Sam Weller's Books was founded as Zion Bookstore, by Gustav Weller, my grandfather, in 1929, right before the Great Depression. Gus's store was quite small and primarily stocked secondhand Mormon books. His staff became his adolescent kids, who didn't quite yet include Sam. Ten years and two moves later, Gustav decided he would become a farmer. By then, 18-year-old Sam was pretty discouraged with bookselling, since it had never adequately fed the Weller family. But that didn't matter yet because Sam would be drafted into military service for World War II before Gus would put the screws to him.

After the war, Sam was compelled to take control of the family business. He was only 24. In 1953, he married Lila Nelson, who invented an inventory system and took responsibility for the bookstore's finances, a job she would perform for the next 44 years. By the 1960's, Sam's reputation as a bookman was well established. His style of bookselling was quite different than his father's. Not only was Sam more casually Mormon than his father, he bucked the culture by selling controversial material, including anti-Mormon books and contraband Henry Millers and D.H. Lawrence, imported via duffle bag. In the rare book realm, Sam built his reputation on rare Mormoniana and Western Americana.


I spent much of my childhood in the bookstore with my parents and the strange and wonderful booksellers who felt like family to me. I started punching the time clock when I turned 10. In the 1980's, I became interested in our rare book department, and worked around its edges, where I wouldn't collide with Sam. Today, we still maintain our traditional focus on Mormon books and Western history but over the years we grew to be a broad-based general bookshop selling rare books of all topics, as well as general used books and new books. Today, our bookstore occupies about 40,000 square feet and employs roughly 40 booksellers. Our rare book department is staffed by Joan Nay and me, both ABAA members, as well as Esther Cannon and Eric Marchant.

This catalog was produced especially for the 40th California International Antiquarian Book Fair. It is an updated version of one we produced for customers for Christmas. Some of the books in it will be on display in our booth at the book fair. We hope you enjoy it and that you find books you can't live without. If you have particular books you are seeking that do not appear here, please ask us; our inventory consists of over half a million volumes and if we don't have what you're looking for, we will be happy to file your request and notify you when we are able to provide it.

As generalists, we produce catalogs with diverse content which varies greatly depending on the collections we are able to procure. But you can always expect Weller's to present you with important and unique books, especially those within the canons of our specialties. - 1. Abbey, Edward. Desert Solitaire: A Season in the Wilderness. New York: McGraw-Hill Book Company, 1968. 1 dition. 269 pages. Octavo. Brown cloth. Very good in a near fine dust jacket. The spine ends are very slightly bumped. Subtle foxing on the outside edges. Tape stain along the rear hinge. Faint bumping and one tiny closed tear at the top edge of the dust jacket. Self-described as "an elegy, not a travel guide," Abbey writes of his experiences as a seasonal park ranger in Arches National Park near Moab, Utah. Not one to hold back, Abbey writes of his love of the desert country and his disdain-one reviewer called this work a "hymn of hate"-of the workings of commerce, development and politics as it encroaches on the pristine deserts of the high Colorado plateau. Near fine in recent three quarter leather with marbled boards. Pages very clean but for light offsetting. A list of the bounty lands received by military personnel in the state of New York for military service. Higher ranking officers received as much as 5500 acres, while lowly privates received only 600 acres. The volume is arranged first by unit, with names alphabetical, then by township. The names and dates of those soldiers who died are also included. A dynamic example of early Americana, and a valuable reference for genealogists and historians. (See photo above) RBAL00tw \$900

Leavenworth: n.p., 1885. 1095 pages. Quarto. Handsomely rebound in smooth full tan leather with leather labels, spine, and new marbled end sheets. Brown stamped dentelles. Very good. Previous owner's name in ink on bottom edge of text block. Several dog-eared pages, and an occasional tick mark in

- pencil. Kansas became the thirty fourth state in the Union in 1861. This massive tome provides all manner of detail of Kansas law, and supercedes the previous Compiled Laws of 1879 with updated and amended sections. Included are detailed land descriptions of the 103 counties, and several interesting pages relating to treatment of Indians within state boundaries. (See photo to left) RDASCOM00kt \$1,000

Very good in attractive three quarter tan leather with red and green morocco labels, raised bands and gilt and blind rules. Spines are lightly faded, and leather has general light rubbing and bumping. End sheets are lightly foxed, and with a few old pencil notes and a bookseller's label in each volume. Internally quite clean but for occasional light foxing and a few smudges. Color frontispiece and a color fold-out map. Frenchman Abbe Domenech was a missionary, traveler, and author, who spent four decades off and on in the American Southwest. This work contains his recollections. - Dutton, Clarence E. Tertiary History of the Grand Canon District with Atlas. Santa Barbara: Peregrine Smith, 1977. xxii, 264 pages. Quarto report volume, with accompanying large folio atlas. Half brown leatherette spine with natural cloth boards. Both volumes are near fine in very good slipcases. The report volume has a faint crease to the upper corner of the text block. The atlas volume is complete with all leaves pristine. The maps and large folding scenic views in stunning color are from the expedition. Originally published in 1882 as the second volume in the monographs series of the U. S. Geological Survey. This is a facsimile reprint of that rare original work, a federally funded geological investigation of the Grand Canyon and the lower Colorado Plateau of Utah. The folding scenic plates in the atlas were drawn by Thomas Moran and William H. Holmes, and have been used widely to illustrate and exhibit the breadth of the Grand Canyon. A masterful work of both literary and scientific merit that is unsurpassed in the literature of the American West. RDUTTER00em \$600

Occasional light soiling. Large folding map at rear shows sporadic foxing, and has some notations handwritten in ink along the Pacific coast shoreline, but is otherwise is in very good condition. A tight and clean copy. "...devoted, principally, to the description and

history of the portion of North America bordering on the Pacific Ocean, between the 40th and 54th parallels of latitude, which is traversed and in which a great measure drained, by the River Columbia, and to which the name of Oregon is now usually applied." (See photo page 1) RGREHIS00tw \$700

Kelly, Charles, and Maurice L. Howe. Miles Goodyear: First Citizen of Utah, Trapper, Trader and California Pioneer. Salt Lake City: Western Printing Company, 1937. Limited edition, #11 of 350 copies. 1st edition. 152 pages. Octavo. Green cloth with gilt stamping. Light shelf wear to boards and extremities. Otherwise very good, clean and tight. Inscribed and dated by the author on the acknowledgment page. The acknowledgment in the book is made to O. A. Kennedy for his help in researching the book. Below this, and the above mentioned inscription, Kennedy has pithily wrote: "This is it" signed with his name and dated. Goodyear is well-known to Utah school children as that romantic figure of a mountain man/trader who built Fort Buenaventura on what is now 28th Street in Ogden, Utah in 1845-46. In his western travels, he was among the first to view the devastation of the Donner Party, and met the first group of Mormon Saints at Fort Bridger just before their arrival in the Salt Lake Valley. He tried to persuade the Mormons to settle near his fort on the Weber River, but failed. Several months later, in November of 1847, Mormon leaders purchased Goodyear's fort for \$1950. Salt Lake City: Legal Printing Co, 1928. Limited edition of 1000 copies. 198 pages. Octavo. Brown cloth with brown stamped decor and titles. Cover is moderately soiled with light shelf wear. A printed book plate numbered 145 is attached to front pastedown. The book plate is signed by Mrs. Estella M. Loomis, the subject's wife, and Mrs. V[irginia] B[arnes] McCormick, the subject's niece. Pages are very good and clean. An attached folding map is at the end. The dust jacket is faded and soiled, with considerable shelf wear, chipping along spine and several tape repairs. Laid in at the front is a two-page letter, typed on US Smelting Refining & Mining Company stationery, by Edgar M. Ledvard, editor of the book. The letter is addressed to Charles L. Camp of the California Historical Society, and is dated Oct 4, 1928. Ex-libris Sam Weller. A faithful reproduction of the Loomis journal detailing the trip from Birmingham, Iowa to Sacramento, California in 1850. A daily account with an accompanying map of the route, and black and white photos of many of the sites taken by Ledyard. A reprint of William Clayton's Emigrants Guide of 1848 is included. The accompanying letter by the editor includes references to the Birmingham Journal. An indispensable work on 19th century emigrant trails. RLOOJOU01jn \$450

fore edges of wraps. A one inch piece lacking at lower spine of vol. 1, #2 issue. Contents are very good, clean and tight. The Pacific Historical Quarterly began in March 1932, issued by the Pacific Coast Branch of the American Historical Association. The serial began to devote its "scope to the history of the entire basin of the Pacific, ...indicating "an appreciation of the importance of the Pacific Coast...and its close relationship to the other lands in and bordering on this great ocean." Issues include articles, book reviews and illustrations.

10. Morgan, Dale L. West of William H. Ashlev: The International Struggle for the Fur Trade of the Missouri, the Rocky Mountains, and the Columbia, with Explorations Beyond the Continental Divide, Recorded in the Diaries and Letters of William H. Ashley and His Contemporaries 1822-1838. Denver: Fred A. Rosenstock / The Old West Publishing Company, 1964. Limited edition, #47 of 250 copies. 341 pages. Folio. Bound in three quarter light brown leather with tan cloth covered boards and gilt stamped title on the spine. In a matching slipcase, and signed by the author. Near fine. The edges of the covers are very lightly bumped and rubbed. The pages are clean and bright. The mylar covering over the book is in very good condition. The slipcase is in very good condition, with lightly bumped and rubbed edges. Contains a large fold-out map in the back. Prospectus laid in. Signed by Morgan on the limitation page. Inscribed and dated by the publisher, Fred Rosenstock, on the front fly. A handsome volume detailing the explorations of William Ashley based on his diaries and letters. Ashley was a Virginia-born statesman, fur trader, and eventual U. S. Congressman. His early travels in the West helped establish the Rocky Mountain fur trade for U.S. interests, and is credited with organizing the rendezvous-style encampments. Ashley and his men pioneered the Platte River route of the Overland Trail, established a trading post on the Yellowstone River, and were the first white men to sail down the Green River. Following his daring and colorful exploits in the west, he served out his later years as a congressman from the state of Missouri. (See photo page 1)

11. Read, Georgia Willis, and Ruth Gaines, editors. Gold Rush: The Journals, Drawings, and Other Papers of J. Goldsborough Bruff. 2 volumes. New York: Columbia University Press, 1944. 1 edition. 1404 pages. Thick Octavo. Quarter black cloth with light brown paper covered boards, and illustrated paper labels on the covers. Very good. The edges of the covers are lightly bumped and rubbed. The pages are very clean, and the bindings are very sturdy. Ex-libris Sam Weller. J. Goldsborough Bruff set out to compile the "perfect guide" across the country following the discovery of gold in northern California in 1848. Beginning with an April 2, 1849 entry when he left his home in Washington, D. C. and ending on July 15, 1851 with his return "to the bosom of my family," Bruff wrote in exhausting detail what a

cross-country rush to the gold fields would entail. Accompanied by his own drawings, this set is deemed by many to be the best source of information on the Gold Rush era.

Signed by Mari Sandoz on the limitation page. Ex-libris Sam Weller. When "The Cattlemen" was first published, one reviewer called it "thundering," and "stupendous in length, concept and achievement, never dull, written with humor and understatement." The volume, the third of six volumes that form the nucleus of Sandoz's work, describes the cattle industry of the American West. RSANCAT00em \$350

Folding map looks as though it has never been touched. Signed by Sandoz on the limitation page. Illustrations by Bryan Forsyth. Ex-libris Sam Weller. A very attractive book. An anthology of selections from the six volumes in Sandoz's Great Plains series, as well as two additional essays, and two sketches unavailable elsewhere: "Snakes" and "Coyotes and Eagles." Sandoz said herself that the source for much of her writing came from her father, and "the silent hours of listening behind the stove or the wood box, when it was assumed, of course, that I was asleep in bed." One reviewer said of her: "No one else, wielding quill or typewriter, commands such evocative prose about the Plains as does Miss Sandoz." RSANOLD00ec \$275



Saint Louis: Southwestern Book and Publishing Co., 1870. 1st edition, 170 pages, Large octavo. Pebbled terra cotta cloth with gilt title and floral end sheets. Very good. Extremities rubbed. Small loss of cloth from spine ends. Presentation inscription in ink from Mrs. D. Robert Barclay, the daughter of the author on title page. The daughter's name is also written on a contemporary historical society bookplate on the front pastedown showing she once presented this copy to the society. Page 148 includes a paragraph describing the Mormons in northern Missouri in the 1830s. Shepard calls the Mormons lawless and unbearable, and with some bravado obliquely describes the incident at Haunt's Mill in 1838 wherein "thirty [Mormons were] killed, among them two children, and many other acts of great violence done by both parties which can never

Talbott, n.d.; Chapter 3: Trail Building, R.S. Shelley, n.d.; Chapter 4: Telephone Construction and Maintenance Radiophone Equipment, Clay M. Allen & A.G. Simson, n.d.; Chapter 5: The Lookout System, W.B. Osborne, 6th edition, 1934; Chapter 6: Tools, Equipment, and Supplies, W.B. Osborne, 4th edition, 1937; Chapter 7: Fire Fighting, W.B. Fire wardens and forest officers "combine practical experience with technical knowledge and trained intelligence, and [are] expected to be so proficient with hand and mind alike." So starts the Western Fire Fighter's Manual, written specifically for firework in the Pacific Northwest. Accompanied by a plethora of black and white photos, drawings and diagrams, and bound in such a way that each chapter can easily be removed and carried individually.


17. Carle, Eric. You Can Make a Collage: A Very Simple How-to Book. Palo Alto, Klutz/Hi Marketing, 1998. 25 pages. Oblong quarto. Spiral bound. Near fine with all of the original colored collage tissue unused and still attached. Most children won't know Eric Carle's name, but many know that weirdly colorful collage caterpillar with the green body and round red head, his title character in the" The Very Hungry Caterpillar" published in 1969. Thirty years after Caterpillar, Carle has designed the venue and provided inspiration for creating similar collages. This book, like most from the folks at Klutz, has what you need "attached" to it, in this case, 72 sheets of decorative colored tissue papers which Carle created by painting on white tissue paper. His designs were reproduced and bound in at the back of this book for artists of all ages to use in making their own collages. Copies with tissue intact are very uncommon.

18. Haberly, Loyd. Mediaeval English Pavingtiles. Oxford: Published for the Shakespeare Head Press by Basil Blackwell, 1937. 326 pages. Quarto. Three-quarter reddish orange leather with beige cloth covered boards, and gilt tooled spine and rolls. Very good. The covers are lightly rubbed, bumped and chipped. The spine is slightly faded and the tan cloth is gently soiled. An ex-library copy with a few slight abrasions to leather from removal of a tag. Discard stamp and label on the front pastedown and another paper label on the rear pastedown. It is doubtful that this volume ever received much use as it is otherwise in very good, sturdy and clean condition. Profusely illustrated. Scarce. Lord Haberly has spent considerable time scouring churches for examples of mediaeval pavingtile art to compile this handsome volume. Calling pavingtiles "an unvaunted art," Haberly urges careful tracings of existing tiles and calls for their preservation and protection. Over 300 color illustrations of pavingtiles. Beyond that, this volume is a nice example of fine printing. (See photo below) RHABMED00ec \$700

Good with rubbed edges and faded purplish stains to covers. Reset in original covers with small discreet reparations to spine ends. Front end sheet has portions of an old mounted gift label which someone has unsuccessfully tried to remove; a few stains and an old ownership inscription. Rear pastedown has a small bookseller's label. Pages are very clean. Scarce. Saying that chess "problems are indeed the poetry of chess," Healy compares the thirty two chess pieces to the alphabet of the poet, the chess board to the paper, and the resulting positions to the stanzas of verse. Healy continues that the "successful exertion of the intellect" in solving chess problems is rewarded by "legitimate gratification." Profusely illustrated with chess board diagrams.



20. Holbein, Hans. **La Danse des Morts.** Paris: Jules Labitte, circa 1838. 252 pages. Sextodecimo. Half leather with marbled paper covered boards and marbled end sheets. Very good. Extremities lightly rubbed and bumped, with boards exposed near corners. A tiny label on the verso of the

front free end sheet. Occasional light foxing throughout. Originally published in 1583, the work contained 41 woodcuts based on drawings by Holbein. Later editions added more illustrations. This French edition contains a total of 46 macabre woodcuts of death escorting every type of citizen to the grave. RHOLLAD00ec \$450



21. Hunter, Dard. A Papermaking Pilgrimage to Japan, Korea and China. New York: Pynson Printers, 1936. Limited edition, #242 of 370 copies. 148 pages. Quarto. Near fine in quarter black calf, with gold and black patterned paper covered boards printed from 18th Century Korean wood-blocks. In a very good slipcase of brown paper covered boards, with moderate sunning to extremities. The publisher's prospectus and original order form laid in. Signed by Dard Hunter and the publisher, Elmer Adler, on the colophon page. Illustrated with black and white plates throughout. Fifty specimens bound in at the rear of the book. This lovely volume is a fascinating study of Asian paper making, written by the undisputed master of papermaking technology and history. The Asian paper maker's craft is wonderfully shown in sixty-eight sepia tone photographs printed by the Photogravure and Color Company; as well as by the handmade specimens which show a remarkable array of colors, shades and textures. The handsome and fitting binding is by Gerhard Gerlach. Not often seen, this signed Dard Hunter volume would make an impressive addition to any book craft, design, or fine press collection. 

Paris: At the Sign of the Pegasus, 1927. Limited edition of 350 copies. 82 pages. Duodecimo. Vellum spine with green paper covered boards. Very good with a small stain on front board. A bookplate from Salt Lake City-based Porte Publishing Company is on the front pastedown. This small volume, "the earliest extant treatise on the shapes of the letters of classical inscriptions," gives exacting, archaeological and geometric detail of printed roman letters. The book is in very good condition, with subtly rubbed edges. The decorative box is in good condition with rubbing and a bit of scuffing at edges. Initially this resembles a child's book of scribbles and scraps, but Ohtake uses scraps, discarded tickets, pieces of newspaper, currency and matchbooks to produce this multi-layered, multi-colored effect along with his own sketches. Calling paper and pencil ""truly great inventions of humanity ... [and] marveling at the essential straightforwardness of that combination," Ohtake writes that he disengaged his vision from the subjects, and simply drew for periods of time in both London and Hong Kong. Frank was number seven in the family of 3 girls and 6 boys. The first two children-Cynthia and Oliver-

both died within a year or two of birth, making Harriet the first to live to adulthood, and the oldest sibling to the surviving one younger sister and five brothers. That Baum inscribed this copy to his oldest sister as the "first copy off the press," gives it an intimate, unique and significant provenance, qualities which are enhanced by this copy being in such nice condition. "The Daring Twins," projected to be a mystery series for teenagers, never quite got off the ground-only two were ever published, this title and the second volume, "Phoebe Daring," published in 1912. He first visited Central America when called as a Special Ambassador for the federal government. He developed a strong belief that educating the Indians with compassion and respect was far better in the long run than "Americanizing" them by force. the industry in the state, the Commission was to pay 25¢ per pound for silk worm cocoons. Although Brigham Young had promoted the silk industry as early as 1855, profits were marginal and the Commission was disbanded in 1904.

The first edition of this book, published in 1958, included McConkie's controversial description of the Catholic Church, as well as his interpretation on why black men could not hold the priesthood. After a revelation in 1978, the LDS Church changed its position, allowing black men to hold the priesthood. 

Pratt penned "Key to the Science of Theology" on LDS doctrinal themes and his spiritual philosophy just prior to his missionary service to Chile in 1851. It has been reprinted over 15 times, although somewhat revised in later printings, and remains a classic work of early LDS literature. The first copy listed below (#220) is a handsome presentation binding, typical of the quality of 19th century British book binding, and was probably one of only a handful bound thus for giving to noted leaders. The second copy (#221), while also leather is more plain.





This small work was timely in its publication as it differentiated the claims to succession in the LDS Presidency by the Reorganized LDS and Utah LDS Churches.





Modern marbled end sheets. Very good. The edges of the covers are very mildly rubbed and the corners a bit bumped. The gilding is rubbed and fading in spots. The first few pages were professionally reinserted. A former owner's name is written in purple pencil on the front flyleaf. The fore edge margins of the first 58 pages bear small moisture stains but do not affect text. A sturdy and attractive copy. This small book is the first LDS hymnal printed in Salt Lake City, and is the 14th printing over all. The first edition of this hymnal was compiled by Joseph Smith's wife Emma, and published in 1835 in Kirtland, Ohio. Over the next 36 years, 12 more editions were printed and bound under the direction of the LDS Mission Offices in Manchester and Liverpool, England. When Cannon printed this edition in 1871, it was the 2rd official U. S. edition, and the 1st edition to be published in Salt Lake City. A total of 25 printings were made between the first printing in 1835 and the last printing in 1912. Over the course of it's 77plus years of use, this hymnal under went a number of revisions with some hymns deleted or added, and some textual changes. This edition has 345 hymns with words only. It includes the meter for each song, and first line and subject indexes. Hymnals typically see heavy use, so a copy in this condition, even with the repairs, is unusual.

Added to the front signature is an inscription in Smith's hand to his son, John Henry Smith and dated 1864. John Henry was also an LDS Apostle and counselor to LDS Church Presidents Wilford Woodruff and Joseph F. Smith.

Book of Mormon represents the 6th printing over all, and the 2th printing in England. Church leaders in England announced this new printing of 5000 copies in the December 15, 1848 issue of the Millennial Star, although it was five or six months before copies were available. A handful of the 5000 copies were bound in a fine morocco, but the majority were bound as this copy is, in one of several colors of sheepskin. Printing for this edition cost just over £186, and the binding in sheep cost £111. By comparison, the predecessor to this printing, the 1841 edition, was printed in a quantity of 4050 copies, and took almost eight years to sell out, whereas this 1849 sold out by the summer of 1851, about two years after publication, likely owing to an increase in missionary activity in the British Isles. 

A few discrete, professional, paper repairs to preliminary and terminal leaves. Repairs ever so slightly affecting legibility of text on the last two pages of work and lower fore edge corners of index. Pages range from clean to bright. Little is known about the publication of this 4th American edition, but it was likely printed between February 1846 when the Mormons began evacuating the city, and September of that year when anti-Mormon violence reached its pinnacle. When word was sent back to Nauvoo, all printing materials, presses and stereotyped plates were packed and shipped to the wagon trains pointed towards Utah. Church officials, remaining in Nauvoo to dispose of Church properties reported in November that stereotype plates had been packed in boxes prior to being shipped, but five months later the boxes were still in Nauvoo. Church leaders urged those still there to maintain a "watchful eve" on them. What ever became of those stereotyped plates is not known. This 1846 printing was the last edition published on U. The two copies of the Pearl of Great Price described below are the second edition of the work, but are of the first Salt Lake City printing. The first edition was printed in Liverpool, 1851. It was originally compiled by LDS leaders in Britain to make the basic teachings of Joseph Smith more accessible to British saints. The Preface to that first edition suggested members consider this "little collection of precious truths as a Pearl of Great Price." The name obviously stuck. A few additions and changes from the 1851 edition were made for this printing, including the completion of the present text of the Book of Moses, and the addition of the revelation on eternal marriage-today known as Section 132 in the Doctrine and Covenants. This edition initially sold for 50¢, and was not canonized as scripture until 1880.



The Utah Silk Commission, established by legislative decree in 1896, authorized bounty payments of 25¢ per pound for silk worm cocoons produced in the state. Williams, who helped produce H. H. Bancroft's 39 volume work on western history, proposed to L.D.S. Church leaders to finance a similar project in Utah. Whitney was selected as author at pay of \$200 a month; his wife, Zina was paid \$50 to be his secretary. To stay in shape for the twelve year project, Whitney practiced regular calisthenics and rode his horse up and down local canyons. Volume 4 is very scarce. Apocryphal stories surrounding this set indicate the binder went out of business just as volume 4 was being finished, and fewer copies were bound. Hence, its scarcity.
