

Hokies Continue Early Conference Road Tests at Duke

THE SERIES

- Today's game will be the 13th football meeting between Virginia Tech and Duke University. Duke leads the series, 7-5, but Tech has won the last four meetings.
- Duke won the first three games in the series, all coming at neutral sites. In 1937 and 1938, the Blue Devils beat the Hokies, 25-0 and 18-0, respectively, at Greensboro, N.C., before shutting out the Hokies again, 7-0, in 1948 at Roanoke.
- Tech finally got on the board in the 1949 game, but still lost 55-7 at Durham. In 1950, Duke beat Tech, 47-6, at Winston-Salem, N.C., before downing the Hokies 55-6 in 1951 at Norfolk.
- Tech's first win in the series came in 1969, a 48-12 victory at Norfolk. Duke won the 1981 contest, a 14-7 decision at Durham.
- The Hokies won 22-21 at Durham in
 1982 —the last time Tech played at Duke
 and won 27-14 and 27-0 at Blacksburg
 in 1983 and 1984, respectively.
- Last season, in the Hokies' first-ever ACC game, Tech downed the Blue Devils, 41-17, at Blacksburg.
- Tech is 1-2 against Duke at Durham, 3-0 at Blacksburg and 1-5 at neutral sites.
- The two schools met six times on the gridiron between 1937 and 1951 as members of the Southern Conference with Duke winning all six of those games. Last

year's win by the Hokies marked their first conference victory against the Blue Devils.

SHORT WEEKS

- The last time the Hokies played two games in a seven-day span was 2003. After opening with UCF on Sunday, Aug. 31, the Hokies played James Madison on Saturday, Sept. 6. Two other times, under Beamer, Tech has played two games in a seven-day span.
- The last time Tech played two games in six days or less was 2000, when the

Hokies played Akron on a Saturday and followed it with a Thursday night trip to East Carolina.

THE GAME ON TV

- The Duke-Virginia Tech game will be televised regionally by Jefferson-Pilot Sports. Steve Martin will handle the playby-play with Rick "Doc" Walker serving as the color analyst and Mike Hogewood providing sideline commentary.
- Virginia Tech is 4-3 in games televised by J-P, going 2-0 last season.

COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Linebackers James Anderson and Vince Hall paced Virginia Tech in tackles at NC State with 10 each.
- **9** Tech has won the last nine road games it has played in the month of September.
- 8 The Duke game will mark the Hokies' eighth appearance on Jefferson-Pilot/ Raycom.
- 7 None of Virginia Tech's seven scoring drives against Duke last season lasted longer than 3:10 on the clock.
- **6** Six Tech players Xavier Adibi, Duane Brown, Chris Ellis, Brandon Gore, D.J. Parker and Marcus Vick made their first collegiate starts at NC State.
- 5 Virginia Tech has won all five of its Atlantic Coast Conference road games.
- **4** Tech's win at NCSU marked just the fourth time under Coach Frank Beamer that the Hokies have won when the score was tied at the end of three quarters.
- 3 Virginia Tech and Duke have played just three of their 12 games in Durham.
- 2 Rover Aaron Rouse's two interceptions against NC State were the first two of his Tech career.
- 1 Virginia Tech's first ACC football game and conference victory came against Duke last season in Blacksburg.

COACH FRANK BEAMER

• Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Tech teams have posted a 112-37 record over the past 12 seasons and appeared in bowl games each year during that span, is in his 19th year as the head football coach at Virginia Tech. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 136-77-2 record.

He became Tech's winningest football coach in 1997 when the Hokies defeated Arkansas State, 50-0.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 12 consecutive bowl appearances, an ACC title, three BIG EAST Conference titles and a trip to the national championship game. Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1999 and 1995 and shared it in '96.

Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year last season.

In 1997, he was inducted into The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame, and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

Beamer's Hokies have earned the highest national rankings in the program's history, earning a top 10 ranking in the AP poll at some point during each of the past seven years, inlcuding this year. During one stretch, Tech was ranked in 84 consecutive AP polls.

Last year, Tech went a surprising 10-3 in a season highlighted by an eight-game winning streak that led to Tech's ACC championship and a trip to the Nokia Sugar Bowl. During the 2000 season, the Hokies posted an 11-1 record that included a 41-20

The Opposing Coach

• Ted Roof (Georgia Tech '87) is in his second full season as the head football coach at Duke University. Roof served as Duke's interim head coach for the final five games of the 2003 season.

His current overall record with the Blue Devils is 4-13, including a 2-3 mark while serving in the interim capacity.

A native of Lawrenceville, Ga., Roof began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Alabama in 1987. He served as a full-time assistant at West Georgia in 1989, before moving to Duke for four seasons and the University of Massachusetts for three. Roof coached at Western Carolina in 1997 and was at Georgia Tech for four years before returning to Duke as defensive coordinator prior to the 2002 season.

The interim title was removed when he was named the 20th head football coach in Duke history on Dec. 6, 2003.

win over Clemson in the Gator Bowl.

In 1999, Tech marched to an 11-0 regular-season mark before losing a hard-fought 46-29 game to Florida State for the national title in the Sugar Bowl. The Hokies ended the '99 season ranked No. 2 by AP.

Another highlight came when Tech beat Texas, 28-10, in the 1995 Sugar Bowl and finished 10-2. The bowl streak started in '93 when Tech beat Indiana in the Independence Bowl to cap a 9-3 season.

Beamer returned to his alma mater in December 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams. The 58-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

Beamer is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Tech and now an assistant at Mississippi State; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech. He had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

- Frank Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other coach.
- Only three of the 119 active Division I-A head football coaches have been at their current school longer than Beamer. Those coaches are: Joe Paterno (39 yrs., Penn State); Bobby Bowden (29 yrs., Florida State); and Fisher DeBerry (21 yrs., Air Force).
- Prior to Beamer, no other grid coach in Virginia Tech history had served more than 10 seasons as head coach.

Twelve Bowls in a Row

• With Nebraska and Kansas State failing to make bowls in 2004, Virginia Tech is now one of only five teams to go to 12 bowls in the last 12 seasons. The other four teams are Florida, Florida State, Michigan and Tennessee.

Rushing = Outcome?

- Under head coach **Frank Beamer** (215 games), the Hokies are 119-27-2 when outrushing their opponents, 16-50 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In Tech's current 12-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 99-12 when outrushing its opponents, 12-25 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In its current 12-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 74-6 when rushing for 200 yards or more, including 5-0 last year.
- Since 1999, the Hokies are 54-5 when outrushing their opponent and 5-12 when being outrushed.

SCORING STREAK

- Tech has scored in a school record 123 straight football games, beginning with a 13-7 win over the University of Miami on Sept. 23, 1995.
- The streak began after a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati at Lane Stadium in 1995.
- The previous school record was 66 straight games, which started in 1970 and ran into the 1976 season.
- During its current streak, Tech has scored 13 or more points in all but three games — a 42-3 Gator Bowl loss to UNC in 1998, a 38-7 defeat at Pittsburgh in 2001 and a 28-7 loss at West Virginia in 2003.

TECH IN THE POLLS

- The Hokies posted their highest-ever football rankings during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Tech finished the '99 season rated No. 2 by AP and No. 3 by the coaches and climbed as high as No. 2 in 2000.
- Tech has been ranked a total of 161 voting periods by the AP since the beginning of the 1993 season, including a streak of 84 straight polls from 1998-2003.
- When Frank Beamer took over in 1987, Tech had been ranked a total of 12 weeks during the first 49 years of the AP poll. The Hokies have been ranked in 106 of the last 121 AP polls.
- Tech has an all-time record of 30-66-1 against teams ranked in the AP poll. Since the start of the 1995 season, the Hokies are 20-12 against ranked teams.
- The No. 7 ranking in the Coaches' Poll was the highest preseason ranking in either major poll for the Hokies. Tech was ranked

No. 8 in the preseason AP Poll. The previous high was No. 9 in both polls prior to the 2001 season, as well as No. 9 in the AP poll to start the 2003 campaign.

AP POLL STREAK

- Prior to the loss at Virginia to end the 2003 regular season, the Hokies had been ranked for 84 consecutive weeks in The Associated Press Top 25 Football Poll, marking the second-longest active consecutive appearance streak at the time.
- Tech had been ranked in every AP poll since the end of the '98 regular season.
- Tech began the streak with a No. 23 ranking in the postseason poll of 1998.

• Tech players who have either graduated, or will graduate in December of 2005, will wear an orange mortar board and tassel sticker on their helmets all season.



- Seven seniors Jeff King, James Anderson, Will Montgomery, Jason Murphy, Jordan Trott, Blake Warren and Tim Sandidge — have all earned their degrees while junior Danny McGrath graduated in three years.
- Seven other players Rashad Ferebee, Justin Hamilton, Cedric Humes, Mike Imoh, Jonathan Lewis, Jimmy Martin and Darryl Tapp — are slated to graduate this winter. Five more players should graduate later this year.

What's a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

> Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy! Tech! Tech! V.P.I.! Sola-Rex Sola-Rah Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!! Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

Just Virginia Tech, Please

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its named to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

- Virginia Tech will hold its normal "Thursday" practice Friday afternoon before leaving Blacksburg via charter buses late Friday afternoon for Durham, N.C. The travel party will go straight to the team hotel, and will not walk through at Wallace Wade Stadium.
- No player interviews will take place at the hotel.
- The team will stay at the Marriott Research Triangle Park and will bus back immediately after the game.

ACC Adopts Instant Replay Model

LET'S GO TO THE REPLAY

• The ACC will implement the use of an instant replay system starting with the 2005 football season. The ACC will model its experimental instant replay procedures on the guidelines developed by the Big Ten Conference during the 2004 season. Instant replay will be in use for all of its home games in 2005, pending the approval of respective non-conference home opponents.

KEY POINTS OF THE REPLAY SYSTEM

- The replay system allows for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during all Conference games.
- Only the Technical Advisor, working in the press box, can stop a game to

review a play. Unlike the NFL model, neither the coaches nor the game officials on the field may ask for a review.

- In order for a play to be changed, the Technical Advisor must have indisputable video evidence that an error occurred. Television broadcast of the game will be the sole source of whether there is indisputable video evidence.
- The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.
- The types of plays that are reviewable include plays that are governed by the sideline, goal line, end zone and end line, passing plays, and other detectable infractions, such as forward progress with respect to first down.

Last Meeting: Tech Begins ACC Era With a Win

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Virginia Tech football entered a new era as the Hokies knocked off Duke 41-17 in their first league game as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

It took Tech awhile to get going, but once it did, the injury-riddled Blue Devils had trouble slowing the Hokies down. After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter, Tech ran off 34 unanswered points, including 24 in the second quarter.

Quarterback Bryan Randall and flanker Richard Johnson sparked the offense. Randall ran for a team-high 93 yards, with 30 coming on a touchdown run that put Tech up 24-7 at the half. Johnson threw a touchdown pass during the second quarter and hauled in TD toss from Randall in the third quarter. Tech finished with 422 yards of offense.

Defensively, end Darryl
Tapp registered 2.5 sacks as the
Hokies limited Duke to 197 yards
of total offense, including just
89 yards through the air. The
Blue Devils never gave up the
battle despite being successful
on just one of 15 third-down
conversions.

Game Notes

- Redshirt freshman fullback John Kinzer (Fairfax, Va.) made his first collegiate start in the Duke game.
 Tech started its first two games in a two-tight end set that did not include a fullback.
- Flanker Richard Johnson's (r-Sr., Baltimore, Md.) 34-yard touchdown pass to split end Josh Hyman (r-Sr., Baltimore, Md.) marked Johnson's first collegiate pass completion. The pass was the first touchdown pass by a non-quarterback at Tech since tailback André Kendrick connected with André Davis for a 35-yard score against UAB in 1999. When Johnson caught a 11yard touchdown pass in the third quarter of the Duke game, he became the first Tech player to throw a touchdown pass and catch a TD pass in the same game since 1981 when fullback Tony Paige accomplished the feat against Wake Forest.
- None of the Hokies' seven scoring drives lasted longer than 3:10 on the clock. Tech came away with points on each of its five trips inside the red-zone.
- The game marked the first time
 Tech had beaten Duke in a conference
 game. Tech was previously 0-6 against
 Duke in the old Southern Conference.

Game 1: Hokies Hold On For ACC Road Win

RALEIGH, N.C. — Virginia Tech avenged its only ACC loss of 2004 by opening its 2005 season with a hard-earned 20-16 victory over North Carolina State at Carter-Finley Stadium.

The Hokies, whose only league loss on the way to an ACC Championship last year was a 17-16 setback to the Wolfpack, picked up where they left off a year ago when they won four conference games in the final quarter. This time, a 19-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Marcus Vick to junior receiver David Clowney with 12:24 left proved to be the difference.

Like most of Tech's games last year, however, the outcome was in doubt until the final seconds. Tech junior rover Aaron Rouse sealed the win with an interception at the Hokies' 6-yard line as time expired. The pick capped a big night for Rouse who contributed eight tackles, two interceptions and forced a fumble

Vick, making his starting debut, led the Hokies on scoring drives of 80 and 88 yards during the game, but overall, Tech was held to 232 yards by the Wolfpack's top-rated defensive unit. State, on the other hand, was able to amass 438 yards, but after marching 83 yards for a touchdown on their first possession, the 'Pack never made it into the end zone again. Plagued by three turnovers and number of costly penalties, the home team had to settle for three field goals over the final three quarters.

Tech punter Nic Schmitt also played a huge role in the win, averaging 45.7 yards on six kicks. Schmitt kept the Wolfpack backed up, booming two kicks of over 50 yards and dropping two kicks inside the NCSU 5-yard line.

ALL EYES ON VICK

- The past of quarterback Marcus Vick (r-Jr., Newport News, Va.) is well documented and there's no doubt all eyes will be on Vick this fall. Coaches and fans are hoping all eyes will be on him for being the leader of Tech's offense.
- After sitting out last season while being suspended from all university activities, Vick re-enrolled in January of 2005 and entered spring practice as the No. 3 man on the depth chart. He didn't stay there long and by the end of spring ball, he was elevated to the starting position.
- For all the hype and accolades Vick is receiving, he still has started only one collegiate game. He saw action as the quarterback in 2003, and even caught a touchdown pass as a receiver in the Insight Bowl against Cal, but this will be his second collegiate start at quarterback.
- For his career, Vick has three touchdown passes and five interceptions.
- In the opener at NC State, he ran for 31 yards, including a 24-yarder on third-and-10, and threw for 108 yards with no interceptions. He connected with **David Clowney** (Jr., Delray Beach, Fla.) for a key 19-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter.

WAITING IN THE WINGS

- While Vick has gotten all the attention, the Hokies have four very good reserves ready should they get the call.
- **Sean Glennon** (So., Centreville, Va.) was the backup to Bryan Randall last year and played in four games, completing 8-of-11 passes for 137 yards and two scores.
- Cory Holt (r-Fr., Lexington, N.C.) is ready after sitting out last year. He missed the end of spring practice with a shoulder injury, but has the coaches excited about his potential.

• The running game will be bolstered by the return of **Mike Imoh** (Sr., Fairfax, Va.). The speedy and diminutive one

- (5-foot-7) presents problems for the opposition with his height and size, as he can hide behind the bigger offensive linemen, making it hard to find him.
- Last season, he rushed for 720 yards and six touchdowns and led the team with 1,030 all-purpose yards.
- At UNC, he set a new single-game Virginia Tech rushing record with 243 yards on 32 carries, breaking Kevin Jones' mark of 241 set at Pittsburgh in 2003.
- He rushed for 56 yards and a 5-yard touchdown in the win at NC State.

HUUUUUUUUUUUUUMES

- Cedric Humes (r-Sr., Virginia Beach, Va.) is the co-No. 1 at tailback with Imoh and the two are expected to split a majority of the carries this year.
- Humes suffered a high ankle sprain and a distal fibular fracture in his left leg in a scrimmage in spring of 2004. He had surgery to repair the ankle a few days later and the fracture healed on its own. But that slowed him down for the first 2/3 of the 2004 season.

A LONG ROAD BACK

- The road back from a devastating knee injury during the fall of 2002 has been arduous to say the least for tailback **George Bell**. One of the nation's premier high school running backs, Bell tore the MCL, ACL, and PCL in his left knee three games into his junior season. This wasn't just a tear. These were knee ligaments that were shredded. Still, Bell was a big name on the national recruiting boards.
- Even though he played in just three games during his senior year in high school, he was one of the most highly recruited backs in the country, picking Virginia Tech over Michigan, North Carolina, NC State and others. He enrolled at Tech in January of 2004, went through spring practice and redshirted last fall.
- ACL reconstruction surgery, such as the one Bell had, uses a graft to replace the ligament in the knee. The most common grafts used in surgeries such as this are called autografts. This technique uses part of your own body, such as the tendon of the kneecap (patellar tendon) or one of the hamstring tendons to reconstruct the ACL.
- In Bell's case, the ACL was repaired using allograft tissue, which is donor material. For Bell, an ACL from a cadaver was implanted in Bell's left knee along with a dissolvable screw.

ROYAL FLUSH

- No true freshman made a bigger impact on Tech's dream season last year than Eddie Royal (Herndon, Va.), who started 11 games and led the team in receptions. Now a sophomore, he leads a young, but very talented group of receivers.
- Last year, Royal caught 28 passes for 480 yards and three scores. His 80-yard catch and score at Georgia Tech sparked a big comeback and he caught the gamewinning touchdown to secure Tech's 16-10 win over Miami to clinch the ACC title. He also averaged 11 yards per punt return, returning 25 punts, and 25.8 yards on 12 kickoff returns.
- · Royal is the youngest of a talented group of seven children. His brother, Chris, is a senior defensive back at Marshall which comes to Tech on Oct. 8 — and was among the nation's leaders in interceptions last year with six. His sister, Christina, is the Regimental Commanding Officer (RCO) for the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets. The Air Force cadet is a cadet colonel, and that's the highest rank a cadet can have. In the history of the VTCC, Christina is the fourth female to achieve this rank and position, and the first African American female to do so.
- Royal, at 5-10, 171 pounds, bench pressed 380 pounds in the offseason to shatter the record for Tech receivers (365 pounds), which he set last year. "That's probably the best bench press, pound for pound when you look at the size of the individual, since I've been here," said Hokies' strength and conditioning coach Mike Gentry. "And this is my 19th season."

THE OLD MAN

- He may only be a redshirt sophomore, but Josh Hyman (Chesapeake, Va.) is constantly kidded by his younger receiving mates for being the old man of the group. The 22-year-old set a new freshman record a year ago with five touchdown grabs.
- Hyman started 12 games last year, catching 27 passes for a team-high 291 yards.
- After graduating Deep Creek High in 2002, Hyman went to Fork Union Military Academy for a semester, before enrolling at Tech in the Spring of 2003. He then redshirted in 2003 before making his debut as a 21-year-old freshman last year.

PICK ONE OUT OF THE HAT

• Royal and Hyman got most of the starts last year, but this year, there are four other receivers who will be battling with them for starting and playing time.

A Tradition of Non-Offensive Scoring

Tech scored 11 touchdowns via non-offensive means (special teams or defense), scoring 77 points through non-offensive means in 2003, tops in the nation, just ahead of NC State and Miami's 10. Tech was second last year with six non-offensive scores.

- David Clowney (Jr., Delray Beach, Fla.) is the most experienced of the group. Last year, he was fourth on the team with 20 receptions, totaling 263 yards and two touchdowns. Clowney, who has spent time on Tech's track team in the winter as a sprinter, clocked a 4.33 40-yard dash in spring testing.
- Clowney made a sliding catch in the end zone for a 19-yard touchdown at NC State which turned out to be the game
- Josh Morgan (So., Washington, D.C.) finished the season on a high note, catching three passes for a Tech bowl record 126 yards — including an 80-yarder — and two scores against Auburn. Last year, he played in 12 games and caught 15 passes for 346 yards and three scores.
- Justin Harper (So., Catawba, N.C.) didn't see as much time as the others last year, but has the coaches excited about his potential. Last year he caught five passes for 84 yards and a touchdown in 11 games.
- Jeremy Gilchrist (r-Fr., Virginia Beach, Va.) spent last year in the stands as a redshirt, but will look to make an impact this year. He always seems to be open and has perhaps the best sets of hands of any of | tight ends have resulted in first downs.

- Tech's tight ends saw a lot of action last year, catching 42 passes.
- Jeff King (r-Sr., Pulaski, Va.) was third on the team with 25 catches, gaining 304 yards a year ago. He earned secondteam All-ACC honors. He was the first Tech tight end to catch four TDs in a season since Greg Daniels did it in 1990.
- He spent part of the winter playing with Seth Greenberg's Hokie basketball team. He saw action in 16 games, averaging 6.1 minutes, 1.1 points and 1.6 rebounds per game. He had eight rebounds and six points at Duke.
- John Kinzer (r-So, Fairfax, Va.) makes the move from fullback to tight end this year and will serve as the No. 2 man.
- Senior Jordan Trott (Torrance, Calif.) moved from defensive end to tight end in preseason and will be used as a blocker in goal-line situations.

THE BRUISERS

- Some of the biggest question marks on Tech's offense come in positions occupied by the toughest players fullback and offensive line.
- Tech returns only one player at fullback with any collegiate experience in **Jesse Allen** (r-Jr., Monson, Mass.), who is a former walk-on who earned a scholarship this past offseason.
- Up front, three starters who have proven themselves as reliable and quality players return, but still, questions arise at several spots until someone steps up and proves his mettle.

THE BIG MEN UP FRONT

- An ongoing experiment is underway to find the best five players to put on the offensive line.
- Will Montgomery (r-Sr., Clifton, Va.) is considered the top lineman on the team and could play at either center or left guard. Last year, Montgomery started all 13 games at center, grading out at 89 percent with a team-high 46 knockdowns. He graded out at 85 percent with a knockdown in the win at NC State.

- At right guard, **Jason Murphy** (r-Sr., Baltimore, Md.) returns after starting the final seven games of 2004 there. The former defensive lineman played 405 snaps on offense with 28 knockdowns in the 2004 regular season. He led the team with three knockdowns at NC State.
- Nick Marshman (r-Fr., Harrisonburg, Va.) could also see playing time here.
- At left guard, **Brandon Gore** (r-Jr., Warrenton, Va.) is locked in a battle with **Reggie Butler** (Sr., Keswick, Va.) for the starting nod. Butler started six games last year at left guard, but Gore got his first collegiate start at NC State.
- The left tackle spot is in good hands as three-year starter **Jimmy Martin** (Sr., Fairfax, Va.) returns. Martin has started 34 straight games, the longest active streak on the team.
- An honorable mention All-ACC selection as an offensive tackle last year, he graded out at 86 percent in the 2004 regular season. He led the line with a 92 percent gradeout at NC State.
- He is backed up by **Brandon Frye** (r-Jr., Myrtle Beach, S.C.), who can play either tackle position.
- The right tackle spot is another spot in question as **Duane Brown** (r-So., Richmond, Va.) made the move from the No. 2 man at tight end to right tackle in the second week of preseason. He will be backed up by Butler. At 6-5, 278 pounds, Brown has the size to make the move, but needs to gain experience as he hasn't played tackle in six years.
- Brown will wear jersey No. 76 when playing on the line, but could put on his old jersey No. 89 during the game and move back to tight end, if needed. He played all 64 offensive snaps at NC State.

ALL WORK, NO GLORY

- I Tech's fullbacks won't see a lot of carries this year, but can always be counted on for top effort and solid blocking.
- Leading the way is Allen, who started four games last year, including the Sugar Bowl game against Auburn. He caught three passes for 24 yards and a score a year ago and had two carries.
- Allen earned a scholarship this past offseason, in part, for his extraordinary effort in the weight room. In spring testing, he set a new team record with a 395-pound power clean, and also recorded a 560-pound back squat, a 430-pound bench and a 360-pound push jerk.
- Battling with Allen will be walk-on Carlton Weatherford (r-So. Danville, Va.).

THE NEW J-DUB

- Last season, head coach **Frank Beamer** didn't allow cornerback **Jimmy Williams** (Sr., Hampton, Va.) to speak to
 the media after a preseason interview raised
 some eyebrows. That allowed Williams to
 concentrate on playing football, and it paid
 off as he was a first-team All-ACC defensive
 back and led the league in interceptions
 with five.
- Since last season, by his own admission, Williams has grown up and is ready to assume the leadership responsibilities of the secondary. Williams is on track to graduate this year and has been named to numerous preseason All-America squads, including *Playboy*.
- Williams was part of Virginia Tech's biggest position switch last season when he moved from the starting free safety spot to boundary cornerback, while Vincent Fuller took over at free safety. Both benefitted as Williams is now considered one of the top corners in the nation and Fuller was drafted by the Tennessee Titans.
- Williams moved into the spot vacated by Atlanta Falcons' 2004 first-round draft pick DeAngelo Hall. At 6-3, 216 pounds, Williams gives the Hokies one of the biggest cornerbacks in the collegiate ranks. Last year, he led the ACC with five interceptions. He opened this year at NC State with five total tackles, including two tackles for loss and a sack.

BIG SHOES TO FILL

• Eric Green was one of the leaders on Tech's dominating 2004 squad and was a third-round draft pick of the Arizona

- Cardinals, so whoever takes his spot has some big shoes to fill. **Roland Minor** (r-So., Washington, D.C.) is ready to fill that roll.
- Minor saw a lot of action last year at boundary corner, but moves over to field corner opposite Williams. He is an athletic corner who ran a 4.35 40-yard dash in the spring.
- Last season, he had 15 tackles and five break-ups. He earned ACC Defensive Back of the Week honors after intercepting two passes at Georgia Tech, one of which he returned 64 yards for a touchdown.
- Minor had eight tackles at NC State in his first start at cornerback.

YOUNG AND EAGER

- Brandon Flowers (Delray Beach, Fla.) has the odd distinction of having a touchdown already as a redshirt freshman, before the first snap of the 2005 season. That's because Flowers returned an interception 38 yards for a score against Western Michigan, but broke his leg later that game. He sat out the rest of the season and was granted a medical redshirt. He missed part of the preseason with a hamstring pull, but is back to 100 percent.
- Flowers, along with **Theodore Miller** (r-Fr., Washington, D.C.) will be looking for playing time as the No. 2 men at boundary corner. They both bring good size and athleticism to the spots and will be critical components to this year's defense.

MACHO MAN

 Perhaps no player since Kevin
 Jones has generated this much buzz as an incoming freshman as Victor "Macho"

- **Harris** has. The Highland Springs, Va., native could see lots of action this year on both defense and special teams, and maybe one day on offense.
- The defensive back was ranked the No. 1 player in the state by *The Roanoke Times* and rivals.com ranked him the No. 28 overall player in the nation, the No. 3 "athlete" in the nation and the No. 1 player in the state.
- The PARADE All-American scored a total of 70 touchdowns his final two seasons and chose Virginia Tech over Michigan, Virginia, Miami and Southern California.
- The story of his tumultuous December of 2004 is widely known. First, he suffered third-degree burns, on the day Tech head coach **Frank Beamer** and assistant **Jim Cavanaugh** were coming to his house for a recruiting visit, Dec. 15.
- Harris' mother, Maritza, was preparing a meal for the coaches, and a grease fire broke out in the kitchen while she was at the store. Harris put out the fire by throwing a quilt on the pan, but suffered burns in the process. He has small scars on his face, and skin grafts on his right forearm. Harris will wear a protective sleeve on his arm to cover the scars.
- Then, 10 days after Beamer's visit, five days after Harris committed to the Hokies, his mother fainted at home on Christmas Day and passed away at the hospital.
- He has a tattoo on his left forearm an image of his mother and the words: "My angel. My reason. My mother." Maritza Harris was 43.

• The only positions that had true battles for the starting position heading into the fall were those at free safety and rover. Those spots were vacated by seniors and left the door open for hungry reserves ready to make their mark.

THE CAPTAIN'S SPOT

- The free safety spot is considered the captain of Tech's defense and two players are battling for that spot.
- **D.J. Parker** (So. Hampton, Va.) has the slight edge after a strong spring practice. Parker played cornerback last season, but makes the move to free safety. He must learn the defense, check-offs and alignments something 2004 free safety Vincent Fuller thrived at for Tech's defense to remain one of the tops around.
- Last year, he played in 12 games, recording 10 tackles and a forced fumble.
- Battling Parker will be the oftmoved, never-complaining **Justin Hamilton** (r-Sr., Clintwood, Va.). Hamilton moves to free safety after two years at receiver and last season as a tailback. He missed most of spring with an ankle injury that required surgery, but is back and battling for the starting spot.
- Last year, as a tailback, he played in all 13 games, carrying the ball 75 times for 336 yards and three scores.

ROVER DUTIES

- Aaron Rouse (r-Jr., Virginia Beach, Va.) leads the charge at the rover spot after moving from whip linebacker to the spot in the spring.
- Rouse made his presence known at NC State, intercepting two passes, breaking up two passes, forcing a fumble and recording eight tackles.
- In the thick of things at the rover spot is **Cary Wade** (r-Jr., Fairfax, Va.). He hasn't seen a lot of action on defense in two years, but the light has seemingly come on. While a little undersized, he is good against the pass, but missed some time in preseason with an ankle injury.

REPRESENTIN' THE 757

• Bryan Stinespring and Jim

Cavanaugh have made livings out of signing the best players to come out of the Hampton Roads area, also called the "757" for its area code.

• On defense alone, 10 starters or key contributors come from the area, while five on offense and Tech's kicker call the 757 home.

- In addition, both kickers punter Nic Schmitt (Salem) and kicker Brandon Pace (Va. Beach) — are from the Commonwealth.

TEAM • UNITED

- The Virginia Tech football team has once again officially partnered with the United Way for the 2005 season after a successful debut last season.
- The partnership is multi-faceted, with a fundraising effort this fall through the sale of orange "TEAM UNITED" bracelet rubber bands.
 - In addition, Virginia Tech

players will lend their time and efforts to volunteering in the community at agencies coordinated by the United Way of Montgomery, Radford and Floyd.

• The bands, which are for sale around campus and at the stadium on game days, helped raise nearly \$33,000 for the United Way of Montgomery, Radford and Floyd last year.

BOOK (DEFENSIVE) ENDS

- A mix of old and new faces are looking to continue the Hokie pass rush that has always been a staple piece of defensive coordinator **Bud Foster**'s defenses.
- Senior **Darryl Tapp** (Chesapeake, Va.) is back and looking to repeat as a first-team All-ACC selection. Tapp, who has garnered preseason All-America honors, is a speedy rusher who goes full-speed all the time. Last year, he was tied for third on the team with 60 tackles, including 16.5 for loss and 8.5 sacks, as well as 23 quarterback hurries and two fumble recoveries.
- Last season against Florida A&M, Tapp had a sack, forced fumble, fumble recovery, quarterback hurry and interception in the first eight minutes of the game. It was the first collegiate interception for the defensive end. He played just 15 snaps on the day in recording those numbers in Tech's 62-0 win over the Rattlers.
- Tapp, a workout fanatic, can often be seen around campus riding his bicycle up the hills of Blacksburg with ankle weights to strengthen his legs.
- Redshirt junior **Noland Burchette** (Richmond, Va.) is looking to return from a right triceps injury that required surgery in the spring. If he does, he will be one of three anchors at the end spot. Last year, he had 27 tackles, including 6.0 tackles for loss and three sacks.
- Redshirt sophomore **Chris Ellis** (Hampton, Va.) is a physical specimen at 6-4, 251 pounds. He is coming off an outstanding spring which saw him earn defensive MVP honors.
- Last year, he played in all 13 games, recording 33 tackles, including 7.5 for loss and three sacks, to go along with 14 hurries, three pass break-ups, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble.
- Rounding out the top four at defensive end is surprising **Orion Martin** (r-Fr., Martinsville, Va.). Martin walked onto the squad after spending a semester at Norfolk State and one semester at Hargrave Military Academy.
- He made quite an impression in the spring game, posting a game-high seven tackles, including 3.5 for a loss and two sacks. He was given the Paul Torgersen Award, awarded to the top newcomer and earned a scholarship shortly after. Martin posted a 350-pound bench, a 550-pound back squat and a 34-inch vertical jump in spring testing.

- There will be just one Lewis on the line this year as Jonathan's older brother, Kevin, graduated last year.
- Lewis was a force on the line for Tech last year and is poised to be so again this year. Lewis, who has started 29 straight games, had 40 tackles, including 11 for loss and five sacks a year ago.
- Powell is a young talent who came on late last year to be a big contributor on the line. He made his first collegiate start against Florida A&M when an injury

sidelined Burchette. Powell finished 2004 with 17 stops, including six TFL.

- Pushing Powell at the tackle spot is
 Tim Sandidge (r-Sr., Madison Heights, Va.).
 Sandidge has played in 37 games over his career. He had a sack at NC State.
- Also looking for playing time are Barry Booker (r-So., Amherst, Va.) and Kory Robertson (r-So., Martinsville, Va.). Both have shown flashes of being contributors and will be looked upon to spell the starters.
- Much in the same way that Jim Davis was used last year, don't be surprised to see Tapp line up inside at tackle for 15-20 snaps per game, especially in pass-rushing situations.

MR. ANDERSON

- One of Tech's defensive leaders is the quiet and unassuming James Anderson (r-Sr., Chesapeake, Va.). Anderson moved from third to first on the depth chart at whip linebacker during the 2004 spring practice, and didn't look back. He started all 13 games last year, recording 48 tackles.
- He opened the 2005 campaign with 10 tackles at NC State.
- Anderson's steady play has allowed the coaches to move **Aaron Rouse** (r-Jr., Virginia Beach, Va.) to the rover spot, and **Corey Gordon** (r-So., Gainesville, Fla.) to be Anderson's top back-up.
- Anderson, who is heavily involved with Athlete's In Action, spent a week in Fort Collins, Col., this past summer participating in the AIA Ultimate Summer Training Camp. He went with teammates Darryl Tapp (Sr., Chesapeake, Va.) and Grant Throckmorton (So., Wytheville, Va.). The camp was designed to teach athletes

how to apply spiritual principles to the lives and sports.

CALL 911

- The linebacking duo of No. 9 **Vince Hall** and No. 11 **Xavier Adibi** will team up
 to give Tech a pair of outstanding athletes
 manning the middle.
- Hall (r-So., Chesapeake, Va.) started the last 12 games at the mike position last year and finished second on the team in total tackles with 64. He had 10 tackles at NC State to open the season.
- Adibi (r-So., Hampton, Va.) has taken over the starting duties at the backer position. Adibi was sidelined with a torn tendon in his right biceps muscle suffered in the 2004 season opener against USC. The highly touted linebacker tore the tendon on his 23rd college play and had surgery on Aug. 31 to re-attached the tendon to his humerus bone. He returned for the Georgia Tech qame, despite initially

being feared lost for the year, after making an incredible comeback in the training room.

- Adibi finished the season with 25 total tackles, including 4.5 for loss and two sacks. He also had an interception, a forced fumble and two pass break ups.
- He recorded eight tackles at NC State in the opener.
- Redshirt senior **Blake Warren** (Clifton, Va.) and sophomore **Brett Warren** (Clifton, Va.) will be the main backups at both positions. Blake, who is legally blind without his contact lenses, started the opener at backer last year and recorded his fourth career interception in the FAMU game, returning it 46 yards for a score. He had 28 tackles and two interceptions last year.
- Brett played mostly on special teams, seeing action in 12 games. He recorded three solo tackles and four assists.

MR. EXCALIBUR

- During Tech's summer strength and conditioning testing, James Anderson (r-Sr., Chesapeake, Va.) once again reached "Elite Athlete" status. It marked the fifth time he had earned the Excalibur Award, which represents the highest honor in the Hokies' athletic performance program. The level is a predetermined performance test that measures achievement for the individual's position. It is comprised of four tests in strength (bench, squat, push jerk and power clean) and five tests in performance (vertical jump, 40-yard time, 10-yard time, sit-reach test and 20-yard shuttle).
- Anderson is the first player ever to win the Excalibur Award five times.
- Also earning "Elite" status this offseason for the third time was offensive lineman Will Montgomery (r-Sr., Clifton, Va.). Earning it for the second time were offensive lineman Brandon Frye (r-Jr., Myrtle Beach, S.C.) and defensive end Darryl Tapp (Sr., Chesapeake, Va.).
- Tight end John Kinzer (r-So., Fairfax, Va.) picked up his first Excalibur Award this off-season.

GETTIN' THEIR KICKS

- Brandon Pace (r-Jr., Virginia Beach, Va.) returns to handle the place-kicking duties. The former walk-on he earned a scholarship last preseason gets quick height on the ball. This year, he is 2-for-2 on FGs with a long of 44 yards and is also 2-for-2 on PATs.
- He was a Lou Groza semifinalist and finished one point away from tying the single-season school scoring record for a kicker. He earned first-team All-ACC honors and last year.
- Stepping in for four-year starter Vinnie Burns at punter is **Nic Schmitt** (r-Jr., Salem, Va.). He has patiently waited his time and will now get his chance.
- The lefty can boom the ball and is also a demon in the weight room. He earned Super Iron Hokie honors in the weight room this past spring, setting a new position record in both the push jerk (360) and power clean (360). His power clean mark was the ninth-best in program history and he also recorded a 390-pound bench and a 605-pound back squat in spring testing.
- He averaged 45.7 yards on six punts at Maryland with three inside the 20 and two inside the 3. He had a long of 59 yards.
- At 6-2, 273 pounds, Schmitt isn't your prototypical punter. He also is an outstanding bowler who frequents the New River Valley Superbowl with **Jesse Allen** (r-Jr., Monson, Mass.). Schmitt consistently bowls games over 200 and had a 298 game last spring, just missing the perfect game.

- For the 11th consecutive year, Tech's punter is a left-footer. Starting with John Thomas (1995), through Jimmy Kibble (1996-1999), Robert Peaslee (2000) and Vinnie Burns (2001-2004), Schmitt will look to carry on the strong tradition established by the southpaws before him.
- Sophomore **Jared Develli** (Sterling, Va.) is handling the kickoff duties. Last year, Develli consistently put the ball deep in the end zone with good height. He had five kickoffs at NCSU, picking up three touchbacks. The former walk-on has one tackle on coverage this year and earned a scholarship this preseason.
- Other players looking for playing time are freshman punter **Brent Bowden** (Centreville, Va.) and kick-off man **Jud Dunlevy** (r-So., Roanoke, Rapids, N.C.). Bowden is the brother of current Florida State punter Chris Hall.



BEAMERBALL

- During the Frank Beamer era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offensive team, the defensive team and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.
- Each of Tech's last eight teams is ranked among the school's top 10 highest scoring teams. During that time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown. And 25 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams. Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 94 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 77 in Tech's last 138 games.
- Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 59 TDs, with 36 coming on pass interceptions, 21 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 35 TDs, including 15 on blocked punts, 12 on punt returns, four on kickoff returns, three on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.
- Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first TD under Beamer, and it was scored on special teams.
- Under Beamer, 64 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. Fifteen of those players Don Stokes, Jock Jones, Roger Brown, Lawrence Lewis, Antonio Banks, Jim Baron, Keion Carpenter, Pierson Prioleau, Anthony Midget, Cory Bird, Kevin McCadam, Willie Pile, Jimmy Williams, Vincent Fuller and Eric Green scored twice. Jason Lallis, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall each had three scores, André Davis four and DeAngelo Hall had six.
- Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 50-8 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams.

BEAMERBALL II

- Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama. Tech now has 104 blocks in **Frank Beamer**'s 215 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 53 punts (15 for TDs), 30 field goals and 21 extra points.
- The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham and safety Keion Carpenter, who each posted six blocks during their
- Tech careers. Basham blocked three field goals and three PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.
- Tech blocked more kicks in the 1990s than any other Division I-A team. The Hokies blocked 63 kicks during the decade
 31 punts, 18 PATs and 14 FGs. Tech has started the new decade with 29 blocks.
- During its time in the BIG EAST ('91-03), Tech posted at least three blocked kicks against every team in the league. During that span, Tech blocked 10 kicks against Pittsburgh, nine against Miami, seven versus WVU, six versus Rutgers, four
- against Boston College and Syracuse, and three versus Temple.
- The teams Tech has victimized the most during Beamer's 18 seasons have been Pittsburgh, West Virginia and Miami. During that span, the Hokies have blocked 10 kicks versus the Panthers and Mountaineers, and nine against the Hurricanes.
- During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 18 times, winning 13 of those games. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in
