

College life was exactly what it was supposed to be – road trips to exciting towns like Rock Island and Decatur, Ill., four of us crammed in one room on overnight trips, carrying football dummies up gravel steps, running wind sprints in the dark the last three weeks of practice, spending every other weekend on a bus with 45 guys and three coaches, deciding how to spend the \$3 in meal money we received on bus trips. Did the games matter? You bet. But every minute with my teammates helped me grow as a person and appreciate the rewards of participation. Athletics at Carroll was an experience for which I am totally grateful.

I enjoyed it. There was never a substitute for victory or a lesson not learned from defeat, but beating the invincible team bonds teammates like nothing else can. It can be profound, emotional. It can move your spirit, give you pride in your school and confidence in yourself. At Carroll, I experienced all of this. The lessons I learned in sports provide answers to questions I face in business. Work together, be honest, trust, respect and communicate with your teammates.

Athletics were a building block of my life and Carroll was a large part of that foundation. The late Gen. Douglas MacArthur once said “competitive sports keeps alive in us a spirit and a vitality. It teaches the strong to know when they are weak and the brave to face themselves when they are afraid, to be proud and unbowed in defeat and yet humble and gentle in victory. And to master ourselves before we attempt to master others. And to learn to laugh, yet never forget how to weep.” At Carroll, I was touched by all of this.

Carroll gave me the opportunity to get a good education, to have teammates I respect and love to this day, to find and marry a lovely woman and to experience college athletics in a wonderful environment. I cannot imagine going to college and not playing a sport. Thank you, Carroll College, for letting me be a part of your sports tradition.

Kristin Igielski '04

Cross country and track

Waukesha, Wis.

For the last time in her college career, Kristin Igielski approached the starting line, poised and ready for the race ahead. She began that race the same way she began her first – one step at a time.

Kristin is no stranger to competition. As a child, her natural athletic ability made her well-suited for several sports. It wasn't until high school that she focused on running. "Since I was new to my high school freshman year, my parents encouraged me to join a sport where I could meet people," she said. "I didn't even have a clear idea of what cross country was when I showed up for the first practice."

Her learning curve was short. She ran track and cross country in high school, but never thought she had what it took to make it at the college level. "Running is natural to me, although I've really had to work hard to accomplish my goals."

"Kristin understands that she was given a special talent in both the classroom and on the field of play, yet she still wants to improve," said Shawn Thielitz, her cross country and track coach. "She doesn't hesitate spending long hours studying or staying after practice. She is a leader by example."

Kristin will graduate in May with a top five national cross-country ranking, a 3.9 grade point average, plans to pursue a career in nursing, and greater self-confidence. In addition, by the time her Carroll career is over, she will have accumulated several academic All-America rankings.

"A big part of Kristin's success is that she understands that you need to have a strategy for not only each race, but in life," said Thielitz. "She carries the strategies we use in our competitions over into everyday life."

Carroll was a place Kristin felt could help her accomplish her goals. It was important to her that she could count on a community of supportive faculty members and coaches while remaining close to those who motivate her most. "I learned very quickly from Kristin that her family is her greatest motivator," said Thielitz. "Kristin is driven by faith and family and has always put them first."

For Kristin, being an athlete is more about striving for your personal best and less about acquiring metals and trophies. Her experience at Carroll has provided the ability and opportunity to reach out to teammates and encourage them in the same way.

In that last race, Kristin won a medal – one that proved to be more invaluable because of the confidence she gained and the inspiration she is for other athletes.



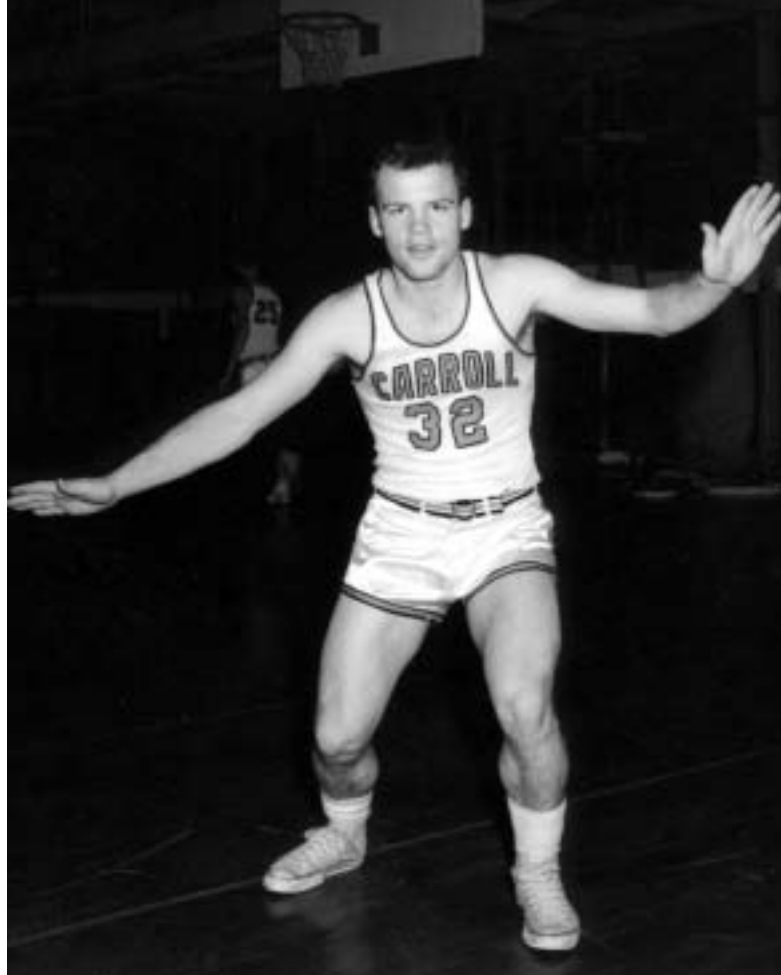
John Schreiber '58 Basketball, football, track Waukesha, Wis. Retired

With the same enthusiasm he had half a century ago, John Schreiber '58 walks across campus, anxious to catch a glimpse of basketball practice in Van Male Field House. Listening to him reminisce about his days playing basketball for Carroll, it's evident he feels a part of the tradition of Carroll and Pioneer athletics.

When John, a Sheboygan, Wis., native, sits back and reflects on his time at Carroll, he does so with a grin and chuckle. "My years at Carroll were filled with many great times," he said. "I remember being a freshman. It was my first coach, Don Huddleston, who found me a job and a place to stay on campus." Huddleston and others taught John plays on the court and lessons for life.

"My coaches never asked us to do something they couldn't do themselves," John said. "They were very fair and that left quite an impression." That philosophy impressed John and became the one that guided his career and his life.

Even as a Carroll freshman, John began to create bonds with his teammates, earned the respect of his coaches and gained confidence in his skills. Working hard and playing hard, he and other athletes joined the Beta Pi Epsilon fraternity and continued building the bonds that remain to this day. His love and respect for Carroll is undeniable.



After graduating in 1958 with a degree in business administration, John began working at Hobart Corporation, where he spent his entire career. Since graduation, he has stayed involved at Carroll, often attending athletic and alumni events.

In September 2002, John was inducted into the Carroll College Athletics Hall of Fame in front of his family and friends. Curt Brewer '58, a former teammate, Beta Pi Epsilon brother and lifelong friend introduced John that night.

"The interest that John has maintained in Carroll College since he first arrived in 1954 has been continuous and Carroll is important to him," said Curt, who recognizes John as someone very special to the Carroll community.

Looking up at his Hall of Fame plaque in Van Male Field House, John beams, recognizing others who have earned the distinction, among them Huddleston, who was inducted in 1974. John is justifiably proud of his accomplishments, proud of where he played and proud to be among others honored for their contributions to Pioneer athletics.

Pam Hicks-Pollock '91 *Cross county, track* *Waukesha, Wis.* *Physical education teacher*

Even though her “teammates” are younger, the philosophy is the same – make it fun.

Pam Hicks-Pollock '91 readily admits where she first learned this lesson. “It was my Carroll track coach, a very fair and encouraging person, who made everyone feel as if they could be successful,” she said. “Being an athlete was fun.”

As a member of the Pioneer cross country and track teams, Pam discovered a deep passion for teamwork. She combined this with her love of learning and chose a career that allows her to share her talents and motivate young students. Now a physical education teacher at Lake Country School in Hartland, Wis., Pam said she “knew early on that I wanted to take all I learned from coaches and professors at Carroll and share my talents with other students and student-athletes.”

“Always in my teaching, I try to make a personal connection with my students and encourage them to challenge themselves, setting no limits on what they can do,” Pam said. “Most of all, I strive to make it fun.”

A high school athlete, Pam knew she would continue running track at Carroll. At first hesitant about the tougher level of competition she would find in college, Pam said the freshman jitters began to fade as older members of the team helped her adapt to college life and athletics.

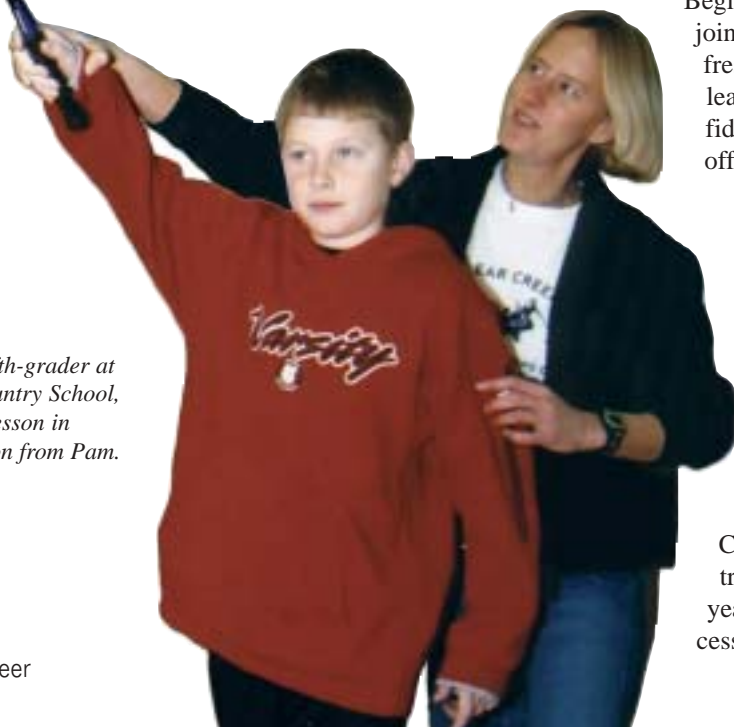
“Carroll just felt like home,” said Pam, a Sturgeon Bay, Wis., native. “The decision to come to Carroll and become a Pioneer athlete was an easy one.”

Beginning with the first track team and later when she joined the cross country team, Pam evolved from a shy freshman into a confident student and athlete. “I learned that I was truly a hard worker and gained confidence in my own abilities, both on the track and off,” she said.


Pam has strived to instill that confidence in the student-athletes she teaches and coaches. “I really help individuals succeed while celebrating their contribution to the team as a whole,” she said.

Recalling road trips, team gatherings and Carroll friendships that remain strong, Pam is proud to encourage Carroll students to “go for it” and be part of an athletics team. “The memories I have of my teammates and my experiences at Carroll didn’t stop the day I stepped off the Carroll track for the last time,” she said. Instead, Pam’s four years as a Pioneer athlete were a springboard to a successful career and satisfying life.

For David Pye '04, the lines between athletics and academics overlap. His career, which he hopes includes work with a professional sports team, will combine his business degree and his athletics experience.

David's leadership training at Carroll is as strong as his academic training. As captain of the tennis team, he has had the opportunity to set an example for other players. "I felt I was in a position to lead my team in a positive direction," he said.

Since his freshman year, the men's tennis team has emerged as a tight knit group with strong leaders.

Although humble about his own contribution to the team, David believes the seniors have set the standard for younger athletes. "It's a great way to ensure the team's success after we graduate," he said.

As his Carroll career progressed, David was elected president of the Pioneer Athletic Advisory Committee and worked closely with student leaders from all sports to promote the benefits of athletics at Carroll and in the community.

"David has had a major impact on PAAC since its inception," said Athletic Director Kristen Jacobsen. "He has an exceptional work ethic and is not only a respected leader at Carroll College, but a respected leader within the Midwest Conference."

During the summer before his senior year, David completed a business internship with the Rochester Honkers, a Minnesota minor league baseball team. The experience provided the opportunity to learn how to handle multiple projects at once and work with a team, often on tight deadlines.

"I never set out to be the best, rather to be the best I could be and set a good example for others," said David. He said his parents taught him very early that "it doesn't matter how good you are. What matters is the dedication you give to everything in your life."

"David will leave to the team his strong sense of commitment and caring," said Greg Rabidoux, men's tennis coach, who added that David's dedication to the team and sport exemplifies the qualities of a Pioneer athlete.

"His efforts helped to make Carroll College one of the most community minded athletic departments in the Midwest," said Jacobsen.

David knows that success in life will require more than a perfect serve or crushing backhand. But just as athletics can shape the body, it also can sharpen the mind and define one's character. David's confidence, commitment and conviction, all nourished at Carroll, make him a champion.

When Mary (Uhalt) Langenfeld '78 started her Carroll College career in 1974, women's athletics were not recognized as NCAA competitive sports. Undaunted, Mary and her teammates paved the way for generations of Pioneer student-athletes.

Mary began her athletic career early, playing pickup basketball games with family and joining the first girls volleyball and basketball teams at her high school. She came to Carroll undecided about her major and ready to set aside competitive athletics.

Janet Grant '74, who supervised students in a former College Avenue house then used for student housing, would have none of that. Grant, an enthusiastic supporter of women's athletics, watched Mary in a pickup game and announced, "You're playing sports here!" It was only then that Mary realized a Carroll basketball career was possible. "Suddenly, I became part of a group of extremely talented women who had the desire to play competitive sports," Mary said.

The team started out slowly, playing small area schools during the first years. The late Coach Jane Swanson, herself a key figure in Pioneer women's athletics, had tough standards and high aspirations. "Jane expected us to be in top shape and train hard," Mary said. "She did a wonderful job keeping up with the latest theories and practice techniques to make us the best we could be."

The conditions were less than ideal. The team had no official uniforms and just enough players. They traveled to games in crowded vans. Still, the enthusiasm was contagious. In her four years of Carroll basketball, Mary watched support for the team and exposure for women's athletics increase.

Her Carroll experience was well-rounded. "Carroll wanted you to excel in all areas, not just athletics," said Mary, who left with a degree in education, a realization that there was a place for her in the world of women's athletics and motivation to pass on what she had learned. A high school physical education and history teacher, Mary teaches her students the importance of learning in the classroom and on the playing field. She has coached varsity volleyball for 22 years and has been an assistant basketball coach for 11 years.

Mary has poignant memories of her Carroll career. "I had so many experiences playing basketball that not many people get the chance to have," she said. Those experiences fostered a love of basketball that remains with her.

Mary believes strongly that she grew as a person at Carroll, in much the same way Carroll athletics grew because of her and her fellow teammates. Lady Pioneers who followed have carried on the tradition of "Building Champions."

PIONEER ATHLETIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE

It wasn't the NBA this Milwaukee native was shooting for; it was an MBA. An athlete all his life, James Hischke '01 always knew a great education would determine the measure of his success. But he also knew that he would always participate in sports.

"All my life I have been blessed with the ability to do well in school," he said. "I am competitive by nature and am always striving to do things better." That philosophy has helped him start a successful career as a computer programmer at Strong Investments in Menomonee Falls, Wis.

James said the two basketball coaches he played for at Carroll taught him several lessons. His first coach was pivotal in helping him adjust to the college game. It was his second coach that taught him most about himself.

"Coach (Sean) McDonough helped me handle a more prominent role on the team when I became a starter," said James. "I accomplished so much more in my basketball career from that point on."

James doesn't hesitate to compare that pivotal point in his basketball career with his career today. "I used to see a ceiling, a point where I thought I couldn't get any better, physically or mentally. Coach McDonough taught me that there is never a 'ceiling' to what I am able to do." Today, although he is temporarily satisfied with achieving certain goals and milestones, he knows there is more to be accomplished.

James learned other lessons on the basketball court. A serious and competitive student and athlete, he also learned to have fun. "I am more laid back now and realize now that the things I strive for don't happen in a day," he said. "Having fun makes that ride worthwhile."

There were life lessons, too. "Athletics teaches a healthy brand of competition that mimics everyday life," James said. "To be part of a successful business team, you must know how to help, advise and be an active participant."

That MBA? James earned his at Marquette University. Today, his goals are high. To stay in great shape mentally and physically, he is working on career plans, competing in triathlons and participating in adult sports leagues.

Just three years out of Carroll, James doesn't dwell on how many points he scored or the athletes who were his competition. What he does remember is the impact that Carroll athletics has had on his life.

“Call it a ‘refreshing experience,’” said Abigail, a chemistry major. “I had one of my best seasons that year.” She was on her way to the athletic success she had been seeking for quite some time and she was excited about how Carroll was supporting her career plans.

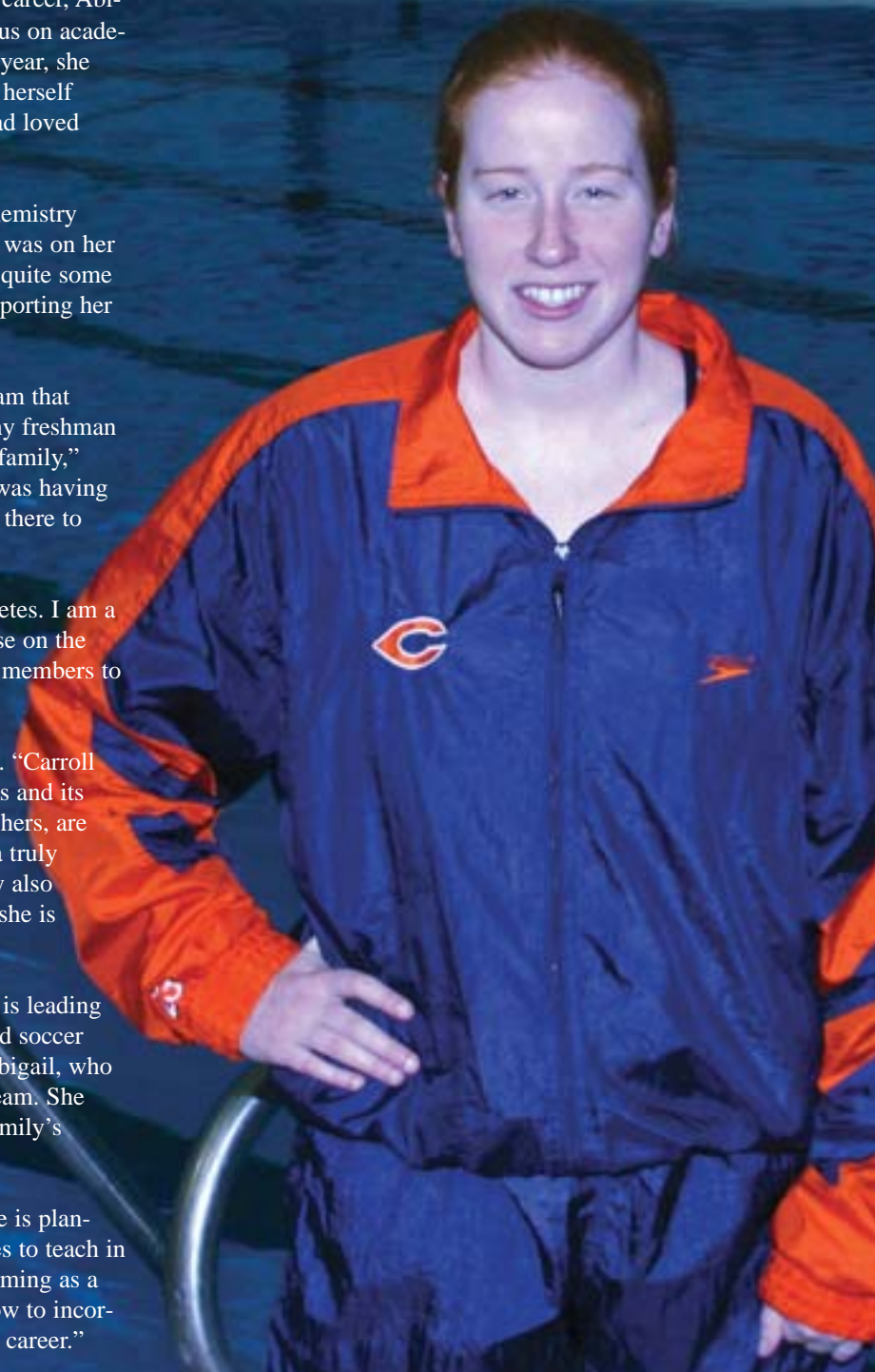
She credits her success as a Carroll swimmer to a team that showed her the compassion needed to transform a shy freshman into an outgoing leader. “I was treated as one of the family,” Abigail said. “It didn’t matter if I had a bad race or was having trouble in class. I knew I had a strong support group there to keep me going.”

Her coach, Abigail said, “set an example for the athletes. I am a better leader because of our coach, as is everyone else on the team.” That leadership also allowed individual team members to develop great chemistry with one another.

Abigail found that same inspiration in the classroom. “Carroll creates a supportive environment both for its students and its student-athletes,” she said. “Coaches, like many teachers, are always cheering for us on the sidelines. They show a truly vested interest in seeing us succeed.” Science faculty also helped her hone her interest in teaching science and she is now training to become a chemistry teacher.

When Abigail isn’t working on her breaststroke, she is leading the next generation of athletes and students. “I played soccer when I was younger and still love the game,” said Abigail, who enjoys coaching her brother’s second grade soccer team. She also teaches Sunday school to sixth-graders at her family’s church.

As Abigail’s college athletics career winds down, she is planning her future. A Milwaukee, Wis., native, she hopes to teach in the Milwaukee area while pursuing soccer and swimming as a participant, coach or both. “Carroll has taught me how to incorporate athletics into my life, not just into my college career.”





Mike Poremba '04 Roselle, Ill. Football

It was a defining moment. Senior Mike Poremba had played in many high school and college football games, but no victory affected him more than the one on Oct. 4, 2003, over Ripon College at Homecoming.

A Roselle, Ill., native, Mike grew up as a Chicago Bears fan and dreamed of playing the game himself. An athlete with considerable natural ability, he played football, swam and ran track in high school, where he was captain of all three teams.

Participating in college athletics was a given. "It was only a matter of where I was going to play," said Mike, who was introduced to Carroll by a Pioneers football coach and encouraged by his father to attend. After talking with coaches and professors, Mike knew Carroll could provide a great place to play football and pursue his passion for history.

Now 21, Mike's appreciation for history affects his perspective on Pioneer athletics. "Every alumnus who has played on a Carroll team is still very much a part of that team," he said. "Every player has helped to build the team for future generations. Once a Pioneer, always a Pioneer."

Mike's final Homecoming as a Pioneer football player ended with that victory over Ripon College, a victory he attributed to every teammate he had ever played with at Carroll, as well as all the Pioneer athletes before him. "I now feel a part of the Carroll tradition," he said.

In December 2003, Mike received the Roy LeClere Award, given annually to a male in the Midwest Conference who earns the highest grade point average in his junior year while lettering in at least two sports.

"Mike is a great role model and a tremendous student-athlete who earned both his academic all-conference and honorable mention all-conference awards," said Jeff Voris, head football coach. "He excelled by being a step quicker, a little tougher and much smarter than the man across from him. Mike also was a coach on the field and a mentor to young players off the field and on campus."

The lessons he learned as a Pioneer athlete, Mike said, will lead to many winning moments in life.

Erin Erickson '04 Basketball, softball Muskego, Wis.

With a sense of quiet confidence, Erin Erickson '04 stepped onto the basketball court in November to begin her fourth and final year as the team's starting forward. Her desire to win hasn't faltered since her freshman year. What has changed is her ability to be a leader. "I am definitely more outgoing as a direct reflection of my participation in Carroll athletics," said this 5'7" senior.

For a shy girl from Muskego, Wis., Carroll was appealing because of its intimate approach to learning and the cohesiveness she found on Pioneer athletic teams. "It didn't matter who I encountered; everyone from the seniors on the team to my professors wanted to make sure I was doing OK," said Erin.

The oldest of three sisters, all attending Carroll, Erin played basketball, softball and tennis in high school. She came to Carroll with the desire to play college basketball, but not enough confidence to try out for the team. Kris Jacobsen, head women's basketball coach and Carroll athletic director, encouraged Erin to try out. Four years later, she is a leader on and off the basketball court and the softball diamond.

Erin admits she isn't the most vocal player on the team, but she encourages others in practice, during games and off the court. "As a senior now, I see how important it is to be a leader and set the example for others," she said.

"Erin is truly respected and admired by all of her teammates, coaches and opponents," said Jacobsen. "She has combined an exceptional academic and athletic career and will be a very marketable and successful alumnae."

Erin remembers following the example set by seniors before her and how pivotal those women were in encouraging her to accept nothing but the best. "As a new player, you want to work hard because you see the seniors working hard," she said. "You want to win for them."

Her quiet confidence sends a loud and clear message on the basketball court and in the classroom. When she leaves Carroll, she'll go ready for whatever competition is in her future.

Claude Covelli '69 Football Madison, Wis. Attorney

Claude Covelli '69 didn't get listed in "The Best Lawyers in America" by accident. It took determination and drive, qualities he developed on the Carroll football field, when his team's record was not the best.

Like many Carroll freshmen, Claude arrived in August 1965 not knowing anyone and scared at the prospect of being on his own for the first time. Although he was a standout high school athlete, he was humbled when he showed up for practice with older and more experienced Pioneers. "It was a very different football experience from high school," he said.

In his rookie year, he sprained his ankle – not a great start to his Carroll football career. Still, he said, "I felt as if I had joined a family." That acceptance paved the way for Claude's success in the classroom and on the football field. He soon realized that being part of the team off the field was just as important as being part of the same team on the field. He and his offensive line teammates joined the same fraternity, lived in the same house and learned to respect each other as individuals.

Bill Wick '70 was a year behind Claude and remembers the affect he had on the team. "Claude walked into the locker room and immediately his presence was felt," said Bill. "When people asked who that was, the older members on the team didn't hesitate to say, 'That's Covelli. He's good.'"



Claude was an effective offensive lineman who worked hard and well with fellow teammates and coaches. "He is one of the most talented people I know," said Bill, an attorney who has seen firsthand Claude's fair but tough demeanor on the field and in court. "I looked up to Claude then and I continue to look up to Claude now as a fellow trial lawyer and a person."

Claude recalls an important point in his Pioneer career, a moment when the team's chemistry was near perfect. Late in his college career, the Pioneers traveled to Augustana College. The odds were not good. The Pioneer roster was low, their record not good. Augustana had a full roster, a winning record and a beautiful stadium.

Something special happened that cold day in fall 1967. The Pioneers won 24-7 and the men on that field celebrated as a team. Claude hesitates to take credit, but others say he was an inspiration, that his work ethic, his dedication and his efforts to build team unity made the difference.

For Claude, athletics was a complement to his Carroll education and the lessons he learned contributed to his career success. Today, when people ask who he is, whether in the courtroom or in passing, they still hear, "That's Covelli. He's good."

Krejcarek received the Grand Prize Award in the Faculty-Staff Portfolio category for the International Photo Imaging Education Association competition. His work will be shown at the conference in Las Vegas, where he will present a talk "Using the Right Brain to Teach Digital Imaging."

Athletic training

Steve Reese was selected by peer review to present at the annual National Athletic Trainers Association Symposium in St. Louis, Mo. He presented a 90-minute workshop, "Promoting Responsible Social Behaviors in the College Setting," to individuals representing 23 institutions around the country.

"Structuring Research Opportunities for All Biology Majors," by **Susan Lewis**, **Lisa Conley** and **Cynthia Horst**, was published in the May 2003 issue of *Bioscene*, the journal of the Association of College and University Biology Educators.

Lewis has been invited to join the editorial board of www.ActionBioscience.org, an on-line journal/site that promotes bioscience literacy.

Business, Accounting and Economics

Dr. Stephani Richards-Wilson received her doctorate in leadership studies from the University of San Diego in May 2003. She joined the Carroll faculty in September 2003 as assistant professor of business.

Career Day, co-sponsored by the computer science and politics departments, brought dozens of alumni back to campus in February to talk to students about their experiences in the business world.

Schneiders donate \$1.25 million for athletics, recreation project

Carroll College has received a \$1.25 million gift toward the renovation and expansion of its athletics and recreation facilities. The gift of James '74 and Deborah Schneider of Austin, Texas, will fund the first of three phases of a \$4 million project.

James Schneider, a member of the college's Board of Trustees, is senior vice president and chief financial officer at Dell Inc. in Round Rock, Texas. Deborah Schneider also completed a portion of her college education at Carroll.

"We are extremely grateful for the Schneiders' continued commitment to Carroll College," said President Dr. Frank S. Falcone. "This generous gift will allow us to enhance our campus and support improved athletics and recreation programs for students."

The first phase includes expansion of the stadium, installation of a synthetic surface, a new drainage system and lights. This phase is scheduled to be completed by the beginning of the 2004 fall semester.

"This gift is another great example of the tremendous support our administration and alumni provide our students," said Jeff Voris, head football coach. "This new playing surface will allow our football program to continue the process of 'Building Champions' on and off the field of play."

The renovated stadium also will have an NCAA sanctioned soccer field. The current field is too narrow for the college to host tournament play.



James Schneider, a four-year letter winner in football at Carroll, is a member of Carroll's Business Advisory Council, a group of business leaders that provides advice and expertise on curriculum issues for the business, accounting and economics department. He has been a guest lecturer and a volunteer and major donor of Carroll's recent Gateway Campaign, which raised \$36 million. The new auditorium in Main Hall is named in honor of the Schneiders' gift to that project.

"Athletics, and specifically, football, was a major part of my overall experience at Carroll," Schneider said. "Debi and I are pleased to support these plans because we believe so strongly in the future of Carroll College and the benefits that come from involvement in sports programs."

Generations of Stanfields call Carroll "home"

Back during the Depression, when Coca Cola was 5 cents a bottle, bread was 10 cents a loaf, rent on an average home was \$8 a month and Carroll's tuition was \$50 a semester, Lucia Stanfield began her quest for knowledge at Carroll College.

In 1930, Lucia graduated from Waukesha High School. Thanks to a generous scholarship from the Presbyterian Ladies Aid, she was able to attend Carroll, where she majored in English and drama. She loved campus life, performed in several plays and pledged Theta Pi Delta. After graduation, she taught high school English in Hartland, Hillsboro, Reedsburg, West Bend and finally Green Bay, all in Wisconsin. At Green Bay West High School, she served as the head of the speech department and later taught language arts for a total of 30 years until retirement. Now 90, Lucia remains active driving, traveling and volunteering.

Following in Lucia's footsteps to Carroll were her brothers Robert and James, sister Marie, and Robert's daughters Bonnie and Jean. Robert began his Carroll career in 1933 and played cornet in the Carroll College Band. In 1935, James started at Carroll, where he pledged Tau Kappa Epsilon, but left after a year and a half to take a job with the Civil Service in Washington, D.C. He served in World War II with the Sea Bee Corps.

Marie entered Carroll in 1936 at the age of 16. Like her older sister, Marie majored in English and speech. She was co-editor of the Hinakaga yearbook her junior year and pledged Kappa Gamma Phi (later Chi Omega). After graduation from Carroll, she taught high school English in Oxford, Wis. At Carroll, she met and eventually married Robert A. McCabe, a 1939 graduate who became a professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He was awarded a Doctor of Humane Letters degree by Carroll in 1989.

The bond between Carroll College and the Stanfield family remains strong. Lucia and her extended family reminisce on how important their ties are to Waukesha and Carroll College. Stanfield family members have been steady supporters of Carroll over the years. The recent \$4 million renovation of Main Hall includes a classroom named in honor of James and Arlene Stanfield.

Last year, Linda's innovative lesson plan, "Caves: Magical Underground Worlds," won the National Council for Geographic Education and George F. Cram Scholarship for 2003. In early October, she flew to Salt Lake City, Utah, to accept her award and present her work to a national audience.

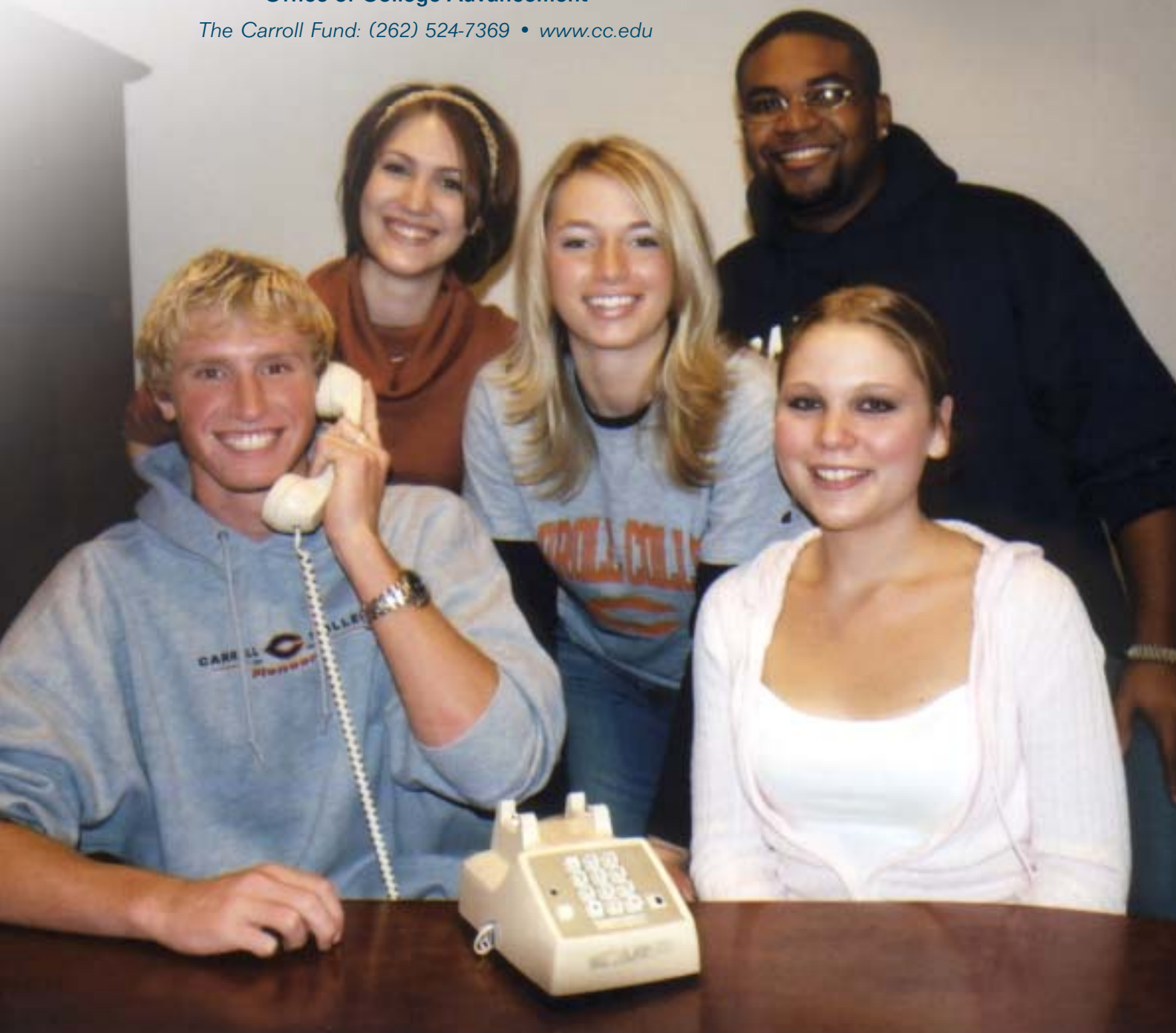
