ERLEBACH LEGACY COULD BECOME FOCUS FOR VILLAGE HEALTH AND RECREATION

"Anything is possible with village support and commitment"

Public consultation is being carried out on possible improvements to the George V Memorial **Recreation Ground between Park** Lane and Park Road. The large green area was given to the people of Birchington by Henry Erlebach, one time headmaster of Woodford Court School, in memory of his three sons who were killed in the First World War.

Birchington residents Phil Pittock and Dawn Edmead are leading the work, and a questionnaire will be delivered to every household in Birchington with the free Adscene newspaper very short-

"A large green space right in the heart of the community is a wonderful asset," said Phil, resident in Birchington for more than 40 years, a governor at Birchington Primary School and active in local sport and other community issues. "But it is only used for football for about four hours each week and many people don't even know it is there. There is great potential to provide a range of fun and healthy activities for the whole community."

Dawn, who moved to Birchington from London in 1994, is also a governor at the primary school and is the leader of Birchington Youth Club. "With some imagina-

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tion and some money the recreation ground could be fantastic," she said. "Our ideas include a new pavilion. which would be about the size of an average bungalow, with some meeting rooms and a café. There could be computers with free Internet access. and perhaps an office for the Communitv Warden.

"The playground equipment could be improved and a "trim trail" with exercise equipment could be provided. The recreation ground could easily become something for everybody, from 0 to 99 years old."

Phil added, "These ideas have been developed with a small group of interested people. We have discussed them with the Parish and District Councils and we think we might be able to find some money. Now we would like to know what the rest of the village thinks."

Copies of the questionnaire will be available from Birchington Library, Birchington Primary School, Premier Stores (Canterbury Road, corner of King Edward Road) and Minnis Bay Post Office & Stores. Completed questionnaires must be returned by Saturday 3 March 2007. Phil Pittock and Dawn Edmead have promised an open public meeting to give the results of the public consultation before taking the project any further.

A brief history of our recreation ground

In 1886, Mr Erlebach and his brother moved the Woodford House School to Birchington from Woodford in Essex. The house they moved into was originally called 'The Lawn' and in an early advertisement for the school, the name can clearly be seen on the gateposts. The house stood about halfway down Station Road on the north-


east side. In 1885, it was the only building on this side, apart from the two blocks of cottages at the corner of Albion Road, known as Bath Cottages. It had been built somewhere between 1852 and 1880.

On the 15th July 1922, Mr H. A. Erlebach signed a deed of conveyance with Percy C. H. Powell-Cotton, in which he bought a section of Quex Park. Within the deed was the addition of a plot of two thirds of an acre, which was the gift of Mr Powell-Cotton to help make the shape of the land less irregular. The ground lies between Park Lane and Park Road in Birchington and abuts the northern edge of Quex Park. Sometime in 1923, the ground was fenced and mowed at Mr Erlebach's expense and was in use before the end of that year. It

was already being called the Memorial Recreation or Sports Ground. Mr Erlebach gave it to the people of Birchington with the specific statement that it was for all kinds of sport, not just for cricket (as some people had initially thought.) He made the donation in memory of three of his sons who were killed in the First World War.

The three sons of H. Arthur and Annie E. Erlebach were: Henry Woodland Erlebach, Rifleman in London Regt (Queen's Westminster rifles), was born in 1886. He died of wounds on 24th October 1915, aged 29 and was buried at Ieper, West-Vlaanderen, in Belgium; Arthur Woodland Erlebach, who was _____

2nd Lieut. 57th Royal flying Corps, and born in and founder of Grenham House School, 1894. On 11th February 1925 a Trust Fund was set up, with the following named Trustees :

Mr P. C. H. Powell-Cotton (Owner of Quex Park) Henry Haversham Godwin-Austen (a solicitor acting on behalf of Mr Powell-Cotton), Gerald McCloud Powell-Cotton, Francis Errington (Solicitor), H.Arthur Erlebach (Headmaster and co-founder of Woodford House School, Birchington), Stanley Alfred Erlebach, Albert Hodges (who married Winifred Erlebach and later became Headmaster of Birchington Heritage Trust and some infor-Woodford House School), Donald Eustace Erlebach, Hubert Collard (a local business man) Henry Etough Eyre Jeston (Headmaster District Council.

When Mr Erlebach died in 1926, the gate that now forms the lych-gate at All Saints Churchyard, was erected in his memory at the entrance to the Woodford House playing fields.

The grounds were used extensively in the ensuing years and a pavilion was erected from funds raised by local people. On the 1 April 1935, the Parish of Birchington was incorporated into the Borough of Margate, instead of remaining a Limb of the Cinque Port of Dover. On 31st December 1938, the current Trustees of the Memorial Recreation Ground conveyed the care and maintenance of the ground to the Margate Borough Council, under the public Recreation Section of the 'Open Spaces Act' of 1906. As the Ground was set up as memorial gift, it came under the oversight of the Charity Commissioners, so

that any change of use for the ground would have to be vetted by this body, who would then, among other procedures, seek the local community's opinion. Thanet District Council now hold the deeds to the Memorial Ground at Birchington. In the deeds it states that the grounds were provided for the use of the people of Birchington for the enjoyment of sports and recreation.
