
Statistics on Displaced Iraqis around the World

April 2007

GLOBAL OVERVIEW

Continual violence across much of Iraq's central and southern regions is forcing thousands of people to leave their homes every month. As a result, the international community is facing a much larger and more complex humanitarian crisis than the one aid agencies planned for during the run-up to the 2003 war. By April 2007, there were believed to be well over 4 million displaced Iraqis around the world, including some 1.9 million who were still inside Iraq, over 2 million in neighbouring Middle Eastern countries, and around 200,000 further afield. A significant proportion of these were displaced prior to 2003, but many others have fled since then. By 2006, Iraqis were once again the leading nationality seeking asylum in industrialized countries. However, some 95% of displaced Iraqis are still located in the Middle East.

INSIDE IRAQ

The number of internally displaced people (IDPs) within Iraq rose by some 50 percent during 2006. In all, more than 730,000

new IDPs have been created by conflict and a sharp upturn in sectarian violence since the February 2006 bombing in Samarra.

As a result of initial optimism after the fall of the Saddam Hussein regime in 2003, over 300,000 Iraqi refugees returned home during the two years following the war (mainly from Iran). Of these, around 27,000 were assisted by UNHCR. However, by 2006, hundreds of thousands of new refugees were

fleeing the country and few were returning voluntarily. Many foreign refugees had also left or were keen to do so. Of those remaining, some have found a relatively safe haven in Northern Iraq, whilst others – most notably the Palestinians – are effectively trapped with nowhere to go.



IRAQI REFUGEES & ASYLUM SEEKERS IN INDUSTRIALIZED COUNTRIES

Iraqis were the largest single group of asylum seekers arriving in industrialized countries in 2006. However, the 2006 total of 22,000 was less than half the average number who arrived during the six years prior to 2003.

Resettlement to Industrialized Countries

During the first half of the 1990s, more than 5,000 Iraqis were being resettled each year to industrialized countries. However, after 2003, the numbers fell by around half. In 2007, UNHCR plans to refer some 20,000 Iraqis for resettlement from the countries neighbouring Iraq. By 6 April, with the agency's reinforced resettlement operations gathering momentum, the number of Iraqis submitted by UNHCR offices in six countries in the region since 1 January had reached 2,677.
