#### DEPARTMENT OF ART

THE ART DEPARTMENT FACULTY AWARD is presented to an outstanding senior art major. The faculty of the art department has presented this award for over 20 years. This year's recipient is Christine B. Conyers.

Christine, a graduating senior from Middletown, Md., is double majoring in law and society and art with a concentration in archaeology. A native of Scotland, Christine is a tireless worker; she has participated in the Public Leadership Education Network's Women in International Policy Seminar and conducted an internship in archaeology at R. Christopher Goodwin and Associates in Frederick. Next year, Christine is planning to pursue a law degree or master's degree in public policy, or both.

THE MARY ELLEN RANDOLPH PRIZE, named in memory of Associate Professor Emerita Mary Ellen Randolph, is awarded to an art major demonstrating equal proficiency in and enthusiasm for art history and the studio arts. Professor Mary Ellen Randolph retired in 1989 after 29 years of service to the College. Miss Randolph continued to participate in the life of the Hood community until her death in October 2005. Because she taught both studio art and art history, the award recognizes students who have demonstrated talent in both fields. The prize is awarded to Christina L. Bariatti.

Christy, a graduating senior from Myersville, Md., is majoring in art with a minor in studio art. She is presently the president of the Art Club and works for the Baltimore-based Art with a Heart, Inc., a non-profit organization that offers art-based, hands-on activities to families and individuals with disadvantages and disabilities. In line with this experience, Christy plans to pursue an M.A. in art therapy.

THE ANNA LOUISE REMSEN PRIZE is awarded to that member of the junior or senior class who maintains a high standard of work in fine and applied art. This prize was established in 1948 as a memorial to Anna Louise Remsen, Class of 1933, and is endowed by Anna's sister, Mrs. Edwin Richardson; her stepmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Remsen; and her friend, Ms. Hildegarde Liebich. The prize is shared this year by Jenifer Michael Hess Webber and Jessica M. Taylor.

Michael, a junior from Laurel, Md., is majoring in art with a concentration in archaeology. She spent the summer of 2005 with Dr. Genevieve Gessert at Ostia Antica in Italy, putting her artistic skills to work on an archaeological project, and hopes to return to Italy soon.

Jessica is from Columbia, Md. She graduated from Hood with a bachelor's degree in psychology in 2005 and has returned to pursue a second bachelor's degree in art with a concentration in studio art. She plans to become an art therapist. Her senior exhibition, "Cutting between the Layers," which uses both pastel drawings and ceramic sculpture to depict skin markings, is on display in the Hodson Gallery through May 7.

THE ART CLUB OF FREDERICK PRIZE is presented to a student who has demonstrated excellence in studio art in the past academic year. This award has been given for the last six years by the Art Club of Frederick, which counts a number of Hood alumnae among its members. The prize recipient this year is Karen J. Orgler.

Karen, a graduating senior from Frederick, Md., is pursuing a double major in Latin American studies and art, with a concentration in studio art and a minor in global studies. She has traveled extensively in Latin America and South America as a community service volunteer. For the past four years, she has spent part of each summer in Nicaragua, where she works as an administrator of a church-based project that focuses on children's nutrition and hygiene. At the same time, Karen sees herself as a continuation in a long line of artists within her family. Her senior exhibition, "Journey through Life," is on display in the library until May 7.

THE ART DEPARTMENT ALUMNAE AWARD is presented to an outstanding junior or senior art major, recognizing interest in the scholarship of art. Karyn A. Necciai is the recipient of this award.

Karyn, a junior from Frederick, Md., is pursuing a double major in history and art, with a concentration in archaeology, and a minor in classical studies. Karyn hopes to participate in an excavation this summer, and plans to pursue a doctoral degree in the archaeology of the Bronze Age in Greece and the Mediterranean.

THE SUZANNE GOTTERT PRIZE IN ART is presented each year to the outstanding student in art. This prize was first awarded in 2004. Suzanne Gottert is a 1968 alumna. This year's prize is awarded to Brenda A. Harrison.

Brenda, a graduating senior from Emmitsburg, Md., is an art major with a concentration in studio art. She has worked as an addiction counselor, family advocate and special education teacher, and has worked many years in experiential education where she developed diversity awareness and multicultural education programs. Brenda's senior exhibition, "The Masks We Wear," includes ceramics, prints and mixed media, and is on display in the Hodson Gallery until May 7.

#### DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGY

THE BETA BETA AWARD is presented to a high-ranking student in Biology 100-200 level courses, upon the recommendation of the biology department. The award is shared by Aubry A. Nicholson and Christina M. Zimmerman.

Aubry is a freshman from Rockville, Md. She plans to pursue a degree in the sciences.

Christina is a freshman from Brunswick, Md. She has demonstrated a very high level of achievement in the introductory biology curriculum. A strongly motivated student who is naturally inquisitive about diverse topics in biology, she has demonstrated excellent critical thinking and problem-solving skills with a broad range of biological concepts.

THE JANE D. McCARRELL PRIZE is awarded to a junior or senior who has shown excellence, interest and progress in the field of biology. This award, endowed by former students, alumnae and friends, honors the late Jane D. McCarrell, professor of biology and chair of Hood's biology department from 1946 to 1972. The prize is presented to Rachel M. Gauza.

Rachel, a graduating senior from Hampstead, Md., is pursuing a double major in music performance and biology. As a freshman, she was awarded the Beta Beta Award. In addition to completing an honors thesis with Dr. Lori Wollerman, Rachel has participated in research projects involving population dynamics of woodland salamanders in the Catoctin mountains and habitat requirements of cerulean warblers in West Virginia. She plans to attend graduate school in animal behavior.

THE SIDNEY SILVERMAN AWARD, named in honor of the late Associate Professor Emeritus Sidney Silverman, is awarded to an outstanding student majoring in biology. Dr. Silverman taught at Hood from 1974 to 1985 and did research at Fort Detrick and NIH. His colleagues in the department established this award in his honor. This year's recipients are Melanie B. Cokonis, Vanessa S. Eccard and Sarah J. Hinchliffe.

Melanie, a graduating senior from Frederick, Md., is pursuing a major in biology. She transferred to Hood in 2002 after completing courses at the University of Maryland College Park, and Frederick Community College. Throughout her academic career at Hood, she has worked full-time for Southern Research Institute where she has been a contributing author on three research publications in the journal, Antiviral Research. Melanie will present a department honors paper entitled, "Preclinical Topical Microbicide Development: Evaluation of Cytokines as Biomarkers for Cytotoxicity" at Hood and in a Sigma Xi forum in Philadelphia. She plans to enroll in Hood's master of science in biomedical science program.

Vanessa, a graduating senior from Smithsburg, Md., is majoring in biology. She transferred to Hood from the University of Maryland Baltimore County and Hagerstown Community College. Vanessa is a peer note-taker, and a member of the commuter student union and the Academic Judicial Council. In her studies at Hood, she has developed an interest in the pathogenic mechanisms of infectious bacteria and viruses. Seizing the opportunity to work in the toxicology laboratories of USAM-RIID on botulinium toxin, Vanessa has acquired many new experimental skills and completed a departmental honors research paper.

Sarah, a graduating senior from Victor, N.Y., is pursuing a major in biology with a minor in chemistry. An avid horsewoman, Sarah will continue to blend her interests in animals and science as she pursues a doctorate in veterinary medicine at the University of Minnesota School of Veterinary Medicine.

THE BIOLOGY FACULTY AWARD was created in 2000-2001 to honor a student or students demonstrating great promise in biology. The faculty in the biology department provide this book prize. The award is presented to Stephanie E. Garrett and Erin E. McClure.

Stephanie, a sophomore from West Friendship, Md., is pursuing a major in biology with a minor in sociology. Since coming to Hood, she has shown a marked interest and ability in biology courses and laboratories. Her work to date indicates real promise for future endeavors in biology. In addition to her scholarly pursuits, she is a member of the tennis team.

Erin, a freshman from Wilmington, Del., plans to major in biology. She came to Hood with an outstanding high school science background and continues to be an exceptional student in each course she has taken in her freshman year. With her strong background and the effort she puts into her course work, as noted by her biology faculty, Erin holds a very promising future in biology.

THE ROUSE GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP is awarded annually to an outstanding senior biology major who has displayed excellence in scholarship, citizenship and sincerity of purpose, and who is planning to pursue graduate study in biology, medicine or an allied scientific field. Mr. G. Park Rouse Jr., established this scholarship to honor his wife, the late Elizabeth L. Chandler Rouse, Class of 1936, and his daughter, Anne Rouse McDowell, Class of 1969. The scholarship is awarded this year to Hannah E. Hottel.

Hannah, a graduating senior from Keymar, Md., is majoring in biology. Hannah is a highly motivated biology student who transferred to Hood from Frederick Community College. In addition to her strong record of academic achievement in the biology curriculum, she has distinguished herself as an undergraduate researcher by completing her honor thesis with Cr. Chris Whitehouse at Fort Detrick where she has used DNA-based techniques to study the disease tularemia. Her broad background in biology and her documented success in research will serve her well as she pursues her degree in veterinary medicine at Cornell University.

# DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS

THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF CHEMISTS FOUNDATION AWARD is presented to a student or students majoring in biochemistry or chemistry for outstanding scholastic achievement and ability. This year's recipient is Megan L. James. Megan, a graduating senior from Woodsboro, Md., is a biochemistry major with a minor in Spanish. During the summer of 2004, she received funds from the National Science Foundation to design experiments for the organic chemistry laboratory. She has presented the results of her research project at national and regional meetings. She interned at the U.S. Department of Agriculture this past year and plans to continue working there for another year before heading to graduate school.

THE MARYLAND SECTION OF THE AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY presents an award to an outstanding upper-level student in chemistry at each of the participating colleges in the state. The prizes were awarded at a banquet and ceremony held recently at McDaniel College. Holly L. Haley is this year's recipient.

Holly, a graduating senior from Westover, W.Va., is double majoring in chemistry and mathematics with a minor in physics. She is an active member of the Free Radicals Chemistry Club, the Gamma Sigma Epsilon Chemistry Honors Society and the Least Squares Math Club. Her summer research project, in which she examined reactions of aromatic rings, was funded by the National Science Foundation and will soon be submitted for publication. Holly will pursue graduate studies in the cosmetic/pharmaceutical sciences.

THE ELIZABETH B. BOWER PRIZE, honoring the late Elizabeth B. Bower, is awarded annually to an outstanding student in chemistry. The Prize was established in 1956 by the late Rebecca Ann Eversole Parker '55, who was inspired by Professor Bower to make chemistry her career. At the time of her death, Rebecca was studying for her Ph.D. in chemistry at Oxford University. In 1962, the Eversole family endowed the prize as a memorial to Rebecca. The prize is shared this year by Oluwakemi M. Adeyeri and Lindsay N. Verbisk.

Kemi, a graduating senior from Nigeria, is a biochemistry major. She was awarded the George Kleinspehn Honor Scholarship for outstanding achievement in organic chemistry in 2004. She is an active member and treasurer of the Gamma Sigma Epsilon chemistry honor society. After graduation, Kemi will pursue a degree in the medical field.

Lindsay, a graduating senior from Middletown, Md., is pursuing a biochemistry major. She serves as the Apprentice Alchemist (Vice-President) of the Gamma Sigma Epsilon chemistry honor society. She has interned at USAMRIID for three years and, following a year of employment as she completes her current research project, she will head to graduate school in biochemistry.

THE CHEMISTRY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD is presented by the CRC Press, Inc., to the highest-ranking freshman student in Chemistry 101-102 during the current academic year. This year the award is shared by Tiffany A. Gutowski and Erin E. McClure.

Tiffany, a freshman from Baltimore, Md., is an Honors Program student, a Bonner Scholar and a member of the Hood College women's basketball team. She plans to pursue a double major in chemistry and mathematics and is currently conducting a research project on the separation of barbiturates using capillary electrophoresis.

Erin, a freshman from Wilmington, Del., plans to major in biology. She will be working with Dr. Dana Lawrence during the 2006 Summer Research Institute. She is an avid writer and has been published both locally and nationally. She recently submitted material for publication in Wisteria.

THE DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS FACULTY AWARD is presented to an outstanding senior major. The department faculty provides this book prize annually. This year's recipients are Paula M. Cantos and Lucas J. Tricoli. Paula, a graduating senior from Congers, N.Y., is a chemistry major. She is an active member of the Free Radicals Chemistry Club and a DJ on the Hood College radio station. During the summer of 2005, Paula participated in the Hood College

Summer Research Institute, completing a study on capillary electrophoresis. After graduation, she plans to pursue employment in a laboratory in New York.

Lucas, a graduating senior from New Market, Md., is a biochemistry major. He is the Sergeant-at-Arms of the Gamma Sigma Epsilon Chemistry honor society and a member of the Free Radicals Chemistry Club. Lucas has participated in several research projects at both Hood and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. His current research project focuses on designing primers and probes for real-time PCR. In the fall of 2006, Lucas plans to enter a Ph.D. program in biochemistry at the University of Maryland.

THE GEORGE G. KLEINSPEHN HONOR SCHOLARSHIP is named in honor of Professor Emeritus George G. Kleinspehn and is awarded to a student whose record in two semesters of organic chemistry at Hood College is outstanding. Dr. Kleinspehn, Whitaker Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, taught at Hood from 1967 to 1993. Prior to coming to Hood, Professor Kleinspehn was a research scientist on the Manhattan Project in Oak Ridge, Tenn.; at Johns Hopkins University; and at the U.S. Army Ballistics Research Laboratories in Aberdeen, Md. The scholarship is awarded to Mehwash A. Naseem.

Mehwash, a sophomore from Gaithersburg, Md., is an Honors Program student with a keen interest in the pre-health professions. She was awarded the CRC Outstanding Freshman Chemistry Award last year and has continued to excel in organic chemistry courses. She can often be found in Hodson studying for the MCATS when she is not quoting Monty Python movies.

#### COMMUNICATION ARTS

THE BLUE AND GREY EDITORIAL AWARD is presented for the best editorial writing appearing in Blue & Grey Today, formerly Hood Today, in the past academic year. The award has been given for several decades to students who serve on the editorial staff. This year's recipient is Jamie E. Bussey.

Jamie, a junior from Newburg, Md., is pursuing a double major in English and communication arts with a concentration in journalism. She is the news editor of the Blue & Grey Today, the student newspaper. This award recognizes her series on life as a freshman at Hood College.

THE ESTHER E. SHAW AWARD is given for the best news story appearing in Blue & Grey Today in the past academic year. The award is presented to Bridgette M. Harwood.

Bridgette, a graduating senior from Challis, Idaho, is a communication arts major. She is co-editor of the student newspaper, the Blue & Grey Today, and a reporting intern at the Frederick News-Post. She is recognized for her reporting on parking issues at Hood.

THE GEORGE E. RANDALL AWARD is presented to a junior or senior who has demonstrated excellence in journalism or writing, has worked on student publications and has maintained a strong G.P.A. The award goes to Bridgette A. Harwood. Bridgette, a graduating senior from Challis, Idaho, is a communication arts major. She is co-editor of the student newspaper, the Blue & Grey Today, and a reporting intern at the Frederick News-Post. She will enroll in law school in the fall.

#### DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCE

THE RAYMOND L. AND LOUISE K. GILLARD PRIZE, endowed by Gary Gillard, assistant professor of information technology, is in memory of his parents, Raymond L. and Louise K. Gillard. # DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS AND MANAGEMENT

THE LARRY T. CAMPBELL MEMORIAL PRIZE is awarded to an outstanding student in the Economics and Management Department. This award honors the memory of Larry T. Campbell, who was treasurer and comptroller of Hood College. Mr. Campbell was associated with Hood from 1968 until his death in 1981. The prize is shared by Valentina Kachanovskava and Rachel L. Moore.

Valentina, a graduating senior from St. Petersburg, Russia, is pursuing a double major in economics and mathematics, with a minor in Spanish.

Rachel, a graduating senior from Frederick, Md., is an Honors Program student pursuing a double major in economics and Spanish.

THE DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS AND MANAGEMENT BOOK PRIZE is awarded by the department faculty to the top graduating senior in the study of management. The prize goes to Denise C. Ryan.

Denise, a graduating senior from Shenandoah Junction, W.Va., is pursuing a double major in management and economics.

THE 2006 EXCELLENCE AWARD OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF RICHMOND, BALTIMOE BRANCH is awarded to a graduating senior with the highest academic achievement in the study of economics. Each college is permitted to nominate one student for this honor. The award is presented to Julie L. Wean.

She is a member of the Hood College student chapter of the Council for Exceptional Children and the Mortar Board senior honor society. Amy has also served as secretary for the Education Club. Since her childhood Amy has wanted to become a special education teacher and has worked diligently to achieve this goal.

THE PARK-DORFF AWARD is presented to that student in the senior class who appears most promising as a teacher in the field of early childhood education. Classmates Sara Bell Parkhurst Van Why, Class of 1973, and Katherine Nixdorff Wilson, Class of 1973, both early childhood education majors, established this prize in 1974 to honor an outstanding student majoring in this field. No other prize existed at this time for ECE majors. Julie C. Pallansch is the winner of this award.

Julie, a January 2006 graduate from Frederick, Md., majored in early childhood education. She is currently a third-grade teacher at Glade Elementary School in Frederick County.

THE RICHELLE EMERICK STUDENT TEACHER PRIZE is awarded to the undergraduate student teacher that exemplifies excellence in student teaching and embodies the spirit of student teaching as a profession. This prize is awarded in honor of Richelle Emerick, former director of financial aid, who retired in the fall of 1999 after 17 years of service to Hood College. This year's prize recipient is Heather Danielle Wojcik.

Danielle, a senior from Sykesville, Md., is pursuing a double major in English and secondary education. Her mentor teacher and college supervisor comment, "She is a reflective practitioner who will continue to grow professionally and who will actively seek growth opportunities." "She is capable of quickly becoming a Master Teacher."

THE CHARLES E. TRESSLER OUTSTANDING STUDENT AWARD is given in recognition of outstanding achievement by a student who intends to enter a career in education.

This award was established to honor Giles Professor Emeritus of Early Childhood Education Charles E. Tressler. Dr. Tressler taught at Hood from 1964 to 1990 and served for many years as chair of the Department of Education. The award is a gift from the Estate of Samuel Eig. This year's recipient is Elisabeth E. Smith.

Elisabeth, from Frederick, Md., completed post-baccalaureate certification in secondary education history at Hood. She is currently a middle school teacher in Frederick County.

#### DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

THE EMILY MYERS DAVIS PRIZE is awarded to a student or students for excellence in English courses. This prize was established by Mr. T. Crawley Davis in memory of his wife, Emily Myers Davis, Class of 1943. The prize is shared this year by Jennifer L. Hill and Ameena Shrestha.

Jennifer, a senior from Cumberland, Md., is pursuing a double major in English and communication arts with a concentration in journalism and a minor in Spanish. She has interned at the Hagerstown Magazine, interviewing and writing features and articles for the editorial section. Jennifer has been invited to write a departmental honors paper in which she will focus on modernists American writers.

Ameena, a junior from Nepal, plans to double major in English and communication arts. She plans to write a departmental honors paper next year. Her interests range from literature and religion to biology.

THE JANICE E. COLE WRITING PRIZE, established in 1992 by the humanities faculty of Hood College, is awarded to a student or students who submit in the annual prize competition the most outstanding essay originally written for a course in the humanities. The prize was introduced in 1992 as the Center for the Humanities Prize. It was renamed in spring 1997 in honor of the late Dr. Janice E. Cole, professor of English at Hood for 31 years. Whitney Trettien is the winner of the first prize this year. Elizabeth A. Aghjayan, Karyn A. Necciai and Shannon K. Williams are the recipients of Honorable Mentions.

Whitney, a junior from Frederick, Md., is pursuing a double major in English and philosophy. Her winning paper is titled, "gaest yrre cwom: Xenodocial Hierarchies in Beowulf," written for a special topics course, Studies in Beowulf.

Liz, a sophomore from Kingston, Mass., is majoring in English with a minor in theater and drama. Her winning paper is titled, "Ride a Thousand Days and Nights: Donne, Love and Metaphysical Paradoxes," written for English 222, Introduction to British Literature.

Karyn, a junior from Frederick, Md., is pursuing a double major in history and art, with a concentration in archaeology and a minor in classical studies. Her winning paper is titled, "Sexuality and Deviance in Rome as Depicted in Ancient-Themed Films," written for Art 362, Rome and Hollywood.

THE MARTHA BRINEY HONOR SCHOLARSHIP, established in honor of the late Professor Martha Briney, is awarded to an upperclassman who excels in English literature courses. The scholarship is shared this year by Elizabeth A. Jones, Matthew T. Mize and Rebecca F. Swanger.

Elizabeth, a graduating senior from Emmaus, Pa., is pursuing a double major in English and history. She is chair of the Campus Activities Board and is a member of the Student Government Association executive board. After graduation, she hopes to pursue a master's degree in library science and possibly an advanced degree in the humanities.

Matthew, a graduating senior from Thurmont, Md., is majoring in English.

Rebecca, a junior from Jefferson, Md., is majoring in English. She is pursuing certification to teach in the secondary schools.

THE JANICE E. COLE SCHOLARSHIP FUND, established in memory of Dr. Janice E. Cole, is awarded to a student who has done excellent work in English. The late Dr. Cole taught English at Hood from 1965 to 1996. Beloved by her students and highly respected by her colleagues, Dr. Cole gave unstintingly of her time to countless faculty and College committee. Most of all she was devoted to the students of Hood College, particularly her advisees and those enrolled in her classes. The scholarship is shared this year by Jennifer A. August, Phyllis A. Parker, Owen S. Tremaine and Whitney A. Trettien.

Jennifer, a senior from Point of Rocks, Md., is majoring in English. She is completing certification to teach in secondary schools. Jennifer served in the Army for five years and was stationed in South Korea.

Phyllis, a junior from Woodbine, Md., is pursuing a major in English. She is the co-founder of the Howard County Association of Office Professionals. Her great-grandmother, Leila Walling, attended Hood when it was the Women's Seminary.

Owen, a graduating senior from Thurmont, Md., is majoring in English. He is pursuing certification to teach in secondary schools. Whitney, a junior from Frederick, Md., is pursuing a double major in English and philosophy. She is an Honors Program student and a 2006 Truman Scholar, a national award recognizing public service. She is the founder and co-chair of the Frederick Green Party, a member of Amnesty International and the co-editor of an anthology on the peace movement that will be released later this year from Howling Dog Press. Last August, she was funded by a Second Century Foundation grant to travel to Thailand to teach English. In her free time, she writes, plays music, teaches English, and collects orchids.

THE MARGARET P. FORD HONOR SCHOLARSHIP was established in honor of the late Professor Emerita Margaret P. Ford, who taught English at Hood from 1964 to 1987 and served as chair of the department for many years. # DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY AND POLITICAL SCIENCE

THE LINDA WYATT '69 AND MARLEEN SPRIGGS '69 AWARD IN AFRICAN-AMERICAN STUDIES is given to an outstanding student who has minored in African-American Studies. This book award honors the lives and memory of the first two African-American students to graduate from Hood College. This year's recipients are Cheryl M. Banks and Tiffany M. Sturdivant.

An outstanding student in African-American studies, she has assisted in teaching African-American history, has volunteered in the Office of the Public Defender in Baltimore and has interned for a chief judge in the Maryland Court of Special Appeals. THE DR. HENRY P. AND PAGE LAUGHLIN FACULTY PROFESSIONAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD is conferred annually upon an outstanding faculty member who has made significant contributions to her or his profession or to the College through scholarship or exceptional service.
