Family Award takes history



A love of history and a family tradition of commitment to education has prompted Beatrice and Roy Little to establish the Watkins Family Award. This award is in memory of Beatrice's grandparents, Charles and Elizabetha Watkins, and parents, Tom and Hilda.

The Littles, whose careers have taken them to London, Toronto, Ottawa, Sydney and Perth, settled in Beatrice's birthplace – Albany – 20 years ago. In support of their community, their award will go to the UWA Albany Centre student with the highest academic achievement over four units in his/her first year of study.

The couple has made a further gift which will ensure the growth of this award, contribute to the UWA Albany Sustainability Fund and support broader university scholarship.

"Education has been very important in our lives and the lives of our family, so it seemed a natural thing for us to be interested in promoting education in our community," Roy says.

Beatrice graduated in Arts from UWA in the 1940s and Roy studied at the University of Toronto, the city in which they met. They are Friends of the UWA Albany Centre.

Together, they have written a history of the extended Watkins family. Beatrice's New Zealand-born Grandfather Charles was an award-winning mining engineer and surveyor. He married his German-born bride Elizabetha, a teacher, in NZ in 1884 and their son Tom was born in 1886. The family is pictured above.

After their move to WA, Charles managed gold mines and became Contract Surveyor with the Lands Department. Elizabetha ultimately returned to teaching, becoming Principal of the Queen Victoria College for Girls. The couple established a home in Albany and later pioneered a farm in Woodanilling.

Tom graduated with honours in Law from the University of Adelaide. He was admitted to the Bar in 1908 and returned to Albany to practise. In 1920 he married Hilda, a talented pianist, embroiderer and decorative wood carver, and they had three children.

The family moved to Perth in 1928, where Tom practised law until his 1962 retirement, all the while maintaining a keen interest in the Woodanilling farm. Hilda died in 1968 and Tom a year later.

"Our family felt Albany was a very special place. This award will keep their memory alive here by rewarding scholarship and achievement – things the Watkins valued" Beatrice says.

Albany community supports sustainability

The Albany community has demonstrated its strong commitment to the region through its generous support of the UWA Albany Sustainability Fund – established to provide scholarships and research funding for UWA undergraduate and postgraduate students in Albany.

Since its launch by WA Premier Geoff Gallop in November 2003, the Fund has received donations – actual and committed – of around \$150,000.

UWA Albany Centre Development Manager Randall Jasper said contributions had come from all community sectors.

"Business donors include Wesfarmers CSBP Limited which has allocated \$45,000 over three years to research into sustainable pasture systems, and AFPL which has committed \$25,000 over five years, half of which will go towards a scholarship," he said.

"The local ANZ bank presented us with a cheque for \$1,000 and Sky West is supporting the UWA Albany/Sky West Lecture Series by providing flights for speakers from Perth.

"A major contribution of \$60,000 has come from the Great Southern Development Commission and local individuals have pledged around \$20,000.

"Providing locally-based education and research benefits the regional economy and encourages young people to remain in the community. It is an investment in the





Medal rewards dedicated work in Albany

Annette Knight's years of dedicated community service and her passionate commitment to the establishment of the UWA Albany Centre, a university centre in her home city of Albany were recognised recently when she was awarded a Chancellor's Medal.

"Surprised and honoured" at the award, Annette said she had been determined when she was in public life (she was twice Mayor of Albany) to see a local university established.

Annette was Chair of the Friends of the UWA Albany Centre for four years and remains an active member. Now she is putting her considerable energy into her role as inaugural Chair of the UWA Albany Sustainability Fund.

"The Fund's goal is to raise \$1,000,000 to invest to provide a secure financial backing for the Centre's future," she said. "We also have many people who are sponsoring scholarships and prizes and supporting postgraduate research.

"There are limitless opportunities for research here. There's farming, aquaculture, winegrowing, fishing and we have many environmental issues such as salinity and sustainability. It gives us a marvellous opportunity to establish ourselves as a centre of real research worth for the nation, particularly through UWA's involvement with the Centre for Excellence in Natural Resource Management.

"But in addition to that, providing local education and research opportunities encourages our young people to remain in the region and gives the community the benefit of having educated, vibrant young people here with fresh ideas."

The former ABC presenter who undertook mature age tertiary study as a mother of seven, and who has received many honours, including Member of the Order of Australia, says working for the Fund is its own reward and the Medal is a wonderful bonus.

University honours decades of support

Along with her husband, Sir James, Lady Sheila Cruthers has been a strong supporter of this University's community outreach activities over the last 30 years.

Lady Cruthers is particularly interested in twentieth-century art by Australian women, and has supported artists (men as well as women) by collecting their works and by providing personal support and encouragement.

The Cruthers Collection of Women's Art is a collection of paintings, works on paper and objects by Australian women artists from the 1890s to the present. It has been growing in size since 1974, when Lady Cruthers first began collecting. She has been supported in her interest by her husband and their son John Cruthers.

The entire collection now comprises over 300 works by about 100 artists and is housed between the family home in Perth and John Cruthers' Sydney home. Many works are on loan to various hospitals and other public organisations.

The Cruthers have been generous in lending art from their collection to the Lawrence Wilson Art Gallery here at UWA. Lady Sheila has been a member of the Friends of the Lawrence Wilson Art Gallery for many years. She is a strong and visible proponent in the visual arts community in Perth and indeed nationally, having also lent from the Cruthers' collection to other organisations, including the National Gallery.

Lady Cruthers was awarded a Chancellor's Medal in recognition of her significant and sustained contribution to the community outreach activities of the University.

Sir James Cruthers Kt, CitWA was awarded the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters at the same graduation ceremony held on Tuesday 8 March at Winthrop Hall.
