Dear Parker Families,

We have news, very good news.

When Parker moved to 49 Antietam Street in September, 2000, we were excited about the improvements over our original building: an old military spy training facility that lacked a gym, cafeteria, and even windows. But we also knew from the start that trying to squeeze a 370 student middle/high school into an old elementary school building would leave us short of space.

In the ensuing years, Parker's faculty has been enormously resourceful. Offices were turned to classrooms, storage closets into offices, and storage moved to the hallways or teachers' cars and homes. Hallway floors and the parking lot are used as breakout classroom space. Some rooms are triple booked—holding at the same time a regular class, a second class using the computers, and teachers working at their desks during their planning time.

None of these solutions, however, are appropriate or viable on a permanent basis, and for the past six years, Parker's administration and Board of Trustees has been searching for an affordable solution to our pressing need for classroom space. Today we are delighted to announce that we have found one.

The Wachusett Regional School District is selling Parker a two-story classroom addition containing 13 classrooms. The modular construction of the unit enables it to be disassembled at Wachusett, transported to Parker, and reassembled here. The addition is just a few years old and has some large science labs. The quality of the classroom space is superior to that in our current building.

Our preliminary cost estimates call for a total budget of about \$2 million, less than a third of what these classrooms would have cost to build new. If all goes as planned, they should be ready for occupancy by December of 2007. Construction work will begin at Parker in June, once the students have left for summer vacation.

Over the next few months, we will be communicating in a variety of ways to keep you abreast of this wonderful opportunity and the ways you can help. In the meantime, enjoy the good news.

Teriann Schrader of the Francis W. Parker Charter Essential School was recently informed by the Commissioner of Education of an upcoming Department of Education Coordinated Program Review. As part of this Coordinated Program Review, Department staff will visit Parker School during the week of February 26 through March 2nd 2007. Such visits are routinely conducted by the Department to satisfy federal and state requirements for the periodic review of specific education programs and services in schools throughout the Commonwealth. The Department is reviewing several programs during a single visit in order to use Department and school staff's time most efficiently and to encourage strong connections among the programs.

The Department's Coordinated Program Review will address the following programs: Special Education and Civil Rights. After reviewing the school's procedures for these programs, a Department of Education team will make its onsite visit, during which it will review individual student records, interview administrators, teachers and parents, and observe instructional sites. After the onsite visit it will prepare a report for the Charter School Leader and Board of Trustees, with detailed findings for each program and an Executive Summary.

Using a scale of ratings ranging from "Commendable" to "Not Implemented," the report will rate the implementation of each requirement reviewed by the Department of Education. Where requirements are found less than substantially implemented, the charter school must propose to the Department of Education corrective action to bring those areas into compliance with statutes and regulations. Districts and schools are encouraged to incorporate the corrective action into their district and school improvement plans and professional development plan. The charter school may request technical assistance from the Department of Education in developing a corrective action plan. Both the Department's report and the corrective action plan are public information and will be available to the public upon request. Program Review Final Reports are also available on the Department's Internet website at http://www.doe.mass.edu/pga/review/cpr/reports/.

Any member of the public may request to be interviewed by telephone by a member of the Department's visiting team. Those wishing to be interviewed should call the Principal's office at (978) 772 3293 no later than Thursday February 15, 2007 to leave their name and phone number, <u>or</u> they may call the Department of Education at (781) 338-3747. A member of the visiting team will contact each person desiring an interview within two weeks after the completion of the onsite visit. If an individual is not comfortable communicating in English or requires some other accommodation, the Department will make arrangements to communicate appropriately with the individual.

Teriann Schrader, Principal of Francis Parker Charter School indicated that she is confident that the Program Review will be a useful and positive experience for staff members and that the report will be useful in planning for the continued improvement of educational services for all students.

UPDATE FROM DIVISION III

News of March's Division 3 Classes

Though it has only been a two-day week at the beginning of the new semester, students have been busy and productive. Printmaking has been creating potato prints focusing on positive and negative space. They have been carving designs or images into the flat surface of a split potato. They have been asked to create an image in black and then by carving the potato differently making the same image in white.

The Watercolor class is learning that water is their friend. Allowing paint to blossom, letting the water do the work of spreading the paint. They also have been focusing on extending the paint with water and understanding the translucent nature of the medium.

In World Drama we read Paula Vogel's play 'The Baltimore Waltz' aloud in preparation to see another of Vogel's works 'How I Learned To Drive' in Boston next week. We will soon be starting Ibsen's 'A Dolls House' and students will be asked to create an annotated script of the play for a reading assessment.

ARTS AND HUMANITIES

Arts and Humanities - Division II

This week, students finished their OPs. Students also handed in their research work. Students should make sure to get revisions of these projects done in the next couple of weeks before Unit III begins. This wrapup of major projects comes as we begin our new Memorial project; donations of Cellophane, Saran Wrap, Tinfoil, and Glue Guns are still very much needed and will be appreciated. Parents should be aware that the next week will involve paint; students should be careful not to wear clothing that can't survive in heavily-crafted environment!

MATH, SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Math, Science and Technology – Division I

This week we have been starting to look at the carbon cycle and how it ties into the greenhouse effect and global warming. In preparation for COW#10 "CO2 and YOU" we have been trying to understand the greenhouse effect and the carbon cycle as systems and the effects human activities have on those systems. COW#10 goes out today, Friday February 2nd. In it students will be using the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Personal Emissions Calculator to try to obtain an estimate of their family's CO2 emissions. To do this effectively they will need the support and involvement of parents. Do you know how much CO2 emissions your household is responsible for? This weekend spend some time working with your Division 1 student to find out. Then see what changes you can make that will reduce the CO2 emissions. During the week students will be working on the math to calculate percentage decreases and effective use of pie charts. They will also be doing labs to actually measure and compare CO2 emissions from different sources including car exhausts. COW #10 is due back Friday, February 9th.

Math, Science and Technology – Division II

This week we have been finishing up our units on Physical/Chemical Properties and Systems of Inequalities. Students completed a lab where they calculated and then tested how dissolving a solute in water changed its boiling point. They are finishing or will soon finish their math assessment, 'The Cookie Factory,' where they find a maximum profit based on a system of constraints. We are moving into disease. We are looking at how disease effects the body and how it spreads, and we are modeling it using exponential functions. Specifically, we are looking at the interesting relationship between Malaria and Sickle Cell Anemia, and how it affects populations.

WELLNESS

Deborah's Wellness Class:

This week in Deborah's Health class we had a slight schedule change, Dr Shear needed to reschedule to next week. In his place, we focused on binge drinking, alcohol poisoning and recognizing the signs and symptoms of substance issues. In physical activity classes we mixed and matched team hand ball and fitness activities focusing on upper body strength.

Laura's Wellness Class:

This week in Wellness we played wiffle ball and 2-ball soccer. In Health class we discussed the negative health effects of tobacco on the body as well as how tobacco companies target teens to start smoking through deceptive marketing techniques. The students also made posters highlighting the effects of marijuana on the body and the brain.

HOPE HEARTS will be sold for \$1 and all the money raised goes towards research for Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy. Not sure what D.M.D is? Well.....

- It is an inherited, X-linked recessive disorder characterized by rapidly progressive muscle weakness which starts in the legs and pelvis and later affects the whole body.
- The disorder is caused by mutation in a gene coding for the muscle protein dystrophin.

 D.M.D is the most common form of muscular dystrophy.
- It usually affects only boys, but in rare cases it can also affect girls.
- Currently there is no cure for D.M.D.
- There is short term treatment like physical therapy and/or surgery.
