I am just writing to tell you that I took part in the YMCA of NSW's Youth Parliament 2005 in the first week of the holidays. I was told by Mr Anderson that it was you who suggested giving the application form to me and I would just like to thank you.

One person was selected from each State electorate and I was lucky enough to be selected to represent the Ryde electorate. I thoroughly enjoyed my six days at the camp, which was based at the YMCAs Camp Yarramundi in Richmond. We spent three days actually in State Parliament, which was a great experience in itself.

During our time in Parliament House we were visited by many Members of State Parliament, who spoke to us and acted as the Speaker while we debated our Bills. Each of the ten groups sponsored and refuted a bill, and we passed them in the same manner as real legislation, with debate, amendments and divisions. My experience speaking in Parliament will stay with me forever, especially the cries of 'shame' and hear hear!

In addition to the time in Parliament, we also paid a visit to the Governor, Marie Bashir, at Government House. Year 7 Parents and Caregivers

The National Adolescent Vaccination Program will continue in September when Year 7 students receive their second dose of Hepatitis B vaccine. The clinic will be held at the school on Thursday 1st September from 9 am to 12 pm.

Only those students in Year 7 who received the first dose of Hepatitis B vaccine earlier in the year will be vaccinated with the second dose at school. I will be giving these students a Parent Information Kit to be delivered home by "pupil post"

The Health Department has advised the school that students who:

- 1. missed the earlier vaccination at school, or
- 2. received the first dose but miss out on the second because of absence or illness,

can attend their local doctor for free hepatitis B vaccine.

YEAR 7 REPORT

y now all Year 7 boys and their parents would have received their very first high school reports. Overall the standard of the reports was good. Having said this I am not as concerned with these first reports as I will be with the second and third reports and seeing that boys are learning and progressing in their education. This is a personal journey, and my overall comment will be based on how much they have progressed since their last report.

Each boy studied 10 subjects in this recent block and consequently each student should have received 10 individual reports. Along with this, each student should have an individual comment and a grade indicating their level of achievement across all their subjects and in comparison to the rest of their class. To write these 150 comments and grades I read through each report for each student. I made a general assessment of their progress. Then I added up how many times the boys were above the class median. I adjusted my comment accordingly, but it was normally based on the number of times the student was above the median of the class for all their subjects.

I have received a number of calls from concerned parents. If I may clarify a few things:

- If there is an issue with a specific subject then communicating directly with the teacher involved is advisable.
- If there is a systemic problem across most subject areas, then I am the one to contact. I am not really in a position to comment or advise, unless generally, upon your son's progress in a specific subject.

I have had the opportunity of discussing with three different Year 7 classes now about the importance of understanding their rights and responsibilities as a student at

NSBHS. A number of behaviors have been outside these general principles. These behaviors have consequently needed to be understood, learnt from and changed. Below are the school's rights and responsibilities for students, as displayed in most classrooms across the school. It might be valuable for parents to discuss the meaning and significance of these with their sons. For my part, it is about your son taking responsibility for his education. This is understandably a complex idea. Through the process of maturation boys will hopefully come to understand that these rights and responsibilities are in fact freeing and empowering principles, that promote harmony rather than inflexible rules that oppress.

As a student you have the responsibility to:	As a student you have the right to:
Treat other people in the classroom with respect, courtesy and dignity. This includes being punctual and bringing appropriate equipment to class.	Be treated with respect and courtesy and to be free from discrimination.
Respect the whole school environment, and keep it clean and tidy. This includes wearing the school uniform correctly.	A school environment that provides an optimal learning environment for all.
Not behave in an aggressive or dangerous manner	Be (and feel) personally secure and safe.
Respect the rights, safety and possessions of others.	Expect your property to be secure and safe.
Study and work in a cooperative, responsible manner. This includes being organized and working in accordance with the teachers' instructions.	Acquire skills and knowledge to the best of your ability.

YEAR 10 REPORT TOKYO KOKUSAI HIGH SCHOOL VISIT

On the 24th of July, 20 of the 24 expected students from Tokyo Kokusai High School (four were briefly delayed due to an earthquake in their home city, but safely arrived soon after) touched down at Sydney Airport and struggled through customs to the welcome of their host families at the school.

The annual Kokusai visit was greatly anticipated, with the school's Japanese programme growing in popularity in recent years. Many of the North Sydney 'host brothers' had travelled to Tokyo earlier in the year, and most now played host to the students whose families they had been billeted with in Japan.

For Thursday and Friday the 28-29th July, Kokusai students, their teachers and hosts went on an overnight trip to Port Stephens. YEAR 11 REPORT TOKYO KOKUSAI HIGH SCHOOL VISIT

The Kokusai exchange experience is one that all students studying Japanese should try and take part in. To mix with people from an entirely different culture gives both parties an amazing insight into another world. 24 girls from Japan came to Australia for 12 days, and staying in the homes of 20 Year 11s and 4 year 10s from NSBHS.

The Year 11s (myself included) had a bit of an edge over the year 10s, not only because of another year of school, but also because all of the Year 11s who hosted were also a part of the trip to Japan in April. Having said that, the year 10s managed to get along fine with their billets. Everyone did. A friend of mine from up the road volunteered to take Honami shopping on Sunday morning, and she came back with 5 bags of shopping. Amazing, ne?

Both students have written very interesting reports of their time at the camp. Perhaps some Year 7 students may be interested in the 2006 camp after reading these reports?

FORENSIC CAMP REPORT

'We won't spend hours driving here to do something easy,' said Kel

Hardingham, organiser of the Talented Forensic Science Camp for Year 8 students. And rightfully said, because work given to us in the next four days was far from easy.

The camp was held in The Armidale Boarding School in Armidale, a small town with a population of 20,000 located about five hundred kilometres north of Sydney. After arrival to Armidale we were divided into one of the four dormitories, all of which air-conditioned to a comfortable temperature of twenty-eight degrees.

The rather large party of campers was divided into groups of four that each studied different murder cases. Groups had to spend time in classrooms studying DNA, Ballistics and Blood Types.

The Forensic Camp involved, however, mostly practical tasks. During my time at the camp, I learnt how to extract and match fingerprints, identify fibre types, measure refractive indexes of glass, perform paper chromatography and measuring the pH of soils. Some other groups also used ultra-violet light and practised cryptology.

In the real world, however, just finding and arresting a suspect do not finish a case. The case has legal issues and the decision must be handed down by a jury. Therefore it seemed fitting that a court case was run on the case – open to parents and caretakers of the participants. I became a Defence Barrister and our job was to defend the accused from the prosecution. Believe me it was difficult.

This is not school. It is a fun experience that gives you the opportunity to learn and experience a unique challenge. Meeting people you hardly know and working together is really a pleasure and The Talented Forensic Science Camp exceeds all expectations, however high they may be.

FORENSIC CAMP REPORT

Most of us when we hear the words, "Talented Student's Forensic Science Camp," either pretend to

be working on an English assignment or plug in the MP3 player. I'll admit it; I did it as well. It took a lot to persuade me to go, but my curiosity and the possibility of playing basketball there took over and I went. It didn't turn out too bad.

There were many people to mix with, from NSW, sunny QLD and even people from little Tasmania, all flocking to The Armidale School, where the camp was held, all of us not too sure about what to expect there. My friend and I took the gruelling 6-hour bus trip there, and clambered out later pleading to be amputated.

What mainly happened when we got there was that we had to put on our "Sherlock Holmes" caps on and solve a complicated mystery/crime and take the accused to court during our 5 day stay, the 5th being a day of court trials. There were at least 30 teams, and five cases. Our case was about a hit and run of a hated boss, by his own employee.

To help us in our cause we had at our disposal the school's advanced lab of Apple Mac computers, and labs for fibre, hair, fingerprint, blood and soil analysis. If we ever get stuck in our investigations we could also mail the experts for help. There were also controllers on the prowl for stuck and confused groups.

In addition, there were a wide range of activities to be done, with the school's many facilities available, such as basketball, soccer, tennis and swimming. There were also recreational activities at high noon, all in the gym. During the day, there were no lectures and you could take breaks throughout the day whenever it suited you. Still not convinced? It's during the last week of Term 2, which means you practically go on holidays early.

But all good has some evil, and the evil in this case was the cost. The camp alone cost \$150 for food, accommodation and a working heater to keep out the evil cold. The bus trip to get to Armidale cost \$155 and there was a \$25 cost for a shirt.

Overall it was quite an interesting camp, to learn how to use simple forensic techniques and methods, and a good chance to socialise with a whole array of different personalities. The camp shows that science is more than sitting in the lab listening to your science teacher, and more than the Times New Roman of your science textbook

Year 10 are making choices about their courses for 2006. Year 10 were fortunate to have Wayne Feng and Zubair Hasan, (Year 11) talk about the challenges of Year 11 Chemistry and Physics and Larry Reisen (Year 12) talked about his experiences with the senoir Biology course.

Tom Keevers of Year sat for the University of Sydney Gifted and

Talented Examination in late 2004 and was invited to attend the university Discovery Program during the last holidays. His report describes the sort of activities that were undertaken.

UNIVERSITY REPORT

During the July holidays from the 13th to 15th I attended the *Gifted* and *Talented Discovery program* that was run at Sydney University. This was a science program with three workshops (one for each day), the workshops were biology, chemistry, and physics. Entry to this program was decided by performance on a test late last year open to Year 8 and 9s.

Wednesday (Biology) - The first day started with being given T-shirts and information packs (about other programs that were running at the university). Biology was a practical orientated day, we did two bisections (of a sheep's kidney, heart, and lungs, and we also bisected rats). We examined cells under a microscope using dye, and performed other activities concerning nerves (sensitivity of skin, Knee jerk, etc.)

Thursday (Chemistry) - This was the best day, in my opinion, and it consisted of four main parts. The day started off with a presentation involving chemical reactions mostly resulting in production of light or a large bang (some were loud enough to temporarily deafen you, so you had to cover your ears). The second part of the day was practical working in pairs, we made a slime solution and we used liquid nitrogen (Boiling point -196C, so yes very cold stuff) to freeze a variety of unimportant objects such as flowers, and oranges. The third part of the day was a lecture from a professor who discussed chemical disasters, the moral being misuse of chemicals makes them dangerous. The last part was an assortment of practical activities (too many to list here) in large groups, this included endo and exothermic reactions, and creation of a reflective precipitate that acts as a mirror (with sample to take home).

Friday (Physics) – This was the last day of the work shop. We started

with a lecture where they talked about and demonstrated various effects of light such as fibre optics Light Amplification and Stimulated Emissions of Radiation (Or to the rest of us LASERS.) We were then handed a booklet containing riddles, it unfolded that we had to solve these riddles which would then direct us to a task which would then give us letters used to solve the final puzzle (Got that? Good!) This was naturally all part of a colossal competition (Battle of the nerds!) Which took around three hours to complete. To complete the work shop we were given a lecture by Karl Kruselnicki who was very entertaining coining lines such as "Sex is one of life's greatest miracles money can buy" he talked about both his personal experiences and general information about science ranging from bioinformatics to suggested forms of high speed space travel.






Yardstick member Jonathan Chow, of Turramurra, said the students started the company with the help of the National Australia Bank, at Chatswood.
