener drew first blood with 5:11 left in the first quarter for a 6-0 lead. Khalee Prothro, who scored four touchdowns last week against Moravian and won three major weekly awards, ran a sweep to the right and fumbled into Albright's end zone. But Schmidt was there to recover for his second touchdown of the year. It was Schmidt's second big play on the drive. He caught a 29-yard pass from Mike Lomas on third down and three that went to the Lions' 19 yard line. The Pioneers again were the benefactors of good luck for their second touchdown. Albright punter Seth Kaplan dropped the long snap and fell on the ball on his team's four yard line. Two downs later on a play fake, Lomas found James Fagnani wide open in the right flat for a four-yard score and a 12-0 lead with 6:47 to play in the half. Albright closed to 12-6 with 1:54 left in the first half courtesy of a break. Widener's John Martorell broke up a fourth down and goal pass, but the defense was called for encroachment. John Port came back for the Lions to throw a five-yard scoring pass to Bryon Haupt to halve the deficit. The third quarter was a battle for field position, which the Pioneers won. They took advantage with 55 seconds left when Lomas fired a 37-yard touchdown pass over the middle to Jamie Schild for an 18-6 lead. The Lions responded on the next drive, closing to 18-13 with 13:30 remaining on Vincent Andrews' one-yard touchdown run. They looked to continue the momentum later as Kyle Herndon blocked a punt by Doug Schlack. Albright drove to Widener's 31 yard line, but running back Raymond Keshel was stopped on a fourth-down run. The Pioneers took advantage on the ensuing drive with Dominic Rock scoring on a one-yard plunge for a 25-13 lead with 8:08 to go. Albright responded on its next drive with Port throwing a 17yard touchdown pass to Stephen Asay just 63 seconds later for a 25-19 deficit. Schmidt was on the spot again as the Pioneers slowly regained momentum. He returned the ensuing kickoff to Albright's 44 yard line before the drive stalled. Schlack came through with a punt that was downed by Todd Fairlie at the Lions four yard line. The field position proved critical as Martorell intercepted a pass from Port and returned it 30 yards for a score with 4:46 to go. Schmidt caught six passes for 141 yards with Prothro adding 14 carries for 79 yards. Lomas completed 19-of-32 passes for 260 yards with Fran Golden and Carroll Dixon contributing 10 tackles apiece.

Mike Lomas threw for 377 yards and three touchdowns for Widener, which notched its fifth straight victory. Lomas, who completed 21-of-35 passes, tied the school records for most 200 and 300-yard passing games in his career for Widener. His 20th and ninth such outings equal the marks also held by Mike Granato (1996, 1998-2000). Widener's Joe Meringolo forced a fumble from quarterback Justin Wutti on the game's second play, which was recovered by Carroll Dixon. Four plays later, Dominic Rock scored on a seven-yard run. Susquehanna responded on its next drive as Nick Friday ran it in from one yard for a 7-7 tie. The drive was keyed on a 44-yard run by Anthony Edwards to the Pioneers 18 yard line. With 3:57 left in the first quarter, Lomas completed the longest pass of his standout career. On a short outlet he found Khalee Prothro, who raced up the right sideline 91 yards for the touchdown and a 14-7 Pioneers lead. Widener ended the first half scoring with 7:43 left in the second, thanks to Darren Shaw catching a 10-yard touchdown reception from Lomas for a 21-7 margin. That completed a nine-play 80-yard drive. The Pioneers kept the momentum going in the third quarter with Rock notching his second touchdown run, this time from nine yards with 12:07 to play for a 28-7 cushion. Widener's defense again came up huge on the next series. Susquehanna had second and goal at the one yard line, but failed on three consecutive runs by Edwards. The last was snuffed at the line by Meringolo and Mike McFadden, ending a 15-play, 77-yard drive that ate up over eight minutes. Mike Schmidt caught a 15-yard touchdown pass from Lomas and Prothro added a five-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter to cap the scoring. It marked the first time the Pioneers had a five-game winning streak in consecutive seasons since doing so from 2000-02, all conference title campaigns. Rock finished with 105 yards on 19 carries and Schmidt added seven catches for 65 yards for Widener, which owned a 553-297 edge in total offense. Prothro had four receptions for 131 yards and Jon Steever contributed three catches for 101 yards. John Martorell notched 11 tackles, McFadden had nine and Meringolo closed with eight. Wutti completed 15-of-27 passes for 160 yards and three interceptions for the Crusaders. Edwards rushed 24 times for 90 yards with Eddie Jones and Ben Gibboney posting 11 tackles apiece.

King's stretched its lead to 31-10 with 7:43 left as Blake Letchford hauled in a 19-yard scoring pass from Chris Barnic. Khalee Prothro had a 19-yard touchdown run for Widener with 4:45 to play and Jamie Schild caught a 15-yard touchdown pass from Mike Lomas with 1:04 left for a seven-point deficit. But the Monarchs recovered the onside kick and ran out the clock. Jeff Chick caught eight passes for 112 yards and Lomas completed 23-of-51 passes for 272 yards for the Pioneers, who committed five turnovers. Todd Fairlie recorded 13 tackles. Mike Lomas threw three touchdown passes with Dominic Rock and Jeff Chick each scoring twice for Widener on Senior Day. Widener wasted little time scoring on its first possession. Lomas completed a 48-yard pass to Chick on the Pioneers' first play from scrimmage and Rock followed with a threeyard touchdown run. Frank Vinci booted a 30-yard field goal later in the first quarter for a 10-0 Widener lead. The margin grew to 17-0 in the second as Khalee Prothro bolted down the left side for a 71-yard touchdown run. The Pioneers got the ball late in the half and tallied again as Lomas found Chick on a seven-yard touchdown pass. Widener in the first half needed just 30 plays to record 305 yards of offense, only had the ball over 10 minutes and had an average starting field position at its own 45. Juniata had only 175 yards over 45 plays in the half, with its average start at its own 27. Rock had a one-yard touchdown run in the third and Prothro caught a 28-yard touchdown pass from Lomas for a 38-0 margin. Chick's 19-yard scoring pass from Lomas early in the fourth made it 45-0 before the Eagles got on the board. Jay Leonard threw a 44-yard touchdown pass to David Nicklaus for a 45-7 margin. Moises Perez closed the scoring with a one-yard plunge for his first career touchdown. That capped a day in which the Pioneers amassed a season-best 627 yards of offense and totaled 27 first downs. Lomas completed 23-of-33 for 342 yards. Frank Vinci kicked a 29-yard field goal as time expired, lifting Widener to a dramatic victory at 29thranked Salisbury. The final drive began when Todd Fairlie returned his second interception of the game and fourth this season 23 yards to Salisbury's 30 yard line. Widener had third down and nine at the 29 and came through as Mike Lomas found Jeff Chick on a 14-yard pass. Vinci split the uprights two plays later for his fifth field goal of the season, giving the Pioneers seven victories in their last eight outings. Widener opened a 13-0 lead thanks to two short drives. Mike McFadden recovered a fumble at Salisbury's 25 yard line that led to Dominic Rock scoring on an eight-yard touchdown run late in first quarter to make it 7-0. A face-mask penalty on a Widener punt return placed the ball on Salisbury's 26 yard line en route to Lomas firing a 14-yard touchdown pass to Chick early in the second quarter. The Sea Gulls closed to 13-7 with 9:33 remaining in the half on quarterback Travis Peters' two-yard touchdown run, but the Pioneers has an answer. Fairlie's first interception put the ball at Salisbury's 40 yard line. Three plays later, Jamie Schild caught a pass over the middle and raced down the left sideline for a 34-yard touchdown and a 20-7 lead with 13 seconds to play in the half. Salisbury had its turn to take advantage of a defensive play early in the second half. Brooks Moser intercepted a deflected pass and returned it to the Pioneers' five yard line. Salisbury got its revenge and its first lead, 21-20, on the first play of a crazy fourth quarter with David Leonard plowing in on a one-yard run. The drive began at the Pioneers' 29 yard line after Lomas fumbled a snap. Widener regained the advantage, 28-21, with 9:44 left. Chick caught a pass over the middle in traffic for a 23-yard touchdown and also hauled in a pass from Lomas on the twopoint conversion. The Pioneers were not out of the woods yet. They looked to run out the clock, but Matt Feiser intercepted Lomas' pass over the middle and sprinted 67 yards for the tying touchdown with 2:52 remaining. Mike Lomas became Widener's all-time leader in passing yards, but it was not enough for his team in a loss at Delaware Valley. Lomas broke the record early in the fourth quarter on a 51-yard pass to Jeff Chick. Lomas finished the contest with 164 yards passing to give him 7,897, eclipsing the previous mark of 7,824 held by Mike Granato (1996, 1998-2000). Lomas threw a 20-yard touchdown pass two plays later to Jon Steever, who made a leaping catch for a 21-21 tie with 13:43 remaining for Widener. But Delaware Valley took the lead for good on the next drive. The Aggies had fourth down and five at the Pioneers 31 yard line, but Adam Knoblauch threw a 31-yard scoring pass to Don Marshall for a 28-21 lead with 8:39 to play. The Aggies widened their margin to 34-21 on their next drive as Knoblauch and Marshall hooked up again, this time on a 12-yard touchdown pass with 2:08 to go. Anthony Silver sacked Lomas in the end zone 43 seconds later for the final margin. Todd Fairlie had a season-best 16 tackles for Widener, marking the sixth time this season he notched at least 10. He also recorded an interception and a blocked field goal. Khalee Prothro rushed 20 times for 145 yards and a touchdown for the Pioneers, who were ranked 38th in the nation by Don Hansen's Weekly Football Gazette entering today. Knoblauch completed 24-of-41 passes for 261 yards and four touchdowns for the Aggies, ranked seventh in the country. Steve Cook had 25 carries for 89 yards. Widener grabbed a 7-0 lead with 6:43 left in the first quarter on Prothro's seven-yard scoring run. Delaware Valley answered three minutes later on Justin Porter's two-yard interception return for a tie. Sean McMahon caught a five-yard touchdown pass from Knoblauch midway through the second quarter for a 14-7 Aggies' lead. Mike Schmidt brought the Pioneers to a 14-14 tie, hauling in a slant over the middle and running 21 yards for the score early in the third quarter. Delaware Valley went to the bag of tricks to grab a 21-14 lead on the ensuing drive. Cook took the hand off and threw a backward pass across the field to Knoblauch, who fired a 64-yard touchdown strike to David Carmon.



Jeff Chick had five catches for 111 yards and a touchdown in being named Most Outstanding Player for Widener in the ECAC South Atlantic Bowl. The victory gave the Pioneers their first postseason title since capturing the 1981 NCAA Division III championship and the first triumph in their three ECAC contests. It was the school's first postseason game since the 2001 NCAA quarterfinals against Bridgewater. The win also gives Widener its first undefeated season at home (5-0) since notching the same mark in 2002. It is the fifth time in eight seasons the team has notched eight overall victories. The Red Hawks struck first early in the second quarter when Vin Doffont booted a 32-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. Widener was quick to answer on the next drive. Khalee Prothro rushed 34 yards to the MSU 14 yard line and Dominic Rock followed with a touchdown run with 10:12 left for a 7-3 margin. The Pioneers struck once more late in the half for a 14-3 lead. Chick hauled in a pass and raced 26 yards to the Red Hawks four yard line. On the next play, Mike Lomas found a wide open Mike Schmidt in the end zone with 1:13 to go in the half. Widener bumped its lead to 21-3 with 6:31 to play in the third quarter thanks to Chick's 28-yard touchdown catch from Lomas. A.J. Lettizia caught an eight-yard touchdown pass from Eric Ferriol and Ryan McCoach added a one-yard scoring run for MSU. They were sandwiched around two Widener field goals from Frank Vinci. Chick moved into second place on the school's all-time receptions list with 171. He also is sixth in Widener annals with 2,315 yards. Lomas completed 20-of-34 passes for 266 yards, becoming the first player in school history to throw for over 8,000 yards. Todd Fairlie finished with 15 tackles and fellow senior Fran Golden also played solidly with 10 tackles, two sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Ferriol completed 24-of-49 passes for 301 yards with McCoach contributing 17 carries for 91 yards. Brian Reitmeyer caught five passes for 96 yards for Montclair State, which owned a 417-341 edge in total



MIDDLE ATLANTIC CONFERENCE / 2005 REVIEW

The Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletic Corporation, formerly called the Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletic Conference, and commonly known as the MAC, originated in 1912 as a loose confederation of colleges. It was unified into an actual all-sports playing conference in 1952 and became the oldest and largest Division III conference holding NCAA membership.

In 1999, spurred by changes in the NCAA championship structure, the corporation formed as an umbrella for three conferences: Commonwealth (Albright, Elizabethtown, Juniata, Lebanon Valley, Messiah, Moravian, Susquehanna, Widener), Freedom (Delaware Valley, DeSales, Drew, FDU-Florham, King's, Lycoming, Scranton, Wilkes), and Middle Atlantic (all 16 institutions).

The earliest records indicate that the Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletic Association was organized December 11, 1912. The first annual meeting was held May 16, 1913, followed by the first annual track meet at Lafayette College the next day.

In subsequent years, the association grew and many leagues sprang within it. The Middle Atlantic Collegiate Wrestling Association, formed in March 1925, was the first to name a Middle Atlantic champion. The first basketball conference, formed as three divisions (North, West, South), had winners join an at-large selection for a four-team playoff. The three-section alignment eventually dissolved, but the Southern Division remained intact. Alignments were further altered when the NCAA created Divisions I, II and III.

The MAC added women's athletics in 1978-79. The steady incorporation of senior women's administrators into the conference hierarchy reached its zenith when Dr. Carol Fritz, associate athletic director at Western Maryland, was elected president in 1986.

During the first 76 years, several athletic directors served as conference coordinators on a part-time basis. David B. Eavenson, a MAC legend, served as president, publicity director and executive director from 1972 to 1988. In 1988, Nathan Salant became the conference's first full-time executive director.

Major changes were made for the 1993-94 year. Ten schools left to form their own association. Their departure served as a catalyst for the presidents and athletic administrators of the remaining 16 schools to form a streamlined, efficient, dual-league organization. This "new look"

was part of a national movement to consolidate similar institutions for competitive athletic opportunities while increasing presidential involvement in the setting of athletic policy.

It was also the year the Middle Atlantic Conference hired its first female executive director, Linda Hopple, who began her duties October 1993 and retired in May 2000. Kenneth Andrews took over for Hopple, becoming the conference's third full-time executive director.

The conference office was housed at Widener University from 1988-93. It was moved to the campus of Lebanon Valley College upon the hiring of Hopple and remains there today.

A moratorium on new membership ended in June 1995. In December of that year, the board accepted Allentown College (now DeSales University) as a new member of the conference, effective for the 1997-98 academic year. DeSales was placed in the Freedom League, replacing Upsala College, which closed its doors at the end of the 1994-95 academic year.

The conference sponsors competition in 23 sports, 12 for men and 11 for women, including, baseball, basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, indoor and outdoor track and field, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, volleyball and wrestling.




Widener HONOR ROLL

NATIONAL FOOTBALL FOUNDATION AND COLLEGE HALL OF FAME

Billy "White Shoes" Johnson was among the first class of divisional football players inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in August 1996. Fellow All-American Tom Deery became Widener second inductee in 1998, entering the hall's third class.



One of the most colorful and amazing open field runners in college football, Johnson still holds 29 school game, season and career records. During his time at Widener he shattered no less than nine all-time NCAA marks and 12 Middle Atlantic Conference records. During his career (1971-73), Johnson scored 62 touchdowns, rushed for 3,737 yards and accounted for 5,404 all-purpose yards.



Deery sparked many Widener comebacks with key interceptions and long kick returns, leading his team to a four-year record of 42-3 and a Division III National title in 1981. A three-time (1979-81) Kodak All-American, Deery still holds four school records, including career interceptions (24), career punt return yards (1,007), career interception return yards (293) and longest kickoff return yards (100).

1977, 1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The 1977 season provided more than just the school's first NCAA championship in any sport. It provided many memorable moments for a team who stuck together throughout the campaign after beginning in less than ideal shape.

The offense looked in disarray with just one returning starter. The defense was in a worse predicament after three standouts decided, respectively, to quit, become a state trooper and enter the Marines. Leave it to perennially optimistic coach Bill *Manlove (pictured)* to turn the tide and create one of the school's most magical runs.

Manlove was not the only one wearing blue and gold in high spirits. After Widener's season-opening 28-0 victory over Lebanon Valley, All-America running back Chip Zawoiski told Manlove, "I'll see you in Alabama, Coach" (site of the national championship game). Zawoiski's prognostication did not look profound after the following week's loss to Fordham, but little did anyone know that would be the Pioneers' final setback of the year.

The Pioneers (11-1) rolled through the remainder of the regular season and into the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. A quarterfinal date

at Central in Pella, Iowa turned out to be no match. The home team sported the nation's leading rusher, but Zawoiski stole the show with a then tournament-record 31 carries along with 171 yards in Widener's 19-0 victory.

The semifinal against Albany State was played in the mud at Memorial Stadium, coupled with a brutal wind. The Pioneers squandered an early 12-0 lead, but Steve Warrington's 52-yard punt return for a touchdown was the catalyst in a 33-15 victory, confirming Zawoiski's insight and Manlove's belief in his unit.

The Stagg Bowl in Phenix City, AL against Wabash saw Widener fall into a 10-0 hole. But in a contest which featured five lead changes, the Pioneers' biggest play gave them an insurmountable advantage. The usually cautious Manlove called for quarterback Mark Walter to hit Walker Carter on a bomb, which worked for a 70-yard touchdown pass late in the game and a 39-28 lead.

Upon the conclusion of Widener's 39-36 victory, students who witnessed the nationally televised game on a rented seven-foot screen in Alumni Auditorium poured out of the hall and on to nearby Memorial Stadium in jubilation.

The offense that looked skeptical, at first, saw Zawoiski finish the season with 1,576 rushing yards and 21 touchdowns, and Walter close with 1,312 yards passing and 15 touchdowns. The defense, minus all the defections, held seven opponents in single figures and yielded just 11.6 points per game.

The 1981 undefeated season was as much about a team celebration than anything else. After all, the senior class could claim at year's end a 42-3 record over four seasons, four conference championships, three NCAA Tournament appearances and a national championship.

But it was one player who stood out. Tom Deery (pictured), a three-time All-American and one of two Pioneers in the College Football Hall of Fame, not only was the spark plug on defense and special teams a fourth straight season, but again provided the big moments when needed.

Unlike the 1980 season when the Pioneers cruised to most of their victories, the '81 campaign was a scratch-and-claw effort that saw the team defeat some game opponents and prepare them for bigger tests.

The first big test was the last game of the regular season at Swarthmore with the MAC Southern Division title and an NCAA berth at stake. The Garnet fans were seeking a huge upset on their home turf, but the Pioneers' defense came through

by allowing just 53 yards rushing in a 16-6 victory.

The national quarterfinals the following week at West Georgia this time provided an opportunity for the pass defense to shine. Widener surrendered just 89 yards through the air and held on for a 10-3 triumph.

Enter Montclair State to Memorial Stadium for the semifinals. Enter Tom Deery.


The Indians scored early in the fourth quarter to close within 14-12. Deery made sure it would once again be a two-possession game. Breaking a school record that stood since 1926, Deery returned the ensuing kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown and a 21-12 game. The 23-12 victory once again had the Pioneers packing their bags for Phenix City.


This time, the final opponent would be one a little more familiar. Dayton not only was the defending national champion, but it had rallied from a 24-point deficit the year before for a stunning 28-24 semifinal victory over Widener in Chester.

Just like 1977, the Pioneers found themselves in a 10-0 quagmire in the Stagg Bowl. They found a way again and this time, it would be Deery to the rescue.

The Flyers looked to increase their margin, but Deery intercepted a pass and ran 76 yards for a touchdown and a 10-7 deficit. Tony Britton gave Widener the lead for good on a 20-yard touchdown run and Mark Stephan added a 23-yard field goal for a 17-10 victory, capping a 13-0 season.

Deery ended the campaign with 11 interceptions along with 833 return yards.

LESLIE C. QUICK JR. STADIUM

The capstone of the Widener athletic facilities is the Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium, which was unveiled for the 1994 football season. Located in the wooded hollow that has grown from a 19th century quarry, the stadium is adjacent to the Schwartz Athletic Center complex.

Dedicated on Homecoming, October 15, 1994, the stadium is named for alum and former University Chairman of the Board Leslie C. Quick Jr., '50. During his undergraduate years, Mr. Quick served as manager of the football and basketball teams for three years under Woody Ludwig.

Quick Stadium towers over a new turf field (installed in 2005) designed with the flexibility in size to accommodate football, men's and women's soccer, men's lacrosse and track & field. Encircling the turf is an eight-lane, synthetic-surfaced, championship track, known as the George A. Hansell Jr. Track. The track, dedicated in 1984, is named for a former athletic director and coach.

The mezzanine sports a Wall of Recognition, which features the dedication plaque and the names of over 400 alumni, faculty and friends so recognized for contributions to the stadium construction fundraising campaign.

Of historical significance, the Wall of Recognition features three medallions removed from Memorial Stadium reading: "Pennsylvania Military College, 1926," "Sound Mind in Sound Body" and "Dedicated to Youth." Memorial Stadium, located behind Old Main, was the site of the University's home football games for nearly 70 years.

Widener fans, coaches and studentathletes share an enormous sense of pride in Quick Stadium, which provides one of the finest NCAA Division III facilities for players, press and spectators in the United States.



ADMINISTRATION Widener



Jack Shafer • Director of Athletics

Jack Shafer is in his first season as Widener's director of athletics after serving the last six years as its assistant director.

Shafer primarily will be responsible for overseeing the school's 20 sports and the overall growth of the department.

Shafer accepts the new role after serving the last six years as assistant director of athletics. He was responsible for overseeing all indoor sports, event management and facilities. Shafer played a huge role in fundraising activities, including the school's annual golf outing, and managing student involvement with the Special Olympics and Big Brothers-Big Sisters program.

He enters his third season as men's soccer coach with an 18-17 record. Last year, the Pioneers (8-8) had four student-athletes named second team All-Commonwealth Conference and five make the Middle Atlantic Conference Academic Honor Roll.

He took over the men's team after guiding the women's squad for four years (2000-03). He helped lead the Pioneers to 34 victories, in-

cluding a run to the ECAC Mid-Atlantic Region final in 2002. In his first season with the men's squad in 2004, Shafer led the Pioneers to the Commonwealth Conference Tournament for the first time in school history.

Shafer arrived in Chester following a four-year tenure (1996-99) as the men's and women's soccer coach at Lycoming, posting a 71-64-8 combined record. He was tabbed Freedom Conference Coach of the Year in 1999 by leading the men's team to the MAC final and earned the same honor with the women in 1997 one year after starting the program.

The stint with Lycoming followed a two-year run as assistant men's soccer coach at his alma mater, Bethany College. He helped guide the team to the 1994 Division III national championship and the ECAC South title the following year.

Shafer graduated Bethany in 1992 with a B.A. in English, helping lead the squad to the NCAA Tournament all four years. He earned his M.A. from Washington College in English after serving as the school's graduate assistant coach for two seasons.



Larissa Gillespie • Senior Woman Administrator

Larissa Gillespie is in her third year as Widener's senior woman administrator.

In addition to her administrative duties at her alma mater, Gillespie is in her seventh year as the field hockey coach. She previously served three seasons as the

women's lacrosse coach.

Gillespie owns a 60-42 record as field hockey coach, which included berths in the Commonwealth Conference Tournament in 2003 and 2004. The squad has posted at least 10 victories the past three years and four of the last five seasons. Gillespie is just four victories away from becoming the program's all-time winningest coach.

During her time as field hockey coach, six players have been named first team All-Commonwealth Conference and 11 have been tabbed second team.

Since Gillespie has been with the field hockey program, numerous school records have been established. Beginning in 1999, when she was

interim head coach, the team broke or tied 10 school records. The 2001 squad shattered the school record for wins in a season (11-6), marking the first time in nine years the Pioneers finished with a winning record.

With the women's lacrosse team, she led the Pioneers to five straight conference Middle Atlantic Conference Tournament appearances from 2001-05 as well as four straight winning seasons from 2002-05. She served as an assistant coach for five seasons before taking over as head coach.

A standout player on Widener's field hockey team as an undergraduate, Gillespie was second on the team in scoring during both the 1996 and 1997 seasons. She closed her career with a then-school-record 16 goals along with seven assists for 39 points, which ranks fourth in school history. She also was a two-time honoree on the Middle Atlantic Conference Academic Honor Roll.

Gillespie received a Bachelor of Science in Sport Management from Widener in 1998 and a Master's of Business Administration in 2000.

ATHLETIC TRAINING / EQUIPMENT

The athletic training staff is located in the Wellness Center, which opened in the spring of 2006. The staff is responsible for the conditioning and rehabilitation of over 500 Widener University's student-athletes representing 20 sports.

The staff consists of two full-time athletic trainers as well as several graduate and athletic training student interns. The athletic trainers have at their disposal a bevy of equipment ranging from separate MD exam rooms, two walk-in whirlpools with one cold plunge and one warm, up-to-date electromodalities and rehabilitation equipment.

The department is headed by A.J. Duffy, in his 17th year in this capacity at Widener and his 25th in collegiate athletics. Duffy is primarily responsible for the football and men's lacrosse teams as well as overseeing the entire athletic training staff. He also teaches athletic training classes at Widener and Temple University.

He has been very active in the profession, serving various elected offices since 1993. Among those areas include President of the Eastern Athletic Trainers' Association and the Pennsylvania Athletic Trainers' Society. Duffy also has

given talks on both the regional and national level.

Duffy has been cited as the 2002 Interboro Education Association Volunteer of the Year, the 2002 NATA Most Distinguished Athletic Trainer, the 2003 EATA Cramer Award winner and the 2005 Philadelphia Sports Medicine Congress Ted Quedenfeld Award recipient.

Prior to arriving at Widener, Duffy was an assistant athletic trainer at the University of Michigan from 1984-90 and an assistant at Temple University from 1981-83. He earned his B.S. from the University of Michigan in 1980, his MS from the University of Arizona in 1981 and his Physical Therapy Certificate from Drexel University (Hahnemann) in 1984.

Duffy and his wife, Monica, a Widener graduate in Nursing, reside in Norwood, PA with

The equipment staff is located primarily on the lower level of Schwartz Athletic Center. The football and men's lacrosse teams have their equipment room located at Leslie C. Quick Jr. Stadium.

The staff is comprised of three full-time managers as well as a plethora of student workers. The staff has played a major role in providing upgraded locker rooms at both Schwartz Center and Quick Stadium as well as maintaining the equipment rooms to meet the needs of Widener's student-athletes.

Johnathan Katona is in his second year as an equipment manager. His primary responsibilities are to serve as equipment manager for the football and men's lacrosse teams. Katona is a certified member of the Athletic Equipment Manager's Association with extensive pro football experience. He has served in the same capacities with the New York Jets of the NFL and the Norfolk Nighthawks, Charleston Swampfoxes, Grand Rapids Rampage and Quad City Steamwheelers of the Arena Football League. In addition to his role with Widener, Katona is an assistant with the Philadelphia Soul of the Arena Football League.

Born in Perth Amboy, NJ, Katona resides in Ridley, PA and is engaged to Asia Rush.

John McCarraher is in his fourth year as both an equipment manager at Widener as well as an assistant baseball coach. He works directly with the men's soccer, women's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball and women's lacrosse teams. McCarraher has coached the Norristown Area Wolverines fall team and has been the pitching coach for Kennedy-Kenrick High School. At Kennedy-Kenrick, he helped the squad advance to the Philadelphia Catholic League Playoffs four times in five years.

McCarraher and his wife, Allie, reside in Skippack, PA and were married in July.

Bob Smith is in his 24th year as an equipment manager at Widener. He works directly with the cross country, track & field, volleyball, field hockey, swimming, softball and golf teams.

FACILITIES Widener



Schwartz Athletic Center is home to our men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, men's and women's swimming, and men's and women's indoor track teams. It also houses Widener's athletic administration and coaching staff in a third-floor suite. Schwartz Center offers members of the Widener community access to a gymnasium, weight room, multi-purpose field house with a new resurfaced floor and a championship size eight-lane swimming pool. The center is open from 12:00 pm-8:00 pm Monday through Friday and from 12:00 pm-5:00 pm on weekends. The facility is closed Saturdays of home football games and the Borislow Weight Room and swimming pool are subject to proper staffing. 


The baseball team plays its home game at a oncampus field that opened in 2006 adjacent to Schwartz Center. The facility sports dugouts, bleachers, scoreboard, press box, three batting cages, four pitchers mounds and the same grass used by the Philadelphia Phillies at Citizens Bank Park. The field is one of the finest college baseball facilities in the Philadelphia area.

The softball team plays its home games on a beautiful field which opened in 2006 just off Bullens Lane. The facility features dugouts, a scoreboard and ample seating area for spectators.

Edith R. Dixon Field is home to our field hockey and women's lacrosse squads. Equipped with artificial turf, lights and a new scoreboard, the field is easily accessible for fans and students. Opened in 2005, the field also is home for our intramural teams.











WIDENER UNIVERSITY

Founded in Wilmington, Delaware, in 1821, Widener University is comprised of eight schools and colleges that offer liberal arts and sciences, professional and pre-professional curricula. A private, nonprofit, doctoral/research intensive institution chartered in both Pennsylvania and Delaware, Widener is today a three-campus university offering programs of study leading to associate's, bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees. The university's schools include the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Business Administration, School of Engineering, School of Hospitality Management, School of Human Service Professions, School of Law, School of Nursing, and University College.

The first four of Widener's predecessor institutions were located in Delaware: Bullock School (1821-1846), Alsop School (1846-1853), Hyatt's Select School for Boys (1853-1859), and the Delaware Military Academy (1859-1862).

The Pennsylvania legislature granted the institution a universal charter on April 8, 1862. In 1867, Pennsylvania Military Academy (1862-1892) purchased 20 acres of land in Chester, PA, on the same site that is today the core of the university's 100-acre main campus, and became Pennsylvania Military College (1892-1966).

In 1966, Pennsylvania Military College officially became PMC Colleges (1966-1972). The name Pennsylvania Military College was retained for the all-male, cadet college and Penn Morton College was adopted for a coeducational civilian component.

The modern structure of the university was introduced in 1972, when the cadet corps was disbanded and the academic offerings were reorganized into the forerunners of today's schools and colleges. Concomitantly, the name Widener College (1972-1979) was adopted in recognition of Philadelphia's Widener family, a descendant of whom served as chair for the

university's Board of Trustees.

In recognition of its comprehensive offerings, Widener College became Widener University in 1979 (to present). Graduate programs were introduced in 1967 with a master's program in engineering, followed by the M.B.A., and then by some 60 additional master's and doctoral programs, most begun in the 1980s.

The university acquired its 40-acre suburban Wilmington, Delaware, campus in 1976 for the School of Law, a branch of University College, and graduate offerings from the School of Business Administration. The Harrisburg Campus, located on 20 acres northeast of the city, was officially opened in the fall of 1989 and now houses a branch of the School of Law and master's level nursing courses. All other academic programs are offered on the Main Campus in Chester.
