Even up until recently, he was finding it hard to get a regular spot in the reserve team. Marvin impressed Collin Lee who was the manager at the time, enough to win a place in the squad for an away match at Coventry. Coming on as sub with only a few minutes to go in the match he played so well, then he won a regular place on the subs bench for the next few games.

Marvin really made his mark when he came off the bench to score his first goal which was the winner (2-1) against Derby County. He then followed this up with, what may be, the best moment of his short career so far; he scored a well taken goal in the FA Cup draw with Everton, which has made him a fan's favourite at the New Den. Since that match, Marvin has started every game for the Lions putting in hard work and exciting performances.

- Using Ms Publisher for newsletters, websites and other publications
- Setting up a simple database in Ms Access
- E-mails, tips

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There are so many ICT resources available nowadays and teachers are beginning to make use of some of these resources to add value to their lessons and to provide pupils with extra support for their courses. One such resource is **BBC BiteSize Revision**, a free service provided by the BBC.




A few years ago the school also bought into SamLearning, a website that not only allows pupils to do structured revision for most of their subjects, but also allows teachers and parents to keep track of the progress that pupils make.


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SamLearning claims that if pupils spend ten or more hours using the site to do revision for a particular subject, it will make a **significant difference to their results**.

Is this really true? A few months ago a study was done at Addeys. We wanted to know if SamLearning and other online resources were really making a difference for our pupils and we wanted to know how pupils and teachers felt about using ICT. A group of 55 pupils took part in the study. This is what we found out:



81% of the **KS3** pupils who took part in the study **did better in maths** than their academic counterparts and a further 36% of these pupils also **exceeded their KS3 predicted targets**.



60% of the pupils who took part in this project said that the use of online ICT resources has made a difference to **how confident they feel about the subjects** that they used it for. An investment of one hour per week through out the academic year will allow pupils to gain confidence and improve their actual results for at least 4 of their subjects. Well worth encouraging!
