This fall, approximately 250 friends, family, and colleagues attended St. Thomas Aquinas College's Annual Tribute Dinner at the Hilton Pearl River. A highlight of this year's dinner was a silent art auction consisting of donated artwork from 25 area artists. At the formal dinner dance, the College bestowed the Aquinas Medal upon John and Kathleen Kerin, and the Founders Award upon Sr. Adele Myers, O.P.

In 1997, Mr. Kerin joined the College's Board of Trustees and is currently serving

The Founders Award recognizes an individual who exemplifies the College's motto, "Enlighten the Mind Through Truth," and salutes tireless dedication to the founding ideals and values that continue to inspire the College community today; Sr. Adele Myers, O.P. was this year's recipient.

Sr. Adele is well known in Rockland County. For 38 years, she taught art at the College and served as chairperson of

CLIMBING THE LADDER WITH AN MBA

"Where do I see myself?" is a question that often plagues students as they are beginning a program. Conversely, Esther Sygal began to ask herself this as she was approaching the end of the MBA program at St. Thomas Aquinas College.

Esther graduated from St. Thomas Aquinas College with a Business Administration degree in 2002. Upon graduation, she immediately enrolled in the Master of Business Administration at St. Thomas. Esther chose St. Thomas' MBA program because the small classroom setting allowed for professors and students to get to know each other.

"The smaller classrooms allowed for each student to be more easily recognized, as opposed to getting lost in a crowd among hundreds of students," she said. As a graduate student Esther wanted the same type of personalized attention she received as an undergraduate at St. Thomas.

St. Thomas' MBA classes are offered on either Friday evening, Saturday morning, or Sunday morning - each class meeting for nine sessions. The program provides students with the option of choosing among Finance, Marketing, Management or a self designed concentration. Students with prior undergraduate or graduate work can have up to 24 credits waived. Full-time students can complete the remaining 36 credits in one year, but the majority of the students, like Esther, are working professionals who pursue an MBA part-time.

Esther worked full time while attending her MBA courses, first as a Financial Services Rep at Met Life Financial Services. In 2004 she started at Innovatix, which provides high quality group purchasing and consultative services, located in Manhattan.

Esther was recently promoted to Manager of Customer Service at Innovatix. She credits her ability to move up within the company to the combination of her degree and professional experiences.

"We're continually looking at changes that can help our MBA students, who are almost all working professionals with little free time," said Alan Colsey, a

graduate of the program and the MBA Director at St. Thomas.

Occasionally, a week night class is offered based on student demand and the college will be offering some classes online in the future.

"If we can maintain the content quality of the experience, we'll see if we can reduce the amount of time a student has to travel to campus."

NEW AFFILIATION WITH ST. JOHN'S UNIVERSITY

This fall, St. Thomas Aguinas College and St. John's University entered into a new alliance. Now, highly academically talented upper class undergraduate students at St. Thomas will be able to take graduate courses within the Graduate Division of St. John's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Eligible students will be invited to take graduate courses in library science, biology, English, history, Spanish, mathematics, computer science, sociology, or theology and religious studies. These courses will be credited towards both the student's undergraduate degree at STAC and graduate degree at St. John's.

A contingent of administrators from St. John's University visited the STAC campus to join with Dr. L. John Durney, STAC's VP for Academic Affairs, to sign the articulation agreement.

This articulation joins several others that

STAC has initiated over the last decade, such as the doctor of physical therapy program with New York Medical College for STAC biology majors and the dual

degree programs in engineering with Manhattan College and George Washington University for STAC mathematics majors.

College life is more than attending classes; campus organizations are also an integral part of the educational process. St. Thomas' clubs, organizations, and committees reflect the interest of students in politics, religion, athletics, service to campus and community, professional fields, and a variety of special activities, social and otherwise. They enrich the student's total experience and contribute to the development of a well-rounded individual, like the Council for Exceptional Children and the Therapeutic Recreation Club.

The Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) is an international organization

dedicated to improving educational outcomes for individuals with exceptionalities. During the spring semester, the St. Thomas Student Chapter 1155 collected new books from individuals and companies. When the semester ended, a group of CEC members and their advisor. Dr. Peggy Nelson, Associate Professor of Education, donated the books to the Rockland Children's Psychiatric Center's library. The Director of Education at the Rockland's Children's Psychiatric Center, Augustus Young, gladly accepted the books and the CEC members offer to work during the summer to organize the library to make possible easy access to the materials.

The Therapeutic Recreation Club, which was established this past year, advances the educational development of students majoring in therapeutic recreation outside the classroom while providing services that are necessary for personal and professional growth. Under the guidance of Dr. Linda Levine Madori, Associate Professor of Recreation and Leisure Studies, the club members raised enough funds through various fundraising activities to enable 18 students to attend this year's New York State Therapeutic Recreation Association Conference.

The Spartan Volunteers are the largest student organization on campus. In September, the Spartan Volunteers raised money to support a staff member's family devastated by Hurricane Katrina. The volunteers have an English as a second language program in which students, such as Kevan, teach English to children of recent immigrants. This matches up nicely for Kevan who will earn certification to teach grades 7-12.

Midnight Runs once per month are commonplace on the STAC campus. A

group of students, along with a staff member, trek into New York City to help the homeless by providing meals, supplies and conversation – all organized by midnightrun.org.

Visiting senior citizens at neighboring Dowling Gardens and raising money to support the Habitat for Humanity projects are also on the Volunteers' agenda.

"More and more students are becoming involved in the Spartan Volunteers and their many projects and sub-committees because, like Kevan, they want to give back to the community. I am rewarded by the dedication of these young men and women. They are our future," said Sr. Madeleine Murphy, O.P., the College's director of volunteer services and campus ministry.

Kevan simply enjoys the experience and is humbled by the attention.

"We're a team. Every member of the Spartan Volunteers plays a key role in at least one of our projects. It's amazing just how much work we can do as a team."

Special sections of freshman English are followed by seminar-style courses in a variety of subjects.

The Honors Program prepares students for advanced study by helping them

understand connections between seemingly unrelated academic disciplines and by fostering a love of independent, lifelong learning. In addition to the full-tuition scholarship covering all classes taken at St. Thomas Aquinas and the summer session at Oxford, benefits of the program include transcript and diploma recognition for Honors work and the opportunity to participate in off-campus co-curricular activities.

"I'm proud to be a part of something bigger. The Honors Program has provided me with the opportunity to get involved, and giving back is something I feel an obligation to do."

Marissa has already been recruited by KPMG and will begin her life as an accountant in September.



MARKETING YOUR ALMA MATER

Over the last several years colleges and universities have become more sophisticated in how they market their institutions – many even employing Madison Avenue agencies in an effort to better position themselves in the marketplace.

This migration to traditional marketing principles is long overdue for many colleges and universities and is vital for the smaller institutions like St. Thomas Aquinas College.

Since the early 1970s, STAC has developed its image in the market using traditional tools like newspaper and magazine advertisements, direct mail print publications, radio and television commercials, and more recently through online opportunities.

The main thrust over the last decade has been to brand the institution as we seek to increase enrollment over a widening geographic region. In 1995, the McNelis Commons Housing Complex joined Aquinas Village, and in 2005 a new residence hall was added to Aquinas Village – bringing the total residences available on campus to 600.

From 1970 to 1981 commuting range was important. Today, nearly 45% of our undergraduate full time students live on campus and nearly 70% of the 2005 freshmen live on campus.

Enrollment since 2000 has steadily risen and record enrollments have been commonplace over that span. In 2005, the College welcomed over 500 new students at the graduate and undergraduate level.

A well balanced marketing plan provides the foundation for that growth. Key to its success is the execution of that plan across the board. Admissions counselors travel extensively throughout the region, visiting schools from Montauk to Cape May and on up to the Albany region and beyond.

The college offers students a glimpse of the campus with print publications and web sites along with a variety of opportunities to visit the campus in person.


When we bring a family to campus, they receive personal attention and are overwhelmed by the beauty of our campus design.

Since 2000 we have become more sophisticated in our data management as well. We can track our successes in different geographic regions and make decisions about where to return to the following year.
